Continued From Page One University of North Texas. A marine pilot, Redin flew bomber flights in the South Pacific from 1942-1946.

He coached the Wayland Baptist men's team for 11 years before being asked to take over the Flying Queens. In 1948 local businessman Claude Hutcherson, owner of Hutcherson Air Service, offered to sponsor the team and provided single-engine Beechcraft Bonanzas to fly the girls to away games; however their mode of travel would not be their only claim to fame. While coaching the Flying Queens, Redin compiled a ecord of 431 wins and 66 losses. The teams won six national AAUW championships including 1956, 1957, 1959, 1961 and 1971, and twice finished with undefeated seasons. Thirty-six players were selected to compete on the U. S. National teams that participated in Pan American Games.

The Wayland Baptist Flying Queens had a win streak of 131 games that began with Redin's predecessor Caddo Matthews and included 76 straight wins under Harley's coaching. Players on that 1958 team recall the loss to Nashville Business College as one of Redin's most memorable coaching moments.

With the game clearly lost and many of the Flying Queens playing with tears streaming down their faces, Redin called a time out with 15 seconds left and brought his team into a huddle. "I called this time out so I could tell you this," Redin addressed his team, "I want you to go back out and lose with the same kind of class that you've won with for the past five years.'

Women's basketball coaches and historians around the country credit Redin as the person who helped get the sport on its feet. Most agree that the 84-year-old Redin was one of the most influential sports figures of the 20th century. Sports Illustrated magazine included him in its list of '50 Greatest Sports Figures From Texas" for the 20th century

Before Redin became involved in the game, women's basketball was not a give and go kind of game. It was stop and go, but "don't go too far." Teams of six players competed with half court rules; two play-

ers were assigned to the offensive end, two to the back court for defense and two rovers who could play on both sides. No player on either side could dribble more than three times without getting called for a turnover.

Redin saw no reason why girls couldn't play by the same rules as boys and began pushing for rule changes nationally while working his Flying Queens full court in practices. The Queens were among the first to use the full-court press and the fast-break offense.

While serving on the U.S. Olympic National Women's Basketball committee and the AAU rules committee, Redin used his influence to change the rules from three dribbles on a half court to unlimited dribble; from a no-time limit shoot to a 30-second limit and from a six-player with a roving duo to a five player, full court game.

Redin was a member of the inaugural class of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tennessee which was begun in 1999 and has been nominated for the National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Missouri. Redin is a recipient of the Naismith Outstanding Contribution to Basketball Award presented by the Atlanta Tipoff Club.

Notice is hereby given that Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Cooperative"), Floydada, Texas, intends to change rates for electric service. Pursuant to Texas Utilities Code section 41.061, the Coopertive has adopted a resolution approving the rate changes. 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
Letter to the Editor

When we were children, and when our children were


