

County Committee Election Soon

The Briscoe County Farm Service Agency reminds you that it's time to start thinking about electing a county committee person to take office January 1, 2004. This year's election is for LAA-1, currently represented by Zane Mayfield.

The area included in this LAA is roughly north of U.S. Highway 86 to the Caprock Escarpment and follows the Caprock to the Armstrong County line (roughly the northwest part of the county).

Nominating petitions will be accepted through the close of business Friday, September 5. Remember, the person you nominate must live and farm in this community.

Please come and join Crop Disaster **Program Sign-up**

The Briscoe County Farm Service Agency is still accepting applications for the curchoice of receiving payments resulting from eligible crop losses for the 2001 crop year or the 2002 crop year, not both vears.

To be eligible, crop expected production must have been an eligible disaster condition. (2004 and 2005).

It is also requested that minority producers, underrepresented producers. and minority groups come forward and participate in the Committee election process.

The County Committee election process is critical as members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Producers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will be carried out. Committees make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers. Be sure you take the time to participate in this year's election. The producer you elect represents you.

Disaster payments will be issued on losses in excess of the 35 percent threshold. Quality loss payments are available when quality losses reduce your actual production by at least 20 percent. Payrent crop disaster program. ments are calculated using 50 Eligible producers have a percent of the county price for crops that are insured or are covered by NAP and 45 percent of the county price for crops that are uninsured.







Another significant change in this month's report was the increase in U.S. ending stocks by 400,000 bales to 4.3 million, and beginning stocks were cut 300,000 bales to 5.5 million due to an increase in the department's 2002-03 export figure. A surge in exports occurred in July as mills rushed to take advantage of the higher Step 2 payment before the end of the marketing year. Therefore, USDA placed exports at 11.9 million bales against 11.6 million bales in its July report.

mates put prospective output at 95.38 million bales, compared with the 94.84 million predicted in July, and consumption at 99.16 million bales versus 99.14 million. Ending stocks are expected to decline during the season by nine percent to 34.29 million bales

USDA's weekly export report surprised very few traders. Featured buyers included Mexico, Indonesia and Turkey. Also in the week ended Aug. 7, actual shipments totaled 295,000 bales, an 11 percent decrease from the previous week and three percent lower than the four-week average.

Activity increased on the spot cotton scene as online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the five trading days ending Aug. 14 totaled 2,050 bales. The previous week only 930 bales changed hands. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 47.78 to 50.92 cents per pound versus the previous week's 45.50 to 54.00 cents per pound range.
