Also on the President's List is Mindy Proctor, a junior social work major, from Quitaque.



Drought Conditions In Place in December

According to the National Weather Service, drought conditions remained in place over most of the area through December. The average rainfall for the 37 NWS cooperative stations was less than 0.01 inch, which was one percent of normal. By years' end, Lubbock had set its second driest year on record with 8.83 inches of precipitation, only slightly above the record 8.73 inches set in 1917. Since June 26, Lubbock recorded only 1.78 inches, which was only 17 percent of normal.

At the end of December, Lake Meredith in the Panhandle remained at record low levels, running only 17 percent of capacity. Lake Mackenzie also was at a record low with only 13 percent of its capacity. White River Lake was slightly abové its all-time low at 19 percent of capacity. The only lake doing well was Lake Alan Henry which was storing a near record high at 78 percent of capacity; however, Lake Alan Henry, while the largest in the South Plains area, is the newest lake and has not yet been tapped as a water sup-

The vast majority of weather stations saw no measurable rain in December, and .23; December, .00.

the average rainfall for the 37 NWS stations was about as low as it could possibly be, less than 1/100th of an inch. The vast majority of stations saw no measurable rain.

From the beginning of this very dry period in late June, Lubbock recorded two of the 12 longest rain-free periods for the city. The first was 56 days in length beginning June 27. It was also by far the longest summertime rain-free period. The second was the 60day period just ending. During the last six months of 2003, Lubbock recorded a scant 1.78 inches of precipitation, which was only 17 percent of the normal rainfall for that time period.

Another notable event during December 2003 was the only winter storm of the season. Unfortunately instead of snow and ice making the news, public attention was drawn to extremely high west winds and blinding dust on Dec. 15. Wind gusts reached 62 mph at Lubbock International Airport.

Northerly wind gusts up to 54 mph on the ninth also made news.

Silverton's total precipitation for 2003 was 10.53 inches, which fell in January, .01; February, .06; March, .99; April, 79; May, .55; June, 6.23; July, .12; August, .50; September, .48; October, .57; November,


Being a Peacemaker


