## Superintendent Gets Vote Of Confidence

### Board OK's 3-Year Pact

Olton school trustees gave Supt. Johnny Clark Jr. a vote of confidence in the form of a renewal of his three-year contract at a regular board meeting Tuesday night.

The board renewed Clark's contract at his current salary, \$11,500 per year, and lauded the superintendent's work since he came here in July of 1961. That action topped the night's discussions, which also included:

1. Approval of reports on the lunchroom, athletic fund, enrollment, transportation, and tax collections.
2. Appointment of a school census trustee, Mrs. Rex Chitwood, who served in that capacity last year.
3. Employment of a bus driver, Carl McClure, for a new route authorized last month by the Texas Education Agency. The school purchased a new bus for the route recently, at a cost of \$3,675.

The lunchroom continued to show a deficit, although its financial situation is improved over last year. Reports showed a deficit of \$3,500 as of Dec. 3, compared with \$2,900 in the red at the start of the fiscal year, Sept. 31.

The school system's long-time athletic fund debt was pared considerably last month, as payments of \$2,621 reduced the debt to \$7,100. At the start of the new year, athletic fund totaled \$9,625.50.

Average daily attendance for the second six weeks showed a slight gain, with a total of 1,156 compared with 1,135 during the first six weeks period. All of the gain was in the elementary school, where the average attendance was 650, compared with 620 during the first six weeks.

Enrollment for the second six weeks in white schools was 1,229, compared with 1,227 during the first six weeks.

Tax collections at the end of November were \$64,891.28, compared with \$69,398.57 at the same time a year ago.

George Redinger, a farmer and long-time civic worker, will head the Chamber in 1963. He succeeds James Hall, local auto dealer.

Dan Gregory, grain man, was elected vice-president, with Basil Sherman as secretary-treasurer.

The new leaders were selected at a regular meeting of organization's board of directors.

Attending their first session as new directors were Sherman, George Caddel, Bill Walden and Walter Lewis. All four were elected at the general membership meeting.

The directors also named Hall, the past president, to serve as an ex-officio member of the board of directors and the executive board.

### Girl Cagers Split Pair

Olton's Fillies split a pair of games with Abernathy's girls and the Mustangs dropped two more encounters in basketball action over the past week.

The Fillies ran their season record to 4-2, winning over Abernathy here last Friday night, 58-48, then falling in a tilt at Abernathy, 60-56, Tuesday night.

The Ponies lost to Littlefield, 54-34, and to Abernathy, 66-32. That made their record 0-4. Olton B boys dropped their opener of the season to Littlefield B, 33-31.

Both the boys and girls get back into action today, with play beginning in a tournament at Happy. Complete schedule of the tourney is carried in a story inside today's Enterprise.

After the tournament, the A and B boys travel to Littlefield next Tuesday night. Olton girls have an open date that night.

The Fillies played without the services of Cheryl Poret Tuesday night, but they almost pulled off the victory as Gayle Nicholas tallied 52 points, a season high for her and probably for the whole area.

Against Littlefield, the Mustangs got fine point production from George Jones, who tallied 19, but the Wildcats took an early lead and were never headed. Ronnie Parsons picked up five in that game.

In the boys' Abernathy game, Parsons picked up 13 points, Jones six and Rusty Sherman five, but they couldn't hold up to the Antelopes, who had four players in double figures.

In other activity at the Tuesday morning meeting, the board announced that the third Sabin Oral Sunday, originally scheduled for this coming Sunday, has been postponed. Type III of the vaccine, one which was involved in controversy, was scheduled to be given. A date for the third SOS Clinic will be announced later.

Among projects discussed for 1963 last Thursday night, about 10 had the most interest. C-CA Manager Melvin McReynolds said all will be considered for action in 1963, with those having the most interest getting top priority.

Easily the two with top interest were: (1) Attempt to obtain an airstrip here, and

(2) Acquire right-of-way for widening of Highway 70.

Another project to be given priority will be one which would create a Board of City Development.

Other proposed projects are: Attempt to obtain vegetable or food processing plant.

Try to establish city park and work with Baseball Assn on local field.

Continue efforts to get a new post office.

Creation of a Youth Center.

Secure more farm-to-market roads near the community.

Work for a lower speed limit on highways here and enforce such lower limits.

Sponsor annual clean-up campaign.

## Cotton Allotments Cut 10 Per Cent In County

All Olton farms, along with those in the rest of the county, will show a straight 10.18 per cent cut from the 1962 cotton allotment next year, Lamar A. Ten, ASC office, Littlefield, said this week.

A ten stressed that the cut would be uniform all over the county with the 10.18 per cent off, on each farm.

He noted that some farmers might think they have received more of a cut due to additional acreage which they have had from other counties.

The cut leaves Lamb County with a 184,894 acre allotment for the 1963 crop.

This is higher than the 1960 crop, 180,677 acres, but more

than 20,000 acres behind this year's allotment, 205,846 acres.

The question now with local farmers is how much they will receive in released acres.

This year, the county received 2452 released acres.

The state's allotment cut amounted to 12 per cent while the nation, as a whole, received a 10 per cent cut.

The local harvest has been delayed this year due to bad weather. Some farmers began stripping Wednesday as the sun shone for the second straight day.

Six area gins reported 14,878 bales ginned Wednesday. This is 7,497 bales behind this time last year, when 22,275 bales ginned were reported.

Senior Play will be presented Friday night in the high school auditorium at 7:30 p.m.

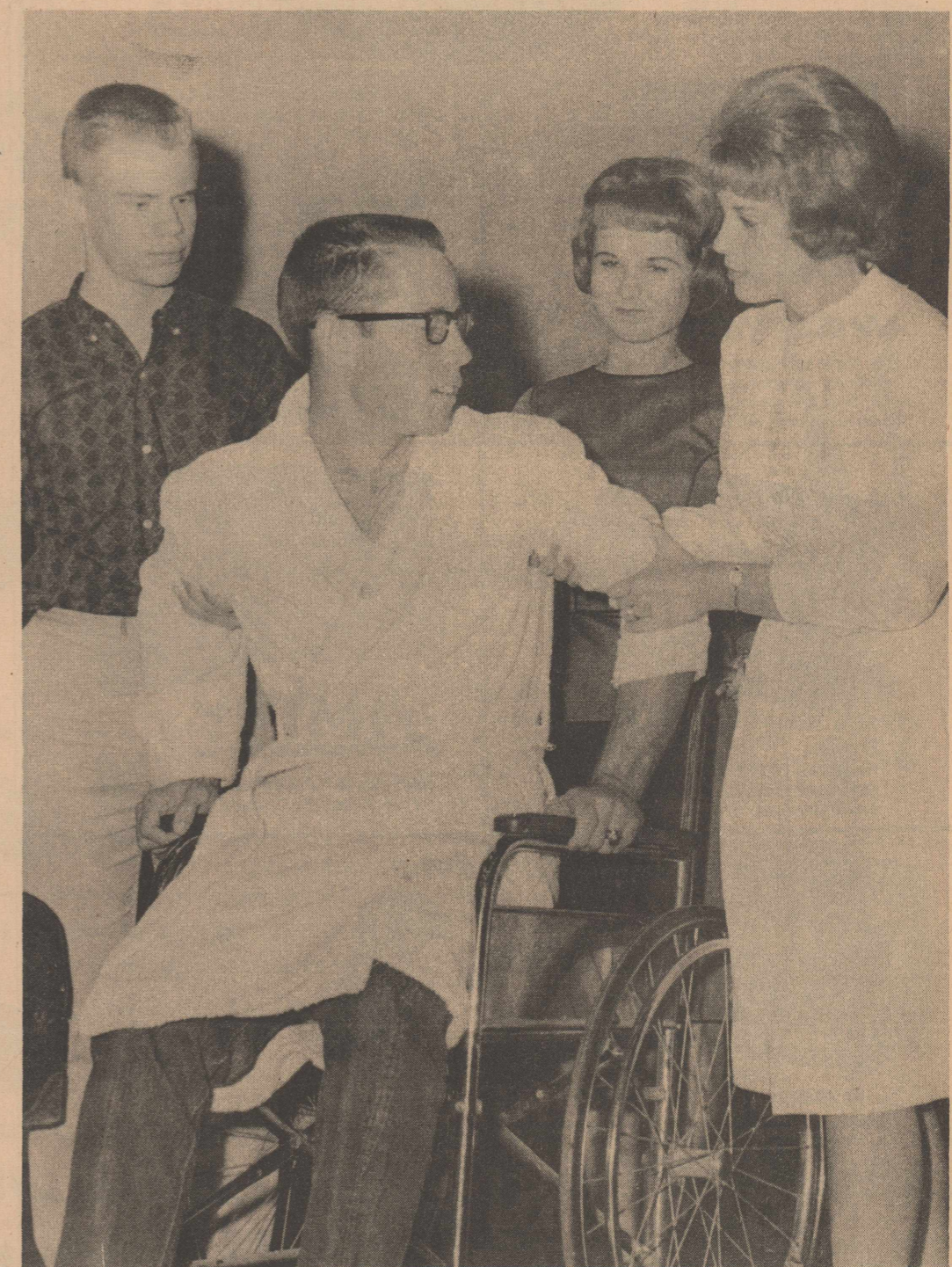

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

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF MEATS, REGULATION OF SLAUGHTER HOUSES, REGULATION OF HANDLING OF MEATS, PROHIBITING SALE OF UNSPECTED OR UNWHOLE SOME MEAT OR MEAT FOOD PRODUCTS, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF AN ASSISTANT TO THE CITY HEALTH OFFICER, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS, AND DECLARING EMERGENCIES, REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, CONTAINING SAVINGS CLAUSE, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, expose, or offer for sale in the City of Olton, Texas, as well as to bring into the City of Olton, for human consumption, any meat, or meat food products of any cattle, calves, sheep, goats, or swine, unless same has been inspected by Federal State or Municipal authority at the time of slaughter, and unless the same bears the imprint, seal, mark, brand, stamp of Federal, State or Municipal inspectors showing that same has been inspected and approved as fit for human consumption.

SECTION 2. INSPECTION. The City Health Officer, with the approval of the City Council, shall act as the Chief meat inspector for the City of Olton who shall be required to inspect all meat and meat food products of any cattle, calves, sheep, goats or swine that are offered or exposed for sale in the City of Olton or that may be brought into the City of Olton for sale for human consumption. However, no inspection shall be required for meats that have been previously inspected and approved by Federal authorities. State shall have the right to appoint an assistant to assist him in the performance of such duties.

The City shall collect as inspection fees for the inspection of carcasses as follows, to-wit: The sum of \$.50 per head as inspection fee for inspection of each carcass. The City Secretary shall be such methods as may be deemed best, provided for the time and manner of the collection of said fees, and the sum or sums so collected shall be paid into the hands of the City Treasurer who in turn shall pay the inspector as the City Council may direct.

SECTION 4. SANITATION OF SLAUGHTERHOUSES. (a) There shall be abundant light, both natural and artificial, of good quality and well distributed, and sufficient ventilation for all rooms and compartments to insure sanitary conditions.

(b) There shall be an efficient drainage and plumbing system for the establishment and premises, and all drains and gutters shall be properly installed with approved traps and vents.

(c) Hot water for cleaning rooms and equipment shall be delivered under pressure to sufficient convenient outlets and shall be of such temperature as to accomplish a thorough cleanup.

(d) The floors, walls, ceilings, partitions, posts, doors, and other parts of all structures shall be of such materials, construction and finish as will make them susceptible of being readily and thoroughly cleaned. The floors shall be kept watertight. The rooms and compartments used for edible products shall be separate and distinct from those used for inedible products.

(e) The rooms and compartments in which any product is prepared or handled shall be free from dust and from odors from dressing and toilet rooms, catchbasins, hide cellars, casing rooms, inedible tank and fertilizer rooms, and livestock pens.

(f) Every practicable precaution shall be taken to exclude flies, rats, mice, and other vermin from slaughterhouses. The use of poisons for any purpose in rooms or compartments where any unpacked product is stored or handled is forbidden.

(g) Water closets, toilet rooms and dressing rooms shall be required for employees and such rooms shall be entirely separated from compartments in which carcasses are dressed, or meat or meat food products are stored, placed, handled or prepared. Such facilities shall be properly supplied, lighted, ventilated, and kept in a sanitary condition.

(h) Rooms, compartments, places, equipment and utensils used for preparing, storing, or otherwise handling any product, and all other parts of the establishment, shall be kept clean and in sanitary condition. There shall be no handling or storing of materials which create an objectionable condition in rooms, compartments, or places where products are prepared, stored, or otherwise handled.

(i) No employee or other person shall be permitted to expectorate on the floor but cuspidors shall be provided which shall be kept sanitary.

(k) Conveyances in which meat or meat food products are delivered shall be so constructed, closed or covered that the contents shall be kept clean.

**SECTION 5. SLAUGHTERING MUST BE DON AT ABATTOIRS;**

From and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, association or butcher to erect, establish, re-form, maintain and/or operate any abattoir or slaughter house where animals are slaughtered, to be used as food or offered for sale or sold for food within the limits of the City of Olton, where such abattoir or slaughter house is not constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with all the provisions in this ordinance and any violation of same in any any violation of this provision shall be deemed a misdemeanor and on conviction of same in any court of competent jurisdiction, such person, firm, agent or employee of any corporation or association or any butcher shall be punished by fine of not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each day's violation shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 6. VALIDITY AND CONSTITUTIONALITY. If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be void, ineffective or unconstitutional for any cause whatsoever, such declaration or holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining Sections and provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. ORDINANCES REPEALED. All Ordinances or parts of ORDINANCES in conflict herewith shall be and are hereby repealed.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after its due passage and publication according to law.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—Twenty changes in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170,000,000 into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jop S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income— if recommendations are adopted—would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicles sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year.
2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.
3. Exempt sales made to state

banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.

4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.

5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from exempt items.

ELECTION CHANGES—The Election Law Study Committee released a 221 page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.

Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of scratching those opposed.
2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.
3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.
4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers,

magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.

5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.

6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

DEBT INCREASED—State Treasurer Jesse James reports that the deficit in the General Revenue Fund increased by \$6,000,000 between November 11 and November 23, when it was \$34,146,666.

GUARDSMEN WAIT—Waiting for approval of armories under the federal-state building program are 32 units of the Texas National Guard.

Federal government, which underwrites 75 per cent of the cost of each armory, is approving construction at the average rate of six per year, but there is no priority arrangement.

So far, 11 armories have been built under the program, according to Harry B. Kelton, director of the Texas National Guard Armory Board.

Eight are under construction at Bonham, Seguin, Dallas, Mexia, Kerens, Mission, Mercedes and Harlingen. Units at Brownwood, Tulia and Fredericksburg have approval for construction.

On the waiting list are units in El Paso, Clipper, Canyon, Belton, Olney, Houston, Electra, Wynnboro, Galveston, Paris, Taylor, Kingsville, Austin, Port Neches, Gatesville, Alice, Huntsville, Borger, Pecos, Monahans, San Antonio, Sulphur Springs, Grand Prairie and New Boston.

RUNS AT STANDSTILL—The "run rate" at Gatesville State School for Boys has been reduced to zero since September 4, when the new \$2,000,000 Mountain View School for serious offenders was opened.

School was dedicated last Saturday in a public ceremony featuring an address by Gov. Price Daniel.

Weldon Brewer of the Texas Youth Council said the "run rate" has been cut down gradually over the past five years. In 1958-59, when the average

monthly population at Gatesville was 1,115 boys, there was a monthly average of 51 escapes. In 1959-60, with 1,197 boys, there were 44 escapes a month. In 1960-61, with 1,364 boys, there were 31 escapes. In 1961-62, there were 1,502 boys with only 24 escapes.

"A walled home may seem cruel to some people," Brewer remarked. "But it's a very humane arrangement when you realize that the boys within are able to take part in a training program and group recreation."

Before the new school was opened, the boys who broke out had to be confined to a small room.

Guards on Gatesville's 40 acres do not carry guns.

SAFETY STRESSED—Governor Daniel has proclaimed December 9 as "Safety Sunday" in an effort to stress the hazards of holiday traffic.

He recalled that highway collisions in the state in 1961 took 2,314 lives. They caused 132,000 injuries and a loss of \$356,000,000 worth of property.

Each Christmas-New Year's holiday from 1954 through 1957 averaged 106 traffic deaths. From 1958-61, when safety campaigns were conducted, there were 23 fewer traffic deaths.

HUNTING DEATHS—Cecil Reid of the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas urges hunters to put a stop to a tragic string of hunting deaths and injuries by practicing caution in the field.

He cites three recent deaths where hunters were mistaken for game and killed.

Reid said no hunter should allow himself to shoot at anything which he has not identified fully as game.

He urges hunters to request passage of legislation such as the "careless and reckless hunting" laws in effect in some other states.

COURT OVERRULES COMMISSION—Texas Supreme Court has negated an order of the Railroad Commission and revoked a specialized motor carrier permit to transport road building materials granted Lively Trucking Contractors.

Decision to vacate the commission's order was made on

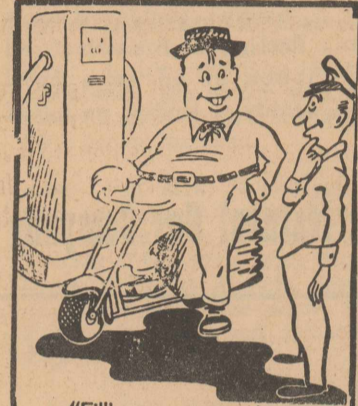

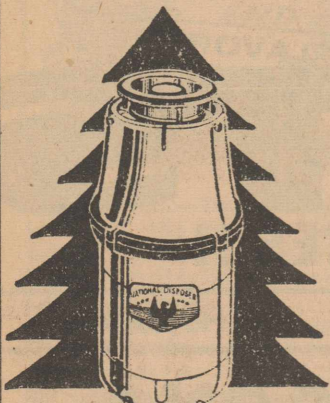

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**STAR SANDWICH COOKIES**  
Makes 2 dozen sandwich cookies  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour    Apricot preserves (about 1/2 c)  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1-1/2 cups rolled oats, (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)  
1 cup firmly-packed brown sugar  
2/3 cup shortening, soft  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon vanilla

**Glaze:**  
1 tsp. grated lemon rind  
3/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar  
4 teaspoons water

Heat oven to moderate (350 degrees). For cookie dough, sift together flour, soda and salt into bowl. Stir in oats and brown sugar. Add shortening, egg and vanilla; combine until thoroughly mixed, about 2 minutes. Roll out on lightly floured board or canvas to about 1/8-inch thickness. Cut with floured 2-inch star cookie cutter. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in preheated oven (350 degrees) 8 to 10 minutes. Cool.

For each cookie sandwich, spread about 1 teaspoon apricot preserves between 2 cookies. Brush tops of cookie sandwiches with glaze made by combining all ingredients.

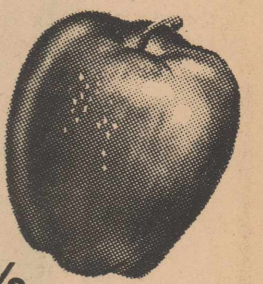
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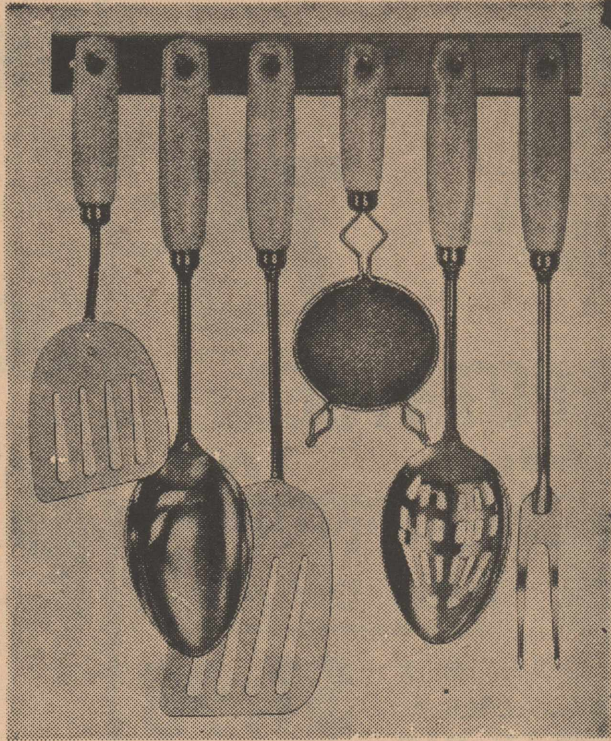
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
