According to the American Heart Association, coronary disease is the single leading cause of death in the U.S. Early recognition of a can save Call 911 if you witness someone experiencing any of the following

1. Chest discomfort: pressure, squeezing, fullness, or pain in the center of the chest that lasts longer than a few minutes or that goes away and comes back.

2. Discomfort in other areas of the body: pain in one or both arms, the back, the neck, jaw or stomach.

3. Shortness of breath: may occur before or at the same time as chest pain.

4. Other signs: breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea, or lightheadedness.

Remember, heart disease can be prevented. High blood pressure puts a person at a higher risk for having a heart attack. One in four Americans have high blood pressure and 31.6% don't know they have it. High blood pressure is a treatable disease. The Joint National Committee on Prevention, detectin, Evaluation and Treatment of High Blood Pressure recommends that adults who do not have high blood prssure to have their blood pressure checked at least every two years.
