IT'S YOUR CHRISTMAS PARADE

The first annual Knox City Christmas Parade will be held this coming Saturday, December 17, beginning at 1:00 p.m. In organizing and sponsoring the Christmas parade, the Knox City Ambulance Service is expressing thanks to the community for the help and support the organization has received during the past year.

Promising to be an exciting event, the parade currently has approximately twenty five different entries. The parade will leave the High School at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, and the first units will arrive in the downtown area shortly after that. The parade will form in front of the High School and travel west on North Fourth to Central, then turn south on Central and continue through the downtown area. At Main Street the units will turn east at the traffic light and continue east on Central to Canal Street (Avenue B). At Canal Street the parade units will turn back to the north and the parade will disband in the 100 block of Canal Street.

The reviewing stand for the parade will be located in front of White Auto Store in the downtown shopping district and Tommy Kent will utilize his sound system to announce the parade.

Among those participating in the parade will be the Grand Marshals for the occasion, the players and coaches of the award winning 1983 Knox City High School Greyhound football team. The Knox City Greyhound cheerleaders will ride in a convertible and throw candy to the spectators while the Knox City High School Greyhound Band and the Scarlet Belle Drill Team perform as parade participants.

Others in the parade will be the Miss Merry Christmas winners of the 1982 contest and the newly crowned 1983 Miss Merry Christmas Contest winners. Dewey Darr of Knox City will be furnishing the convertibles for the young ladies and the cheerleaders to ride in.

Lewis Paint and Body Shop will have entries in the parade to stress a theme of safe holiday driving. The parade will also consist of Mayor Buddy Angle's vintage "musical" Cadillac, a classic car by Tom Whitford, Harley Davidson "dresser" motorcycles belonging to Dave Thompson and Mark Decker, three wheeled cycles belonging to Robbie Whitford and Ken Lawson along with emergency vehicles from the Police, Fire and Ambulance agencies that serve Knox City.

Other entries in the parade will be clowns and balloons, "Big Bird" and friend from the Sweet Shop in Haskell, a bicycle group from O'Brien, the Senior Citizens from Knox City and both the local Girl Scout and Brownie Troops. The Knox City Boy Scouts will serve as Legion Of Honor for the Parade with the scouts carrying the flags.

A special guest has been invited to participate in the event. A recent confirmation of that invitation from his headquarters at the North

A large crowd gathered at Big Spring stadium to watch the Knox City Greyhounds and the Wink Wildcats decide who would advance to the state finals. It was a beautiful night for football, cool, crisp, no wind, and two very exciting teams.

The Greyhounds put forth a super team effort. Great hard running by Hutchinson, Lockhart and Oudems behind a line that was doing good blocking, and a tremendous defensive game keeping the Hounds in good field position all night. Defensively Whitley, Evatt, Eaton, Rocha, Thompson, Flores, Whitaker, Hutchinson, Oudems, Lockhart, Watkins and Gutierrez played GREAT. Wow, that's all of

them. Good going, Hounds. This defensive unit shot down one of the most potent offensive units in the state, allowing only seven points. Now for the thing we all have been seeking. THE STATE CROWN.

Lest I forget, hats off to the men responsible week after week for the preparation of this fine Greyhound team, coaches Tommy Sloan, Jimmy Rogers, C.H. Underwood and Ronnie Cox.

Knox City kicked off to Wink to open the game. The Wildcats took possession at their own 34 yard line, Jerry Gutierrez stopped the runner after a one yard gain. Wink completed a pass for 12 yards and a first down. On the first down play Chad Whitley shot into the backfield and strip-

ped the ball from the runner and Wayne Hutchinson recovered on the Wildcats 38 yard line. Oudems picked up 14 yards up the middle and a first down. Lockhart carried for 17 yards down to the seven yard line and a first down. Oudems picked up two yards before fumbling and Wink recovered at the two yard line. The Wink heralded quarterback Price made eight yards before Thompson made the stop. Whitaker and Oudems stopped Adams the fullback for a two yard loss. However, Wink picked up four yards on third down and this made a first down. Price hit Thomas for a 17 yard gain.

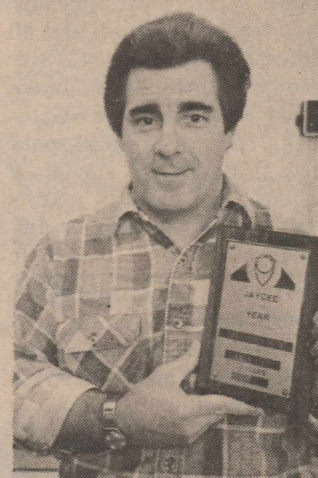
Booster Club officials are hopeful that everyone will make an effort to take red with them.

School Kids Have Their Say On TV

Delanie Worley, 12-year-old daughter of former resident Ron Worley and his wife of Aurora, Colorado, has been involved in an interesting program in her sixth grade class at South Middle School in Aurora.

A survey, conducted by students in the gifted and talented program at South Middle School, was used in a student newscast on KRMA-TV's "Super Six School News" last month. Delanie and classmate Julie Shinnors co-anchored a telecast in a 2 1/2 minute taped newscast to report the results of the survey in which nine other AGATE students helped in obtaining information.

About 60 schools a year get to make a two-minute tape for "Super Six School News" for KRMA, which is owned by the Denver Public Schools. However, in the four years since the show first aired, the South students are the only ones who have attempted to cover a real news event, the only case in which they have done real journalism, an official said. The program was aired in four states.

Most of the schools report on what is going on in their classes, interesting items, but not exactly what headlines are made of, a special events coordinator said.

The students in Delanie's group designed a questionnaire given to kids and their parents, tabulated results and wrote the script. The survey dealt with recent suggestions on school reform. During the broadcast, co-anchor Worley told Americans that, regardless of reports by the likes of the National Commission on Excellence, "The most frequent comment (from kids) was that students might drop out of school (if rules are tightened)." Parents polled by the class agreed with their children. About 73 percent were skeptical of proposed reforms including more homework, longer school hours, fewer holidays, and better discipline.

South staff members said more homework was fine with them, but not a longer school year. Frequent comments were that "kids need a vacation."

The survey showed that parents and students at South did not agree with some of the key recommendations of the Commission for ways to improve education.

Then on third down Rocha put a great hit on Price and caused a fumble and Chris Whitaker recovered for the Hounds at the Knox City 29 yard line. Wink stopped the Hounds and Hutchinson punted. Wink took over again at their own 32 yard line. On first down the Wink runner coughed up the ball and Hutchinson recovered on the Wildcats 40 yard line. Lockhart got one yard. Wink jumped off sides, then Lockhart ran for four

yards and a first down. Oudems picked up seven yards. Lockhart ran for 17 yards down to the two yard line with about 40 seconds left before half time. Hutchinson tried the option twice with no gain. Then Hutchinson's pass to Flores was incomplete. With less than 10 seconds remaining, Hutchinson tried a field goal. It looked good, the band in the end zone under the goal post celebrated, Hutchinson celebrated, but the official said it was off to the right and no good. Half-time score Knox City 6, Wink 0.

Knox City received the kickoff to start the third quarter. The Hounds started at their own 20 yard line. Oudems stopped for no gain, Lockhart made three yards, then Hutchinson made a super run picking up 48 yards behind some great blocks and the Hounds were on the Wildcat 29 yard line. An illegal procedure penalty and a holding penalty against the Hounds moved the ball back to the 44 yard line. Lockhart made seven. Oudems made two yards. On third and long Lockhart's pass to Watkins was incomplete. The punt snap was fumbled and Wink stopped the Hounds and took over on their own 42 yard line. Flores, Whitaker and Hutchinson stopped Price after a five yard gain. Then Thompson and Lockhart stopped Price for no gain. On third down, Wink fumbled again

and Oudems came up with the ball. Lockhart was stopped for a one yard loss; however, a personal foul penalty against Wink moved the ball to the Wildcats 30 yard line. However, the Hounds made only one yard in four downs and Wink took over at their own 29 yard line. Wink's only offensive threat came on this series of downs. Adams broke for 47 yards before Eaton saved the day for the Hounds. Evatt and Whitaker stopped Adams after a four yard gain. Price kept for five before Flores stopped the play. Price kept for three and first down at the 12 yard line. Rocha made the tackle. Price ran down to the three yard line before being stopped by Hutchinson, Evatt and Whitley stopped Adams after two yard gain and first down. Then Adams scored on a one yard run. The PAT was good and Wink led 7-6.

Wink was fired up and stopped the Hound offense for no gain and forced a punt. Hutchinson punted 28 yards and Wink had good field position at their own 44 yard line.

The Hound defense gave up yardage grudgingly but the Wildcats were moving. Price made seven yards before Flores and Eaton stopped him. Evatt stopped Adams for one yard. Adams picked up three yards and a first down. Stop was made by Hutchinson and Lockhart. Rocha and Oudems stopped Adams after five yards gained. Rocha and Oudems stopped Adams again after five yards and first down with the ball at the Hound 32 yard line. The Wildcats were able to move to the 25 yard line where on third down Evatt and Whitaker stopped Price for a

one yard gain. On fourth and three, Price fumbled the ball and the Hounds David Thompson came out for the ball and a Hound recovery. This recovery was the first play of the fourth quarter. From this point to the end of the game the Hounds showed the marks of the champions they are. Poise, determination, and desire were evident. With good blocking and hard running, the Hounds started 77 yard march. Lockhart carried four times for 16 yards, Oudems carried three times for six yards, two five yard penalties against Wink and 45 yards on five carries by Hutchinson including the 18 yard touchdown run. PAT was no good and Knox City led 12 to 7.

Knox City kicked to Wink and the Hound defense was utterly awesome. Wink started at their own 31 yard line. Evatt, Rocha and Whitaker allowed Adams five yards. Then Evatt made a great tackle on Adams for a one yard loss. Price passed to Posey for 25 yards and first down. Ball was at the Hounds 49 yard line. Rocha and Eaton stopped Price for no gain. Thompson and Flores stopped Price for no gain. Whitley made a great tackle on Adams for no gain. On fourth down, Hutchinson stopped Price for a one yard gain and

the ball going over to the Hounds.

At this point the Hound offense went to work. With 2:51 left in the game. A 5 yard penalty moved the Hounds back and made it first and 15. Lockhart got eight tough yards. Hutchinson then made four yards. Another penalty moved Knox City back five more yards and made it third down and eight yards. Lockhart, with a tough run showing second effort made eight yards and a first down. Hutchinson made two yards, then Hutchinson again made two yards. At this point, Wink had used their last time out and it was third down and six yards to go for a Hound first down and victory. Lockhart again made a tough run getting the needed six yards and a first down and the victory. Final score - Knox City 12, Wink 7.

What a game!! What a Victory!!!

Next week, the Hounds play Bremond for the State Championship at 8:00 p.m. in Weatherford.
