

The "float" is gone and consumers will have to keep a closer eye on their bank account balance. A new federal law went into effect that will cause checks to clear much faster. It is designed to make check handling faster, and has essentially eliminated the time between check writing and bank clearing. Another change caused by Check 21 is the end of receiving original canceled checks with your bank statement. Now banks can substitute legal copies of the originals. The original checks will be destroyed after processing. All the changes are caused by a need to reduce the physical transfer of checks between institutions to

lower costs and check-transporta-



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
