Mayor's Minutes

Summer has come on strong in Friona, and the City Pool is in full operation from 1pm to 5pm every day. The City had a good response to lifeguard and other positions at the pool this year, with 11 applicants filling the lifeguard, cashier, and manager/assistant manager positions. The pool crew came to the City Council meeting at the beginning of this month and manager Reese Stowers introduced several of the lifeguards to us. Visit the City's social media accounts or refer to the paper for various activities and to book a party during the summer. The pool will close come the first part of August as people leave for college and return to school. Next year, we should have the Splash Pad constructed to add to the pool that is being built through a grant from Texas Parks & Wildlife.

This month I wanted to highlight City Council Member Bruce Fleming. Bruce has been on the council for 11 years this past May and is currently in the last year of his last term as a council member. He has brought a keen financial eye to the city and leant his expertise in agriculture and water issues to the council over the years. Below is Mr. Fleming's article

describing his background and vision for Friona.

My name is Bruce Fleming, and I was born and raised in Friona. My wife is Shana (Gibson) Fleming of Friona, and our adult children are Cotton, Aspen and Mason. I graduated from Friona High School, then received dual bachelor's degrees in business finance and business management, followed by a master's degree in accounting. I'm a licensed Certified Public Accountant (CPA).

I was originally approached and

asked to run for a City Council position in 2013 by citizens who wanted me to focus on the issue of water in Friona. In my tenure, the City has purchased additional water rights and has concentrated those water rights in areas with the deepest saturated thickness of water. The City has previously constructed, and is continuing to finish work on, the city water loop, which will help balance water availability and pressure throughout Friona and allow us to pump water to areas of the City that would otherwise be without in the face of mechanical issues. During the Pandemic the City used Federal funds to prepare a long-range water model that can be used to guide the City for the next 40 years into the future. This model allows for many "what-if" scenarios such as population growth, water use, and other factors that revolve around our water resources, allowing the City to plan ahead. Friona is also currently implementing a water resource conservation program that will pay residents for household water efficiency improvements. I'm excited for this program, as these household improvements will help conserve

water for future generations.

National Ginger Snap Day is July 1st

This is a day for celebrating a sweet and savory cookie treat containing molasses, cloves, ginger, cinnamon, and brown sugar. Written records indicate the ginger snap was invented by German monks around 1296, using the word "snappen" as the description of the delicious treat. Interestingly, there doesn't seem to be very much "gingersnap" history available again until the early 1800s, where records indicate Dutch colonists were making them regularly.

Ginger Snaps are a healthy version to a cookie because of the ingredients they contain. Ginger, cinnamon, and clove all are considered anti-inflammatory spices. In addition, these ingredients are also known to fight heart disease. Separately, ginger snap spices each provide more specific benefits: Cinnamon - lowers glucose levels in the body to help fight diabetes; Ginger - aids in treating digestion; and Cloves - helps treat oral diseases and headaches.



Ingredients

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup vegetable oil 1/4 cup molasses
- 1 large egg
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional) 1/2 cup white sugar

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- 2. Mix brown sugar, oil, molasses, and egg together in large bowl
- 3. Combine flour, baking soda, ginger, cinnamon, cloves, and salt
- 4. Stir combined ingredients into molasses mixture
- 5. Roll dough into 1 1/4 inch balls
- 6. Roll in white sugar
- 7. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet
- 8. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes
- 9. Cool on wire rack

STAAR scores in math, science decline

Texas student scores in math and science showed marked drops in science comprehension, according to the Texas Education Agency. The 2024 results show declining math and science scores across all tested grade levels.

Only 34% of elementary and middle-school students met or mastered grade-level science, a drop of 5.7 percentage points from last year. Math scores also dropped slightly.

"Pandemic-induced disruptions to learning exacerbated students' difficulties in mastering fundamental math concepts, TEA Commissioner Mike Morath said. "As a result, we must keep our foot on the gas to intensify efforts in pro-

viding targeted interventions and research-based education strategies to ensure that students obtain necessary foundational skills and concepts and achieve the desired academic outcomes not only in math but across all subject areas."

Seven state hospital projects announced

Bolstered by \$1.5 billion in funding passed last year by the Legislature, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission has announced seven new state hospital projects to serve people in need of inpatient psychiatric services.

"Texas continues working to increase access to critical behavioral health

treatments for Texans in every corner of our state," Gov. Greg Abbott said.

The projects are in various stages of planning and design. They include:

Panhandle State Hospital (Amarillo): Constructing a new state hospital to serve 75 patients in a non-maximum-security unit. Budget: \$159 million.

Lubbock Psychiatric Center: Constructing a new state hospital with a 50-bed maximum-security unit. Budget: \$121 million.

Terrell State Hospital: Constructing a 250-bed replacement hospital. Budget: \$573 million.

North Texas State Hospital – Wichita Falls: Constructing a 200-bed replacement hospital. Budget: \$452 million.

Rio Grande State Center (Harlingen): Expanding current facility to add a 50-bed maximum-security unit. Budget: \$120 million.

San Antonio State Hospital: Renovating an existing building to add a 40-bed maximum-security unit. Budget: \$15 million.

El Paso Psychiatric Center: Planning and land acquisition to expand the current facility by 50 non-maximum-security beds. Budget: \$50 million.

Military bases provide \$151.2 billion economic impact

U.S. military installations in Texas contributed at least \$151.2 billion to the state's economy last year and supported more than 677,000 jobs across the state, according to a study by the state comptroller's office.

The state is home to 15 major U.S. military installations, as well as the Army Futures Command headquarters.

Besides the economic impact, the military bases contribute to the state's culture, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said.

"The installations are also vibrant and dynamic partners in the community, supporting not just business and industry but also schools, charities, youth sports and cultural events," he said.

Gas prices hold steady

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 7.8 cents last week, averaging \$3.03 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.44 while the most expensive was \$3.89 per

gallon.

The national average price of gasoline rose 0.3 cents last week, averaging \$3.41 per gallon. The national average price of diesel rose 2.4 cents and stands at \$3.76 per gallon.

"With summer now officially here, we've seen the national average price of gasoline holding most steady compared to last week, with some states seeing their traditional price cycling every couple of weeks, while others have seen prices slowly slip," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

"For now, gasoline prices may see little movement ahead of July 4 as oil prices have risen above \$80. But the good news is that instead of the national average jumping to follow the rising price of oil, it's holding steady. The bummer is that the decrease we hoped for will have to wait, thanks to oil's climb," De Haan added.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Those left to cherish



The family would like to extend a special thanks to BSA Hospice of the Southwest: D'Dee, Lindsey, Brenda, and volunteer sitter Charlie.




