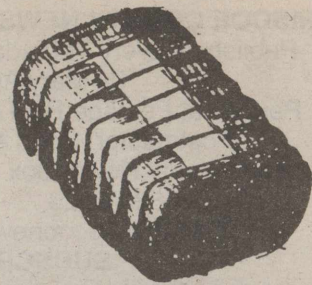

The following article was taken from the newsletter of the First United Methodist Church in Canyon, and was sent to us by Mary Lou Campbell.

It is a message from the pastor, and is titled "Build Community."

"Sunday's paper had a big article about a friend of ours, Tanner Young, from Silverton. Tanner got a severe head injury playing football earlier this fall. He could have died if he hadn't gotten immediate attention, including a helicopter ride to Covenant Hospital. Tanner is fine today. He has a big scar on his head from surgery, but his hair is growing back. The doctors even cleared him to play basketball if he wants to.

"What helped Tanner get well? Many factors. God's healing power, a fast-acting EMT, great doctors, nurses, and medical technology all contributed to Tanner's healing. But one of the most powerful factors was *community*, the loving support and prayers of true friends and neighbors.

"Our son, Nick, went to the emergency room the night of Tanner's accident, and said tons of people were there. While Tanner was in the hospital neighbors helped in every imaginable way. Christians of all denominations prayed. Many people visited, sent gifts, said words of love and encouragement. Without the loving support of true friends, Tanner and his family would have suffered much more.

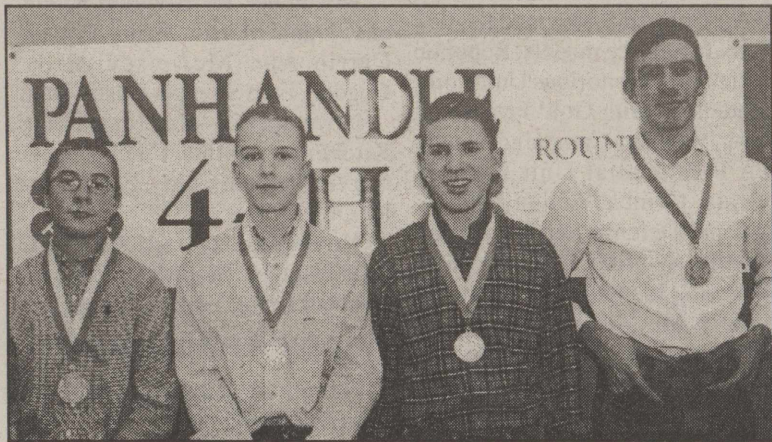

"That's why I've asked Tom Moore to lead us in building community through small group ministries. No Change in Winner After Election Recount

The recount is in and the vote total changed slightly, but the actual winner elected November 5 did not change.

In the race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 in Briscoe County, Democratic challenger Connie Smith maintained her win after a recount, receiving 304 votes to Republican incumbent Edwin Norris' 295 votes, said Bena Hester, county and district clerk.

On election night, votes counted for Smith and Norris each numbered 287, but that number changed with canvassing of the vote tally Tuesday, when Norris had 296 votes and Mrs. Smith garnered 303 votes, Mrs. Hester said.

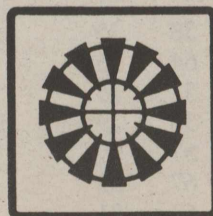

Owls Lose Bi-District Game to Fort Elliott at McLean Thursday

The Owls dropped their bi-district game to Fort Elliott at McLean Thursday night of last week. After playing a very good first half and trailing only 21-14 at the midway stop, the Owls went on to lose 59-14 under the 45-point rule with 3:09 remaining in the game.

When Fort Elliott kicked off, Red Ivory returned the ball for the Owls. He carried for a first down on the 37, after which Clifton Baker picked up a couple of yards and Ivory hit John Arnold with a pass which was good for a first down on the Fort Elliott 20. Ivory carried a couple of times before going into the endzone for the first points of the game. Gid Mayfield held and Max Comer kicked the PAT to give the Owls an 8-0 lead with 6:43 remaining in the first quarter.

When Max kicked off, the ball went into the endzone for a touch-back. Chance Rhoderick stopped the runner on the first play, after

which Ivory sacked the Cougar passer for a loss. Fort Elliott completed a pass for a first down and ran for another on the Silverton 10. They scored with 4:57 remaining in the first quarter. Their PAT kick failed, and the Owls continued to lead 8-6.

When the Owls got the ball back, Ivory picked up five yards and passed complete to Dustin Hale for a first down on the 22. Three incomplete passes saw the ball go over to Fort Elliott on the 17.

The Owl defense held, led by Chase Comer, Arnold, Yance Forbes and Ivory, and Fort Elliott punted to the Silverton 3.

Ivory gained to the 15 on the first play, then ran for a first down on the 30 as the second quarter began. The Owls were penalized for holding, fumbled and saw it recovered by Forbes, before punting on fourth down. Hale saved a touchdown with a tackle on the Silverton 25. Two infractions were whistled against the Cougars, and on their

second play Ivory intercepted a Fort Elliott pass on the Silverton 2-yard line. The Owls were unable to move the ball, and Ivory punted.

This time Fort Elliott came back and passed for a touchdown with 3:47 remaining before halftime. The PAT run was good, and the Fort moved ahead 13-8.

When Fort Elliott kicked off, Forbes took the ball near the goal and ran to the Cougar 37. Ivory ran for a first down on the 24, after which two incomplete passes caused the ball to go over on the Fort Elliott 16.

The Cougars came back to score again with 59 seconds remaining in the first half, kicked the PAT, and moved ahead 21-8.

The Owls waded through penalty calls, and Ivory completed a pass to Hale for a first down on the Fort Elliott 16. The Cougars were hit with a pass interference call which gave the Owls another first down, and Colt Smith passed to Arnold for a touchdown with 18.8 seconds remaining in the quarter. Once again Mayfield held and Max kicked the PAT, which was blocked by the Cougars. This narrowed the Fort Elliott lead to 21-14.

The Owls kicked off again, and on their first play Ivory intercepted a Fort Elliott pass and ran to the 18. Time in the first half expired on the play.

Fort Elliott scored with 9:09 remaining in the third quarter, kicked the PAT, and moved into a 29-14 lead. Numerous penalties against both teams took up most of the rest of the third quarter.

The Cougars came back to score with 8:15 remaining in the fourth quarter, kicked the PAT, and extended their lead to 37-14.

The next score by Fort Elliott came with 7:43 remaining in the game. They kicked the PAT, and moved into a 45-14 lead.

The Cougars scored on a pass with 5:15 remaining in the game,

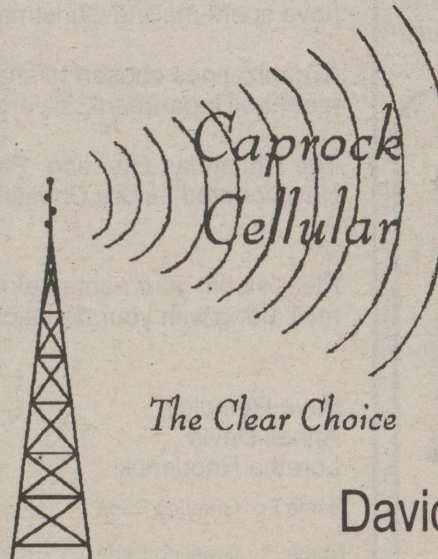
