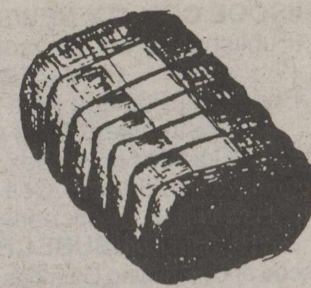

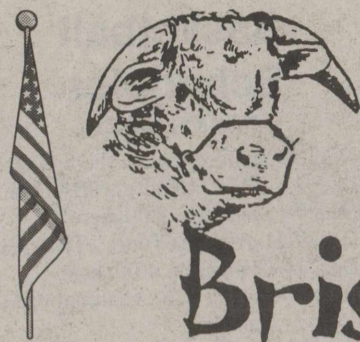

## Wayland Honors Flying Queens Coach

Wayland Baptist University honored long-time Flying Queens coach and women's basketball innovator Harley Redin by naming the school's Athletic Hall of Honor after him.

The ceremony took place Saturday, Nov. 20, during the school's homecoming weekend.

Redin started his coaching career with the men's team in 1946 and began coaching the women's team in 1955. He stopped coaching the men to work solely with the women's team, the Flying Queens, in 1957.

During his time with the Queens, he led the women to six AAU National Champion titles and six AAU runner-up finishes.

He also helped bring several innovations to the women's game: the unlimited dribble, the 30-second shot clock and the full-court game.

Redin retired in 1973.

A Silverton native, Redin played at Tarleton State and North Texas State University. He was a pilot in the Marine Corps during World War II.

## Tax Appraiser Takes Part in State Seminar

Betty Ann Stephens, Briscoe County Tax Assessor-Collector joined over 250 Tax Assessor-Collectors and tax office personnel for the 22nd Annual County Tax Assessor-Collectors' Continuing Education Seminar at the Hilton College Station and Conference Center, November 15-17, 2004.

The annual continuing education seminar at College Station is sponsored by the V. G. Young Institute of County Government, which is part of Texas Cooperative Extension. The Institute provides elected county officials with information and technical assistance and helps officials complete their state-mandated, minimum continuing education requirements.

Included in this year's program were workshops on time management, property tax issues, legal changes affecting credit card payments and an update from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"Texas is one of a small number of states that requires all elected county officials to earn continuing education credits," explained Richard O. Avery, Director of the Institute. "The Institute provides education to county commissioners, judges, treasurers, tax assessor-collectors and county and district clerks through programs conducted in College Station and across the State."

Tax Assessors who attended all of the sessions during the seminar received 13 hours of continuing education credit.
