8th Street Parking Plan Draws Petition

Signers Ask Delay, Full Study

The city council's proposed ordinance declaring parallel parking on 8th Street between Main and Avenue G has drawn a petition asking that action be delayed "until all facts can be brought to the attention of everyone."

More than 100 persons had signed the document Wednesday at mid-afternoon.

Backers planned to circulate the petition several more days before presenting it to the city. The petition was drawn up last week after a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce retail trades committee, headed by Lester Thompson and Mabel Bizzell.

Members of the committee pointed out that parallel parking on the street would cut down on parking area near the downtown area and asked that the council's proposal be given full study before action is taken.

The issue came up following the city council's meeting earlier this month, at which the proposal for parallel parking was made by new councilman Howard Buchenau.

Buchenau said he did not feel parallel parking on the street would hinder business, and he added that he felt safety conditions would be improved on the 60-foot street.

This is the text of the petition now in circulation:

"To the Honorable Mayor of the City of Olton, Texas, and to the Honorable Councilmen of the City of Olton, Texas;

"Whereas we, the undersigned, Citizens of the Community of Olton, Texas, do at this time believe that the proposed ordinance invoking Parallel Parking on 8th Street between Main Street and Avenue G in Olton would tend to increase speed of traffic on the above mentioned street and that this could become hazardous in that this street is within the school area;

"Whereas, we believe that the extra space provided in Parallel Parking would create a passing zone in the street, which we feel might cause the street to become more hazardous in that some might tend to pass other cars causing a hazard;

"Whereas, we feel that at the present that passing zone does not exist and that the vehicles traveling on this street do not tend to pass at a rate that is now hazardous;

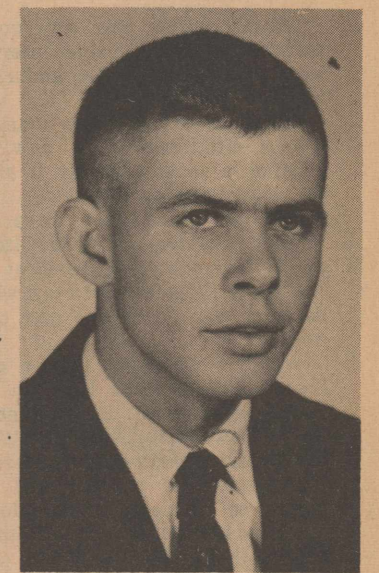
"Whereas we, the undersigned do hereby petition the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Olton, Texas; that you Gentlemen do not act upon the proposed City Ordinance, which in effect requires that there be invoked on the Street, namely 8th Street between Main Street and Avenue G in the City of Olton, parallel parking until further study can be made by the City Council and by interested citizens of the City of Olton, Texas, and all facts can be brought to the attention of everyone."

Olton workers in the American Cancer Society fund drive raised \$829.32, topping the local goal, Ed Thompson, Olton chairman, announced Wednesday.

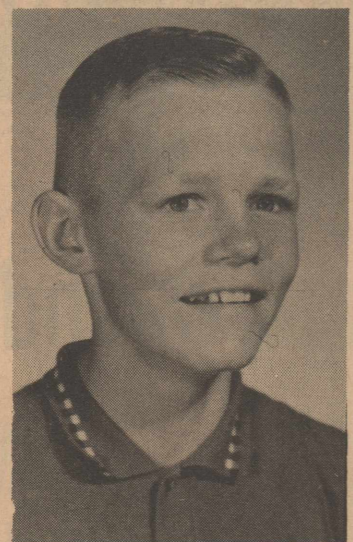
Goal in Olton was \$650. Individuals canvassed business houses here and later the New Century Study Club conducted a house-to-house drive.

The Lamb County goal of \$3,150 also was topped, with \$4,000, Thompson said.

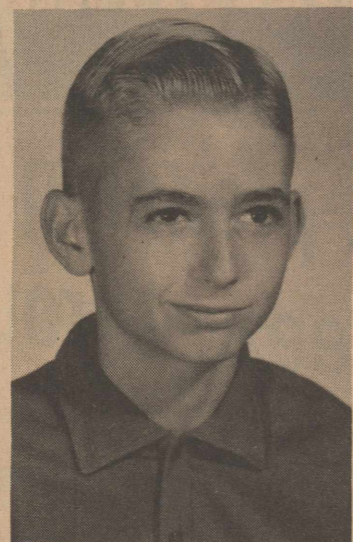
SCHOOLS OUT

Eyes On The Council

Olton's three new city councilmen have stirred up considerable interest in politics here with their swift endorsement of new ideas.

First of all, the new councilmen backed the appointment of a new city attorney, placing a local attorney in the post to replace a Plainview firm.

We are sure they have much support in that decision, because Olton people generally favor doing business at home.

It is a little early to tell whether another decision backed by the new council will be popular.

We are speaking of the re-vamping of the council to name the five councilmen in charge of different departments such as fire, law enforcement, administration, water-sewer and streets-maintenance.

Whether this project will work out remains to be seen, but it does have some good possibilities, if all the councilmen are willing and eager to co-operate to bring Olton the best city government possible.

Still another decision backed by the new members has already drawn criticism.

This is the decision to install parallel parking on 8th street between Main and Avenue G.

Many merchants and customers alike would prefer to see the street remain as it is, with a 15-mile speed limit and angle parking.

The move to put in parallel parking apparently was prompted by the fact that the street is 60 feet in width and parallel parking would allow more room for drivers.

This, the new councilmen believe, would improve safety conditions.

The new councilmen also believe that parallel parking would improve conditions for the "fast getaway" needed by fire trucks as they leave the fire station at the corner.

There are some plausible arguments offered by backers of angle parking, too.

They believe parallel parking would increase the hazards on the street, because it would speed up traffic. They also feel a "third" lane would be created, thereby opening up new chances for faster driving in the school area.

Approval of Parallel parking on the street would cut the present parking capacity in half. While this is a monetary reason not being pushed by opponents of parallel parking, it does have a bearing.

Shopping in stores along the street, and along main street as well, would be affected.

However, as one main street merchant put it, the shopping loss should not be a deciding factor if the street actually is unsafe under current conditions.

We go along wholeheartedly.

However, we also submit that the council should not move to cut down on Olton parking unless safety is indeed a factor.

The proposal should be studied from all angles before it is enacted.

And we hope it can be studied strictly on a basis of sound reasoning--by both sides--without personalities becoming the big issue.

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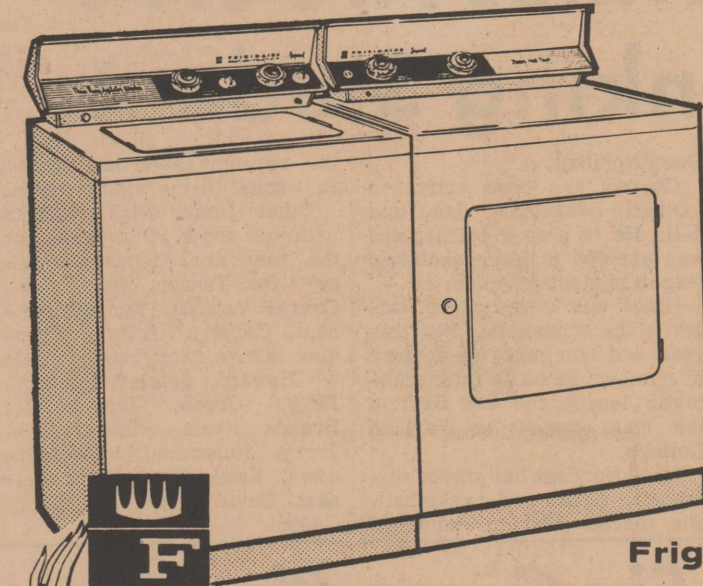

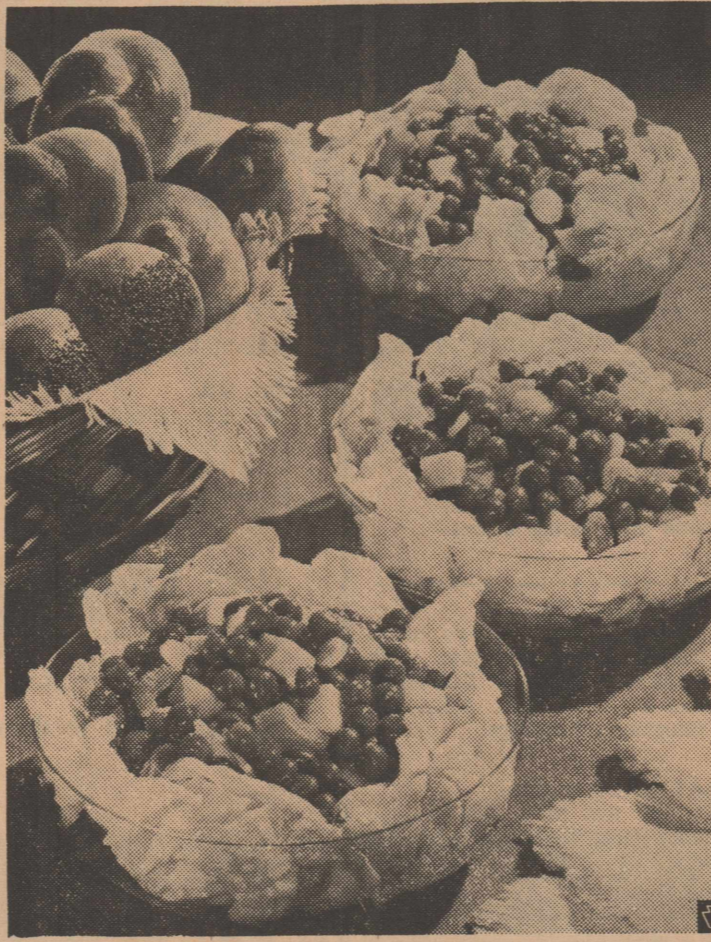

Tangy Salad Of Cheese, Peas Perks Appetites



The season for barbecues and outdoor cookery calls for spicy, taste-tempting salads. Here's a "make-ahead" treat that will have plates being passed for seconds accompanied by hostess pleasing compliments.

GREEN PEAS AND GOLDEN CHEESE SALAD

- 1 10-ounce package frozen green peas
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/4 pound diced American or cheddar cheese (3/4 cup)
- 3 tablespoons chopped sweet pickle
- 1/2 cup finely sliced celery
- 1/4 cup chopped green onions
- 1/3 cup boiled salad dressing (or commercial salad dressing)

Place frozen green peas in saucepan with water, salt and sugar. Cover. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, separating block with fork, if necessary, to hasten thawing. Reduce heat to medium and simmer 3-4 minutes. Turn peas immediately into a container with ice cubes and cover. Refrigerate thoroughly. Drain.

Combine with remaining ingredients, cover and let stand in refrigerator for an hour or so to let flavors blend. Serve in scooped out tomato cups or on crisp lettuce. Serves 5.

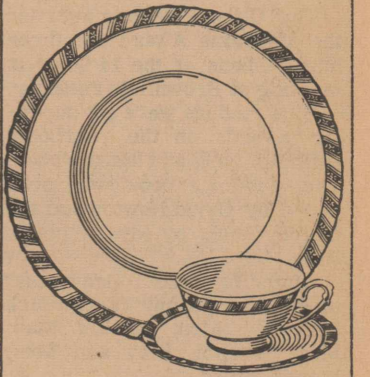

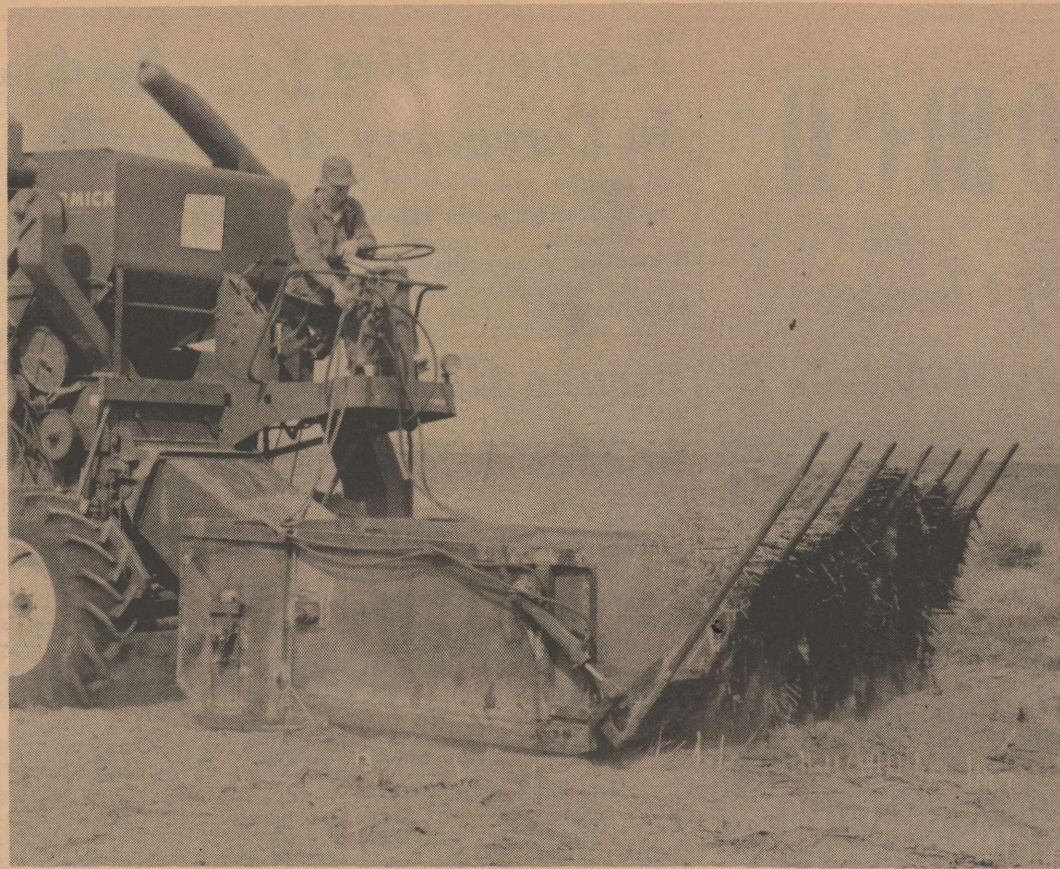

New Combine Attachment Tested At Muleshoe Farm

The Houston Hart farm, four miles west and one south of Muleshoe was the proving ground last week for a machine designed to mechanize the harvest of sesame crops for plains farmers.

The machine is a self-feeding combine attachment that picks up a dry sesame shock and flips it onto a slowly moving conveyor chain. The conveyor chain feeds the sesame bundles into a string cutter that reduces the bundles into bites for the combine.

It is designed to operate on any standard self-propelled combine, and makes Sesame harvesting a one-man operation. Present harvest methods require a four-man labor crew, plus the combine operator.

Texas Sesame Fieldman, Ray Hodges, has guided the project and was at the controls of the combine on its successful test run last week.

"It's mighty late in the season for harvesting sesame," said Hodges, "but Hart and Bill Whatley kindly left us about an acre of shocked sesame so we could keep testing the new attachment." Ted Allen's 101 International combine has been used throughout the test operations which started last Oc-

tober. "Excessive hand labor at harvest time has limited sesame production on the Plains more than any other factor", according to Robert L. Parker of the Sesame Growers Organization. "This new self-feeding combine attachment will completely mechanize more than half the sesame harvest operation, and will make Sesame production much more attractive and profitable for plains farmers."

Area men, who have watched the machine in operation, speculate that with some modifications, it can be used to harvest other important seed crops from the shock, such as millet, sudan, or sorghum alnum.

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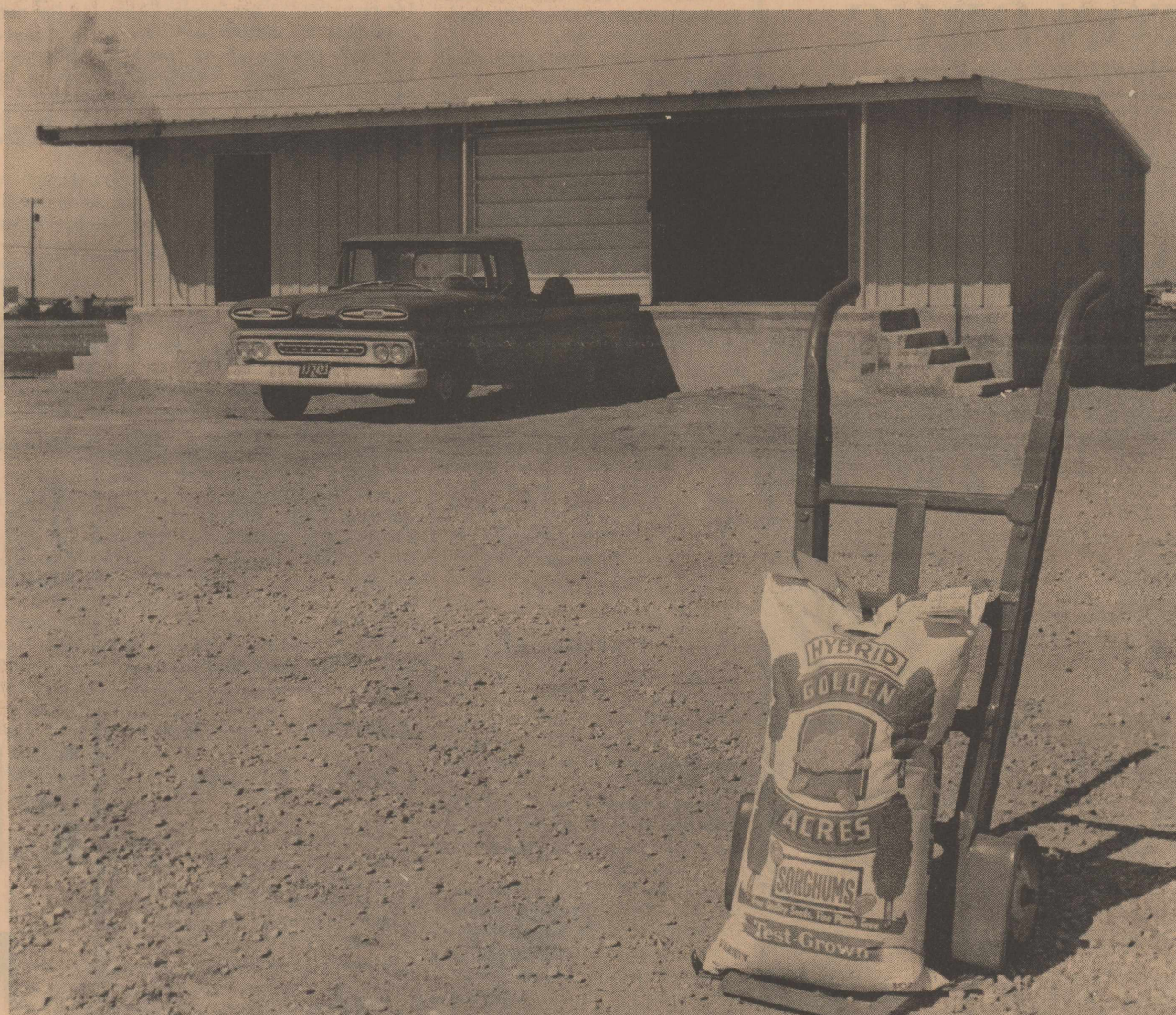

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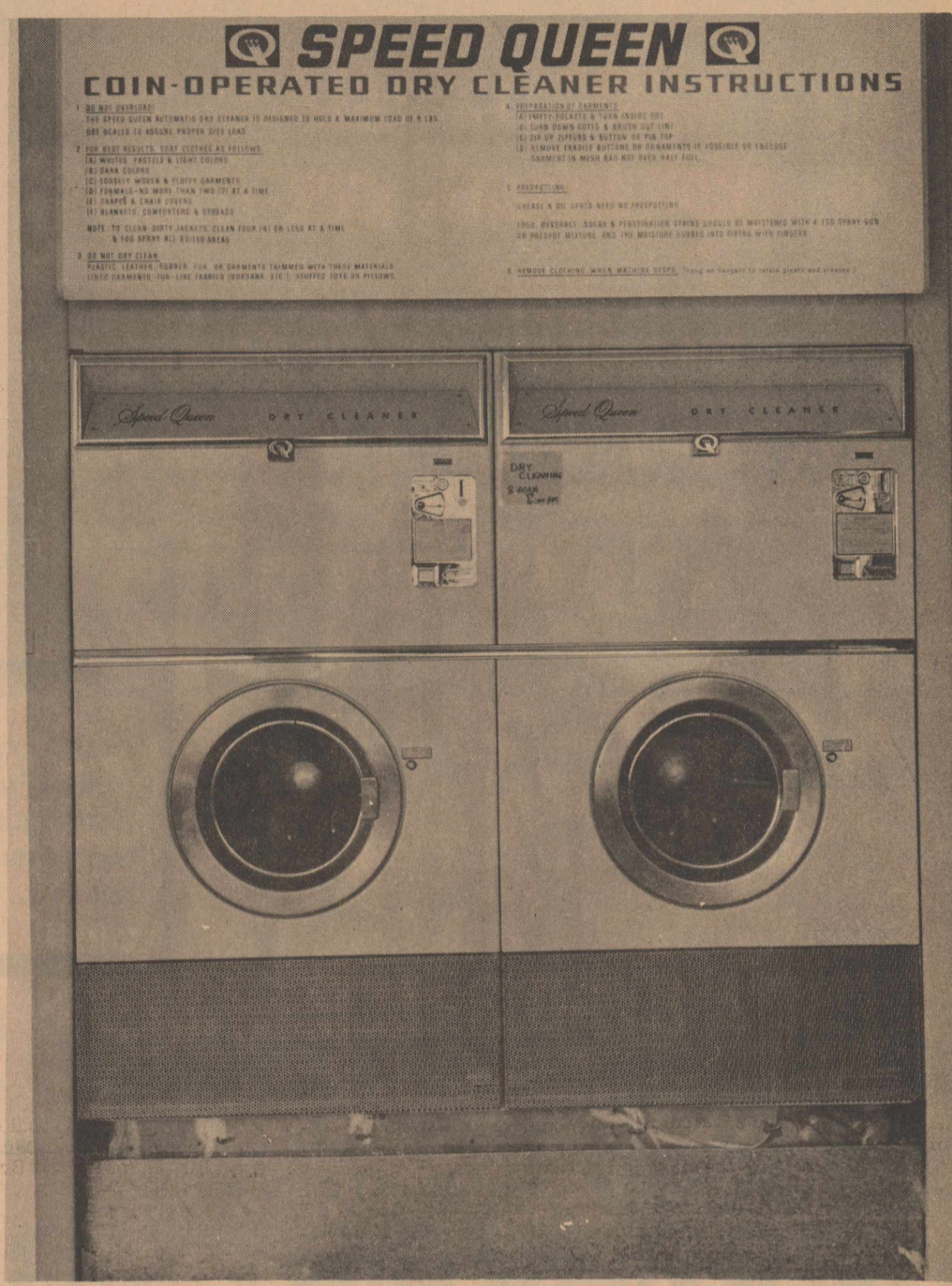
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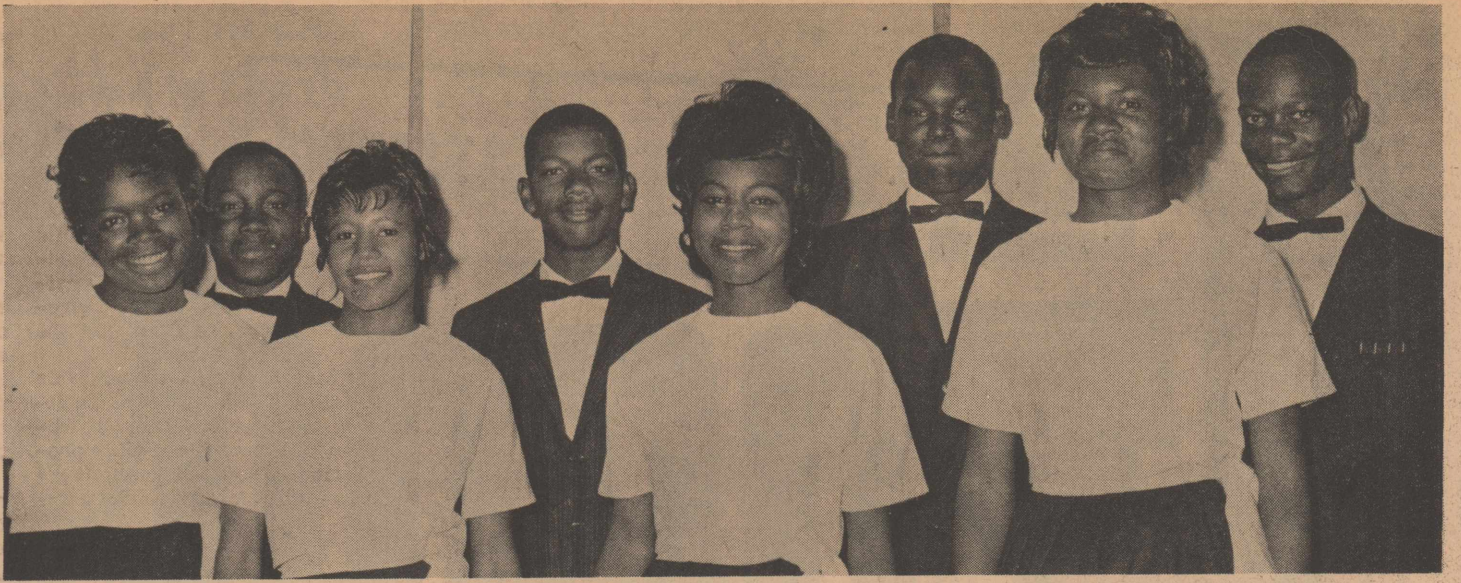

Newcomers Require More Local Service

If a considerable number of families in this highly-mobile population of ours should suddenly decide to take up residence in Olton, how well prepared would the community be to take care of them?

What would the new arrivals require in the way of additional school facilities, teachers, water supply, police protection and the many other services that go with modern living?

The nature and extent of the problems created by a rapid rise in population are brought out in a report in the Municipal Year Book, based on a study of a particular urban county, conducted by the University of Wisconsin.

It shows that the arrival of 100 new families in a community brings on the need of 3.85 more classrooms, of four additional teachers, eight-tenths of a policeman, two-thirds of a fireman and four other public employees for such operations as street cleaning, tax collection, park maintenance and the various health and welfare activities.

The 100 new families would also require 10,000 gallons of water a day, a hospital bed, part of a jail cell and of a visiting nurse and added library facilities.

In terms of Olton, what does it boil down to?

A calculation shows what would be needed, according to the figures in the report, to provide for an increase of ten percent in the number of local families, which totaled 568 at the time of the recent census. The extra 57 families would require two additional classrooms (grade school and high school), eight-tenths policeman and firemen, two teachers,

5,680 gallons of water a day, six-tenths hospital beds and many other services.

The problems that newcomers bring with them are big ones. Not that more families are not wanted. They are the lifeblood of any community from the standpoint of growth, vitality and economic health. But they do create problems.

Providing the necessary facilities for sudden increases in population can work havoc with local budgets. The strain, however, is a temporary one. In due time the newcomers will be carrying their own weight, financially, through the taxes they will be paying.

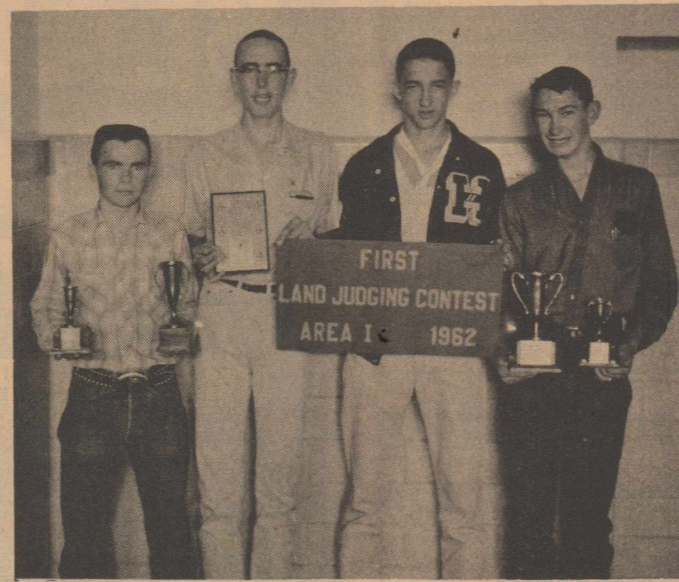

"With God as my witness and potatoes in my hand, I am ashamed of being a part of a farm program on relief with our government taking \$10 a week out of the labor class of people to keep me in business."

With this statement, J.B. Williams of Olton introduced his talk last week at the hearings on the proposed national potato marketing order in Amarillo. Jim Williams, Olton, also spoke at the hearings, which were conducted by the US Department of Agriculture at the request of the National Potato Advisory Committee.

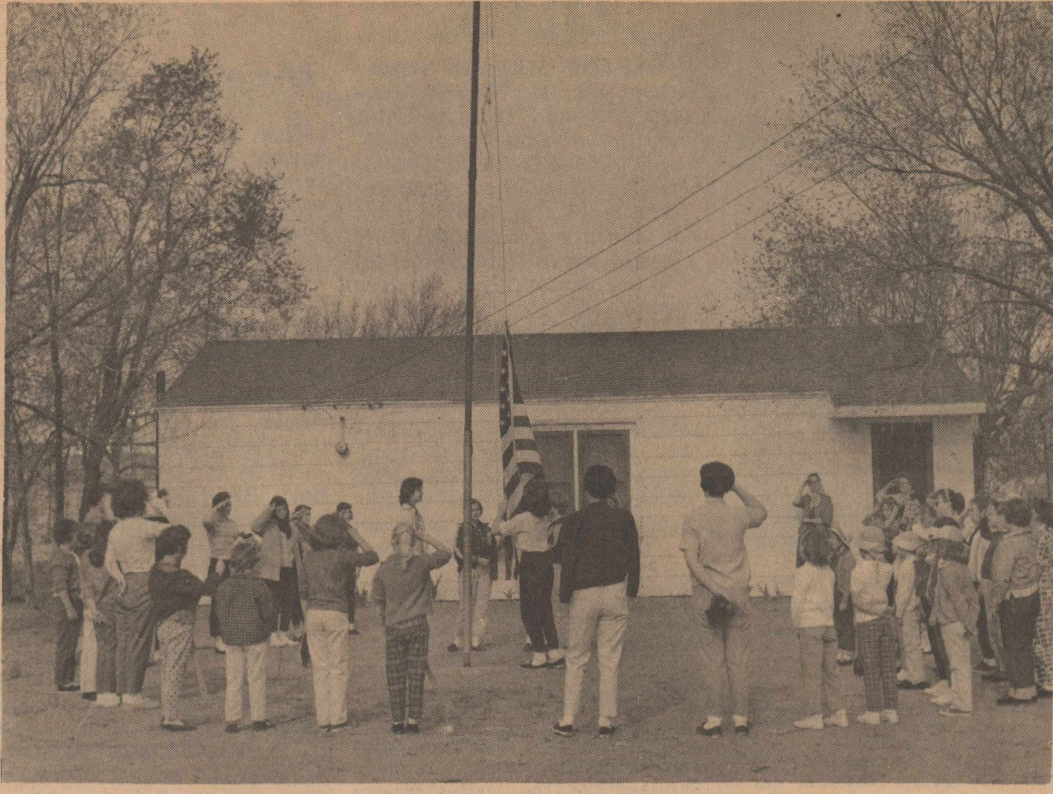
"Why shouldn't we leave one commodity on the open market?" J.B. Williams asked. USDA officials have said that all evidence gathered at the hearings will be taken into consideration by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to see if a national potato marketing referendum should be called.

"The talk is going around in my country that you have to inherit it or marry it. We are killing all incentive to work. When old men like me, that don't know any better than to work for a living, are gone our country will have to have forced labor and she will then have chaos," J.B. Williams asserted.

"It makes me sick to see men up here with a thousand acres of potato harvest going on in South Texas trying to get the Federal Government to let them have their check book," he concluded.
