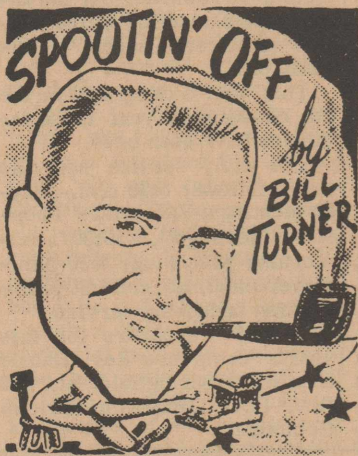

Almost 50 Turn Out As Football Drills Open

'Good Eating' Is Lunchroom Motto

Time for lunch? How about chicken, creamed potatoes, fruit cup, hot rolls and butter, chocolate cake and milk? Sound pretty good?

This could be described as a "Type A" lunch, the kind served every day of the school year at Olton school cafeteria.

Olton kiddos will get their first meal of the year at noon Monday Sept. 3 when school opens.

Technically, a "Type A" lunch, is defined as one having a two ounce serving of cooked or canned meat, fish, poultry, beef, pork or other protein rich foods such as eggs, cheese, dry peas or beans or peanut butter; at least three-fourths cup serving of raw or cooked vegetables or fruit or both; one or more slices of bread or hot rolls or cornbread which is made of enriched flour and meal; two tablespoons of butter,

either cooked with the food or served with the bread; and one-half pint of whole milk.

In addition to these requirements, Olton also serves a dessert of fruit, cobbler, cake, doughnut, ice cream, cookies or candy bar.

White milk is served each day, with the exception of Thursday, when students have a choice of white or chocolate.

Elementary students are served lunch first starting at 11:15 a.m. They also have a milk break around 2 o'clock and have a choice of white or chocolate milk. Milk tickets for 20 days cost 60 cents.

Elementary student lunches cost 30 cents each or five day lunch tickets may be purchased for \$1.50 and 20 day tickets for \$6.

Student lunches for junior high and high school students cost 35 cents each with five day tickets selling for \$1.75 and 20 day tickets for \$7.

Teachers and other school personnel are charged 35 cents for meals and visitors pay 50 cents for a meal.

Students are asked to purchase lunch tickets Aug. 30 and 31 when they register.

Dr. Johns Elected New Councilman

Dennis Appears As Write-In Candidate

Only one candidate's name appeared on the ballot at Olton's city council election Tuesday, but, in reality, two candidates were in the race.

Dr. Basil Johns, only candidate to announce, took the election with 205 votes.

A write-in candidate, H.L. Dennis, came in with 102 votes. The total of 307 votes cast was, for Olton, a strong turnout at the polls.

Only 146 votes were counted at the April election in which G.H. Buchenau, C.C. Galloway and Bob Gullett were elected to the Council.

Most of the voting came late in the afternoon. In fact, the polls were busiest just before they closed at 7 p.m.

Only 52 votes had been cast at 1 p.m. Tuesday.

A telephone campaign, sponsored by the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, is credited with having turned out a great many voters.

"We not only called them once, we called them twice and some three times," one member of the telephone committee said.

Elementary Registration Set Aug. 30

Children who will be six years old on or before Sept. 1 are asked to attend school Aug. 30 and 31 from 8:40 until 11:30 a.m. each day.

Those who have not already presented birth certificates are asked to bring one with them Aug. 30. Each child will be required to have a small pox vaccination upon entering school.

Children who will be in second, third, fourth, and fifth grades will register Aug. 30 and Aug. 31. Registration will be held from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. each day. Children will be free to go home after they have registered with the teacher to which they are assigned. Names will be listed by the door of each room.

Farmers Get Soil Reports Here Tuesday

Copies of the new soil survey report will be distributed to area farmers next Tuesday night at a meeting set for 7:45 p.m. in the school lunchroom.

Farmers will also be instructed in the use of the book at that time.

The report covers a complete soil survey made in Lamb County and is expected to be of use to land owners, bankers, real estate agencies, tax people, fertilizer dealers and numerous other businesses.

In making the survey, soil scientists checked the fields and native grasslands in all parts of the county. They dug holes and examined surface soils and subsoils, measured slopes with a hand level, noted differences in growth of crops, weeds, brush and grasses and recorded observations about the soils that they believed might affect their suitability for farming, engineering and other uses.

The survey was made by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Texas Extension Service and other agencies.

The soil scientists plotted the soil boundaries on aerial photographs. Then cartographers prepared from the photographs the detailed soil maps in the book with fields, roads, pipelines and other landmarks.

Refreshments at the meeting will be served by the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Hobby Keeps Him Busy And Happy

"Yessir, I'm kinda proud of these kids," V.L. Smitty, deputy sheriff, better known as "Smitty" around Olton, stood looking up at a bulletin board plastered with snapshots of "his kids."

The boys, in this case, are youngsters from Westview Boys Home at Hollis, Okla. It doesn't take very long talking to Smitty to realize that this is no casual pastime for him. Smitty sorta looks up at you with a little quint and a slow grin and says: "Well, you see, boys are my hobby. Now you take this one over here," he points to one... and Smitty is off on his favorite subject...boys.

With three sons of their own, Billy of Lamesa, V.L. Jr. of Earth and Joe Oliver of Littlefield, Smitty and his wife, Alice, have had plenty of home experience with boys.

With the county as his workshop, Smitty, in the past ten years, has come to know almost all of the youngsters around Olton and many from other towns in the area.

When a reporter drove up to his home this week, Smitty was out shining up his police car and listening to a young Latin boy. The boy seemed to be doing most of the talking while Smitty listened and nodded his head every now and then.

When asked about the youth, Smitty said: "Well, they have their problems. They come out and talk to me sometime... Latin boys and white boys... listen and maybe it helps them."

It's obvious that Smitty enjoys every minute of it.

"When I get to feeling blue or something," he noted, "I just take off and go up to the boys home. Guess it's like some people go fishing or play golf. With me, it's boys."

He said he tries to get up to the Home several times a year and proudly noted that they had only lost two boys out of 300 in the past five years.

"We had two go bad," he said.

Only one girl's picture appeared on Smitty's bulletin board. When asked about her, he answered:

"That's about the only girl I've really worked with and she sure has turned out fine."

"I got a letter from her just last week," he continued, "She's up in the state of Washington now going to college."

Smitty started his work with local boys when he helped organize the Cub Scouts and went around collecting money for a building.

"There's grown men here now that I had in the Cub Scouts," he laughed.

The Smiths regularly send clothes, groceries or hay or "whatever we think they can use" to the boys' home. Last year they had about 35 of them down to Olton for about two days.

"You never saw so many kids," Smitty said with a gleam in his eye. "People brought all kinds of food to help feed them. We sent 35 pounds of cookies back with them."

When asked if he had any theory in his work with boys, the deputy sheriff answered slowly:

"Well, I've found that the right home, the right environment, right recreation and right supervision will save 99 boys out of a 100."

He likes to tell about the "stamp" school-bus at the boys' home, too.

"I guess you can get anything with stamps," he laughed, "cause we got a schoolbus."

Ladies of the Church of Christ contributed books to make the purchase.

"I think it took 2,370 books to get that bus," Smitty grinned.

One of the things he is proudest of is a letter he received recently from the Amherst MYF, after he spoke to the group during Youth Week.

The letter concludes:

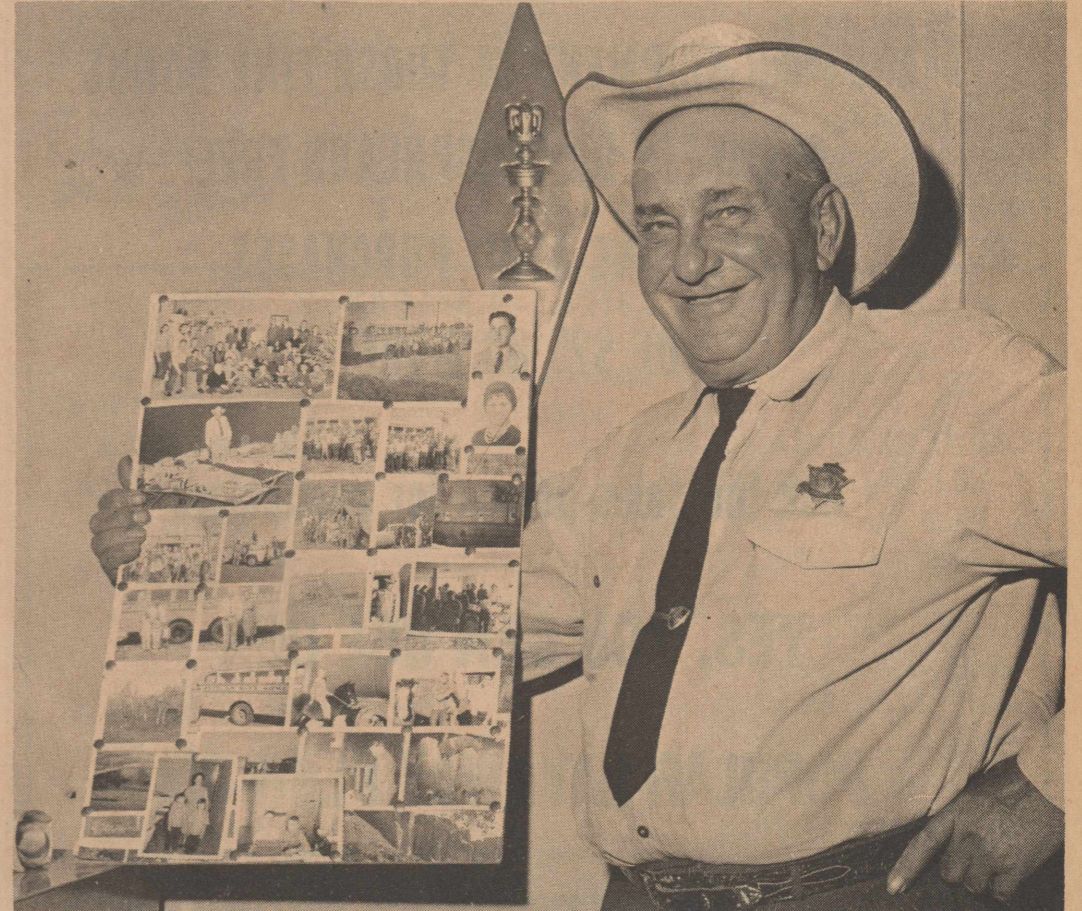
"...continue in your good work with these youth and surely God will bless you."

Costs On Auto Vacations Running Higher This Year

Vacation expenditures, for residents of Lamb County traveling by automobile, are running higher this year than they did last.

The reason for it? An increase in the cost of overnight accommodations, an increase in tolls and a hike in gasoline and other taxes in some areas.

The sad news comes from the Commerce Clearing House and from the Automobile Club of New York.

The finding is that the average couple, driving 300 miles a day, must figure on a daily budget of \$31 for necessary spending. This is \$2 more than was needed last summer.

It breaks down to \$10.50 for meals and snacks, \$11 for overnight lodgings, \$7 for car operations and \$2.50 for tolls and miscellaneous needs.

Also being encountered, in many states, are higher taxes on gasoline, cigarettes and on purchases in general, which are subject to sales taxes in 37 states.

A "vacation tax map," issued by the Commerce Clearing House, shows gas taxes ranging from five cents a gallon to eight cents.

Cigarette taxes, collected in all but three states, begin at two cents a pack and reach a high of eight cents.

As for sales taxes, they go from a low of two percent to a top of four percent.

These are state taxes. In addition, there are the usual Federal taxes and, sometimes, overlapping local levies.

In the State of Texas, vacationers are paying five cents on gasoline, two percent in sales taxes and eight cents on cigarettes.

Of much more importance to the Lamb County car owner than these trip expenditures, is the bigger question of how much it is costing him per year to own and operate his car.

According to the American Automobile Association, the cost was a little higher in the past year than in 1960.

For the driver of a standard-size car in the moderate price group, were usage was at

the average rate of 10,000 miles a year, it amounted to nearly \$1,204.

The biggest item was depreciation, followed by insurance, fuel, maintenance and license fees.

The total in the county, for the 8,550 passenger cars under registration last January, came to \$10,294,000.

Filling stations in Lamb County had a good year, taking in \$2,242,000 of this amount.
