Fire Alert System Gets City OK, Aid

Firemen Chip In On System

Olton city councilmen, fearful of over-spending the city's slim budget, scraped up \$750 Tuesday night to subsidize an unbudgeted item - a new radio alerting system for volunteer firemen.

The action came after a request from Fire Chief Tom Smith and Fireman Davis Maxey and a long discussion by the council over whether the budget could stand it.

The fire department asked the city to pitch in \$1,000 to help cover the \$2,500 investment. The firemen themselves are spending \$1,000.

The city's \$750 share of the alerting system brings the total to \$1,750. The department plans to solicit the rest from public-spirited citizens.

One other purchase - foreseen and budgeted - came easier for the council, which voted to spend \$1,500 on a garbage truck.

The firemen's alerting system is called a Plectron Radio-Tone Alerting System. Its installation will result in radio-type receivers being placed in firemen's homes.

These receivers would be operated from the fire station so that when an alarm is sounded, the receiver would act as an alarm clock. After the fireman is awakened a voice would

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On City Council Election

Aw Come On Now, Fellers... Where's The Sportin' Blood?

Who's running in the April 4 city election here? Nobody.

What happens if no one announces? Somebody gets elected by write-in, maybe.

What if the winner won't accept? Olton is without a mayor and two city councilmen.

That would leave three councilmen, Carroll Cox, Clovis Poteet and Dr. Lynn Fite, to run the city's business until another election could be called and someone qualified for the vacancies.

As of today, nine days remain for office-seekers to announce and file. The deadline is March 25 at noon.

Ordinarily, this would be nothing to become anxious about. After all, many elections don't have candidates until the last minute.

But this is Olton, Texas, where mayors and councilmen sometimes are hard to come by.

It wasn't long ago that Olton found itself hunting a mayor. Plenty of candidates were on hand for April, 1959, election and Lefty Hollingsworth won by a slim margin.

But Mayor Hollingsworth suffered a heart attack in May and resigned for reasons of health.

A special election was called for June, but no candidates filed. Major James said he

would serve as mayor if drafted, and he was as good as in. He's been mayor ever since. Times have changed though. Mayor James was asked Tuesday night if he would serve again if elected on a write-in. His answer:

"No."

Councilman Bob Duncan was asked the same question. The answer:

"Not a chance."

And then Councilman Fred Thompson was given his chance. He simply shook his head negatively.

Those three go off the council with the election April 4.

Somebody needs to fill their jobs.

Any takers?

Farmers Facing Puzzling Times

Farmers in the Olton area this week found their future somewhat like a jigsaw puzzle. They faced uncertainty on three fronts: sugar beets, grain and bracos.

Action by the House Agriculture Committee this week slowed the efforts, but not the enthusiasm, of boosters of sugar beet production in West Texas.

The committee endorsed an administration bill to extend the U.S. Sugar Act from March 31, 1961 to Dec. 31, 1962.

The step blackened the hopes of Olton and area farmers that a new sugar law would be forthcoming in the near future.

The proposed emergency feed grain bill has passed both the Senate and the House, and now is in Senate-House conference committee, where a compromise must be reached and given final approval if any bill is to go to the President for signing.

The bill, if it becomes law, would boost government price supports on all feed grains that as yet have not been planted for the 1961 harvest year, for producers who agree to reduce their acreage.

Uncertainty also clouds Public Law 78, the braco measure. Olton area interests feel they must have braco labor for cucumber and other harvests, but some interests are working against extension of the law.

If the law is not extended before June 30, 1961, bracos must report back to Mexico within 30 days, regardless of contracts with associations or farmers.

Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa and Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock denounced the agriculture committee's action on sugar, saying the vote was taken "behind closed doors."

Representatives of sugar beet interests were not permitted to testify on the measure, Rogers said.

Area sugar beet boosters maintain that domestic pro-

ducers should be given the right to supply all or part of the previous Cuban quota, which was cut off by President Eisenhower.

The sugar bill reported by the committee continues the right of the President to keep in effect the present embargo against sugar from Cuba, but authorizes him to import from other foreign countries the amount previously obtained from Cuba.

Rep. Rogers and others representing sugar beet interests in this area plan to request "full consideration of the issue on the floor so that proper amendments can be offered."

City Among Next 6 On New Post Office

Olton is among the next six communities on the Post Office Department's list for new postoffices, it was learned this week.

Postmaster I.B. (Doc) Holt said he had learned this fact in a conversation with authorities at Lubbock.

"It isn't definite just how soon a new office will be located here," he said.

However, the postmaster indicated that definite plans probably will be made within the next few months.

Holt pointed out that the Olton office has shown an increase in postal receipts each year in the past 10 years. "Ten years ago, our receipts were about \$9,000 annually," he said.

Since 1954, receipts have climbed this way: 1954, \$19,292; 1955, \$20,002; 1956, \$22,758; 1957, \$22,937; 1958, \$25,959; 1959, \$27,633; 1960, \$28,358.

Speaker Challenges Teachers

A share of the job ahead in keeping America at the forefront of the world must be shouldered by teachers in Olton schools and others like it across the United States.

That challenge was issued by Dr. Charles Matthews, superintendent of Plainview schools, in an address last Friday night at the Olton Teacher Appreciation Banquet.

More than 200 persons were on hand at the school cafeteria for the event, which is held each year in honor of the 50 teachers in Olton schools.

Dr. Matthews posed the questions, "Whose century is the 21st?" and proceeded to answer it this way:

"It can be ours if we teach not only science and math, but also the benefits of our American Free Enterprise system, our heritage."

Leading up the question, Dr. Matthews pointed out that Spain dominated the 16th Century, the Dutch the 17th, France the 18th, and the British the 19th.

"The first six-tenths of the 20th Century belongs to the United States," he said, "but the Communists are gaining."

One-third of the world's population is dominated by the Sino-Russian cause and one-third by those who believe in Democracy and God, he added.

"Which way will the other third go? Whose century is the 21st?" he asked.

Then he challenged teachers to delve more into the benefits of the American way of life in their daily work.

At the same time, he challenged the public in general to meet the needs of the schools and teacher salaries.

"I believe this can be done with Texas money," he said, "without looking outside the boundaries of this state."

Dr. Matthews was introduced by Joe Harper, Olton superintendent of schools, Master of ceremonies was W. C. Gunter. Invocation was by the Rev. John Lewis, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Entertainment was provided by the Blue Notes, school orchestra directed by Richard Bentz, and the High School Sextet, directed by Mrs. Joe Harper.

Olton Red Cross Drive Over Top

Olton is the first community in Lamb County to reach its goal in the county Red Cross Chapter's fund campaign for 1961.

Fred Hicks, campaign leader here, reported Wednesday that contributions in Olton totaled \$157, just above the \$150 goal.

Olton Schools Show Top Gain In Lamb Census

Olton schools counted a record 1,260 students in the 1961 school census, showing the largest gain of any school in Lamb County.

Figures for all Lamb County schools were revealed this week by Jerry Lumsden, county school superintendent.

Olton schools recorded an increase of 56 students over the 1960 census. Amherst showed a gain of 39 and Littlefield an increase of 25. The county as a whole is up to 101 students to 5,614.

The 1961 totals by school districts were: Littlefield, 2203; Olton, 1260; Springlake, 785; Sudan, 722; Amherst, 416; and Spade, 228.

Car Inspection Deadline Nears; 4 Stations Here

Less than half of the 13,969 vehicles in Lamb County have been state-inspected as time ticks away on the April 15 deadline.

That word came this week from the Texas Department of Public Safety office at Lubbock. TDPS said only 5,451 vehicles have been inspected in this county.

"Motorists who wish to avoid the long lines to obtain annual motor inspection stickers," said Captain Alan Johnson, motor vehicles supervisor.

Drivers operating vehicles registered in Texas on public roads after April 15 without the 1961 stickers will be subject to arrest and a fine of up to \$200 plus court costs, Johnson added.

Trailers with a gross weight exceeding 4,000 pounds also must be inspected.

The inspection stickers may be obtained in Olton from Hall-Sides Motors, Thompson-Chevrolet, Bodkin-Nixon Implement and Olton Motor Company, the four official inspection stations here.

First, second and consolation trophies will be given.

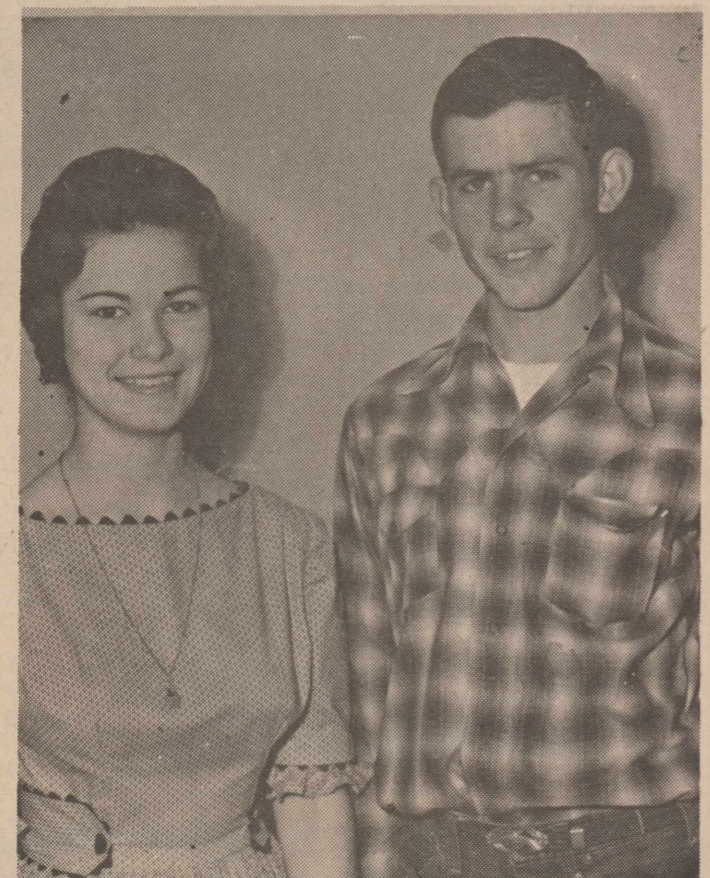
Freedom Course To End Tonight

Sesame Boosted As Area Crop At Meeting Here

Robert Parker of Paris, executive vice-president of Texas Sesame Growers, Inc., described costs and profits on sesame at a special meeting at Olton Farm Supply Monday night.

Almost 50 farmers from points throughout the Olton area attended the meeting, which was preceded by a chili supper. Parker said studies have shown the sesame oil performed milo on net returns in this area in 1960.

Citing a cost and income study made in this area, Parker said average yield on sesame in 1960 was 990 pounds per acre, while milo average yield was 4,500 pounds.

On prices of \$1.40 for milo and \$10.50 for sesame, gross income was \$63 per acre on milo and \$103.95 on sesame. Total production costs per acre were determined to be \$38.59 on milo and \$44.99 on sesame, leaving an average net of \$24.41 on milo and \$58.96 on sesame, Parker said.

Bill Kimbrough, county agent, was master of ceremonies at the meeting.

tell him where the fire is. "This would eliminate having to use the siren at night," said Fire Chief Smith. "When the wind is up it's hard to hear at a distance anyway."

The fire chief also pointed out that the siren could be used at night exclusively to warn of tornadoes.

"Whenever people heard the siren at night, they could be sure it's a tornado, rather than wondering whether it's a fire or a storm," he said.

Maxey said he had learned the new alerting system would save citizens a total of \$500 a year on the city's key rate for fire insurance.

"We certainly believe it's worth the investment," Smith said.

Councilmen, studying the budget, found that the total amount budgeted for the fire department for the year is about \$1,985. They saw some possibility of expenses running less than that, but not \$1,000 worth.

However, they agreed the alerting system would be beneficial and Councilman Carroll Cox moved that the city give \$750 toward the purchase. The motion got unanimous approval.

On another item dealing with the fire department, the council voted, 4-1, to set up \$200 a piece for each of three firemen to attend Firemen's School at Texas A&M this summer.

Councilman Cox voted against the proposal, saying he felt "you can get the amount too high."

Purchase of a garbage truck planned earlier when the budget was made up, got unanimous approval of the council. A total of \$1,900 had been set up for the truck, but Councilman Fred Thompson located a suitable vehicle for \$1,500.

The council voted to buy the truck, a 1957 model, six-cylinder Chevrolet with hoist, on condition that it met the approval of Thompson, an auto dealer.

On another item, the council voted to go along with a request from Bob Saunders, district manager of General Telephone Company, for a restriction on future 4-party residence phones here.

Saunders said the company would offer only one and two-party phones in the city in the future, but he added that those residence already on four-party service would not be affected.

"They can keep the four-party line if they like," the district manager said.

Saunders said the restriction on four-party lines in the future would enable the company to operate more efficiently here.
