





Guest House on the Walter Ranch endorsed by Bobby Bowden, southwest of Quitaque, Spates and Stormer demonstrated proper use of trail building tools--the clinometer, the Pulaski and the McLeod.

A clinometer (or inclinometer) measures the slope of the land. There are basic rules to follow that keep erosion to a minimum. Subtle changes in the slope of the trail, along with slight changes of direction, give the trail a desirable 'rhythm."

The Pulaski and McLeod are both firefighters' tools that are useful in proper trail building. The Pulaski is two tools in one--a mattock and a cutting tool. The McLeod is also a combination toola 10-inch hoe and rake. Both tools are used to clear the new trail bed.

Just as snow skiing trails are designed for varying skill levels, recreational trails are planned for many levels of skill.

About 700 feet of an easy trail was completed, with about the same distance marked for clearing.

A trail for the intermediate trail user was marked further up the hillside. Clearing and finishing work on that trail will be completed at a later time.


