To Meet Albany Friday

Greyhounds Skin 'Cats In Season Opener, 32 - 0

The 1979 edition of the Knox City Greyhounds made its debut in winning style Friday night in Greyhound stadium with a 32-0 win over the visiting Rule Bobcats.

The game was played with the usual amount of mis-cues and jitters most always associated with the first game of the year.

Knox City received the opening kickoff and Ricky Gonzales returned the ball 17 yards to the 37. Tim Roberson carried four straight times picking up 20 yards and two first downs. Two incomplete with Rule receiving the

sses and a short run caused the Hounds to punt. Dwayne Johnson, who is doing the punting for the Hounds this year, only had the opportunity to kick three times and each time did an excellent job of placing the ball. The first two were not long but effective making

Rule start deep in its end of

the field. After an exchange of punts, on the Hounds' third possession they started on their own 31 with Roberson and Terry Watson alternating carrying the ball. Aided by a face mask penalty against Rule and a recovered fumble by Andy Barnard, Roberson scored on an eight yard burst over the right side. Gonzales kicked the extra point. The touchdown came on the second play of the second

period. The next time the Hounds got the ball, they moved deep Bobcat territory highlighted by runs of 17 yards by Roberson, 18 yards by Watson and excellent blocking by offensive line lead Kyle White.

Rule five yard line, the Hounds suffered two penalties, completed one pass, one run and two incomplete passes before turning the ball over to

the Bobcats on their seven.

The Hounds' defense held and a good runback of the Rule punt by Roberson put them in position for Johnson to pass 13 yards to Sammy White for a touchdown with 1:55 playing time left in the half. The point after was no good. Score: 13-0.

The second half opened kickoff On the third play, the Bobcats fumbled and the Hounds recovered the ball on Rule's 41.

The first offensive play, Roberson ran wide to the left side behind a wall of blockers led by Kyle White 41 yards for the score. Watson was rushed in as the place kicker since Gonzales was having leg cramps. The kick failed however, and the score remained, 19-0.

Following the kickoff and an exchange of punts, the Hounds started on their 45. On the tenth play of the series, Scott Lynn scored from the one. The drive was highlighted by a 13 yard pass from Johnson to Adam White, running by Greg Whitten, Watson and Lynn. Roberson then kicked the extra point. Score: 26-0.

The defense of the Greyhounds controlled the game. They continually kept the pressure on the Bobcats. The defensive effort was rewarded when Sammy White recovered a fumble in the Bobcat end zone for the



Stenholm Urges Reconsideration

Seventeenth District Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has urged reconsideration of a USDA study aimed at shifting administration of the Knox City Plant Materials Center from the Soil Conservation Service to non-federal control.

"This is a program that works with a minimum of federal funds and personnel and works well," Stenholm said in a letter of protest to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland. "Any disruption in the work now in progress at the Center would be a loss not only to the farmers and ranchers who benefit directly from its research, but also for the many sportsmen and members of the general

On September 1, the offices of the Knox County Sheriff and the Knox County Attorney joined forces in an effort to more effectively collect bad checks. The law has been amended

and officials are now allowed to collect a fee, with the amount variable according to the amount of the check. This fee will be paid into the county treasury and should prove to be an additional deterrent to bad check writers, officials

As of September 1, 1979, all checks will be processed through the County Attorney's office. However, officials are asking that before turning a check over to them, the following procedures be complied with:

1) Before placing a check marked "insufficient funds" in the hands of the Sheriff or County Attorney, one should send a letter to the person's last known address requesting payment of the check. This letter must be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested. It is not

marked "no account." 2) Never accept partial payment on a check.

3) When turning over the check to them for collection, one should make a notation of what property or service was obtained in exchange for the check. For example, if the check went to a gas station for \$20.00, \$10.00 of which was for fuel and \$10.00 for cash, it is essential that they be advised of this fact.

4) If the check paid off a pre-existing debt, i.e., payment on an open charge or credit account, do not turn the check over to them for collection because they have no jurisdiction over this type of check. If they attempt to collect it for you, they place themselves in danger of being

charged with false arrest.

5) Most importantly, one should obtain accurate identification and a correct address of the person from whom he or she accepts the check. If there is any doubt in one's mind whatsoever, he or she should require presentation of a VALID Texas Driver's License and note the license number on the check. If the person cannot present a Texas Operator's or Commercial License, one should not accept a check from him. They have in their files many checks that are simply uncollectable because the person who wrote the check moved away, and with no driver's license number it is impossible to locate him. One should impress on his or her employees that there is no substitute for the driver's license identification, and it must be a Texas license and not that of another state.

County Sheriff James E. Redwine and County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett said they would appreciate cooperation on this matter and they hoped by everyone's working together that losses could be cut down considerably due to bad checks.

Feeder/Cleaner Can **Remove Cotton Trash** 

Cotton can be a cleaner product when it reaches the textile mills, thanks to a new discovery made by engineers at Texas A&M University and Cotton Incorporated.

While watching a highspeed movie of cotton modules being fed into a module feeder at the gin, the engineers noticed something unusual. The dispersing cylinders were actually separating the cotton and the trash that's common with stripper type harvesting.

From this observation came a new machine called a feeder/cleaner. It removes up to 70% of the dirt and trash from seed cotton before it ever enters the gin. This increases gin efficiency and, in some cases, saves producers 20-25% of the total per bale processing costs. Just as important, it can improve the grade of cotton by as much as \$10 a bale, according to one farmer.

The movie-going engineers were Lambert H. Wilkes and Gary Underbrink of Texas A&M and J.K. "Farmer" Jones of Cotton Incorporated, the research marketing arm of cotton producers.

Jones explained how the feeder/cleaner works. "Actually, the cleaner

is nothing but channel saw-type cylinders. They actually catch the cotton in mid-air and let the already separated trash go over the grid bar."

An oversimplification, perhaps, since it took over two years to perfect the feeder/cleaner, which was field tested in the Texas High Plains and in the Coastal Bend area of

Wilkes, professor of agricultural engineering at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in College Station, and Underbrink, research associate, worked out the design in cooperation with Jones, Cotton Incorporated vice president director processing and handling research. This is the team

developed the module builder and gin feeder system.

The project was funded jointly by Cotton Incorporated and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and is another example of producer's per bale checkoff at work.

The feeder/cleaner has

potential especially for stripper-harvested cotton, which is gaining wider acceptance across the belt, even though the stripper means more trash in seed cotton. For instance, in West Texas, it commonly takes 2,200 or more pounds of seed cotton to produce a bale of lint. Of that 2,200 pounds, the smallest portion is lint, with seed about 925 pounds, trash about 775 pounds, and the lint about 500 pounds. In the Lubtest, the bock feeder/cleaner removed 400 to 550 pounds of trash per bale from the cotton

before it entered the gin. "This increases the amount of cotton you can process in a given unit of time," said Underbrink, "since overhead cleaning capacity is a limiting factor in many gins.'

Wilkes added, "It also reduces the amount of energy required to handle the trash. You are looking at 700 to 1,500 pounds of trash per bale in some stripped cotton and it takes a tremendous amount of energy just to move it from one place to another.'

The feeder/cleaner was also tested in Corpus Christi, to see how it would work with high moisture cotton, the condition that exists in the rainbelt areas.

According to Wilkes, it removed 40% to 42% of the trash in the Corpus Christi test.

The feeder/cleaner work in high moisture cotton," he said. "This has been one of our concerns. This becomes increasingly important as stripper harvesting moves into the high rainfall areas.'

Depending on how trashy your cotton is, the feeder/cleaner can improve cotton by as much as two grades, says Lloyd Morris, operator of the Victory Gin in Corpus Christi, where the test was held.

"You could go from zero to maybe \$20 a bale, depending on how rough your cotton is," said Morris

"We like the part of keeping the trash and dirt out of the gin plant," he added. "It was very noticeable that the dust went down and we probably picked up two grades at the press. But we had some very rough cotton."

Morris' cotton had a 25% moisture content.

"If it's any worse than this we will just have to quit," he quipped. "So if the feeder/cleaner did any good in this country, it should work like a charm anywhere else."

Approximately 90% of the Texas and Oklahoma cotton was harvested with strippers last year.

Underbrink explains why: "The stripper is a cheaper method of harvesting than the picker. faster, more economical, and there is less loss of seed cotton. However, on the negative side, it takes 1,600 pounds of seed cotton to make a bale of cotton in picker areas. Whereas, with stripper harvesting, it may take from 2,000 to 3,000 pounds to produce that same 500 pounds of lint. Most picker-adapted gins can't handle that

much trash. "The feeder/cleaner, however, offsets the disadvantages of having more trash in your cotton," he added. "With the feeder/cleaner it's not necessary to modify the complete gin plan when converting from picker to stripper cotton. And you

don't lose capacity.' Another advantage of the feeder/cleaner is that it removes trash with very little seed cotton

"Anytime you clean cotton you are subject to an amount of seed cotton loss," says Underbrink.

"And that's like throwing away money. We have been able to maintain a seed cotton loss elow 1% and still do this high efficiency cleaning."

The unit is designed so it can be used as a complete feeder/cleaner, as was done in the Lubbock test, or the cleaning unit can be attached to some already existing feeders.

"I think we have got to put one in a gin and run it for a year under all conditions to really advise the farmers and ginners on the total economics involved," concluded
