

TxDOT ready to begin U.S. 60 Bridge Project



The Texas Department of Transportation is set to begin work on a project that will improve safety and mobility along US 60 in Parmer County.

The \$70 million project will build a new bridge at U.S. 60, as well as entrance and exit ramps, and add safety lighting, said Neil Welch, P.E., TxDOT's Littlefield area engineer.

"We know this project is located on a heavily traveled truck route and adjacent to one of Cargill's North America protein plants, which has a steady flow of traffic around the clock. It is going to affect a lot of motorists including the plant traffic.

Both eastbound & westbound U.S. 60 traffic, through the construction zone, will be reduced to 60 mph, Welch added.

"The project is scheduled to begin Monday, April 15, with project contractor Webber, LLC., of The Woodlands, TX, setting barricades and beginning work on bridge elements," said Welch.

TxDOT is committed to keep traffic flowing, but U.S. 60 motorists can expect various lane closures, traffic shifts and detours throughout the duration of the project," Welch said. "Our goal is to make sure we get the work done in the safest and most efficient way possible."

Drivers are asked to use caution through the work zone, since crews will be working in close proximity to traffic, and should keep the following tips in mind:

• Slow down and always follow posted work zone speed limits. Speeding is one of the major causes of work zone crashes. Remember, traffic fines double in work zones.

• Pay attention. Workers and heavy equipment may only be a few feet from passing vehicles.

• Be patient. Delays from highway construction can be frustrating, but it only takes a few extra minutes to slow down for a work zone.

Community Center renamed for former mayor

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, April 8, 2024 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Greg Lewellen read a proclamation declaring April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month and presented the certificate to representatives from the Deaf Smith Crisis Center. Five former members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department were recognized for their many years of service to the community. Certificates and "Keys to the City" were presented to each retired volunteer. See photos on back page. Council members approved a motion to rename the Friona Community Center. In honor of Friona's longest serving mayor, the new name will be the Clarence Monroe Community Center. Monroe served as mayor from 1983 until 2002. A motion was approved to allow members, retirees, and widows of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department to receive a monthly \$120 water

utility credit for services that protect the health, safety, or welfare of the city.

The council discussed the possibility of a water request from Weber Construction during the Cargill Overpass Project which begins next week. Weber Construction Sr. Project Manager Michael Oliver told council members that there would only be a slight chance that any additional water would be needed, but the company wanted to be prepared for any contingency. Water would be available at the city park station.

A motion was approved for a professional services agreement with the Texas Tech University School of Veterinary Medicine regarding a feral animal control program. The program will start with feral cats and could inproved as well as the financial statement for March 2024. The 2nd Quarter financial statement was also reviewed and approved. Minutes of the Minutes of the March 11, 2024 regular meeting were approved and the annual review of the city's investment policy was approved. The next scheduled meeting is Monday, May 13th.

The project's completion date is scheduled for spring 2027

























Spring Recipes

This week is another recipe I just chose randomly because it sounded good to eat. Hope you enjoy.

One-Pot Chicken Pasta with Cajun Seasonings

Ingredients

- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- ³⁄₄ teaspoon salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 3/4-inch pieces
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 4 medium scallions, thinly sliced, greens and whites separated
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 12 ounces whole-grain penne or other short pasta
- 2 cups unsalted chicken broth
- 1 (15 ounce) can unsalted fire-roasted diced tomatoes, undrained
- 2 ounces reduced-fat cream cheese, cubed, softened
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

Directions

Combine paprika, oregano, thyme, salt, pepper and cayenne in a medium bowl. Add chicken; toss to coat. Heat oil in a large, high-sided skillet over medium-high heat. Add the chicken and cook, stirring occasionally, until browned and cooked through, about 6 minutes. Transfer to a plate. Do not wipe the pan clean. Reduce heat to medium. Add scallion whites and garlic to the pan; cook, stirring constantly, until softened, about 1 minute. Stir in pasta; cook, stirring often, until lightly toasted, about 1 minute. Add broth and tomatoes; increase heat to medium-high and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium and cook, stirring often, until the pasta is al dente and the liquid is mostly absorbed, about 10 minutes. Stir in cream cheese and the chicken; cook, stirring constantly, until the cheese is melted and the chicken is heated through, about 1 minute. Sprinkle evenly with scallion greens and parsley.

Gas price jump up

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 11.4 cents last week, averaging \$3.20 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 30.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.35 while the most leum analysis at Gas-Buddy.

"With oil prices rising to nearly \$87 per barrel last week, their highest since October, we are not only facing the seasonal factors that push prices uprefinery maintenance, the switch to summer gasoline, and rising demand-but also escalating crude oil prices as OPEC's production cuts continue to cause declining global oil inventories, with escalations between Iran and Israel adding to concerns of further destabilization. The West Coast is likely to see gas prices continue to jump, and in a week or so, will be joined by the mid-Atlantic and Northeast states as they wrap up the transition to summer gasoline." De Haan added. GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Some things you read about in scripture you don't want to have any part of, and this is exactly the case in Deuteronomy 27-28 as the Lord lays out how to be cursed by him. Being cursed by God is not having an ill willed spell cast upon you, but being cursed by God speaks of going against His ways and suffering the consequences of your choices. This was especially serious to the Israelites, God's covenant people, who had been given God's salvation, the Law, and the Promised land. All they had to do was walk in God's ways to enjoy tremendous blessings. If they ignored God's law, then they were promised to be a people cursed by God as the horrific consequences of their sin would unfold in their lives, through their generations and eventually lead to the ultimate consequence of losing their land, blessings, and freedom.

Just as in the Old Testament, so many people today are cursed by God. First and foremost, this curse is upon all who remain lost in their sin. One's sin is exposed in the Law of God, and Galatians 3:13 proclaims that "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us..." At salvation, you trade the curse of your sin for blessing and salvation through Jesus. After salvation though, many Christians live back-

slidden lives where they are more at home in the world than in the church, and the consequences of their sins plague them with guilt and misery. They have cursed themselves with sinful choices, and reap what they sow. Such a cursed life of misery may have moments of happiness in sin, but is void of the Lord's peace, hope, and joy that comes from walking with the Lord.

Fortunately, there is a way to move from being cursed by God to being blessed by God. If you are lost in your sin, turn to Christ for salvation. If you know Christ, turn back to the Savior, and seek his cleansing, then walk in his blessing (1 John 1:9).





USDA Designates 12 Texas Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas

Three natural disasters have been designated which involve 12 Texas counties and their neighboring counties. Triggering forces listed include excessive heat, drought, and high winds. Disaster #2 declares Briscoe and Parmer as the primary counties affected. Contiguous counties are Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith. and Lamb in **Texas and Curry County** in New Mexico.

This Secretarial natural disaster designation allows the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disas-

ters through emergency loans.

Emergency loans can be used to meet various
