Fillies Are Abernathy Tournament Champions

Olton's talented girls basketball team brought home the championship trophy of the Abernathy basketball tournament last weekend.

The Fillies won three straight over Hale Center, Idalou and Abernathy to win the title.

They dropped a game to tough Tulia here Tuesday night, running their season record to 10-4. The losses have been to Tulia, Abernathy, Happy and Friona, a district competitor.

Olton's boys also had something to crow about this week—their first victory of the season. The Mustangs whipped Cotton Center handily in the Abernathy

meet, running their season record to 1-8.

The boys will journey to the Springlake tournament today. The Mustangs meet Pep in a first round game tonight at 7.

The girls will play host to Floydada here Friday night, with the Frosh scheduled to play at 7 and the varsity game set for 8:30.

Two of Olton's Fillies were named to the Abernathy all-tournament team—high-scoring Gayle Nicholas and defensive expert Deanna Farrar.

Miss Nicholas hit for 34 against Hale Center in leading the Fillies to a 60-28 first

round win. Cheryl Poteet added 15 and Tommy Witten 8.

In the second round, Gayle tossed in 35 to pace a 54-42 victory over Idalou. Miss Witten got 11 and Miss Poteet 8.

In the finals, the Fillies chalked up a 54-49 victory over Abernathy's girls, with Miss Nicholas tallying 39. Miss Witten again had 11 and Miss Poteet picked up 4.

Against Tulia here Tuesday night, Miss Nicholas had 34 and Miss Witten picked up 5. Gladys Nuevas led rebounders with nine.

The Frosh girls also lost their game with Tulia, 29-27, despite a strong scoring performance from Sandra Johnson, who got 15. Sherry Caddell and Susan Norfleet each had six.

Coach Robert Nickerson's Mustangs lost their opening game in the Abernathy meet, falling to Slaton, 80-41. Ronnie Parsons tallied 18 and George Jones 9.

Then the Ponies got sweet revenge on Cotton Center, winning 61-48. Jones got 18, Parsons 16, Darrel Glover 9 and Jerry Smoot 8.

Against Roosevelt, the Mustangs continued to show improvement, although they fell, 73-48, to a tall, talented squad. Parsons hit 18 points to lead Olton, while Glover added 11.

More Than 40,000 Bales Across Scales In Olton

Harvest 85-90% Completed

More than 40,000 bales of cotton are already across the scales of Olton area gins, assuring the community of another bang-up cotton year.

And the way farmers kept bringing the white stuff in this week, it appeared they might meet or beat the record 47,000 bales ginned in 1961.

A check of the six gins in this area Wednesday afternoon showed a total of 34,416 bales already in bagging and another 6,049 on the yards—a total of 40,465 across the scales.

By Wednesday evening, the backlog at Olton Co-Op Gin had dropped to 3,500 bales. The Co-Op's number of bales on the yard was over 3,800 bales earlier in the week.

All six gins—Circle, Farmers, Co-Op, Smith, Straw and Thompson—were running behind this week as farmers kept piling it on.

The rush began to show signs of falling off Wednesday, and the guess was that the community's harvest is 85 to 90 percent out of the field.

Many farmers already were done, and others were near the finish.

Some of those who received varying amounts of hail during the growing season—Gilbert Roberson, Merrill Brigance, Don Spain, C. E. Keasler and others—had finished their gathering.

Comments on their crops ranged from "good" to "fair" to "not very good."

J. L. Snider, who farms 4 1/2 miles west, was still going strong on his harvest this week. He was getting about 11 1/2 bales to the acre.

Similar yields were reported at other farms, such as that of H. R. Curtis, eight miles north and two west.

Cloudy weather and scattered drops of moisture threatened to slow down the harvest early in the week, but the sun popped back out and farmers continued their rapid harvest pace.

150 HEAR CONGRESSMAN

Castro, Cotton Talked

Cong. George Mahon traded ideas with the people here Monday night as about 150 persons turned out to hear the congressman in a question-answer session at the school auditorium.

The meeting, sponsored by Olton's Young Farmers, brought these main opinions from Mahon:

1. "We must eliminate Castro and the Communist regime in Cuba at the earliest possible moment."

2. "It doesn't make sense to talk about a tax cut when we have such a great deficit."

3. "Every effort should be made to reduce governmental spending."

4. "We can't go on cutting cotton acreage...we have to have volume...and we must find a way to produce it for less."

Mahon talked briefly about a recent trip to Central America, spending and other topics before opening the floor for questions.

The congressman, a key figure in U.S. military appropriations, pointed out the instability of governments in Central America, along with illiteracy and the lack of a middle class.

"We should only invest money in things to help these people help themselves," Mahon said.

Speaking of Cuba and Castro, he said: "I learned that Communist materials go through the mails in Central America at a fantastic pace...it's a necessity for us to eliminate this base (Cuba and Castro) for Communism."

The congressman said the Soviet Union "showed its colors" in the Cuban crisis.

"Khrushchev recognizes that the U.S. is the strongest power on Earth, militarily. When the President took a firm stand, Khrushchev backed up."

Allen was inside a barracks which burned on the farm about 9:30 p.m.

Fire Chief Tom Smith said Wednesday that no one apparently knew that Allen was inside until after the fire was out. He said it is not known how the fire started.

The barracks was a total loss.

Funeral services for Allen were held here Tuesday at 1 p.m. with the Rev. James Moore officiating.

Interment was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

Allen was born Dec. 26, 1904.

Survivors include his wife, Lurline; one son, Dave F. Allen Jr.; one daughter, Gerald Allen, all of Olton; one brother, Sam Allen; and one sister, Bertie Allen, both of Detroit.

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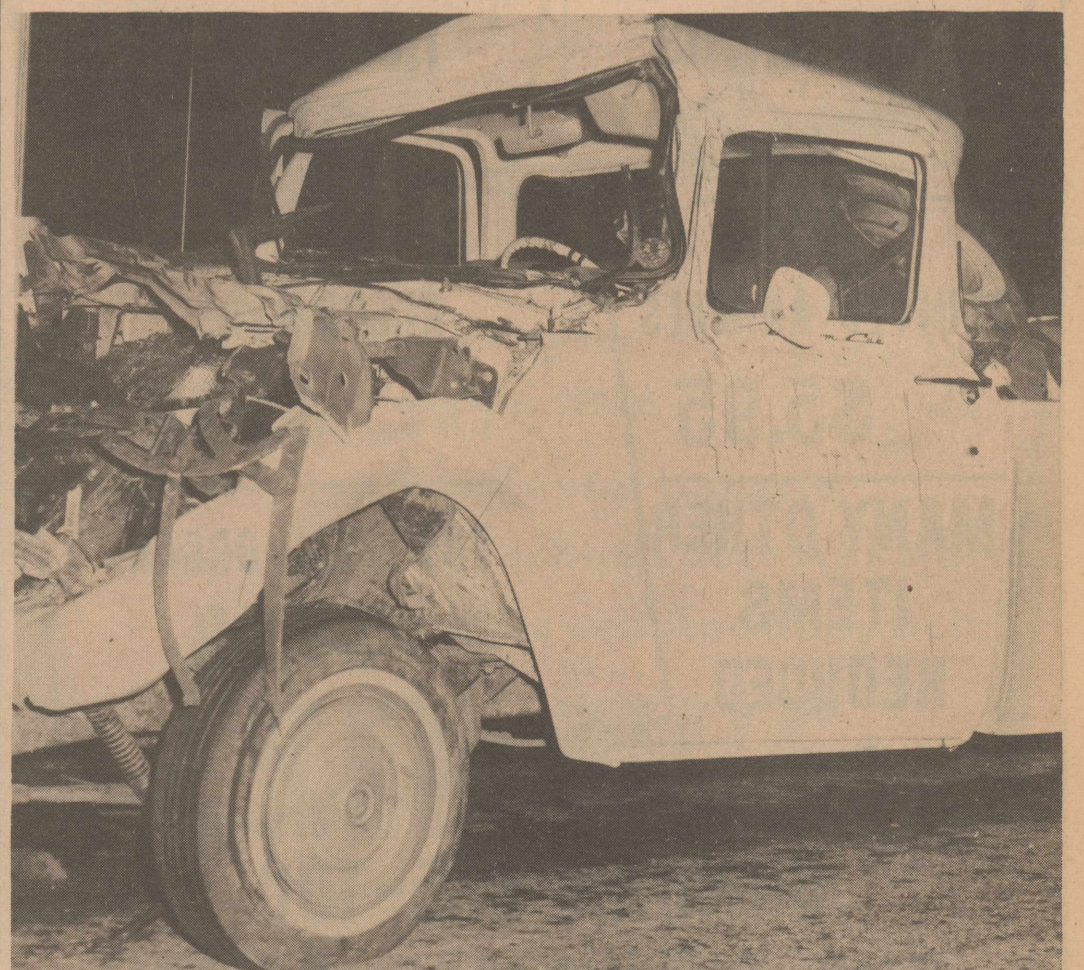
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NEW SIGN painted on the south wall of American Grains near the city limits welcomes visitors to Olton. The sign is one of several planned by the Olton Chamber of

Bangs Testing Starts Here

Bangs testing started in Lamb County Monday according to W. R. Kimbrough, county agricultural agent.

All cattle owners that have less than 50 head must have their cattle tested. Those with larger herds have to test 50 or 20 per cent, whichever is greater.

Free vaccination for bangs will be given to calves between the ages of six to ten months. Tests for TB will be taken on request.

There will be no cost to the livestock producers. Cattlemen are asked to have a shoot and to have posts at the end of the shoot 30 inches in the ground and five or six feet above where the head gate will fit.

The tests may be obtained by calling one of the committeemen. They are Glenn Blackman, Fieldton; Merrill Brigrance, Olton; and Johnny Murrell, Earth.

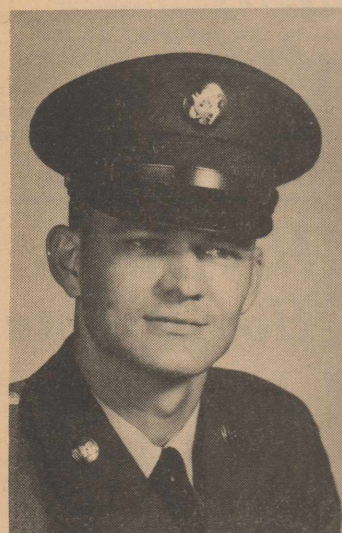

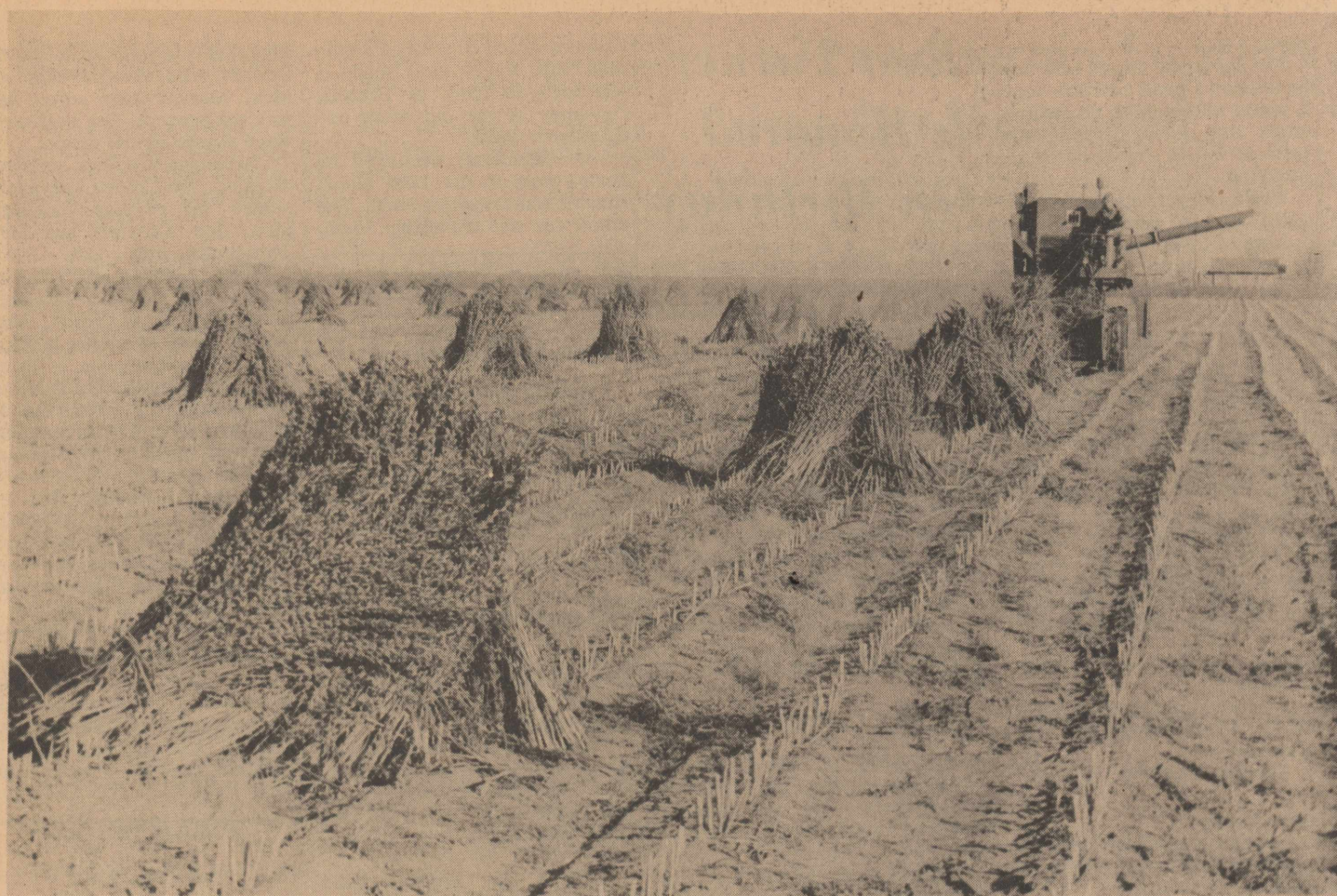

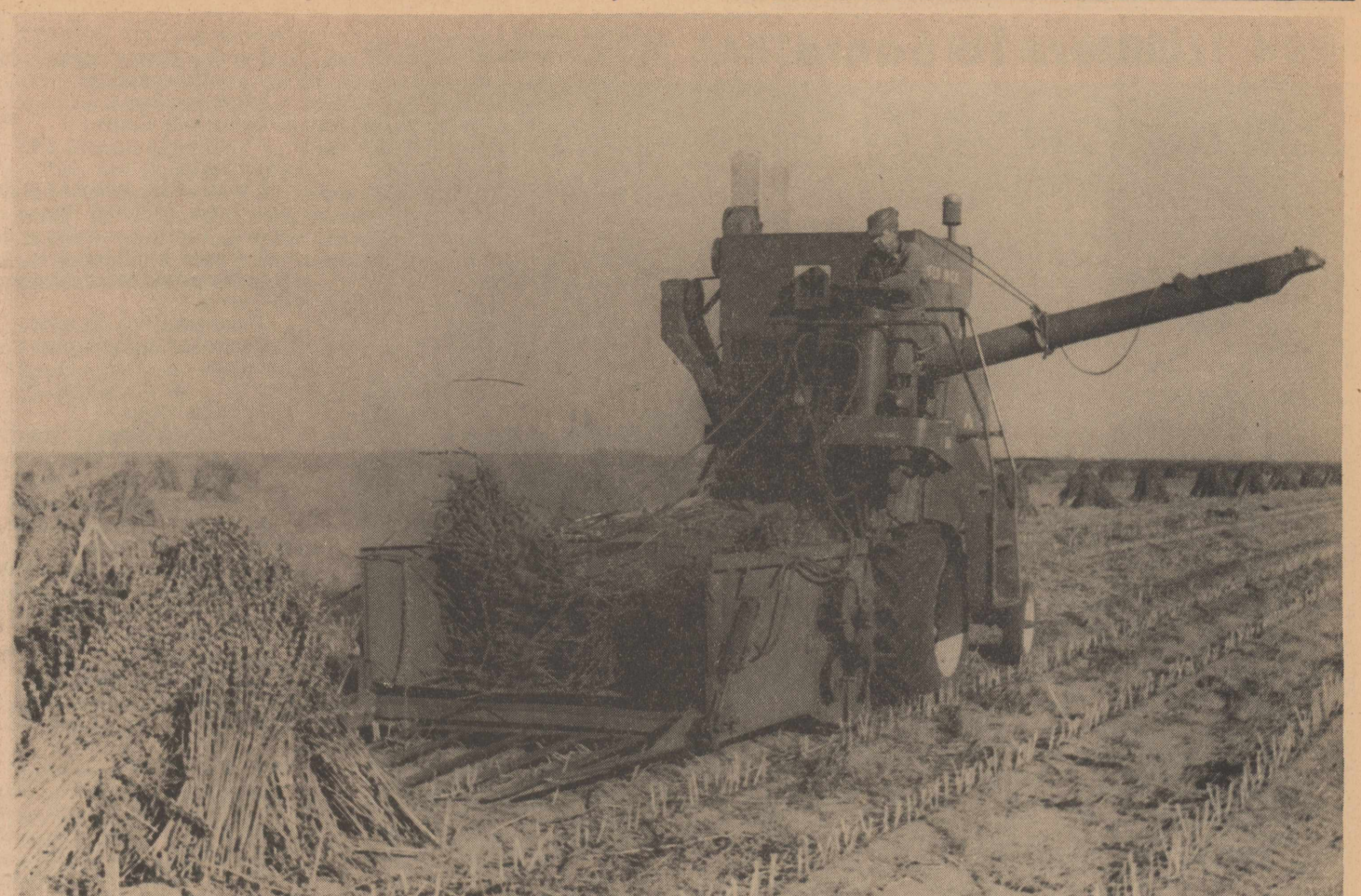

may participate in the program and plant sesame on diverted acreage. Spain had about 40 acres in sesame this year.

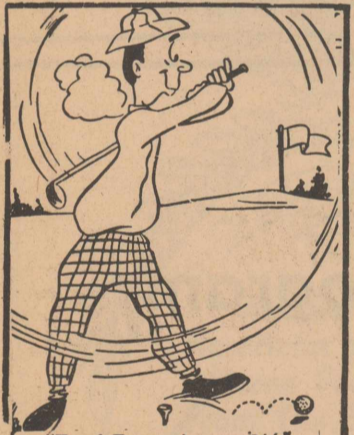
Shoppers Advised To Check

The Texas Safety Association today advised Christmas shoppers to keep safety in mind when selecting toys for children.

J. O. Musick, general manager of TSA, advised selecting toys that are sturdy and well-made. "Cheaply constructed or breakable toys may come apart or be broken under strenuous child play," Musick said. "Broken or jagged edges from toys can cause cuts and infections."

He advised testing the strength of a toy to see how much bending it will take and whether it will last past Christmas Day. "Choose the toy which is suitable to the strength of the child. A toy which is too heavy for a youngster to handle easily could cause an accident to that child," Musick explained.

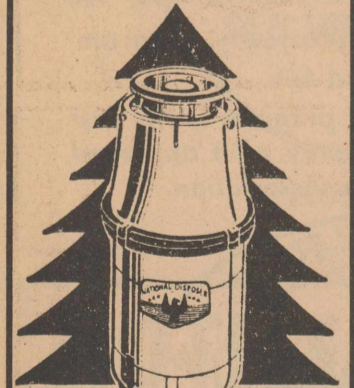
He further advised shoppers to beware of toys manufactured with sharp edges or pointed ends, and to check all playthings to make sure there are

no parts which may become loose and find their way into the mouth.

"Babies and toddlers invariably follow the 'hand to mouth' rule for everything they touch. See that they do not play with small toys marbles, coins, beads or other tiny objects," Musick said.

Other things such as stuffed animals with button eyes which may become loose, whistles with removable mouth pieces and pull-toys with small removable parts also are dangerous for small children.

The safety director reported that nearly 600 children under age five die each year in the U.S. as a result of suffocation from ingestion of small objects. Last year in Texas, 16 children under age five died from ingestion of objects other than food.

C-CA Mails Project Forms

Dangers Of Flocked Tree For Christmas Are Told

The Texas Safety Association today issued an urgent warning on the dangers of "flocked" Christmas trees and also cited other hazards of holiday decorations.

"Unless a flame resistant chemical is used in 'flocking' a natural tree, the danger of fire is greatly increased," J. O. Musick, General Manager of TSA, said.

"Even if the material used in flocking is flame resistant, it does not make the tree itself non-combustible," he continued.

"Most research shows 'flocking' will not impart any flame resistance to the tree."

The safety director explained there is little that can be done to make any natural tree flame resistant and warned shoppers to evaluate carefully any claims that a natural tree has been "fire-proofed."

The "flocked" Christmas tree has steadily gained popularity during the past four holiday seasons, especially for use in the home. It resembles a tree whose branches are heavily laden with snow. The flock is made from sharply cut rayon fibers mixed with various chemicals.

Natural trees are frequently "flocked," not only in the traditional snow white, but also in others colors. Often dry adhesives are added to give sparkle and glitter.

Musick pointed out that the dry adhesives must be pre-mixed with the flame retardant chemicals to make the entire flocking itself flame resistant.

This fact has caused some concern to TSA as there are now some kits on the market to be used in "flocking" trees at home.

"Most professionals flocking trees know the dangers of material used in decorating natural trees, but the inexperienced decorator can add to their normal combustibility without knowing it," he said.

Musick advises that when purchasing a "do-it-yourself" kit, be sure the "flocking" material is marked flame resistant. Do not add other materials, such as glitter or coloring, which do not also have these qualities.

"If you must use other material, make sure it is added to the flame resistant chemicals used in the actual 'flocking,'" he said.

The safety director stressed that no person should think his tree is flame resistant just because it has been coated with flame retardant material.

In citing dangers from other decorations, Musick reported that the combined use of spray-on type snow and glass fiber "angel hair" is highly combustible.

"The average home decorator is not aware of this as

both items, when used separately ARE flame resistant. It is when the snow substance is sprayed on the glass fiber that the decoration becomes highly dangerous," he added. "However, if the snow is sprayed on the tree first, and then the glass fiber or angel hair is added—it is safe."

Another concern of safety officials and fire prevention authorities is the use of cotton under trees. Only cotton which is flame resistant should be used.

It takes, on the average, two and one-half minutes for the

amount of combustible cotton used at the base of most trees to burn completely, but fire hazard reports on natural trees show there is no time to call the fire department if the cotton should ignite the tree.

"It takes only five to 10 seconds, depending on dryness, for a combustible tree to be consumed by fire. The flaming tree is much like a gasoline torch. It ignites everything close to it," Musick continued.

"Place all Christmas greens where they cannot be ignited by lighted candles, a spark from the fireplace or other sources of flame. Natural trees dry out faster around heat. The drier the tree—the greater the fire hazard."

The Texas Safety Association joins the National Fire Protection Association in recommend-

ing that trees be purchased shortly before Christmas, stored outside until needed and then removed from the house as soon as possible.

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

1963 Feed Grain Support Prices Are Increased

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman has announced an increase in the 1963 corn support price to \$1.25 per bushel from the \$1.20 support price previously announced on Nov. 14. Increases are also being made in the other feed grain support prices. This action is designed to assure that the twin objective of the Feed Grain Program—to improve farm income and to make further progress in balancing feed grain supplies with national requirements—will be met. Secretary Freeman also announced an increase in the payment rate for diverted feed grain acreage in 1963. The national average support prices for 1963 feed grain crops are shown below together with the previously announced support prices.

Corn, total support price \$1.25 per bushel; previously announced \$1.20 per bushel.

Barley, total support price, \$.96 per bushel; previously announced \$.93 per bushel.

Grain Sorghum, total support price, \$2.00 per cwt.; previously announced price, \$1.91 per cwt.

Oats, total support price \$.65 per bushel; previously announced \$1.07 per bushel.

As announced earlier farmers participating in the 1963 Feed Grain Program will receive price support partly through loan and purchase agreement and partly through payment in kind. The increases announced today will be accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rate with no change in the payment in kind payment previously announced.

The 1963 feed grain program differs from the 1961 and 1962 programs primarily because of the additional 18-cent payment in kind as a result of price support. This new element has required further careful study by the Department. This study, coupled with reports from field offices forms the announcement of the 1963 Feed Grain Program and recommendations of advisory committees on feed grain which met in Washington last week indicating that action to raise support level was necessary to carry out the policy of this Administration to increase farm income, cut back surpluses, and reduce government cost.

Special provisions are made for small farms in this announcement. The payment rate for acreage diverted to conserving uses will be increased to 50 percent of the county support rate of the normal production of diverted acres, for farms on which the entire feed grain payment acreage (1959-1960 acreage, as adjusted) is diverted,

up to the eligible maximum of 25 acres.

For other farms, diversion payments will be increased somewhat as a result of higher support price. For the first 20 percent of the acreage diverted from feed grain to conserving uses, the payment will be at 20 percent of the county support rate (reflecting maximum average support price of \$1.25 per bushel for corn, \$2. per cwt. for grain sorghum, and \$.96 per bushel for barley) on the normal production of diverted acreage. On any acreage diversion above the minimum requirement, payment will be 50 percent of the county support rate.

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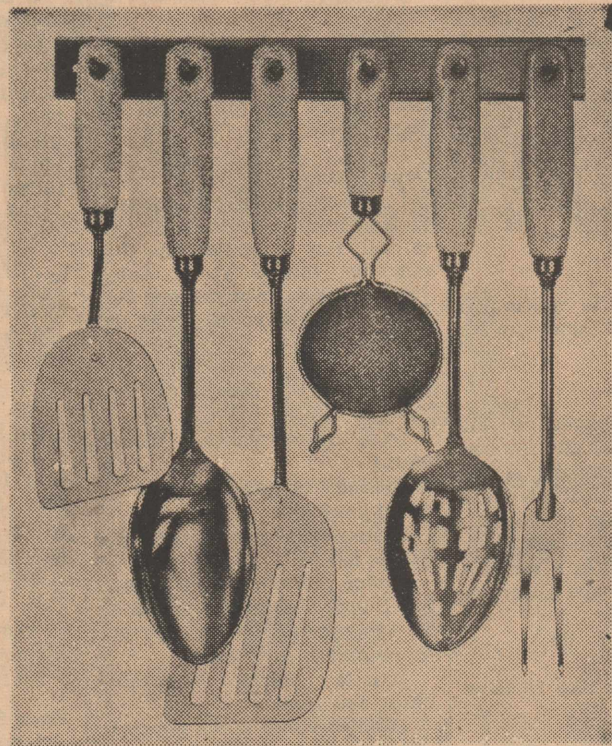

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights
 by Vern Sanford
 TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.— In his final press conference as attorney general, Will Wilson paid tribute to Texas newspapers for helping expose graft and corruption.

Wilson said that Texas newspapers, large and small, deserve a lot of credit for the progress he made during his six years of administration. "In our system" he said, "the light of day, brought through the news media, is the most efficient enforcement agency we have."

He remarked that he considers a probe for corruption of local governments the field that offers the most investigative opportunity to his successor, Waggoner Carr.

MAN HUNT—Meanwhile, incoming AG Waggoner Carr is involved in a search for able assistants for the attorney general's department. He wrote Leon Jaworski, president of the State Bar Association, that it's very difficult to find trained men.

Number of assistants now has dwindled from 80 to 68. Carr said he needs capable men with good courtroom experience, as there are 4,000 cases pending in the attorney of the nation" are on the slanted-hole well investigations.

A major problem is finding experienced attorneys willing to work for low pay. Beginners make about \$400 a month. Nine division heads draw \$10,500 annually.

Bar association promised to help Carr with the man hunt. First step was to name a 19-member committee to work with the incoming attorney general.

COURT BACKS COMMISSION
 Railroad Commission's new "Rule 54", which restricts slanted wells, passed its first legal test when Dist. Judge Jack Roberts upheld the commissioner's order for a directional survey on a deviated well in the East Texas field.

Roberts turned down an application from attorneys for the L. G. No. 2 Alexander lease in Gregg County, who sought an injunction against the commission, and against Tidewater Oil Company. Tidewater wants to determine whether the L.G. is bottomed under its own lease or under Tidewater's adjoining property.

FAREWELL PARTY—Amidst a pine tree setting some 2,500 public officials, state and federal employees, and other friends of the outgoing governor staged a \$10 a plate honor banquet for the Price Daniels.

Location was Austin's Municipal Auditorium. Included among a long list of headliners were Vice Pres. Lyndon Johnson, Gov.-elect John Connally, Lt. Gov.-elect Preston Smith, RR Commissioner Ben Ramsey, former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepard and State Bar Pres. Leon Jaworski.

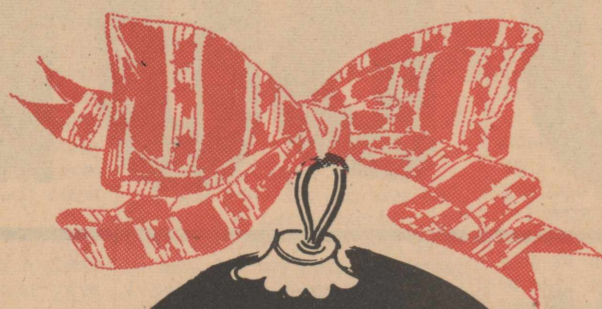

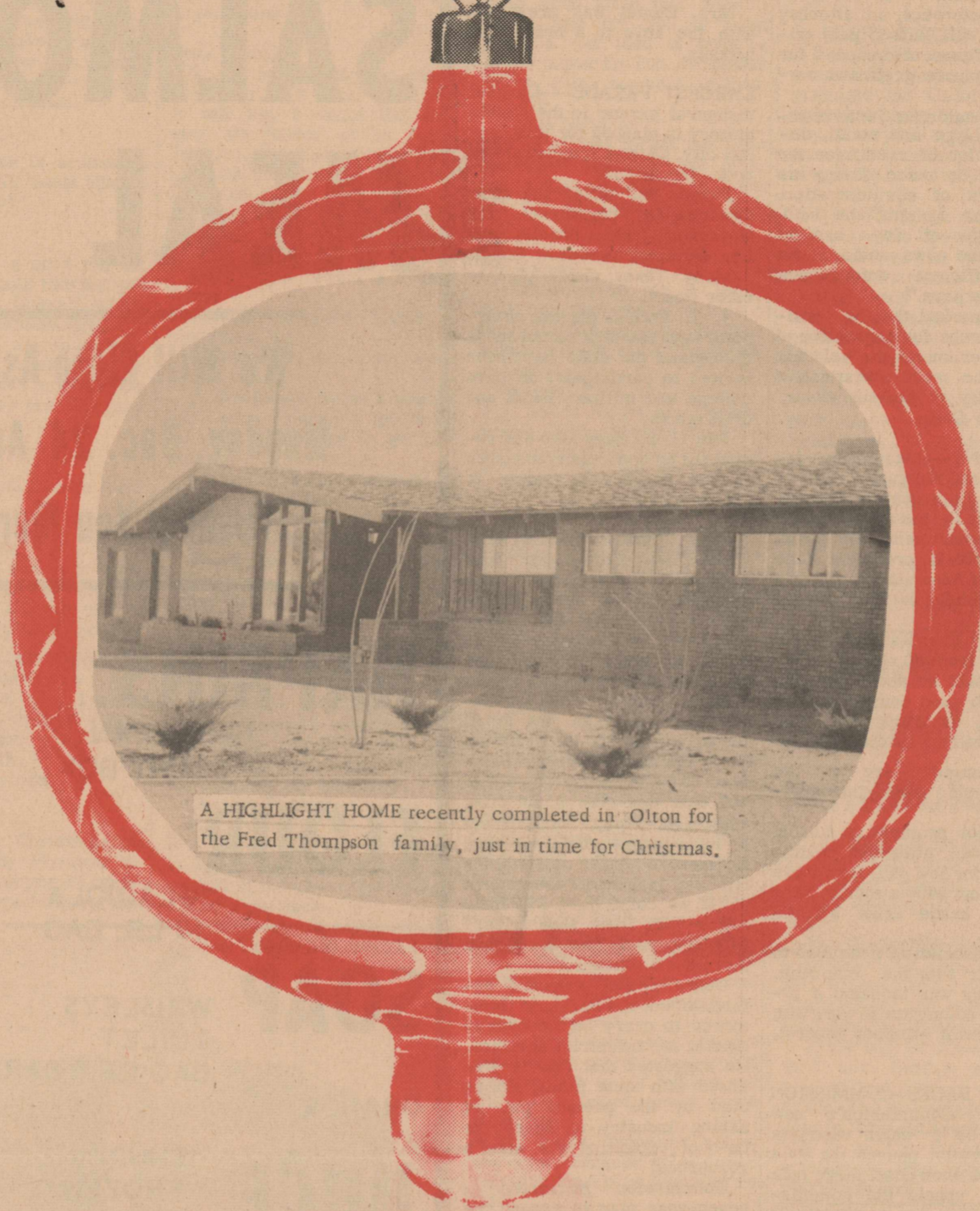
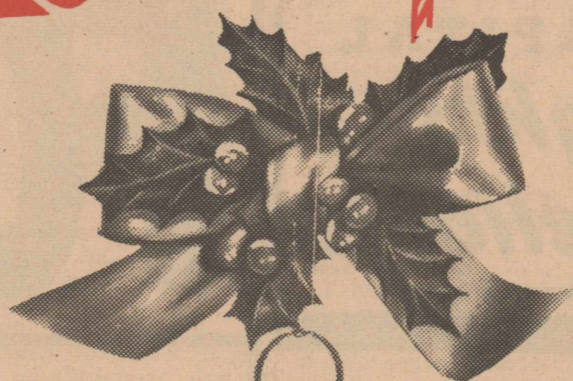
