Fourth Grade Water Education Material Delivered



The North Plains Groundwater Conservation District delivered water educational material to the fourth grade teachers this week. The educational material is entitled "Major Rivers" and is provided free of charge to the schools within the seven counties of the District.

The program is designed especially for the 4th grade level. It is colorful, entertaining and easy to teach. All the materials needed for instruction will be provided and include the following: Teachers guide, Video, Poster, Program record sheet, Student booklets, Pretest, Posttest, Home information leaflets and Major Rivers sticker.

Instruction focuses on five practices and assess personal habits.

1. Identify the steps in the water cycle.

2. Identify basic facts about the water supply in Texas which include; the regional differences in rainfall, the amount of water supplied by surface and by groundwater, and the State's major rivers and aquifers.

3. Identify the steps and processes of the water distribution system in Texas.

4. Recognize typical household water uses, and identify which ones use the most water over a year's time.

5. Identify water conservation

These objectives also support many of the State's Essential Elements in science, social studies and writing.

"Major Rivers" consists of 10 lessons, requiring approximately 30-45 minutes of instruction each day. Suggestions for optional enrichment activities are included if the teacher wants to expand the program.

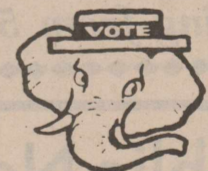

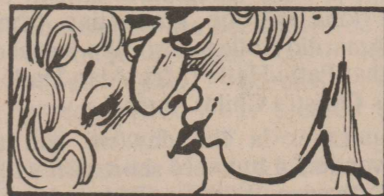
Grand Chapter of Texas, Order of the Eastern Star, will convene in Amarillo Oct. 18, 19 and 20 for their 108th annual session.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Texas Public Utility Commission to introduce two experimental services called Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are optional call management services that will automatically forward a customer's incoming calls to a pre-designated number whenever that incoming call encounters a busy or don't answer condition. These services are for both business and residence customers. The company proposes that the services be available beginning November 19, 1990.

The monthly rates for Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are \$1.00 for residence customers and \$3.00 for business customers. The monthly rate for subscribing to both services is \$1.75 for residence customers and \$4.00 for business customers. During this experimental offering period the installation charges will be waived.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$752,000.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer will be offered on an experimental basis in selected areas throughout the state for 12 months. The availability of these services after that time will depend on Southwestern Bell's decision of whether to offer the services on a permanent basis.

Persons wishing to comment on these services should notify the commission by November 9, 1990. Brownies Meet

Hordes of field crickets have invaded parts of Sherman County, creating a tremendous nuisance in some areas.

Large numbers of crickets usually occur in the fall following prolonged dry weather in the spring and summer. Cooler fall temperatures and rains often trigger cricket migrations to lighted areas around buildings.

Field crickets can damage ornamental and garden plants. Inside homes and other buildings

they come a nuisance and may occasionally feed on fabrics, especially clothing stained with perspiration or food.

Cleaning yard & garden areas will reduce cricket feeding & breeding sites. This includes destroying weeds & sense vegetation around homes & other buildings & removing piles of bricks, stones, wood & other debris where crickets may hide.

Eliminating outside lights at night also helps keep crickets away from buildings & making sure that all screens & doors fit tightly will help keep the pests out of the home.

Spraying around foundation walls, window and door facings, crawl spaces, door thresholds, and in and around garbage cans and

wood piles will keep crickets from moving indoors. Effective insecticides for outdoor use include chlorphrifos (Dursban), diazinon, malathion, propoxur (Baygon), resmethrin, carbaryl (Seven) and methaldehyde, the latter two as baits.

Field crickets lay their eggs in the soil, with as many as three generations a year in southern areas. They overwinter as eggs of nymphs (immature forms).

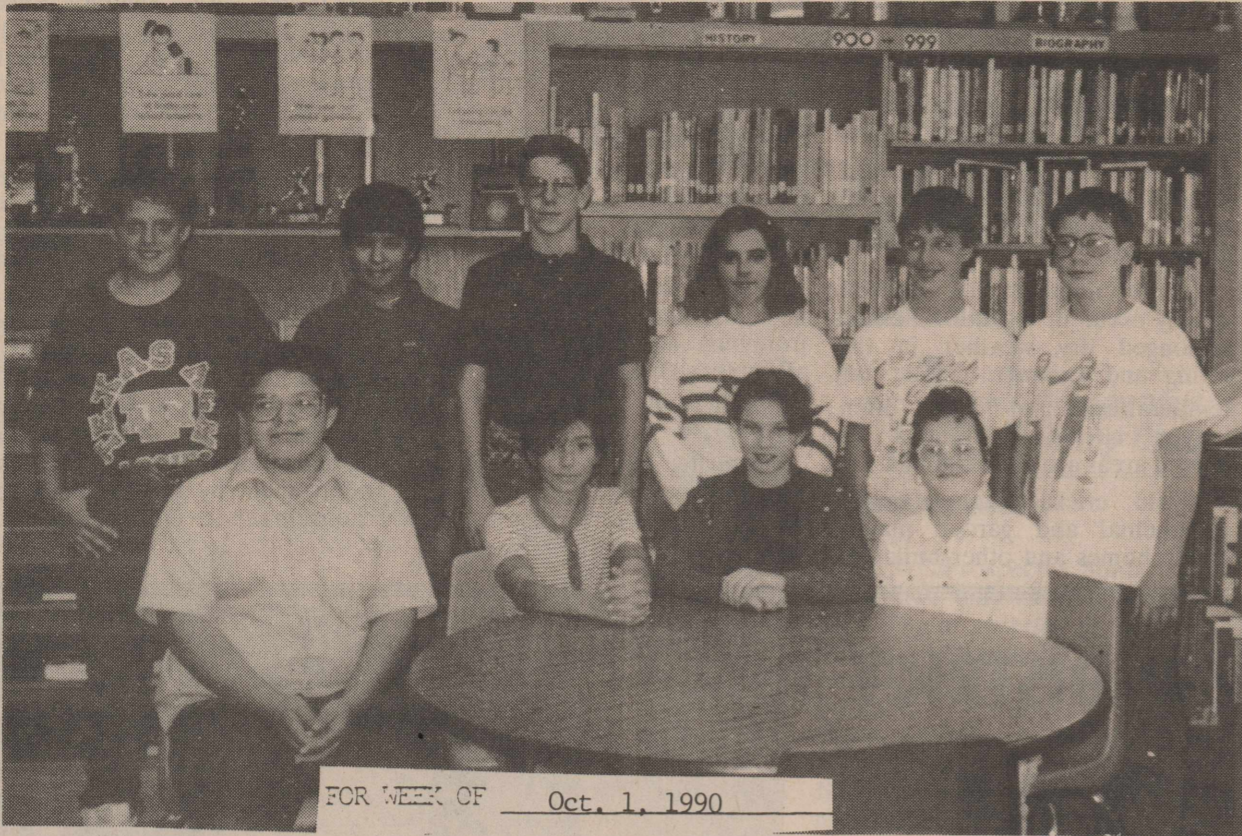

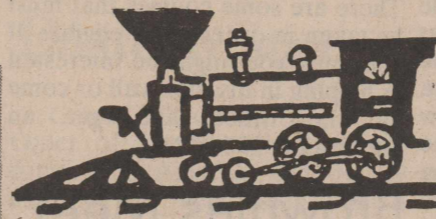
