The final game of the series will be the junior varsity team vs. San Jacinto Christian Academy at 6:30 p.m. today.

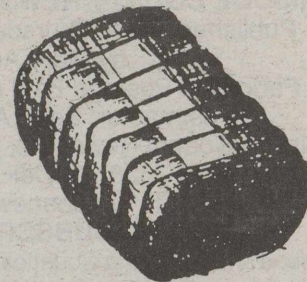
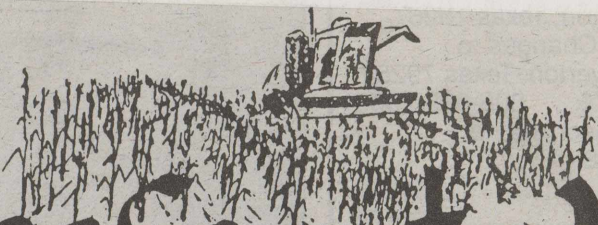

Piper Makes Traditional Kilts

Colin Chalmers of Silverton looked sort of out of place at Jent's House of Music on Friday.

Maybe it was his Scottish brogue. Maybe it was the kilt. Probably the kilt.

Chalmers, just about two years away from his native Scotland, was dressed in the full traditional Scottish garb, complete with ghillie brougs (shoes), skindoos (knife) and a kilt.

"Believe it or not, wearing a kilt is pretty comfortable," he said, carefully arranging the heavy wool tartan as he was sitting.

Many other people seem to think so. Chalmers has the rare ability in America to craft traditional kilts that reflect people's clan heritage, and he has already sewed 50 kilts for customers across the United States.

He said he's one of three in the entire country who makes traditional kilts, made with the proper buckles, pleats and wool tartan. And the demand has been huge, as people search for their ancestry.

"It's getting bigger in America," he said.

But Chalmers didn't originally come here to share his kilt-making abilities. It was his 30 years of experience on the bagpipes that brought him overseas, thanks to a group that wanted a bagpipe teacher in Canyon and saw Chalmers' advertisement on the Internet.

Chalmers sees a few students and plays the pipes with the 23rd Street Band in Canyon, but his day job is at Jent's House of Music, his sponsor. He's learning how to tune brass instruments while he waits for his labor certificate, one of the steps in a long process to get a green card.

"We've had fun with Colin," said Chris Bell, the store's manager. "This is obviously different. There's not many pipers running around."

On a cultural visa, Chalmers and occasionally his wife, Shirliann, visit schools and give presentations on Scottish heritage.

But when Chalmers gets home, he sets about sewing kilts, carefully sewing 5,000 stitches in eight yards of imported Scottish wool fabric, all without the help of any machines.

He imports the wool in

three weights--lightweight to heavyweight, which he considers the best -- from three select mills in Scotland. He measures the subject around the waist, down to about the middle of the knee, and around the backside.

Then Chalmers blocks out the material, making sure the one-inch pleats in the back look similar to the pattern in the front -- a plaid pattern often of greens, blues and reds. The detailed work takes about 16 hours each kilt.

He learned the process back when he was playing bagpipes in the Scottish volunteer army as part of the Black Watch RHR regiment, the oldest Scottish regiment. Chalmers remembers a pleating mistake at the beginning but learned quickly to measure properly.

He scoffs at the people who ask for single-belted kilts.

"There's only two buckles on my kilt," he said. Chalmers said that allows the kilt to lay right.

And there's no requirement to wear the kilt of your clan. You don't even have to be Scottish or male.

"You can wear any tartan," he said.

Which he does.

"I wear any kilt if I like it," he said.

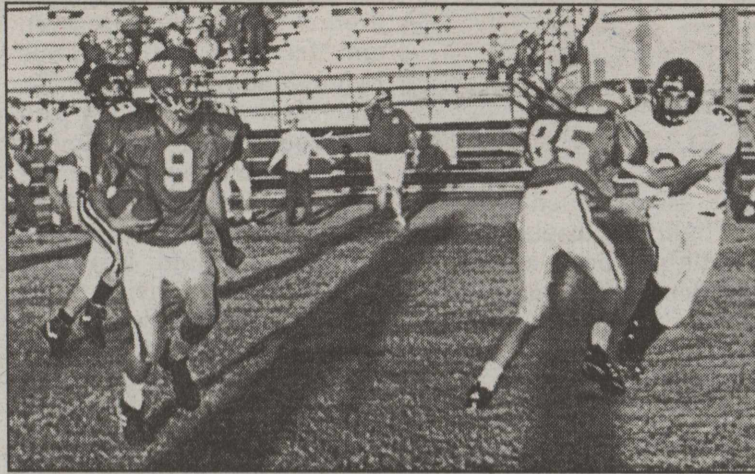

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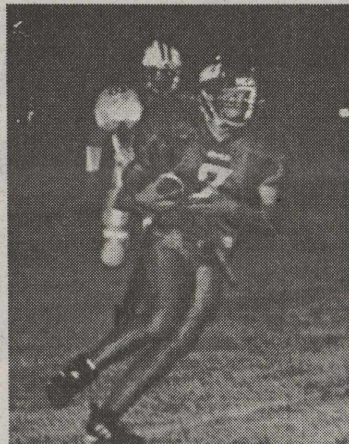
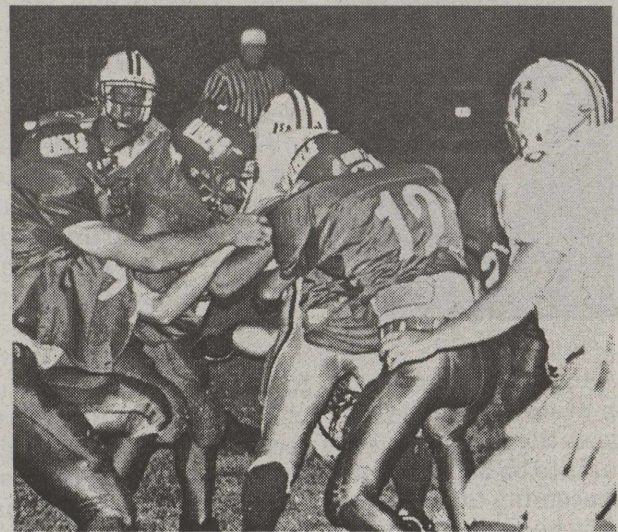

Red Owls Fall to Green Owls In Second District Outing

Silverton's Red Owls fell before the onslaught of the Hedley Green Owls here last Friday night. When the dust cleared, the scoreboard showed that the Owls had dropped their second district outing 37-16.

Actually the stats put up by the Red Owls weren't that bad, but the boys couldn't push the ball into the endzone when they got in scoring position.

The Red Owls made 12 first downs, as compared with nine for the Green Owls, and gained a total of 311 yards as compared to 351 for Hedley.

Max Comer kicked off for the Big Red and stopped the return at the Silverton 35. Hedley passed for a touchdown with 9:42 still on the first-quarter clock, carried the PAT into the endzone, and held a 7-0 lead.

When Hedley kicked off they recovered their onside kick and were back on offense again. Defense led by Chance Rhoderick, Comer and other Owls held, and the ball went over on downs on the Silverton 30.

Beau Brock, Rhoderick and Yance Forbes alternated in carrying the ball, and a pass from Colt Smith to Eric Minyard was good for a first down on the Hedley 11. Forbes carried the ball into the endzone with 5:20 still on the first-quarter clock. Caleb

Caleb kicked the onside kick, and recovered it for Silverton, after which Forbes ran for a first down with 5:11 remaining in the first quarter. Brock and Forbes picked up a few yards each before the ball went over on downs to Hedley.

The defense held once again, and Hedley got off a very poor punt which came down near midfield.

rushed with no gain, and Smith ran for a first down. Smith passed complete to Estes for a 10-yard pickup, and hit Minyard with a pass for a first down on the Hedley nine. Smith completed a pass to Comer with two seconds remaining in the first half, but the Owls were unable to put it into the end zone.

When the ball was put in play in the second half, rushes by Brock and Estes brought about a first down on the Hedley 30. Forbes carried his second touchdown of the game with 8:19 still on the third-quarter clock. Comer kicked the PAT, and Silverton narrowed the score to 23-16.

When the Red Owls fired an onside kick at the Green Owls, Rhoderick recovered on the Hedley 25, but Silverton was unable to gain yardage, and the ball went back to Hedley on the Silverton 15.

Hedley rushed and passed deep in Silverton territory, and scored with 1:19 remaining in the third quarter. They kicked the PAT, and moved ahead 31-16.
