

"Everyone is waiting for the August crop report next week, and bales on July 31, the end of the hopefully we get a number that will keep us busy for a while," an analyst said. "There really is nothing for the market to react to at the moment.

The department's report will be the first date of the season to be based on actual field surveys. Private analysts' estimates for the U. S. crop range between 17.75 million and 18.3 million bales compared to the 17.5 million bales projected in July by USDA.

"As the U. S. crop gets better and better, everyone continues to ratchet up their estimate of the crop," one market observer said. "Surely, whatever USDA shows in its upcoming report will be considered to be on the low side when we read it," he quipped.

The cotton market closed moderately lower Thursday after the release of USDA's weekly export sales report. According to the department, in the week ended August 1, major U. S. export purchases from Columbia, Taiwan,

General inactivity in the market, Japan, Turkey and Indonesia were Mexico, Italy, Canada, Ireland and sult.

> Outstanding sales of 1,164,300 2001-02 marketing year, were carried over to 2002-03, and sales for delivery in the 2003-04 marketing year totaled 76,000 bales. In addition, final shipments of 137,100 bales, considerably more than the 6,008,800 bales of U. S. cotton exported the previous year.

"Export sales usually are slow in front of the August supply / demand report," one analyst said. "Some buyers hold off to see what the report does to the market and many buyers' offices are closed for summer holidays. Shipments were strong this week, and old-crop shipments reached 11.09 million bales which should result in USDA reducing old-crop carryout by about 100,000 bales in its August 12 report," he added.

On the spot cotton scene, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 675 bales online in the week ended July 8 compared with the previous week's total of 300 bales. The average price received by

West Nile Virus **Advances West**

A horse in Haskell County, about 50 miles north of Abilene, tested positive Wednesday, August West Nile Virus (WNV). This is the 21st horse to test positive for WNV in Texas, and is the westernmost detection of the virus in the state.

"Previously, WNV had been detected only as far west as Travis County," reported Dr. Joe Garrett of the Zoonsis Control Division of the Texas Department of Health. "The virus was confirmed in a dead blue jay submitted from southwest Austin on July 17"

He noted that infected birds Montgomery, Tarrant and Travis, lents.

infected mosquitoes have been detected in Dallas, Fort Bend, Harris, Orange and Jefferson counties.

"We credit the Texas Department of Health with confirming infection in the Haskell County horse. The private veterinary practitioner, suspecting that the animal might have rabies, submitted the brain to the TDH laboratory, where rabies testing is conducted. After ruling out that disease, health department laboratory technicians tested the tissue for west Nile Virus and confirmed infection," said Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. She said unless rbies is suspected, WNV testing for horses is usually conducted at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMOL) at College Station. WNV testing for humans, birds 7, for the mosquito-borne disease and mosquitoes are conducted by the Texas Department of Health.

We're continuing to urge owners to have their horses, donkeys, mules and other equids vaccinated against this form of 'sleeping sickness' which continues to spread westward," said Dr. Logan. "To gain protection against the virus, however, equids need to injections of WNV vaccine administered at least three to six weeks apart. The animal will not develop full immunity for about four to six weeks after the second injection."
