We had this note from Maggie Stratton:



New Legislation Affects County Businesses

Business owners, unlike homeowners, are assessed not only on the value of their real property but also on tangible personal property owned or held by the business and used for the production of income. These taxable business assets include inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, computers and

A business is required annually to render its personal property to the appraisal district in which the property is located; however, since Texas law heretofore hasn't provided a penalty for failure to render, a substantial number of businesses--both in Briscoe The Owls were unable to County and throughout the state--haven't filed renditions.

Man Dies in Crash

Richard Dale Ray, 26, died Sunday after hitting a horse on State Highway 207, seven miles south of Silverton, according to a Texas Department of Public Safety dispatcher.

Mr. Ray died at the scene.

He was driving northbound at about 8:18 p.m. when he struck the horse in the roadway. The horse rolled up into the car, striking the windshield and the driver.




