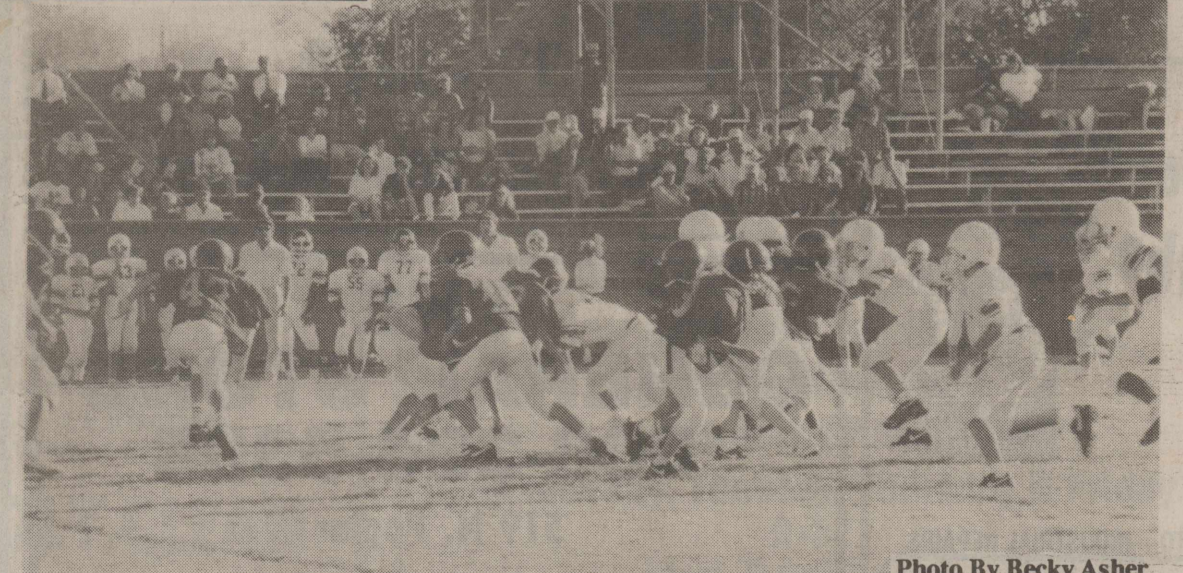

Stratford made seven touchdowns from seven different players and defeated White Deer 46-7 in a non-district matchup of Class 2A teams.

The Elks, 4-1, jumped in front to a 25-0 halftime lead behind a dominant rushing game. Donnie Gray opened the scoring with a 52 yard run.

Paul Davis nailed one on a 4-yard run to give Stratford a 13-0 first quarter lead.

Stratford pulled away in the second quarter when Michael Brooks traveled 11 yards into the end zone, and Gray connected with Justin Long on a 16 yard pass.

The Elks were able to build 391 yards on the ground and totaled 444 yards and 23 first

downs for the game.

Junior Gomez led Stratford with 115 yards on 17 carries.

Also scoring touchdowns for the evening were Greg Vandiver on a 47 yard pass from Gray and Scott Asher made a 38 yard run.

Stratford had 5 penalties for a total yardage of 95 and White Deer had 6 penalties for 35 yards.

SPS Honored

Electrical World magazine honored SPS on Wednesday, October 2, as the national winner of its 1991 James H. McGraw Award for management and leadership.

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Bill Helton accepted the honor's commemorative medallion on behalf of all employees at a ceremony in New York City during the magazine's annual Executive Round Table of industry leaders.

The McGraw Award, named after the founder of the McGraw-Hill Publishing Company, is presented annually for the purpose of giving public recognition and expressing industry appreciation of the contribution to the advancement of the electrical industry.

McGraw-Hill is the publisher of Electrical World as well as other magazines, including Business Week.

In singling out SPS, Electrical World's Editor-In-Chief William Hayes said the award honors the company for:

*Effectively pursuing a policy of "dynamic conservatism," that has produced rate reductions in each of the last seven years.

*Gaining a rating of excellence in service from 97% of its customers as opposed to an industry average of 73%.

*Earning awards in two states for its economic development efforts (SPS actively participates in two economic development coalitions: The High Ground of Texas and the Business Quarter of New Mexico.)

*Raising interest coverage to almost five times (a measure of how well the company controls debt.)

*Winning EPA and national attention for its pioneering environmental efforts (such as SPS's development of air quality control equipment for power plants, conservation of fresh water, marketing of coal ash and other achievements.)

Nominations are not solicited. Electrical World monitors the industry and selects appropriate winners. Last year's winner was Florida Power and Light Company.

Helton said the McGraw award is recognition of the foresight and commitment of the company's former and present directors and management team and the hard work, dedication and contributions of every employee.

"It's gratifying to be honored nationally," Helton said. "Every employee has a right to be proud of this major award."

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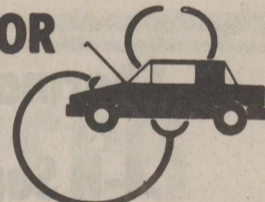

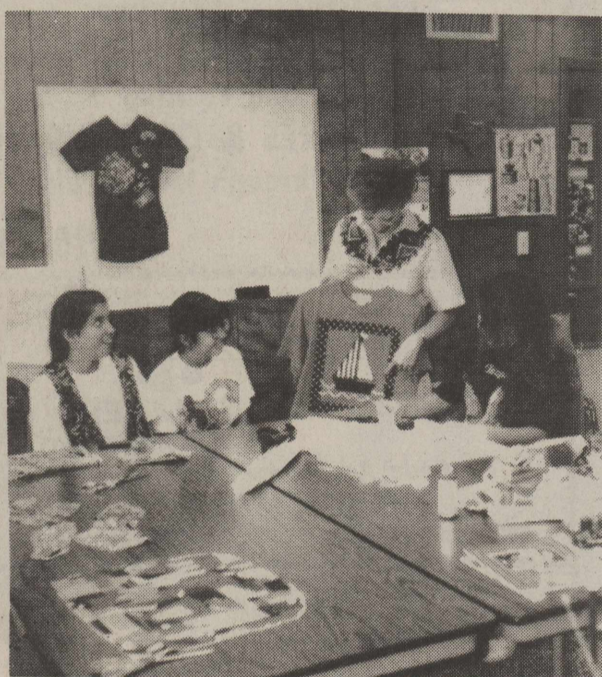

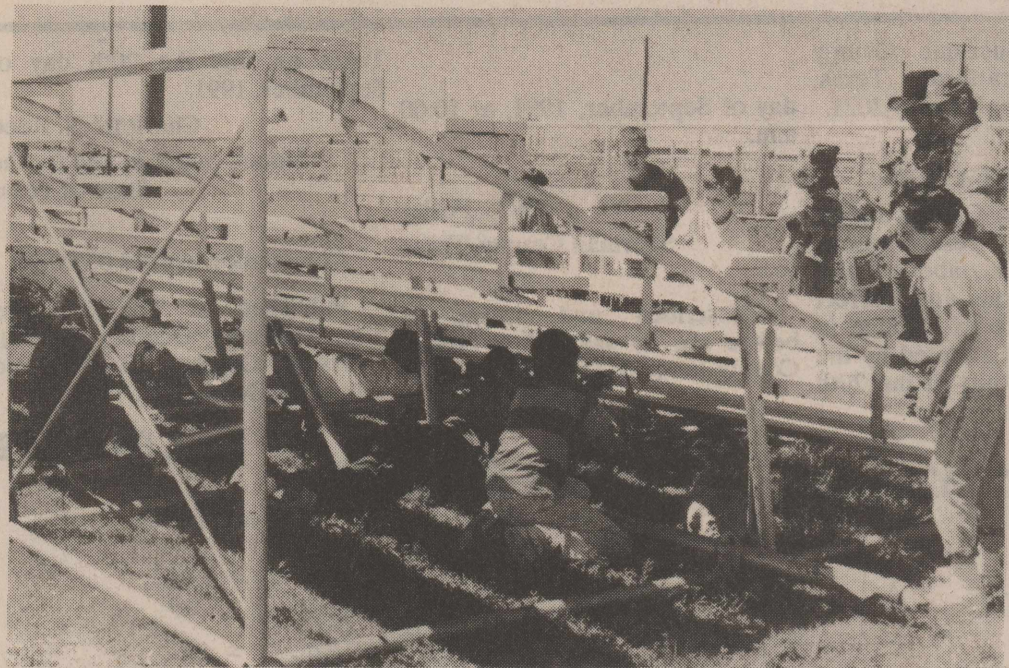
Horse Club
