## City Council Vote Draws Two Runners

### Gullett, Polk File For Spots

It appeared for a while no one would show, but Olton's city election may turn into a horse race, after all.

As of Wednesday at 5 p.m. when the city hall closed for the day, it was "one for the money and two for the show."

Two office-seekers had filed and observers were looking for more.

First to announce was Charles Polk, who came out for one of the two councilman openings. Polk and his wife operate the House of Flowers and he doubles as an insurance salesman.

Bob Gullett, employed at Higginbotham-Bartlett, entered the political chute Wednesday afternoon. He filed about 3:30 p.m. for a councilman post.

What the election still lacked late Wednesday was the "three to make ready," a third candidate to run for mayor.

Of course, it'll take a fourth candidate and more to turn the Tuesday, April 4, election into a real race.

Time's running short for candidates to announce. They have until Saturday at noon, March 25, to file, according to city officials.

Out going members of the city council are Major James, mayor; and Bob Duncan and Fred Thompson, councilmen. All have said they won't seek re-election.

The city election isn't the only one on the schedule for April 4. Set the same day is balloting in the special senate election.

Seventy-one candidates are on the Lamb County ballot. They will be listed in alphabetical order.

Absentee voting, which has attracted only seven persons in the county thus far, continues until March 31.

Scheduled Saturday, April 1, is the school board election. Seven candidates are in the race for two posts. They are: Bill J. Langford, Cleo Smith, Don Williams, Winston Bley, O.J. Neeley, Jean W. Hall and Mrs. A.E. Cade.

Absentee voting in the Olton school election continues at the county courthouse until Tuesday, March 28.

## Area Gas Users Form Organization

About 80 farmers of the Olton area became a part of the recently formed "Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association" at a meeting Tuesday night in the high school auditorium here.

Officers of the Olton area group are Elmer McGill, chairman, and V.Y. Jefferies, alternate chairman.

Approximately 750 farmers who use natural gas for irrigation fuel in the Panhandle and South Plains region have formed the parent organization.

David Burgess of Tulla is president, while Don Anderson of Crosbyton is vice-president and True Rosser of Petersburg is secretary-treasurer.

Purpose of the group is to secure fuel for irrigation motors at the lowest possible price. The move has mushroomed over a period of six weeks as a result of county and community meetings in 11 counties.

Leaders of the association expect it to spread to some 30 to 40 counties where irrigation wells are being operated presently on natural gas.

Motivating factor for the creation of the gas users group was the notification recently by Pioneer Natural Gas Co. to the irrigation farmers of this area that a rate increase would be affected.

Assisting in organization of the association in Lamb County was Gene Templeton of Earth.

## 1,500 View Second Annual Event

### 18 Blue Ribbon Winners Get Trip To Region Science Fair

The weather outside was frightful, but more than 1,500 Olton residents found the schools' Second Annual Science Fair delightful here Friday night.

The crowd, including about 1,150 students, viewed more than 300 exhibits of various scientific nature in the All-Purpose Room of H.P. Webb Elementary Building.

Eighteen of those exhibits were selected for Regional Science Fair competition at Lubbock April 14-15.

Ratings of I, II, and III were given in each of four divisions, elementary, intermediate, junior and senior. First place winners received blue ribbons, second place red and third place white. Gold stars were given to those who became regional science fair entrants.

Judges were Mrs. Inez Robinson, Dimmitt High School teacher; Weldon Schaefer, instructor at Texas Tech; and Doug Sopher, Olton.

They placed the exhibits according to the following standards: scientific thought, 30; creative ability, 30; thoroughness, 15; clarity and dramatic skill, 15; and technical skill, 10.

"Members of the Olton High Science Club have done an outstanding job in bringing about the Science Fair," said James Caley, director of the event.

"In events such as this, there is a tremendous amount of work to be done behind the scenes. These Science Club members are the unsung heroes of the Fair," he said.

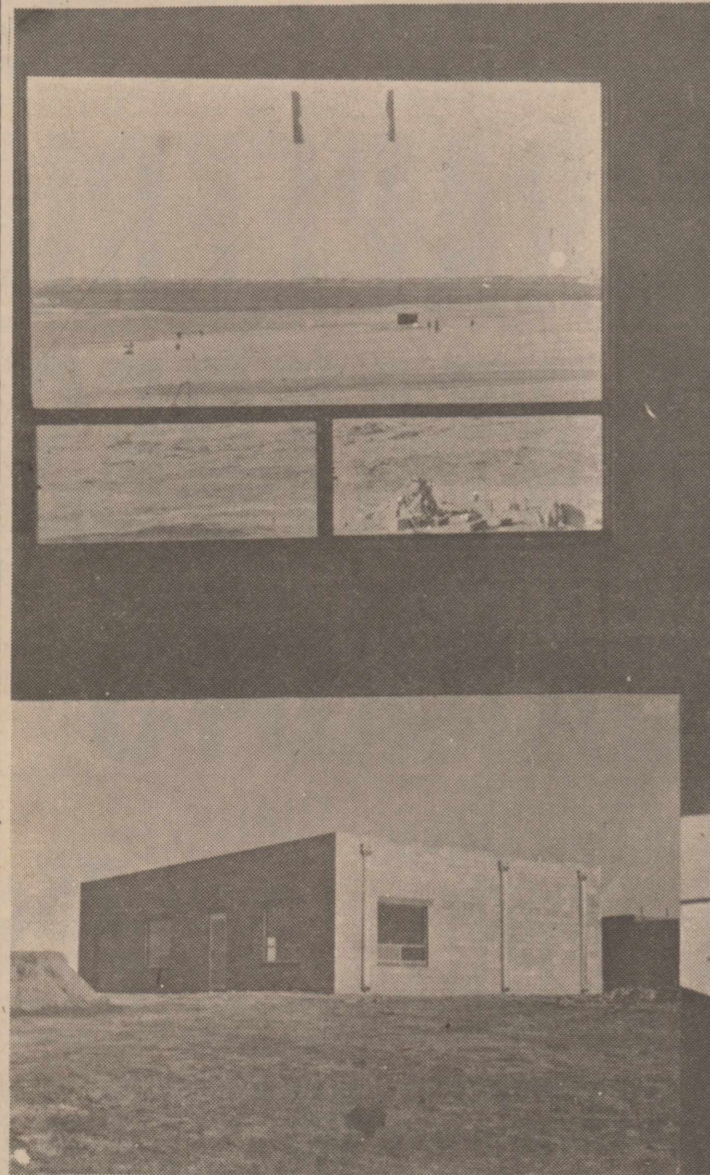

## Former Olton Minister Dies In Abilene

Rev. Chester Watt, 53, of Plainview, former Olton minister, died Tuesday night at Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Rev. Watt was born in Idaho, June 20, 1907 and was reared in Gunderock, Neb. He and the former Johnnie Koen were married in December 1932.

At the time of his death, he was pastor at the Date Street Baptist Church in Plainview. He had served there since May 1960.

He was pastor at the First Baptist Church in Olton from the fall of 1948 to the spring of 1951. After leaving Olton, he went to the First Baptist Church in Lovington, N.M., where he served from 1951-56. He organized the Calvary Baptist Church in Lovington and served there until 1959. He went to Plainview after leaving Lovington.

Rev. Watt was graduated from Baylor University in Waco and Southwestern Theological Seminary at Fort Worth.

Survivors include his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Jay Wilkey of Abilene; one son, John of Plainview, husband of the former Miss Doris Gray of Olton; one brother, two sisters and one grandchild.

Services were conducted today in the First Baptist Church in Plainview.

funds, there is a natural interest in the purposes for which the money will be used," said Percy Parsons of Olton, chairman of the Lamb County Cancer Society Chapter.

"Fortunately," said Parsons, "this question can be answered accurately in the case of the programs of the American Cancer Society. The Society feels, that this kind of interest is healthy, and beneficial, and wants everyone to know how this money is used."

"Research to win the final battle against cancer is first on the priority list for funds," Parsons continued. "This year," Parsons said, "thirty-four cents of every dollar contributed by Texas people will be spent for cancer research in Texas Research Institutions. This amount is steadily increasing, and at the present time more than \$550,000 is allocated for support of current research projects."

Education of the public to cancer's seven danger signals is probably next in line of importance because of the great number of lives that can be saved today, Parsons emphasized. "For this purpose, the Society in Texas will spend twenty-three cents of each dollar this year," he said.

"Another very important phase of our program is service to cancer patients," Parsons went on. "Through many county units and from the Texas Division, cancer patients are provided with dressings, loan closet and comfort items and other services," Parsons pointed out. "This work," he said, "accounts for eleven cents of each Texas Crusade dollar for cancer."

"Adding greatly to the effective program of cancer control in Texas is the very active participation of physicians, dentists and nurses throughout the state," said Parsons. "Providing professional information and films for these very important groups, as well as support for clinical fellowship and support of tumor clinics and cancer registries is done at an expense of twenty cents of each dollar."

"In any effort the size of the ACS program in Texas," concluded Parsons, "there is naturally an expense of administrative work and of supplies for our campaign. We are proud, in this case, that the money spent for both these things is very low. Only eight cents of each dollar goes for the materials to reach three million Texas families during the Crusade, and only four cents is used for administration and development of the program."
