Step 2

Photo ID is required. You must be at least 17 years old to donate. Donors that are 16 may donate with a signed parental consent form.

Step 3

You will answer a few questions about your health history and places you've traveled and about any prescription and/or over the counter medications that may be in your system. Use Donor Express at www. thegiftoflife.org to save time by completing your questions online on May 12th only before arriving to donate or while you are waiting to donate.

Step 4

A specialist will check your temperature, pulse, blood pressure and hemoglobin level. You will then be ready to donate. You will asked if you would like to donate a single unit or a double.

Step 5

Donors will receive a T-shirt, a WOW pass to Wonderland Park, a squeeze cow, a coupon for a gallon of milk, and a pint of Blue Bell ice cream in celebration of National Dairy Month!

Donors will also be treated to a free hamburger courtesy of the Friona Noon Lions Club and Holy Smokes BBQ.

This award represents the attainment by an individual of superior musicianship as demonstrated in the exacting competition of the Texas State Solo-Ensemble Contest.

Sales Tax Revenue Exceeded \$4B in May

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$4.01 billion in May, 4.5 percent more than in May 2023. The majority of May sales tax revenue is based on sales made in April and remitted to the agency in May.

"Monthly state sales tax collections soundly exceeded collections from last May, contrary to signs of slowing spending in recent months," Hegar said. "Growth in receipts occurred for almost all major sectors.

"Receipts from the major sectors driven by business spending, with the exception of the mining sector, were up compared with a year ago.

Receipts from consumer spendingdriven retail trade were up, led by online merchants, while receipts from live entertainment services also grew. Receipts from restaurants grew at slightly below the rate of inflation for food away from home."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in May 2024 was up 2.2 percent compared with the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$633 million, up 6 percent from May 2023; (2)motor fuel taxes — \$325 million, down 4 percent from May 2023; (3)oil production tax — \$556 million, up 12 percent from May 2023; (4) natural gas production tax — \$180 million, down 9 percent from May 2023; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$71 million, down 1 percent from May 2023; and, (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$152 million, down 3 percent from May 2023.

Fiscal 2024 franchise tax collections totaled \$6.38 billion year-todate through May. Compared with collections through May 2023, yearto-date franchise tax collections were up 2.6 percent, higher than what was projected in the Comptroller's 2024-25 Certification Revenue Estimate.







Newest Panhandle weather tracking system-StrikeNet Pantex develops weather app

When it comes to weather in the Texas Panhandle, what's happening at one location may be completely different than conditions only a few miles away. For the more than 4,500+ Pantex employees, weather onsite can be vastly different than what is occurring at their homes.

As the nation's primary assembly, disassembly, and life-extension center for nuclear weapons, weather events at Pantex can impact both workers and production, so having access to real-time meteorological data across the entire region is paramount to everyone's safety.

To address regional

weather events, Pantex Meteorologist Steve Kersh is working with school districts and private landowners to refurbish and upgrade area-wide weather stations formerly maintained by a local TV station. These sites include new weather and lightning-detection software providing real-time data on wind speed, temperature,

rainfall, and lightning from each location, which is now available to the public on the StrikeNet website at https://strikenet-tx .com.

Pantex also initiated development of the StrikeNet weather app, which is free and available to the public on Google Play and the App Store.

On both the StrikeNet website and app, all available weather data are listed in its dropdown menu. For example, when lightning maps are enabled, the strikes are represented by the lightning symbol, with the most current strikes in the red circle and the estimated distance from Pantex indicated on the symbol

"Severe weather can have a direct impact on Pantex operations, both from a safety standpoint for our employees and for our mission. Enhancing capabilities that track weather events to specific locations using our newly developed sensors is a huge step forward for

the site and our surrounding area," said Pantex Site Manager Colby Yeary.

Initially, ten sites signed up to StrikeNet network including schools, homes, ranches, and businesses, with an additional 11 sites quickly added. School officials indicate that the lightning detection data would be used to help with determining whether to seek shelter if and when thunderstorms proach during regular school hours and extracurricular events, while ranchers and farmers can access real-time weather conditions aiding in crop and livestock production.

Pantex views StrikeNet as an opportunity to offer accurate and localized weather information to Texas Panhandle residents, internet users, and weather station owners at no cost.

Consolidated Nuclear Security, LLC operates the Pantex Plant, located in Amarillo, Texas, and the Y-12 National Security Complex, located in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, for the U.S. National Nuclear Security Administration. Bechtel National, Inc. is the lead member of CNS; minority members include Leidos, Inc.; ATK Launch Systems, LLC; and SOC LLC. Pantex and Y-12 are key facilities in the U.S. Nuclear Security Enterprise, and CNS performs its work with a focus on performance excellence and the imperatives of safety, security, zero defects, and delivery as promised.

Recipe of the week: Peachy Banana Apple Smoothie



Prep Time 45 min

8 servings

Ingredients

8 ounces bananas, fresh, Edible Portion (EP)
2 cups applesauce
1 quart yogurt, Greek, vanilla, fat-free
9 ounces peaches, frozen
1 cup ice cubes

Instructions

Critical Control Point (CCP): No bare-hand contact with ready-to-eat food.

Freeze the bananas at least one day prior to service. Peel the bananas and lay them on a sheet pan prepared with parchment paper. Ensure they are not overlapping or piled together. Cover and place in the freezer overnight. Once frozen, the bananas can be stored together.

Place the applesauce in the refrigerator the day before making smoothies.

In a mixing bowl, combine the applesauce, Greek yogurt, frozen peaches, frozen bananas and ice cubes. Blend the mixture using an immersion blender until pureed and smooth. Taste to ensure the smoothie is smooth. If not, continue blending.

Pour 8 ounces of smoothie into 9-ounce cups evenly and top with a lid.

CCP: Hold and serve at 41°F or below. CCP: No bare-hand contact with ready-to-eat food. 10.36 g

Tips

Two cups applesauce = 2 cups fruit puree. Eight pounds EP bananas = 12.5 ounces AP bananas or ~2 bananas or 1 cup puree.

Nine ounces frozen peaches = 1 cup fruit puree.


Fruit (puree) in smoothies credits as fruit juice. Fruit puree was weighed and measured without the addition of water or other ingredients.

SBOE to approve more rigorous course material

Public comment is now open for new course materials proposed by the Texas Education Agency and under consideration by its governing body, the State Board of Education.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the state has developed academic content that will be offered free online for kindergarten through fifth grade reading and language arts, and for through kindergarten eighth grade math. SBOE must approve the materials for use in all public schools that wish to use them.

Education Commissioner Mike Morath said the intent is to provide free, state-developed and vetted course materials. He said teachers have said in TEA surveys that they spend many hours outside of school looking online for such material.

"In many cases, the materials that have been cobbled together by curriculum teams or grade level teams, while seemingly appropriate, have not given students exposure to the background knowledge they need," Morath said. "You want kids to be able to read independently, but you want them to be really stretched."

If approved by the board, districts will receive an additional \$40 per student to use board-approved books and \$20 to print stateowned content. Anyone interested in viewing the proposed materials and provide feedback by going to the board's website — sboe.texas. gov — and finding the "Instructional Materials Review and Approval" page.

The board could approve use of the materials in November.

State revamps Narcan distribution following delays

Texas is revamping its distribution program for an overdose-reversing medication after years of supply and distribution challenges, The Texas Tribune reported.

The state has tapped into more than \$45 million in federal funds since 2019 in order to get Narcan into the hands of law enforcement and members of the public seeking to reduce overdose deaths. The program has been beset by delays, supply challenges and communication lapses, however.

UT Health Science Center San Antonio will continue to administer the program, now called Naloxone Texas, and says it has improved distribution and communication in recent months.

"I am aware that individuals have expressed concern about the rapidity with which they receive naloxone," said Jennifer Sharpe Potter of UT Health San Antonio. "This is life-saving work,

and we want to make sure that people get naloxone as quickly as possible."

UT Health San Antonio's contract with the federal Health and Human Services Commission requires it to distribute at least 120,000 doses a year in Texas, The Tribune reported. This year marks the first time the state is using its own funds in part for distributing naloxone instead of relying solely on federal money.







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Xcel Energy ready to meet summer power needs

Xcel Energy is ready to meet the region's power needs this summer as Texas customers see a decrease of almost 10% from summer 2023 bills. High electricity demand in the summer typically means higher bills, but electricity is less expensive this summer because of low prices for natural gas that fuels about 30% of the region's power generating capacity. Additionally, several temporary billing surcharges on Texas bills have ex-

pired since summer 2023. A typical Texas residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month is paying almost 10% less than last summer.

"We continuously monitor weather forecasts, electricity supply projections and other factors to ensure reliability and minimize the risk of disruption for our customers during periods of peak demand," said Adrian J. Rodriguez, president, Xcel Energy - Texas.

The company's Texas system is part of the Southwest Power Pool (SPP), which oversees the reliability of a transmission network covering all or portions of 14 states and operates a wholesale power market. The SPP marketplace facilitates the sale and purchase of electricity to ensure cost-effective power reliability, in addition to serving as the "balancing authority" responsible for balancing supply and demand - ensuring

enough generation is available to reliably supply electricity now and in the future. As required by the SPP, Xcel Energy will have enough power to meet expected energy demand in the summer of 2024 plus a reserve margin of more than 15%.

"We have invested in the reliability of our system by adding new lines and substations to free up capacity to serve a growing demand for electricity, but hot weather can present unique challenges that

remind us to never take anything for granted," said Brad Baldridge, Xcel Energy director of Customer and Community Relations in Amarillo. "As part of our shared responsibility through the Southwest Power Pool, if emergency conditions arise, our customers could be asked to conserve energy or, in an extreme situation, experience controlled power outages to help reduce energy use on the larger regional grid."

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
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
