## Missionary To Speak Sunday

Peter Hoepner, a lay missionary of the Methodist Church in the Congo, will be guest speaker at First Methodist Church in Baird April 25, at 11 a. m.

Currently on a year's furlough, Hoepner was director of the teacher training center at the Methodist Church's Sandoa mission station on the Lulua River 75 miles from the Angola border in the Southern Congo.

Hoepner first went to Africa as a special term missionary in 1955, under the Methodist Board of Missions, and was assigned to primary school work in Elizabethville. Following his term of three years, he returned to the United States and was commissioned a regular missionary. He went back to the Congo in 1960, the year the Congo became independent from Belgian rule.

Hoepner was born in Hugo, Colo., and was graduated in 1955, with the degree of bachelor of arts from Kansas Wesleyan University. He is proficient in French the official language of the Congo, and in Swahili, the African language of the area.

The service is open to the public.

## BLANKET FIRST, BAIRD IS SECOND IN DISTRICT GIRLS TRACK MEET

Regional girls track and field event will be unreeled in Baird May 8. District winners and runners-up from an area of about 75 counties are scheduled to compete.

This is the first season for a state organization in girls track and field.

Blanket won the District 8 championship in Division I last Friday at Baird, scoring 98 points to 77 for the host Baird Bearetttes. Burkburnett was the only entry in Division II.

Santa Anna was third in Division I with 75 points, followed by Jim Ned with 60, Wylie with 47, then May, Lueders, Gordon and Moran.

Blanket's Ann Dameron stole the show, winning two individual events, placing second in a and running on two championship relay events.

Miss Dafron won the 80-meter hurdles and the high jump, and was second in the broad jump. She ran on the Tigerette 440-yard and 880-yard relay teams.

Ilean McIntosh and Sally Green captured Baird's only two blue ribbons by winning the shot put and broad jump, respectively.

Betty Corn was also qualified for regional with a second place finish behind Miss Damron in the 80-meter hurdles.

## Parade Will Signal Rodeo on Thursday

A traditional parade at 5 p. m. next Thursday will open the annual three-night stand for the Callahan County Sheriffs Posse rodeo. Rodeo performances are scheduled for 8 p. m. next Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

At least 10 riding clubs are expected to participate in the parade, which will form near the railroad depot in Baird, marching north on Market St. to the county courthouse, then returning along the same street to the depot.

Also expected are the Shadows, a girls drill team from Abilene.

Seek Local Riders Participation in the parade by more Callahan County residents has been urged by rodeo officials. Persons wishing to participate may telephone O. D. (China) Allphin at UL 4-1230.

The three Callahan County high school bands -- Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains -- have

been invited to join the march. Riders in the parade will also participate in the colorful grand entry for the first rodeo show Thursday night. Last year, some 390 horses and riders took part in the grand entry.

To wind up promotion for the rodeo, a full day's tour is scheduled Saturday by a caravan of cars from the county. The caravan will form on Market Street in Baird, leaving at 8:30 a. m.

Leave County After a stop in Clyde for an 8:40 a. m. show, the caravan will leave Callahan County for 10 stops before returning. Shows will be given at each stop, with music provided by the Baird FFA band.

Persons making the tour have been asked to take along a picnic lunch.

The caravan is due in Abilene at 9:10 a. m. Saturday. After two stops there, the group is due in Merkel at 10:15, at An-

son at 10:55, and at Stamford at 11:35 a. m.

Picnic lunches will be spread in Stamford. After lunch, the caravan will be at Lueders at 1:30, at Albany at 2:05, Breckenridge at 2:50, at Ranger at 4:30, at Eastland at 4:30, and at Cisco at 5. Also planned are stops at Putnam at 5:35, and another show when the group gets back to Baird about 6 p. m.

Tickets On Sale Reserved steaks for this year's rodeo, which will be produced by Ralph Collier of Austin, are now on sale at the Baird Chamber of Commerce office.

Announcer will be Chuck Parkinson of North Hollywood, Calif., who works some of the nation's largest rodeos. In addition to his many credits, he has been rodeo announcer for both movie and television shows.

Junior Meeks and George Doakes will be clowns in addition to providing this year's specialty acts.

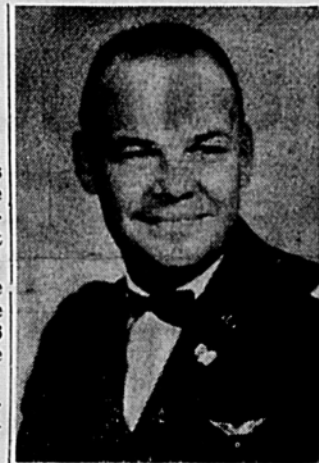
## Baird Elem. Gets Probation

Services for Chief Warrant Officer Clarence Don Loyd, 25, of Clyde were at 2 p. m. Monday in Clyde's First Methodist Church. Officiating was the Rev. Merriel Abbott, pastor, assisted by the Rev. Harold Watson, Baptist pastor.

Military graveside services were conducted in Clyde Cemetery. Bailey Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Loyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Loyd of Clyde, was killed Thursday at Fort Benning, Ga., when he fell some 40 feet while "rapelling" from a helicopter during training.

A native of Weatherford, CWO Loyd was born Sept. 23, 1940. He moved with his parents to Clyde in 1944 and was a 1959 graduate of Clyde High School.

As a boy he was active in the Boy Scouts and in the Methodist Church.

His father is city water superintendent at Clyde.

CWO Loyd joined the Army when the 5th Missile Battalion was organized in Abilene in 1960, taking basic training at Fort Carson, Colo. He also served at Fort Belvoir, Va., and Fort Bliss, Texas.

He received his wings and warrant in September, 1963 at Fort Rucker, Ala., after attending Warrant Officer Candidate School at Camp Wolters, near Mineral Wells.

He served in Korea with the 7th and 59th Infantry Divisions. Surviving in addition to his parents are three brothers, Charles of Abilene, Robert J., who is with the Navy in Alaska, and Tommy of Clyde; and a sister, Jane Ann of Clyde.

Twelve students from Baird High School will participate in regional University Interscholastic League competition this weekend in Denton. Included are two in literary events, one in golf, and nine in track and field.

Aleta White will represent Baird in the regional shorthand contest, with Joene Rowe competing in girls extemporaneous speaking.

Bobby Black will carry Baird's colors in golf singles at regional. In track and field, Baird entries are scheduled in seven events -- six for individuals and the mile relay. Members of the mile relay are J. D. Faircloth, Maxie Gordon, Steve Stanley and Kelton Jones.

Individual entries will include Stanley in the 440-yard dash, Donald Price in the mile run, Richard Windham in the shot put and discus, Bobby Voigts and Wally Harris in the high jump, and Dyer Windham in the pole vault.

The mile relay team, Stanley, Voights and both Windhams were all blue ribbon winners at the district meet two weeks ago.

Last Friday, the track team polished up for the regional meet by taking part in a invitational meet at Winters. All athletes qualified for regional.

With 2A, A and B schools participating, Baird brought home one blue ribbon and two second place finishes. Richard Windham was the only winner, taking the shot put with an effort of 55 ft., 3-4 in.

Windham was also second in the discus throw.

Baird's crack mile relay team tasted defeat for the first time this season, finishing to Class 2A Winters High School.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Three optional plans for state House of Representatives redistricting also are due from subcommittee by May 1.

Committee has adopted these tentative legislative redistricting guidelines:

"At least one attempt" will be made to eliminate "floterial" districts;

Small counties without population sufficient to justify a representative of their own will not be divided;

Two or more representatives will not be allowed to run at large in two or more counties.

Committee also approved Senate-passed bill to permit up to 15 per cent population variance in forming legislative districts.

House speaker Ben Barnes is optimistic that the Legislature can solve the thorny redistricting problem without need for a special session.

AMENDMENTS GET PRIORITY — State representatives returned from their brief Easter vacations to find two proposed constitutional amendments high on their work assignment list.

Governor Connally finally got the balky House Amendments Committee to clear for debate measure to increase terms of governor and other officials elected statewide from two to four years.

Committee also approved redistricting pain-easer calling for increase of State Senate membership from 31 to 39, but stripped from it provision to lengthen upper house terms to six years.

Pressure for submission of both measures to Texas voters (in November and August 7

elections, respectively were intense.

NEW LAWS ADOPTED — Dozens of bills have been given final passage in one house and sent to the other for further action.

Two bills by Rep. Dick Cory would authorize commissioners courts in all but the largest counties of the state to give county officers raises of up to 20 per cent.

Sen. Don Kennard's bill to create a North Central Texas Airport Authority of Tarrant County, which is opposed by Dallas, was passed in the Senate, but the House version ran into a filibuster by Dallas delegation members in the committee hearing.

Bill by Sen. W. T. Moore would authorize Texas A&M to accept James Connally Air Force Base for the state and establish a technical institute.

POLL TAX REPEAL FAILS — Proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax fell four votes short of getting the necessary two-thirds in the House of Representatives. But measure was kept alive by a parliamentary maneuver.

Rep. Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi is sponsor of the bill.

BUDGET WRITING TOUGHER THAN EVER — Appropriations bill conferees failed to make the April 15 deadline set by House Speaker Ben Barnes for completion of their work.

Despite any sharp differences between House and Senate bills, the budget-writing job in general is tougher than ever this year. That's because of creation of new state agencies and trans-

fers of duties -- particularly in hospital and water fields -- plus impact of federal programs just evolved on state finances.

LOAN BILL ADVANCED — Legislation which opponents charge would mean the highest interest rates on loans in the nation for Texans received tentative Senate approval 16-14.

Measure by Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg would allow annual interest rates on installment loans of \$9 per \$100 up to \$6,500. An amendment, finally accepted after strong objection, exempted small loan companies from terms of the bill. Another amendment exempted mortgage loans on real estate.

NON-CITIZEN AID PROPOSED — Proposed constitutional amendment to make old age assistance to non-citizens who have lived in the U. S. for at least 25 years received heavy support in a House committee hearing.

Rep. Joe J. Bernal of San Antonio, sponsor of the bill, said only three other states require citizenship for such assistance. Many thousand long-time Texas resident, who have not qualified for citizenship for such assistance due to language or other barriers, have no income at all today, Bernal told the committee.

COLLEGES GET FEDERAL FUNDS — With \$11,200,000 presently allotted for distribution in federal grants for college construction in Texas, the Texas Commission on Higher Education already has requests from 24 more colleges and eligibility established for 12 junior colleges.

Applications received amount

to an additional \$12,500,000 of construction requests under the 1964 Higher Educational Facilities Act. Grants pay for 40 per cent of the actual cost of new construction for approved college facilities.

RAIN-MAKING STUDY JUDGE — John T. Carr Jr., weatherman with the Texas Water Commission, says long-range experiments in weather modification should be undertaken in Texas, even though at present conditions do not seem favorable and existing methods are expensive.

Carr said that ideal conditions for rain-making are infrequent in Texas. However, experiments have shown there are effective methods to bring about rain where it would not have fallen naturally and to increase the yield of rain clouds.

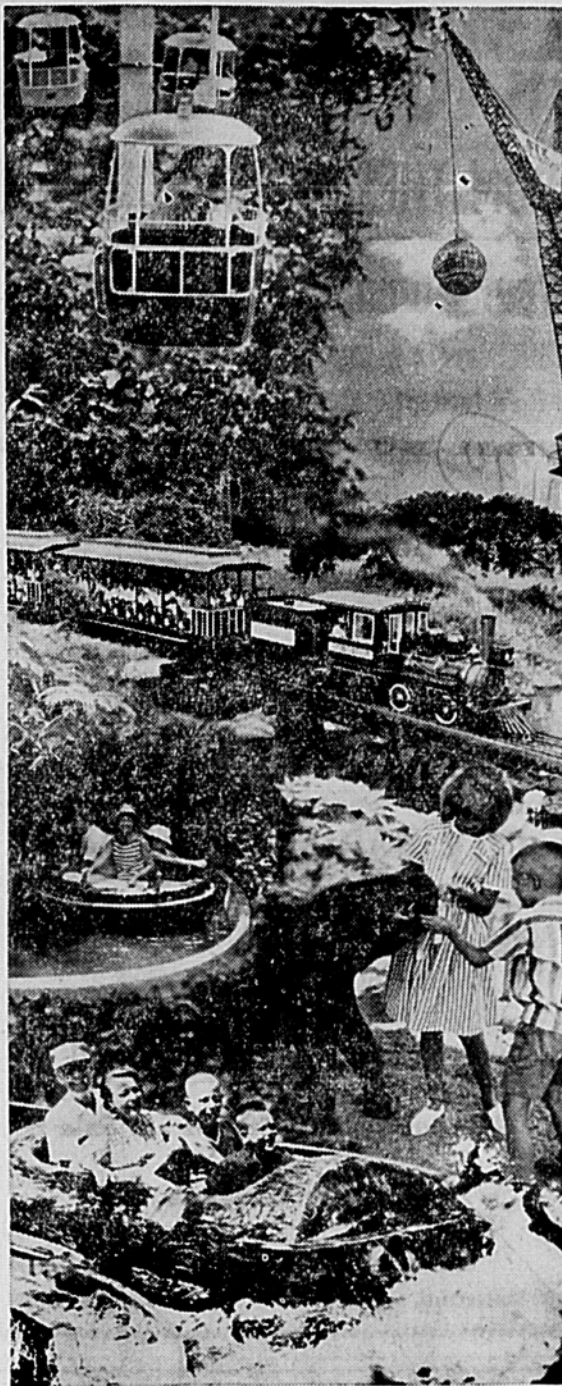

It is J. B. Schlick Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1 Jack J. Hill. Drillsite is 990 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of Section 16, Block 8, SP Survey.

Site is on an 80 acre lease. J. D. Sandifer Jr. of Breckenridge completed three Callahan County regular field wells 2 1/2 miles south of Cross Plains.

No. 18-A William Franke is 1,737 feet from the north and 1,163 feet from the east lines of Section 72, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Daily potential was 2.13 barrels of 32 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole. Pay was topped at 352 feet. Operator set 5 1/2-inch casing at 354 feet and total depth is 389 feet.

No. 19-A Franke is 1,737 feet from the north and 863 feet from the east lines of Section 72. Daily potential was 3.19 barrels of 31 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole with the pay topped at 352 feet. The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 354 feet, and total depth is 389 feet.

## Buying Healthy Plants Best Way To Prevent Later Difficulties

Homeowners can head off later troubles by purchasing only disease-free and healthy plants, advises County Agent Pat Garner.

He offers the following suggestions to those who may soon be buying transplants or nursery stock:

If at all possible, check the roots systems to see they are free of such disease as rots, gall or knots. Avoid buying any plant that does not have a healthy appearing root system. Also, make sure the stems of the plant or plants are healthy

in appearance. Dead areas or cankerous-type lesions often found on stems may later develop and kill the plant, he warns. Then too, he adds, disease can be carried to healthy plants already growing through the planting of those with disease.

When purchasing bulbs, make sure they are not discolored and do not have scab-type lesions on the surface. Healthy bulbs will have smooth surfaces free from spots and pittings, the agent says.

Watch for signs of leaf spot on evergreens and check their color for uniformity and a healthy growing condition. It may be money well spent to buy the top grades of nursery stock, says Garner.

Because some ornamentals are extremely susceptible to diseases which occur in a given area, the county agent suggests that only plants with resistance to these diseases be selected. Cotton root rot, for example, is very common over much of Texas and should be considered when plants are being selected. A list of plants which show the most tolerance for this disease is available at county Extension offices. Ask for a copy of L-390 "Cotton Root Rot," and also for other publications dealing with plant diseases.

Most plant diseases, explains Garner, can be prevented and the logical starting point for a disease control program is the planting of disease-free stock.

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## Knowing How to Use Pesticides Surest Way to Prevent Trouble

Some people swear by pesticides, others swear at them. Usually the difference in the two is what they know about pesticides and how they apply them. Whether or not pesticides harm men, animals, plants, fish and wildlife depends largely upon one person -- the user -- points out County Agent Pat Garner.

By following a few simple rules of safety when using agricultural chemicals, especially pesticides, trouble can be avoided. Garner offers these suggestions:

Follow all label directions and safety precautions. The manufacturer is required to law to properly label his material. The label clearly states what the pesticide is to be used for and how. Also precautions for the applicator's safety when applying the material are listed.

All agricultural chemicals and especially pesticides should be stored under lock and key and in their original containers. If for any reason, the original container is not used, then properly label the substitute. Don't guess what is in an unlabeled bag or bottle. It could be a costly one.

Dispose of containers in a safe manner. Burn paper containers but make sure the smoke doesn't drift on you or your house or a neighbor's property. If the containers are glass or metal, bury them.

Guard against drifting dusts or sprays. Make sure they do not drift into an area where they will be harmful.

And remember, says Garner, when you encounter trouble with pesticides, about the only person you can blame is yourself.

## Social Security Benefits Over \$81,800 Per Month in Callahan

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Callahan County now top \$81,800. R. R. Tuley Jr., district manager of Social Security in Abilene, said today in releasing his annual benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 4 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Tuley said. This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter.

"There is no longer any doubt. Social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in this county."

Monthly benefits first became payable in January 1940, and they have continued without interruption for years, accompanied by a steady growth in the

number of beneficiaries. Tuley noted that as of December 31, 1964, some 1485 countians were collecting over \$981,660 annually from social security.

More people in Callahan County, he said, could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

As of January 1965, in the nation at large, almost 20 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of \$16 billion per month.

The average monthly old-age retirement benefits in January was \$77.57 for all states, while in the State of Texas the average was \$69.43, Tuley said.

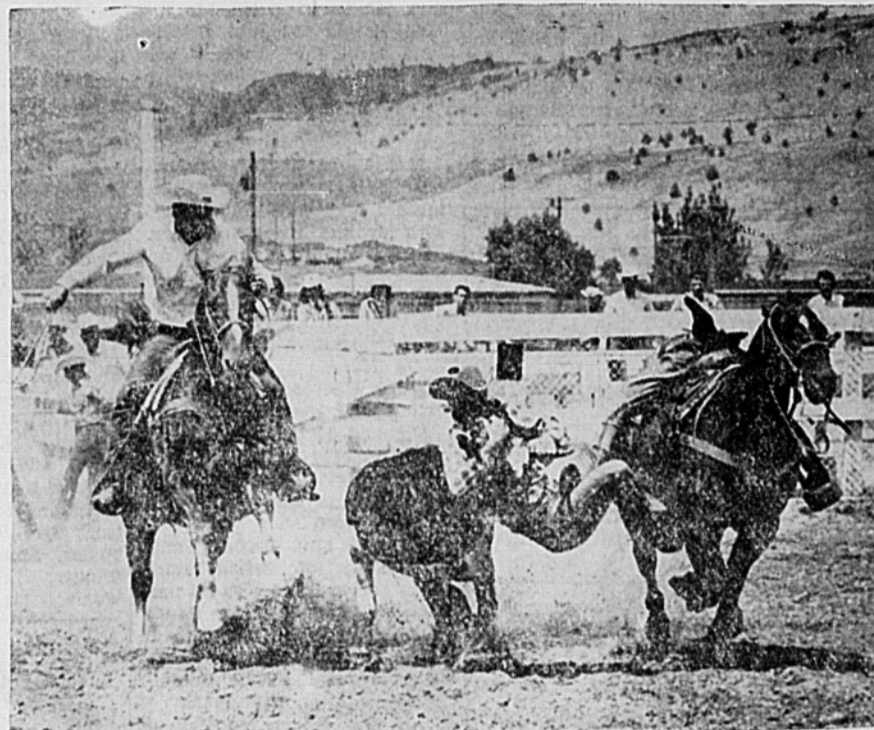

## WASHINGTON — Second of a series on the basic origin of law

### APPLYING THE LOGIC OF LAW

The 18th century lawyer and writer Bastiat, in his commentaries of about 1850, made no mention of "rights" under law -- human rights, social rights, employment rights, civil rights, and majority rights. Obviously he felt that no such "rights" exist, except those pertaining to our three God-given rights of life, liberty and property (discussed recently). If, as Bastiat indicates, these three basic rights are not conferable upon the individual by man-made laws, where else would they originate? To whom would they apply and to what degree? For example, with the consent of an employer, no man can be denied the right to work. Without the consent of an employer, no man can acquire the right to work. Hence, the term "right to work" becomes meaningless under this logic, as do all these other "rights" above referred to.

Following this line of reason it seems necessary to distinguish the difference between rights, which every individual possesses (life, liberty and property) and privileges, which desired persons may be granted, or, qualified persons may acquire through a mutually acceptable arrangement with other men.

In a republic, all economic exchanges between individuals are mutually voluntary. If this

concept is maintained, how can the owner of property be denied the right to sell to whomever he chooses, on whatever terms are agreed on between the seller and the purchaser, and for whatever reason he chooses? The economic facts of supply and demand are no respecter of persons. It works the same for everyone. Persons who are unable to conduct exchanges with proprietors of property, goods or services, thus generate a demand to initiate like businesses for themselves and conduct those enterprises for profit. Many do exactly this and the general economic welfare is improved. Others seek law to compel privilege, or they mill in mobs and demonstrate. For what? Mostly it is difficult to know just exactly what, because of the many motives seemingly involved.

Assume, however, it is entirely a demand for relief under law to assure that passage of the Declaration of Independence the theme of which is that "all men are created equal." If the sentence is kept in the context in which it was written, it has nothing to do with people as individuals. Rather, it proclaims that "governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed..." -- not from the "divine right of kings." It told the British Crown that our fathers were not born with inseparable bond and allegiance to any king -- not even the King of England -- and were, in

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fact, his equals in that regard. The "equal" here used has nothing to do with the equality of one individual with other individuals -- it has nothing to do with spiritual equality, equality with respect to senses, faculties, health, fingerprints, ear lobes or economic potential. Whether it should mean these things can be argued endlessly, taking whichever viewpoint on which one may have convictions. The point here is, can "rights" beyond those basic concepts discussed by Bastiat, be legally, by force, imposed upon individuals for the benefit of special privileges to others? Law is more than just a pudicious guide for legislators in times like these. It is a lamp of liberty.

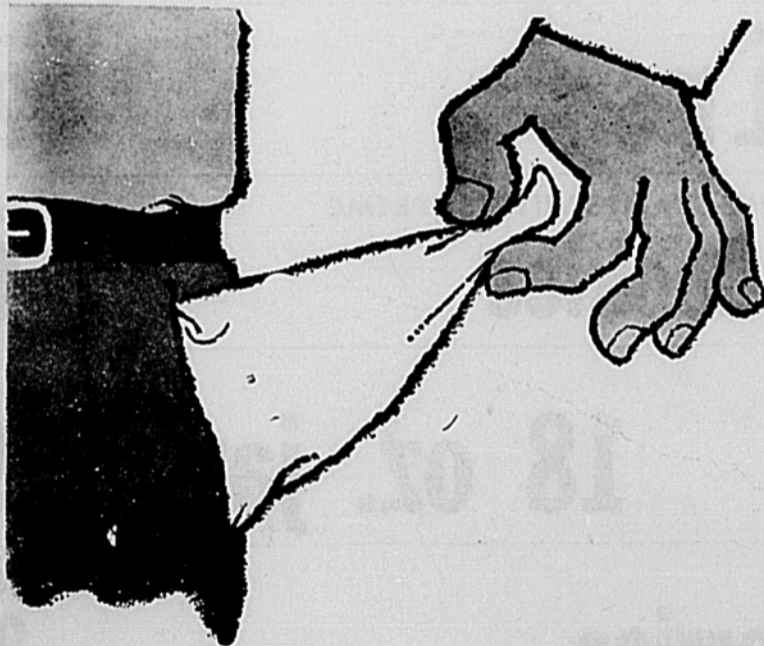
