The cooperative's annual report to members points out some of the differences between electric cooperatives and other electric suppliers that help cooperatives rank so high in customer satisfaction surveys. One of these is that the power of the cooperative truly rests in the members' hands. Another distinguishing difference co-ops have is the local ownership and control, with local management and employees familiar with the area and the membership. The report also noted a study down that validated the course set by utilities such as Swisher Electric who stuck to their core utility netting during the turbulent days of deregulation as compared to those who ven tured off into un-regulated areas. Those that stayed their course came out ahead, while those who went adrift lost money, some losing everything.


It's That Time of Year
