The 22nd Annual Coat and Shoe Fund Project to benefit Girlstown, U.S.A. is now underway throughout the Texas Panhandle. Conducted by the Lions Clubs of District 2-T1, the project was begun in 1979 to provide every deserving girl with a coat and a pair of shoes.
This year, 90 girls will be coming to Amarillo on Friday and Saturday, November 15 and 16. The girls receive a generous discount from Mervyn's Department Store in Westgate Mall, and this makes the Lions Club dollars go even farther. Each girl will have a credit limit within which she may purchase her coat, shoes and other much needed clothing items. Many of the girls have never before purchased so many new articles of clothing. They will be assisted in their shopping by Lions Club members and their spouses.
The chairman of the Coat and Shoe Fund is Keith Christie of Dumas, Texas, who is serving his sixth year in that position. Along with promotion the fund drive with area Lions Clubs, Mr. Christie coordinates the shopping trip and the amount of funds each girl may spend. Southwestern Public Service Company To Provide Wholesale Electricity for Cap Rock Electric Cooperative

Southwestern Public Service Company & Cap Rock Electric Cooperative, Inc. today announced an agreement in which SPS will provide wholesale power to Cap Rock, which serves 17 West Texas counties.
Delivery of electricity under the agreement will become effective upon completion of transmission lines between the two companies, expected in mid-1993.
Cap Rock is headquartered in Stanton, 18 miles northeast of Midland, and serves more than 20,000 customers. SPS is a regional, investor-owned utility serving about 350,000 customers in the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, eastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.
Cap Rock will become the 17th rural electrical cooperative to which SPS provides wholesale power.

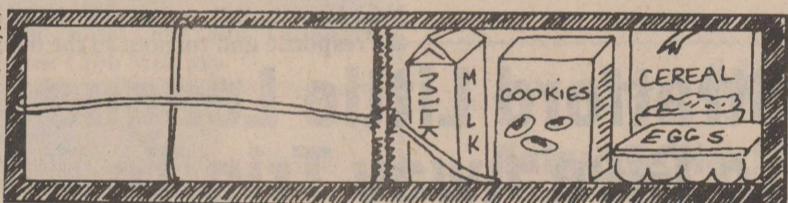

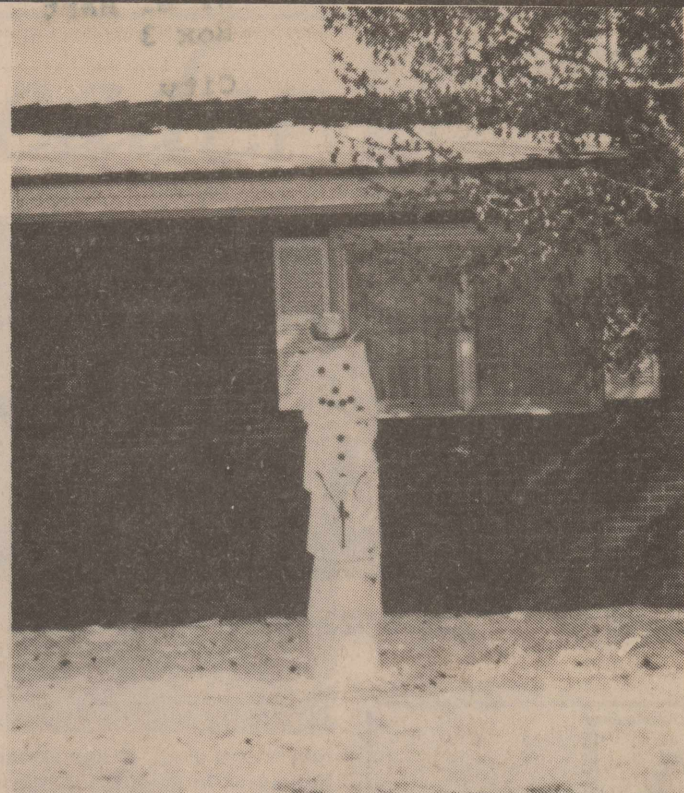

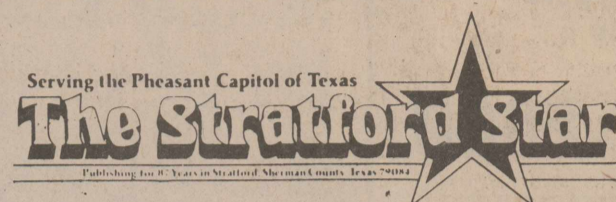

Everyone stayed home that could while it was so cold.

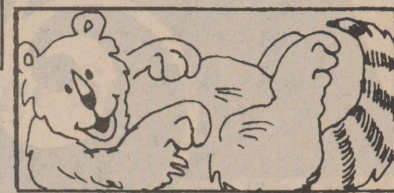
Calvary Baptist Christian School Honor Rolls

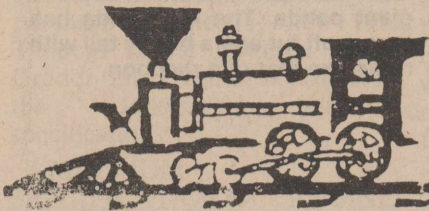

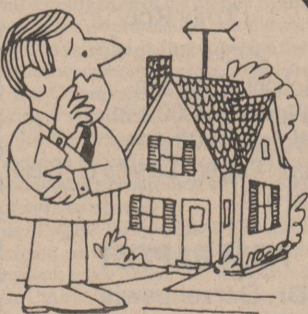

The 1990-91 fiscal year for the Sherman County Library ended in October. The statistics show that 2571 books were used by adults. Children that used the easy reading material took out 3318 items. Patrons used 251 talking books and 221 large print books.

The library had 15 school groups who came for references work. Fifteen films were shown to 742 children that attended Story Time and the Summer Reading program.

Interlibrary loan services were used 112 times with 60 reference and referral questions sent to our major resource center which is Texas Panhandle Library System and Amarillo Public Library. Because our library is a part of this system, patrons have access to libraries at West Texas State University, Amarillo College, Amarillo Public, and any other library affiliated with the Harrington Library Consortium.

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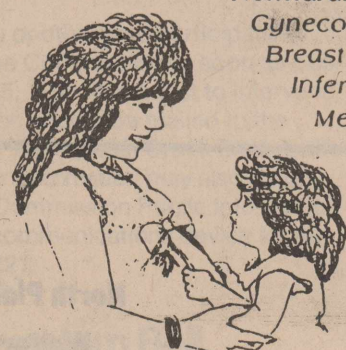
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Football

Straford will host Spearman Friday night Nov. 2, 1991 in Stratford at 7:30.

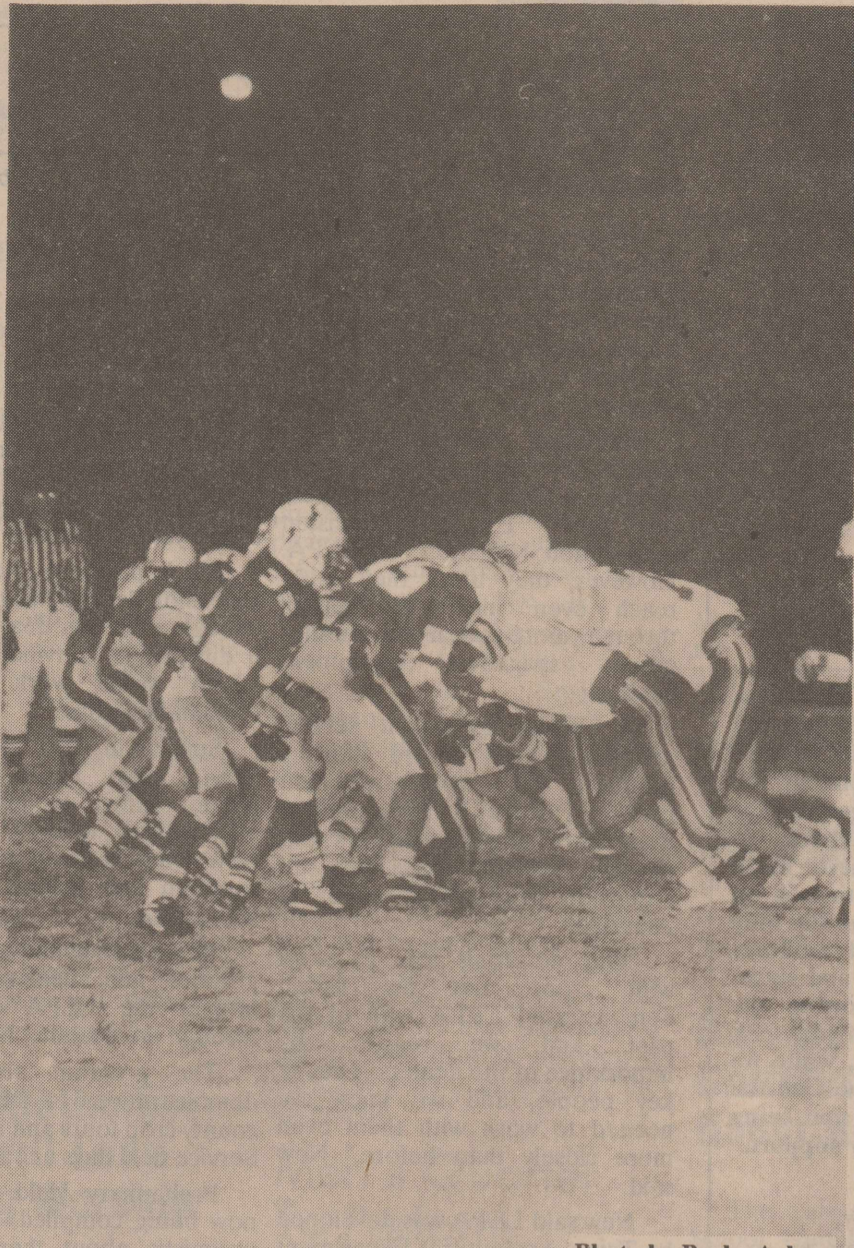
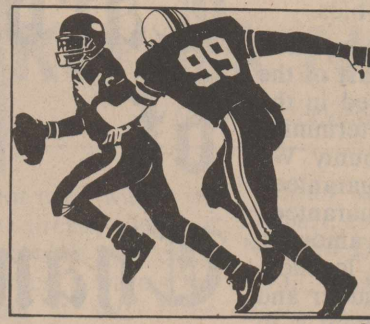

have seen it demonstrated, New said. That's part of the reason for the increased emphasis on demonstrations with the assistance

of dealers, who will be able to spread the word to producers.

One dealer who was "real quick to come around to the idea," New said, is Nick Smith of Olton.

Smith said he installed his first LEPA system in the early 1980's after hearing about the technology and approaching New.

"I knew there was a need for a more efficient means of irrigation. I knew we could do a better job," he said. "I knew what the growers could get from LEPA. It's just going to take time to educate them."

He adds that LEPA is not for everyone, partly because of the extra management needed. But he said he often installs no-cost trial systems if he thinks a producer would benefit, and added, "I've never had a producer who has asked me to take it off. They always write me a check."

Smith's effectiveness as a salesman is also valuable to New.

"He's got the confidence of growers. That's what all dealers need," New said. "And that's what we need."

health Q & A

Q: Why do athletes and others take steroids?

A: You may be tempted to take anabolic steroids because you think this is a quick way to put on muscle size and increase your strength. Fact is, the steroid abusing athlete may rise more quickly, but fall just as fast. Side effects of steroid abuse include severe acne, liver and kidney disease, cancer, bone disease, sterility, aggressive hostility and paranoia—and has been the prime suspect in some athlete deaths.

Q: What happens to those caught selling or using anabolic steroids including the many high school students who use them to improve their athletic performance and appearance?

A: It is now a federal offense to sell or use anabolic steroids, reports Robert C. Bonner, head of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). Under the Anabolic Steroids Control Act of 1990, the penalty for selling these drugs can be a five-year prison term, and a maximum fine of \$250,000. The penalty for possession is one year in federal prison and a minimum fine of \$1,000. For free brochures on steroids, write: Steroid, Demand Reduction Section, DEA, Washington, D.C. 20537.

When it comes to saving water- and money-the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has found that one way to persuade farmers to try a new irrigation technology is to convince equipment dealers of its value.

Extension personnel have successfully persuaded a few producers about the effectiveness of Low Energy Precision Application Irrigation, or LEPA. However, they think they could reach even more by getting through more often to another group: irrigation equipment dealers.

A special Extension service program geared toward showing producers which crops can benefit from LEPA also is being used to draw more irrigation dealers into the fold, said Dr. Leon New, an Extension irrigation specialist in Amarillo.

"Our emphasis was to work with crops that we hadn't demonstrated LEPA with in the past, and we realize the importance of the dealers. They're key people, and we knew we needed to work with them even more closely than before," New said.

New said LEPA was developed by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers in the early 1980's as an alternative to center pivot irrigation. Center-pivot systems have spans of varied lengths that sweep around circular fields from anchored center pads.

Center-pivot systems have advantages over row irrigation in areas where water is in short supply, because they can irrigate more efficiently. LEPA can water even more efficiently than conventional center-pivot systems, New said.

LEPA applies water much lower to the ground, which reduces water loss through evaporation and wind drift.

LEPA is initially more expensive than conventional center pivots, but irrigation & chemigation (application of chemicals) can be done using less energy and water—and sometimes improve yields, especially where water is limited, New said.

New has led a number of Extension Service Field demonstrations since the mid-1980's in an effort to show the advantages of LEPA, but progress has come in increments.

Over the years, New had been able to show producers that peanuts, corn & other crops have improved yields under LEPA.

* A sound approach to guidance, or discipline, should include more than stopping a youngster from behaving in ways you don't want; it should also include teaching the child what it is okay to do.

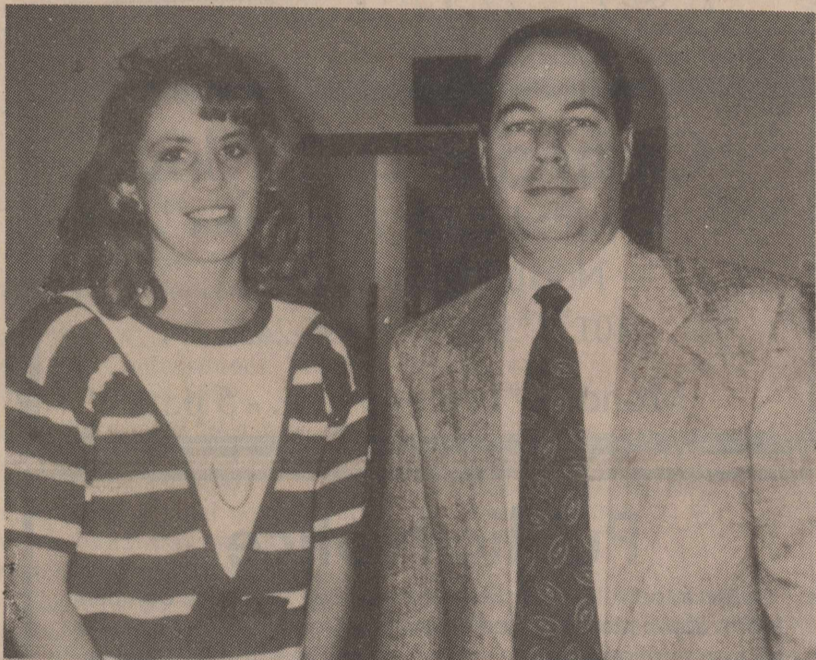
* Learning right from wrong comes through patient explanations, having good role models, and temporarily being deprived of something desired.

decisions. * Punishment can frequently be avoided through the use of "preventative discipline." Look for a problem in the environment and then "fix it". Problems with valuable breakables, medicines, and hot soup on the front burner can all be prevented; besides they aren't as much fun as washable crayons (and an acceptable place to use them), blocks that fit together, & a colorful book you read to them.

* A well-disciplined child may seldom have to be punished.
