In addition, students participated in a two-hour helicopter landing zone class. Once all this has been accomplished, the student must then work 24 hours in the hospital emergency room in Plainview, plus work 24 hours on duty with Plainview Fire and EMS. They cannot take the National Registry test until each of them has five ambulance runs including one major medical and one major trauma run. They must continue to respond to 911 calls until they get all required runs! That is a lot of dedication for our volunteer service.



Storms Topple Power Lines; Some Silverton And Claytonville Customers Without Power

Customers of Swisher Electric Cooperative in an area extending east Claytonville all the way to Silverton were without power as a result of Monday evening's storms. Swisher Electric's operations superintendent Kenny McCaslin said that as of Tuesday morning, June 22, twenty-seven 69,000 volt transmission poles and countless distribution poles in the Silverton-Claytonville area had been reported downed, with hundreds of broken crossarms.


Cooperative general manager Charles Castleberry said it would be several hours, possibly up to 36 hours in some areas, before power will be to be restored. Castleberry said the cooperative is working to re-route power to the Claytonville and Northcutt (Silverton) substations where possible. "Basically, we have a flood over there," McCaslin said in explaining that it will take some time to assess the situation and work around the water and impassable roads.







shipments in its weekly export sales report on Thursday. For the week ended June 10, export shipments totaled 386,100 bales which were 39 percent above the week earlier and a 44 percent increase from the four-week average. The primary destination was China followed by Mexico, Turkey and Indonesia.

The department's data showed net export sales of 118,600 bales that were 31 percent lower than the previous week and five percent less than the four-week average. Major buyers for the week included Indonesia, Canada, China and Turkey. Sales of 129,800 bales for delivery in 2004-05 were primarily for Mexico, Turkey, Indonesia, Thailand and Canada.

On the spot cotton scene, trading was slightly higher in the five trading days ended June 17 as Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 673 bales online compared to the previous week when 660 bales were sold.

In other news, cotton planting in the United States is nearing completion. USDA reported 95 percent of the intended acreage was planted as of June 13 compared to 92 percent at the same time one year ago and the 23 percent five-year average. Both Okla homa and Texas were ahead of schedule as Oklahoma producers were 95 percent complete with planting versus 91 percent one year ago. Texas farmers had 89 percent of their crop in the ground compared to 83 percent the previous year.

Dear Water Customer:

On July 1, Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority will be changing the disinfectant that we use from chlorine to chloramines. This change is intended to benefit our customers by reducing the levels of disinfection byproducts (DBP's) in the system, while still providing protection from waterborne disease.

However, the change to chloramines can cause problems to persons dependent on dialysis machines. A condition known as hemolytic anemia can occur if the disinfectant is not completely removed from the water used for the dialysate. Consequently, the pretreatment scheme used for the dialysis units must include some means, such as a charcoal filter, for removing the chloramines prior to this date. Medical facilities should also determine if additional precautions are required for other medical equipment.

In addition, chloraminated water may be toxic to fish. If you have a fish tank, please make sure that the chemicals or filters that you are using are designed for use in water that has been treated with chloramines. You may also need to change the type of filter that you use for the fish tank.


Being Satisfied
