Council Tables Parking, City Secretary Issues

Secretary Is Moving To Town

Olton city councilmen pigeonholed a couple of controversial items here Monday night, and a council meeting which began in a tense atmosphere ended as a calm, quiet session.

Councilman Howard Buchenau made motions to table both issues, one a proposed parking ordinance and the other a question on City Secretary Berniece Smith's holding office without residing in the city limits.

The legal question concerning the city secretary, brought up by Councilman Bob Gullett, had to do with whether the post may be held by a person who does not reside in the city limits. Mrs. Smith lives outside the city.

Gullett referred to an opinion received recently from the Texas Municipal League by City Attorney Andy Stroebel.

Stroebel said the TML opinion stated the city secretary

must be a qualified elector--resident of the city.

"I realize that the former city attorney (Day and Owens, Plainview) didn't understand it to be that way, but that is what the opinion says.

"I wasn't authorized (by the council) to seek the opinion," Stroebel pointed out, "but the question came up and I requested it for my own information."

Buchenau said it was his understanding any acts signed by a city secretary who isn't a resident could be open to question.

Gullett said he had talked with Mrs. Smith about the possibility of her moving to town, as a solution to the problem. "I have decided to try it," said Mrs. Smith, "and see how it works out."

Mrs. Smith said she knew the question would come up, because it had been mentioned when the three new councilmen first took office.

She said she would become a resident and continue in office, unless there were objections. "If there are any, I'd like for them to be brought up here and now," she said. Gullett said his reason for bringing up the question was based on "our obligation to keep everything legal."

Mayor M.T. James Jr. said: "Personally, I think she has done a fine job."

A short time later, Buchenau made the motion to table the question. The motion got unanimous approval from the council.

Earlier, Mayor James had opened the meeting by announcing he would withdraw his vote of last month's meeting on the parallel parking issue.

James, believing he could vote if he announced his intention prior to the question, had balloted against a proposed parallel parking ordinance for 8th Street between Main and G.

His vote threw the council into a 3-3 tie, with Buchenau, Gullett and Cecil Gallaway voting for the proposal and James, Bob Duncan and Fred Thompson voting against it.

Later, James learned through

Area Gets Rains, Some Hail Damage

For the third night in a row, rain fell over parts of the Olton area Tuesday night, bringing the total rainfall for the year to 6.30 inches. This is more than an inch ahead of the 5.15 measurement this time last year.

Hail damage from a storm Sunday night was reported high at farms northeast of town but farmers to the south gave a rosy picture at this stage of the game.

Rainfall here last Friday night measured .75 of an inch. Monday night .20 was reported and Tuesday night .45 was measured.

Lightening in the Friday night storm sent firemen to a barracks fire and kept Southwestern Public Service men busy. The barracks was destroyed after it was struck by lightning. Electrical service was stopped Friday night for about 40 minutes and Saturday afternoon for two hours after lightning struck a substation.

Despite threatening clouds Sunday night, the town proper received no moisture. Farmers northeast, however, reported as much as one and one-half inches that night.

Mrs. Jim Kemp, four and one-half miles northeast of Olton, reported a half inch of rain Sunday night and "two or two and one-half inches of hail piled up."

"The next morning at 9 o'clock, we still had hail piled up on our front steps," she said.

She noted that they would probably have to plant over, but the deadline is near and the ground was so wet that they couldn't get into the fields. She added that their feed was hurt but thought it would come out.

Four miles east of Olton on the F.B. Coleman farm, hail the size of marbles was reported Sunday night. Damage was not high in that area, however.

On the Gilbert Roberson farm, four miles north and one west, three-quarters of an inch of rain was recorded Sunday night and very little hail. Most crops in this area are reported looking good.

Floyd Light, who farms north of Olton and just south of the draw, reported both hail and rain Sunday night.

"Monday morning, I picked up hail by the handfuls in the bar ditches," he said. He estimated damage to his cucumbers at 20 to 30 percent, but added that his maize wasn't hurt.

On the L.L. LaDuke farm,

10 miles west of Olton, very little rain was reported.

"Our cotton and maize are both burned by the sand," Mrs. LaDuke said, "but they're still growing."

South of town, most crops are looking good.

Elmer McGill, five miles southwest, reported that the hail had missed his area three times. He noted that his corn was looking very good.

Southeast of Olton at the Lowell McGill farm, crops were described as "looking fine."

"We've had very little rain and no hail since May," he commented.

Special Class Gets Approval

Approval for special education classes for Olton schools by the Special Education Division was announced this week by local school officials.

The request has now been sent to the finance division. This is considered a routine procedure and it is felt that the classes will be made available in Olton.

A meeting of parents interested in the classes, described as for those who are not college bound, was held here in March.

A Lubbock psychologist was then called in to test children who were being considered for

the classes. The classes are to be of a specialized nature, centering around the individual child. No grades are to be given. Each child is to progress at his own pace.

The school is interested in establishing two types of classes. One would be students who are not now attending school. The other would be for students who are in school but are not getting the extra help they need.

School officials hope to have a complete program of education that would begin in elementary school and carry the student through to graduation.

Robin Brown In Hospital

Robin Brown, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Gene Brown, is in Carris-Tinkley Hospital at Truth or Consequences, N.M., for therapy treatment.

Date for the event was announced Tuesday by Melvin McReynolds, manager of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, following a meeting of the retail trades committee.

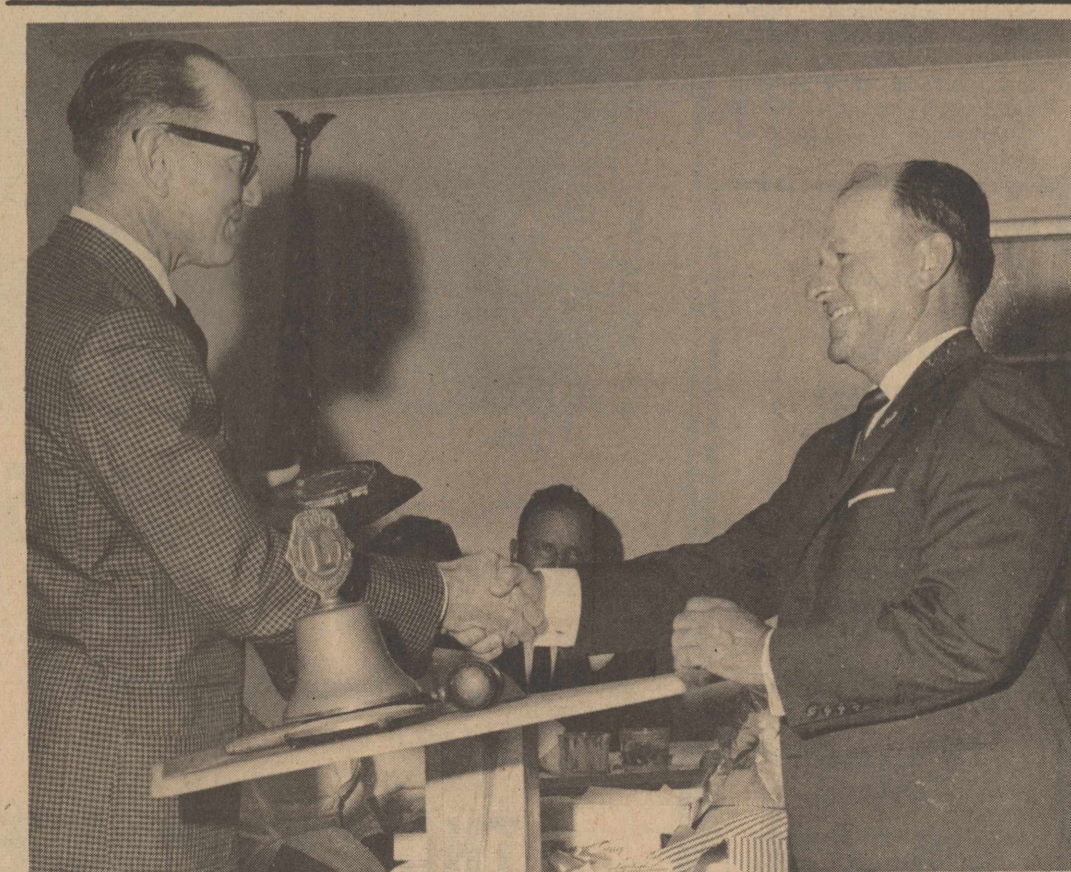
Special events are being planned for the big day, along with drawings for prizes to be given away by participating merchants.

a TML opinion that he could not vote.

After James canceled his vote and the question came up at the meeting, Buchenau moved to table the proposition. The council voted unanimously to shelve the ordinance, for the time being.

In other activity, the council:
1. Approved plans to take out a \$50,000 liability insurance policy with Chitwood Insurance Agency on the city streetsweeper.

2. Okayed the month's bills, agreeing with a suggestion from Buchenau that in the future signed purchase orders accompany invoices presented to the council.

3. Granted a five per cent discount to the school system for payment of its \$3,300 annual water-sewer bill annually in advance. Supt. Johnny Clark appeared at the meeting and sought a 10 per cent discount. He said such an arrangement would benefit the school system, the city and the taxpayer, enabling the schools to economize and the city to get a large amount of operating capital in one payment. After discussion, the council settled on a five per cent discount.

4. Approved a General Telephone Company request for (1) and increase in resident extension home rates, from \$1.00 per month to \$1.25 per month, and (2) to set up a different billing system for key (button) telephone rates.

District Manager Bob Saunders of Littlefield told the council the second proposal would not mean additional revenue to General Telephone overall, but that it would make small differences to users.

Object of the change, Saunders said, is to streamline the system, not only for billing, but also for operations. The council voted, 4-1, for approval. Gullett voted against the proposal, saying he didn't like the extension rate increase and that he would like to study the whole proposal more before voting for it.

5. Accepted a proposal from Byron Jackson Pump Co., Plainview, in the amount of \$1,361.81 for repairs to the city pump.

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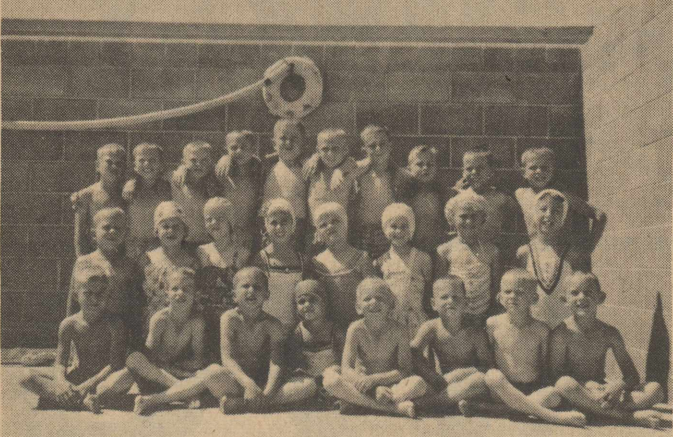

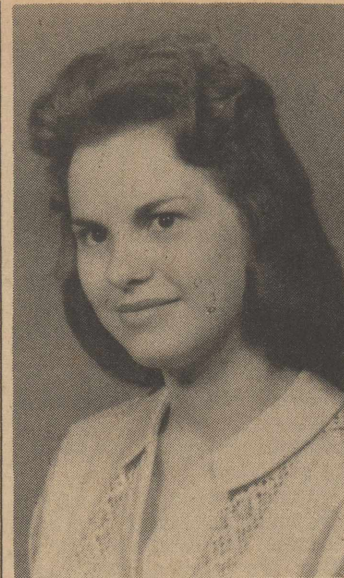

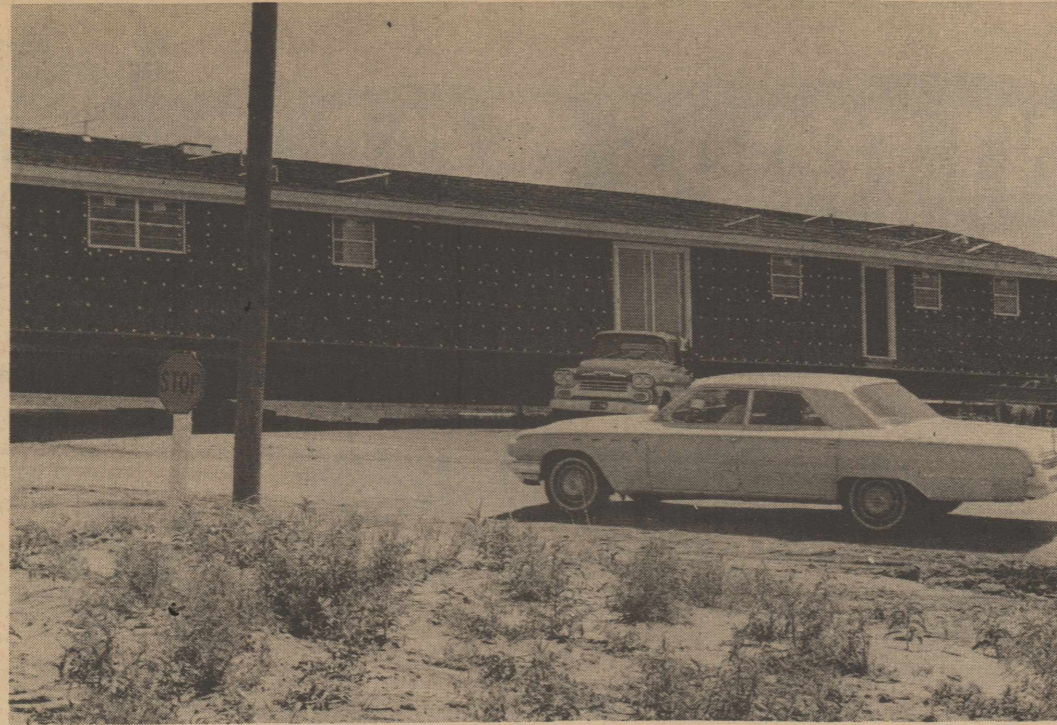
