

Wet soil is muddying up some Texas spinach producers' harvest plans. The crop was planted on time and harvest began in some areas after a few days of sunshine. Texas' 6,000 acres of spinach benefitted from the rain at the beginning of the growing season; however, the line between beneficial and detrimental rain has been crossed in some regions.

The rain has kept producers from the fields, delaying harvest. Spinach quality is compromised when harvest stalls. Also, high humidity favors a higher incidence of disease, mainly white rust and Blue Mold. The season's not over for spinach, and harvest could still be successful.

Good hygiene can mean the difference between life and death for honey bees. USDA scientists found honey bees that are genetically resistant to mites obsessively groom themselves. They use their legs to brush off tracheal mites that could invate their airways and choke them.

Researchers were studying the grooming habits of bees, and found resistant bees groomed more than susceptible ones. The scientists emphasized the study was just a brief look into young bees' grooming habits. In a real colony, mites are a constant challenge, and aggressive grooming would pay off over time.

SCIENTISTS TAP FUNGUS TO PROTECT CORN

USDA researchers think a benign fungus that lives in corn could protect it from mold contamination. The fungus produces a substance that disrupts the mold's ability to infect ripening corn kernels. Mold causes disease and can contaminate the corn with natural carcinogens. The new finding challenges old scientific thinking that the fungus neither hurt nor helped corn. Now researchers think it pays for its room and board by helping corn fend off mold. Further research could lead to inoculating corn seed with the fungus as a living barrier against mold.

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




Silverton FFA Well Represented at **Greenbelt District Banquet Dec. 6**






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
