Raindrops Keep Falling on our Heads

You don't expect a downpour in November. Gully washers are for springtime, not Halloween. Six inches of rain is a decent amount for six months, but six hours? If you were wishing for a "wet winter" it's certainly off to a good start.

The official rainfall so far for November is 6.04 inches. Average rainfall for November during the past ten years is .43 inches. Rainfall is always beneficial and appreci-

ated in West Texas. It is not always helpful in the short term, but it always helpful in the long term.

Since 2010, the most rainfall Friona has ever received in November was 1.05 inches in 2016. The top four monthly amounts are: 11.70 inches in August 2017, 7.43 inches in May 2015, 7.23 inches in May 2023, and 7.15 inches in October 2015.

The heavy rain did postpone the cotton har-

vest and will most likely put a dent in the quality of the crop. If cotton farmers didn't have bad luck they wouldn't have any luck at all. Cotton farming is like watching the Dallas Cowboys.

Maybe next year will be better.







GOP win raises stakes for Cornyn's leadership bid

With Republicans regaining majority control of the Senate, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, is making his bid to become that chamber's majority leader. U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, had previously announced he would step down as party leader. Republicans will hold at least a 53-45 edge in January, with Senate races in two states still undecided as of Friday morning.

According to The Dallas Morning News, Cornyn said voters rejected Democrats' "years of disastrous border policies, reckless spending, and failed management that has caused the Senate to lurch from one avoidable crisis to the next."

Cornyn faces competition from Senate Minority Whip John Thune of South Dakota and Sen. Rick Scott of Florida. Senate Republicans plan to hold their leadership elections this week by secret ballot. If elected leader, Cornyn vowed to improve transparency with GOP senators.

"There will be no more backroom deals or forced votes on bills without adequate time for review, debate, and amendment," he said.

Republicans largely flip Rio Grande Valley from blue to red

More counties in the Rio Grande Valley and surrounding areas went Republican this election, continuing what GOP leaders are calling the culmination of a years-long strategy. The party has managed to flip 16 counties since the 2016 presidential election, according to the Texas Standard.

The economy clearly was a major issue among voters in this election between former president Donald Trump and Vice President Kamala Harris.

"A lot of the rural parts of Texas are shifting red because the economy is less good," said Brandon Rottinghaus, a University of Houston political scientist. "And the threats to the oil and gas industry that people perceive are coming from Democrats are driving the communities to vote Republican."

For example, in Starr County, Biden beat Trump by five points in 2020, but four years later voters there chose the former president over Harris by 16 points.

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Election Day runs smoothly across state

Voting in Texas went fairly smoothly in Texas with no major disruptions reported, according to The Texas Tribune. Roughly half of the state's 18.6 million registered voters cast ballots in person either in person or by mail, and another two million went to the polls on Election Day. That is slightly under the 11.3 million who voted in 2020, thus far, with counting of provisional ballots nearly complete.

There was only one violent incident reported at the polls, when a man punched an election worker in Bexar County after being asked to remove his Trump hat. Wearing clothing backing a candidate or proposition inside a Texas polling location is illegal. After the assault, the man was charged with a felony.

In another case, a Tarrant County man claimed a voting machine flipped his ballot from Trump to Harris, but election officials say he made a mistake while filling out his ballot. That ballot was discarded, and he was allowed to cast another ballot, prompting Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick to note that machines were not flipping votes.

"In Tarrant County, we have only had one person say their vote was flipped out of 591,885 votes cast to date," he said.

State population estimates released by demographic center

The Texas Demographic Center has released its population estimates for July 1, 2023, and Jan. 1, 2024. Final population estimates are available for counties and places by age, sex, and race/ ethnicity at demographic.texas. gov. Information for the estimates is collected through five surveys taken from October to February, gleaning information from counties, cities, and educational institutions.

The state's estimated population rose from 29,145,505 in 2020 to 30,749,924 on Jan. 1, 2024 - an increase of 5.5%. Counties showing the largest percentage increase in that time period were Kaufman (26.7%); Rockwall (25%); Kendall (22.2%); and Liberty (20.3%).

The U.S. Census Bureau also makes annual population estimates, and TDC says differences in input data and methodologies lead to slight variations between the two.

DFW area predicted to be hottest real estate market in 2025

A real estate trends study reported by the Texas Standard predicts the Dallas-Fort Worth area will be the hottest real estate market in the nation for investment and development next year. The study compiled data from more than 2,000 industry experts.

"Obviously, it's the really strong post-pandemic recovery. It's also size," Nick Wooten, real estate reporter for The Dallas Morning News, said. "We've seen the metro top 8 million people in the latest census estimates," he said. "And there's just continued demographic growth. Those are the three big factors that these experts cited."

Both sales and home prices are fairly flat in 2024, with supply reaching levels not seen in a dozen years, Wooten said.


"You're not seeing sales change a lot," he said. "I think a lot of people are still sitting on the sidelines trying to figure out what's going to happen in 2025."

Record number of Texas horned lizards released to the wild.

The state reptile, the Texas horned lizard, has been listed as a threatened species since 1977. The Houston Chronicle reports that thanks to captive breeding efforts to populate the wild with the iconic critter, more than 600 hatchlings were recently released to the Mason Mountain Wildlife Management Area in Central Texas in cooperation with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The lizards are popularly referred to as horny toads. Their population decline is blamed on the pet trade, wild habitat loss, and the spread of invasive fire ants. The Texas horned lizard was designated as the state reptile in 1993. Their range takes them across the state's borders to northern Mexico and throughout much of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico. The hatchlings, about three-fourths of an inch in length, can reach as much as 7 inches in length at maturity.

City will receive 68.8K Sales **Tax Allocation for November**

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.2 billion in local sales tax allocations for November, 1.1 percent more than in November 2023. These allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly and on sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.

The City of Friona will receive \$68,814.82 in sales tax allocation for November. This amount represents a 13.98% percent increase over the November 2023 total of \$60,372.13. For year-to-date 2024, the total is \$604.916.87 which is a 1.85 percent decrease as compared to YTD for 2023 of \$616,369.95. The FEDC will receive \$17,203.71 of the November allocation for its operating budget.



Commissioners Approve Storage Unit Purchase

Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, October 28, 2024 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

A motion was approved to utilize \$5,390 of ARPA funds to purchase a 10' x 16' storage unit from American Porta-Store of Clovis, New Mexico. The unit will be located on the

east side of the old jail and will be used to maintenance house equipment and janitorial supplies.

A motion to use approximately \$8,000 of ARPA funds to purchase equipment for the First Floor Courtroom was approved. The audio/ video/IT equipment would allow "Zoom" court hearings to take place in the courtroom.

Sheriff Geske reported that he was currently housing 20 inmates which includes 9 from Lamb County. Discussion of a contract with Firetrol for the maintenance and inspection of alarms, sprinkler systems, extinguishers, etc. for the courthouse and jail facilities was tabled until the next meeting.

In other business, the Minutes from the October 28th regular meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of accounts payables. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was approved.

The next Commissioner's meeting scheduled for Monday, November 25th. All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.


Geske is among ap-

Touchdown Chili

Ingredients

2 pounds ground beef 1 large onion, chopped 6 cloves garlic, chopped

- ⅓ cup chili powder 1 ½ teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 ½ teaspoons dried basil
- 1 (28 ounce) can diced
- tomatoes with juice
- 1 (4 ounce) can diced green chile peppers, drained
- 1 (15 ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 (12 fluid ounce) can or bottle beer
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon hot pepper sauce (e.g. Tabasco™)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper

Directions

Place the ground beef, onion and garlic in a large saucepan over medium heat. Cook, stirring to crumble the beef, until the beef is no longer pink and the onion

is tender. Drain off the fat and return the pan to the stove. Combine the chili powder, cumin and basil; sprinkle over the beef. Cook and stir to coat the meat and toast

the spices a little. Pour in the tomatoes, green chilies, tomato sauce, beer and vinegar. Bring to a boil and stir to loosen any bits that are stuck to the bottom of the pan. Mix in the brown sugar, hot pepper sauce, salt and pepper. Reduce the heat to low, cover and simmer for 3 hours. Remove the lid for the last 30 minutes of cooking.

Mayor Proclaims November 11th as Bullying Prevention Day

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, November 11, 2024 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance. All council members were present.

Mayor Greg Lewellen read a proclamation designating November 11th as Bullying Prevention Day. Mayor Lewellen presented the proclamation to Elementary School Principal Ross Maldonado who informed the council of plans underway involving students at his campus to raise awareness concerning bullying.

A motion was passed to approve an audit report for the year ending September 30, 2022 as presented by a representative of the firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert & Moss LLP. The report included a clean opinion with no modifications listed.

Code Enforcement Officer Danny Campbell and Municipal Court Judge Maria Samarron gave the council an update on directional work by the Building Standards

Commission which has identified properties that are currently not compliant with city codes and/or ordinances.

A motion was passed to approve a Memorandum of Understanding with Axon Education LLC to provide cost effective, efficient, and convenient EMT, AEMT, and Paramedic training for interested individuals. Under the agreement, City of Friona employees will receive a 20% discount on the cost of their training.

A motion was passed to approve the appointment of Tonia Abarca, Anita Lafuente, Rebecca Baucom, Emma Hernandez, Mari Martinez, Dayana Prieto, and Martha Rodriguez to serve on the Board of Directors of the Friona Public Library. The appointment is for a two-year term.

After reviewing a resolution authorizing an advanced funding agreement for local government maintenance of railroad pavement markings and

signs, a motion to deny the authorization was passed unanimously. It was opined that the railroad and/or state was responsible for the maintenance of the railroad intersection.

In other business, the accounts payable for October 2024 were approved as well as the financial statement for October 2024. Also, Minutes of the October 15th regular meeting were approved. The next Council Meeting is scheduled for Monday, December 9th.

Sub \$3 gas here to stay

Average gasoline prices in Texas have rose 3.0 cents last week, averaging \$2.59 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$1.79 while the most expensive was \$3.73 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 2.6 cents last week, averaging \$3.03 per gallon. The national average price of diesel has declined 0.4 cents last week and stands at \$3.52 per gallon.

"While the election has come and gone, gas prices have stayed the course, with the national average price of gasoline declining for a fourth consecutive week as seasonal demand weakens and Americans begin to take refuge from falling temperatures," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at Gas-

With the median U.S. gas price now at \$2.95 per gallon, the lowest since 2021, it appears to be just a matter of time before the national average falls below \$3 per gallon for the first time since May 2021, something we've already seen for diesel prices, which many Americans will be thankful for as we get closer to Thanksgiving," De Haan added.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Vicente Quintana scored all three touchdowns on runs of 3 yards, 63 yards, and 3 yards, respectively. Gabriel Garcia and Zane Gonzales each ran for a two-point conversion. Quintana rushed for 185 yards. For the season, he had 2308 yards total rushing and scored 35 touchdowns.

The 8th grade Braves also claimed a District Championship last Thursday by beating Dimmitt 8-0 in a low-scoring contest. Kolton Thompson sealed the victory with a pass interception with just 1:28 left in the game. Eli Rosales did all the scoring as he ran for an 8 yard touchdown and then Rosales ran for the two-point conversion. For the game, Rosales was the leading rusher with 106 total yards. He finished with 915 yards for the season. The Braves finished the season with a 3-5 overall record and were 3-1 in district play.

Picking the perfect Thanksgiving turkey

Things to know when selecting your centerpiece bird

The turkey is the star of the show for most Thanksgiving tables and cooking your bird to perfection can seem hard. However, choosing the right bird at the store should be easy.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service poultry expert Brett Meisinger, lecturer and collegiate poultry judging team coach in the Texas A&M College of Agriculture and Life Sciences Department of Poultry Science "talked turkey" with us and answered some questions consumers may have while searching for the perfect Thanksgiving turkey.

What size turkey do I need to buy?

Choose the weight of your Thanksgiving turkey based on the number of guests you plan to invite. The safest method for choosing the size of the bird is to purchase 1.5 pounds of whole bird per guest. On average, each person consumes

8 ounces of turkey. If you don't need a whole bird for your Thanksgiving crowd, you can choose a smaller product option such as a

option when putting food on the table. There is no right or wrong label to source as the cost and visual appearance of packaging can also impact consumer preferences.

Free-range is a common label seen on poultry products. Free range means farmers give turkeys access to the outdoors as they grow. Organically produced birds have freerange access, yet not all free-range birds

are grown organically Free-range and organic labels can include a variety of rearing practices for turkeys. Organic production sets standards for feed ingredients, antibiotic use, housing designs and labeling. The U.S. Department of Agriculture outlines the rules in its Guidelines for Organic Poultry Certification.

How early do I need to buy my turkey and when do I need to defrost it?

Buy early for the best selection. A frozen bird can keep for over a year so there really is no such thing as "too early" to buy. Consumers can freeze fresh turkeys for storage also if they wish.

Plan for defrosting time when making your purchase. The recommended method for defrosting for food safety is from the freezer to the fridge. Allow 24 hours for each 4-5 pounds of bird weight in a refrigerator 40 degrees or lower. Once refrigerator-thawed, a turkey can be left in the refrigerator for one to two days before cook-

Is there a nutritional difference between fresh and frozen?

There is no nutritional difference between fresh and frozen turkeys at the grocery store. Most whole turkeys at the grocery


store are frozen. This is the easiest way to ship and store them for sale.

Farm-to-table style means smaller producers can provide fresh options. However, they cost more and these products are not available until just before the holiday season. However, consumers can freeze them for storage if they wish.

Is my turkey Texasgrown?

Odds are good that the turkey you find in supermarkets Texas has come from out of state. Minnesota North Carolina and Arkansas are the top states for turkey production.

Texas does not have large-scale commercial turkey farms. The 4-H and FFA youth of Texas produce the most turkeys in the state for major stock shows and judging contests. But you can reach out to local markets, butchers or specialty shops to determine if they have locally grown turkeys.



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
