



The thrill-a-minute races which appear in almost every cowboy movie are exciting affairs, as they are meant to be; but some of the real rides for life of American history surpass any ever imagined by a movie writer. ter the ham and bacon was cured, we sliced and stored it in crock jars of lard. We stored 5 gallons ham and 8 gallons bacon. As I did not have enough shelves in the pantry, new shelves were added at no cost.

I have enjoyed being home food supply demonstrator and feel it has been of some benefit to my whole family.

The True Facts Will Be Known In Time

Disaster came to us at Pearl Harbor when, in violation of every international principle, our Oriental enemy struck a coward's blow while pretending to be striving for a pesceful outcome to the differences between Japan and America. Immediately there was an outcry that a scapegoat be found for the happening

Before the facts were known or could be known there was some perferved oratory attribut-ing negligence and incapacity to the officers entrusted with the defense of our stronghold in the mid-Pacific-demanding courtmartials and whatnot. Undoubtedly there will be the closest sort of investigation by the naval authorities of every phase of the Pearl Harbor Incident. That is martial routine But the time for making such inquiry is not now when the American navy is scouring the seas for enemy ships and when the officers who alone know all the facts cannot be called home to appear before a proper tribunal.

Rarely has a war been fought in which every engagement was a victory and still more rarely has there been an international conflict when the enemy has not outguessed the other fellow

Certainly it was untimely, to say the least, for a Senatorial outburst based on gossip and rumor and that outburst was fittingly characterized by Senator Walsh, chairman of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee, and others on the floor. The circumstances mentioned by Senator Tobey of New Hampshire, pointing to lack of vigilance, unreadiness, and worse, he admitted were founded only on what some other Senators had told him. He did not know, and his alleged informants did not know, and could not know, whether there was any foundation for the terrible accumutions Ultimately, of course, every circumstance will be disclosed and action, if action is required, will be

As was pointed out in the Senate debate, any Congressional investigation would disclose the very information that our foes would like to have, as for example, the extent of the damage to the ships and just what our precautions at Pearl Harbor and Honolulu against such raids consist of The enemy that struck and fled can know none of these details It will be remembered that the Nazis reported

the complete destruction of the British airship esrrier Illustrious, to cite just one example, and did not know of their error until the great ship, steaming under its own power, came to a United States

Quite apart from the inadvisability of seeking the sadist satisfaction of trying to fix the blame at this particular stage of hostilities is the danger that lies in giving credence to surmises or mere inventions that start no one knows where and are magnified as the stories are passed along. The other day it was broadcasted all around, and probably published in some papers, that enemy bombers were within an hour and twenty minutes of New York, that enemy warplanes had been seen over Boston, etc. There was not a word of truth in the story. Whether some excited Bostonian saw a flock of geese high up and let his imagination translate these into enemy aircraft, or how else the shocking rumor was started, nobody knows and probably will ever know. But before the story had reached the authorities to contradict it, there was

A few days later we got the story in another shape-to wit, that on the morning of December 12 New York had actually been bombed New York itself, of course, knew that it hadn't been bombed, but the rest of the world had another breath-taking moment. In the old World War we had to deal with many similar stories, of American transports sunk, and that sort of thing. These were supposed to have been given currency by fifth column agents, though that particular term had not been coined then. It is not impossible that the yarns of today may have come from a corresponding source.

The lesson of all this is not to believe all you hear. While it is wise to be prepared for anything. it is supremely stupid to get the jitters from every unfounded report that drifts from unnamed and

The "Northwest Passage" Now A Reality

As the shadow of war lengthens over the Pacific, a new inland, fog-free, airway to Alaska, rushed to completion by Canada, places the military might of the United States and Dominion forces within five hours of this continental outpost.

Within twenty-four hours men and aircraft could be mustered from all over the United States and Canada for concentration in Alaska. In November of 1940 the United States-Canada Joint Board on De-

fense recommended construction of a chain of air bases linking Alaska with air fields close to the American border. Today, little more than a year later, U. S. and Canadian transport planes are winging their way over the new skyway. Built by Canada at a cost of \$6,000,000, the airline will serve in the days of peace as the foundation for a com-mercial air route to the Orient.

Much credit for this achievement should go to the Air Services Branch of Canada's Department of Transport. But the men who made the forests blossom forth as airports were the tobacco-chewing, tractorcussing, frost-bitten sons of the wilderness who tackled the job with typical Canadian gusto.

The plans called for main ports to be established at Grand Prairie, Fort St. John, White Horse, Fort Nelson and Watson Lake. The first three were near enough railways to eliminate transportation prob-lems, but Fort Nelson was 300 miles north of the end of steel and Wat-son Lake was just a dot on the map surrounded by wilderness.

Bound for Fort Nelson, Tractor Train No. 1 started out from Dawson Creek in two sections on February 9 last. Mile by mile the caravan bunted and battled through the brush. Sometimes it moved ten miles in 24 hours, but more often only three or four miles. A week after its departure it had covered

Tractor Train No. 1, leaving trail which others might follow, arrived at Fort Nelson on March 31, 1941. Thus ended the first skirmish with nature, forty-six days after it left Dawson Creek.

Next came the summer campaign. To hew a road into Watson Lake in the summer over rocks and muskes bogs was out of the question. But, why couldn't men and equipment be floated in from Wrangel, Alaska, via the Stikine and Dease rivers? This involved 350 miles of river travel and a 75-mile portage.




