Callahan Deep Try Slated

Location for a new Callahan County wildcat eight miles north of Cross Plains was staked by J. E. Connally, et al, of Abilene.

It will be No. 1 Ethel Hewes, spotting 330 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west lines of Subdivision 9, Lavaca CSL Survey 6. Proposed depth is 4,400 feet with rotary.

Wohlreich and Hudspeth of Abilene staked No. 3 Sarah Hennessy Estate as a 1,850-foot rotary project in the St. Patrick (Hope) Field six miles north of Clyde.

Site spots 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of W. H. Klepper Survey 2.

In the regular field, F. H. Murphy of Abilene staked No. 1 L. T. Harris as a 1,400-foot rotary project two and a half miles south of Eula.

Location is 1,650 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east lines of Section 24, BBB&C Survey.

J. K. Dobbs of Ft. Worth staked three new locations in the McGraw (Cross Plains Sand) Field three miles west of Cross Plains. All are slated for 1,800 feet with rotary.

No. 1 N. S. Johnson spots 250 feet from the south and 774 feet from the east lines of Wyatt Hickman Survey 6.

No. 3 W. L. Baum will be 270 feet from the south and 720 feet from the east lines of Montgomery Survey 853.

No. 4 Baum spots 925 feet from the south and 820 feet from the east lines of the same survey.

F. J. Saddler, Oil Operator, of Abilene staked No. 3 N. S. Johnson as a 1,750-foot rotary project four miles northwest of Cross Plains in the McGraw (Cross Plains Sand) Field.

Slated for 1,750 feet with rotary, it spots 1,250 feet from the south and 1,798 feet from the west lines of Wyatt Hickman Survey 6.

Same operator's No. 4 Johnson will be a 1,750-foot rotary project spotting 1,665 feet from the south and 1,798 feet from the west lines of the same survey.

In the same field, N. M. Dillard, et al, of Cross Plains completed No. 2 Jackson and McClure as a producer in Block 96, Comal CSL Survey 181.

It flowed 36.84 barrels of 43.3 gravity oil in 12 hours through a 12-64-inch choke Packer was set on casing, with 120 pounds on tubing. Flow was from 24 perforations at 1,566-1,572 feet. Casing was set on bottom at 1,602 feet.

L. A. Hedrick of Wichita Falls plugged No. 1 Winifred Barton Barton Phillips at 1,741 feet. The wildcat was located five miles south of Clyde in Section 10, BBB&C Survey.

R. Denny Jackson of Brownwood No. 1-A M. E. Cornelius, Am-Hard Field project five miles northwest of Cross Plains, was plugged at 1,815 feet. It is in G. M. Vigal Survey 798.

Obedying Signs Is Good Judgment

"It's a sign of good judgment to know and obey the Signs of Life!"

Mr. E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice-President of Employers' Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., made that remark today in discussing the current Signs of Life program the Texas Safety Association and the Department of Public Safety is sponsoring in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

"Signs of Life are the traffic signs and signals erected for the protection of motorists and pedestrians," Mr. McFadden explained. "It's their job to warn of conditions ahead, and drivers who don't heed their warning are likely to run into trouble."

"The traffic trouble caused by such heedlessness is indicated," Mr. McFadden said, "by the fact that more than half the drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are violating one or more traffic laws at the time of the accident. Violations most frequently committed are:

1. Exceeding speed limit.
2. Failure to keep right of center line.
3. Improper passing.
4. Disregarding warning sign.
5. Disregarding stop sign.
6. Disregarding signal or officer.

"On the matter of speed," Mr. McFadden said, "driving too fast for conditions often causes drivers to miss traffic signs or signals or to be unable to slow down in time if they do see them."

"Whenever you drive," he said, "remember that it's dangerous to be a Hurry Bug. Slow down and live!"

Hunt Safety Plan Pushed In Texas

Increased emphasis on hunting safety is counted on to reduce gun accidents during the coming fall wildlife harvest, according to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

He said the safety program is expected to counteract the trend, which first became unusually marked last year, where by more children and women folks are taking up hunting as a sport.

Upwards of twenty Texans died last year in assorted hunting accidents. At least seventeen died from gunshot wounds. Ten of these fatalities involved teenagers and nine youngsters were killed outright. All of the juveniles affected were fourteen years of age or under. At least a score more children were shot.

The Executive Secretary said the tragic season prompted widespread interest in safety programs by organized groups such as sportsmen's clubs which stimulates hope for fewer tragedies.

He did point out, however, that one of the first two hunting fatalities reported this summer involved a twelve year old Bander boy who accidentally shot a hunting companion of about the same age while they were hunting squirrels with a 22 rifle. The other tragedy occurred when a Jasper woman was shot by her husband whose gun was discharged as he took it from the car. They were squirrel hunting.

"The interest of youngsters in hunting is a natural one," said the Executive Secretary. "It is a good outlet for their energy. But we must guide them in safe handling of firearms and teach them about all that a loaded gun is potentially a lethal weapon."

He said a comparatively new hazard might prevail this fall in the increased interest in high-powered shotgun shells and cautioned hunters to make certain, through a skilled locksmith, that their guns are adequate to handle the bigger loads.

Undesirable Wheat Varieties Listed

A list of 23 wheat varieties designated as undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities has been released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Because of their undesirability, a discount of 20 cents a bushel in 1956 price-support rates will be made to discourage the planting of the listed varieties.

The varieties were designated by the Agricultural Research Service after consultation with state agricultural experiment station personnel, agronomists, cereal chemists and other qualified technicians on state and Federal staffs.

The price-support regulations for 1956 will provide for producer certification that is the identification of the variety of wheat going under price support will be the responsibility of the producer. It will be based on his knowledge of varieties seeded and harvested. No protein content premium will apply to any of the undesirable varieties.

The 23 varieties listed accounted for only 31 million bushels of the 1954 production and 3.7 percent of the '54 wheat acreage. The varieties shown on the list included seven which are planted in Texas. All are hard red winter wheats and are Red Chief, Red Jacket, Kanking, Chiefkan, Early Blackhull, New Chief and Yogo.

USDA officials state that this change in the price-support program for wheat is designed to encourage the production of more desirable varieties and lessen the possibility of U. S. wheat of inferior quality finding its way into domestic and export channels. Strong backing, say the officials, has come from crop improvement associations.

Lower Death Toll Set For Labor Day

The lowest nationwide traffic fatality estimate for the Labor Day weekend since 1950 was announced today by the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies.

The Association, which attributed the reduction to the current "Slow Down and Live" traffic safety campaign, estimated that 410 persons will die on the highways during the coming 78 hour holiday weekend.

Specifically, the Association forecast ascribed the 410 expected deaths to these causes: 135 fatalities due to excessive speed; 65 deaths from driving on the wrong side of the road; 42 from reckless driving; 39 from failure to yield the right-of-way; and 29 from falling asleep at the wheel.

The remaining 100 deaths will include 35 pedestrians who attempted to cross the street between intersections, 10 who stepped into the street from behind parked cars and 55 fatalities from miscellaneous actions of drivers and pedestrians.

In addition to these traffic deaths, over 22,000 drivers and passengers, plus some 3,200 pedestrians, are feared likely to suffer personal injuries. At least one out of every four drivers or pedestrians involved in a fatal accident will have been drinking alcohol immediately before the accident, the Association said.

Concerning the holiday forecast, Thomas N. Boate, manager of the Association's Accident Prevention Department, said: "The expected reduction directly reflects the reduced traffic toll experienced during this summer's nationwide 'Slow Down and Live' campaign. While slight, the decrease is significant. It gives motorists added hope that their cooperation with mass, coordinated safety programs can lower the traffic toll."

"Labor Day begins officially at 6 p.m. Friday, September 2 and ends at midnight on the following Monday. It is the nation's third three-day holiday this year and there is every reason to believe that with the help of motorists, it can also be the safest. Courtesy, caution and cooperation should be the watchwords for safe Labor Day weekend driving."

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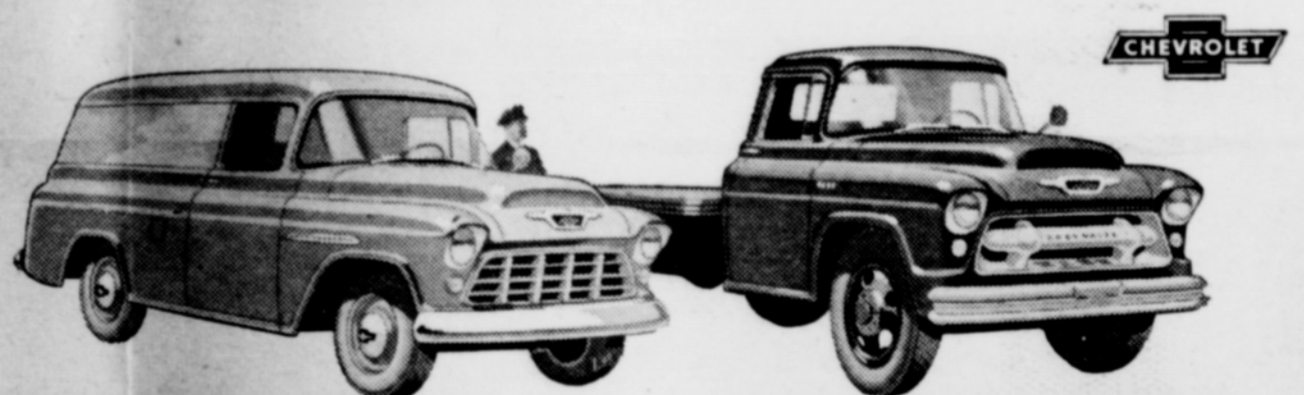
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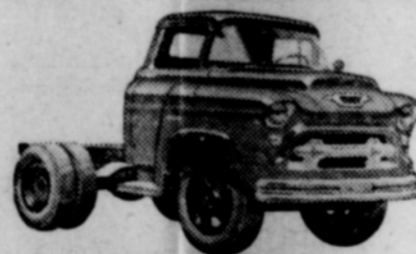

Whether a special session of the Legislature is called on school integration apparently hinges on a Texas Supreme Court decision still to come.

Filed by the anti-segregation Texas Citizens Council in a district court at Big Spring, the suit seeks to bar payment of state funds to bi-racial schools.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd says the court decision holds the key to whether Texas laws must be changed immediately or already-integrated schools must back-track. Decision by the district court can be carried directly to the Supreme Court and possibly be settled by the time school starts.

Should the court hold payment to integrated schools can be made under existing laws, there apparently would be no urgent need to change them, at least in that regard.

Shepperd said he welcomed the Big Spring suit since it promises to clear up the difficult legal situation.

Gov. Allan Shivers says he will call a special session "if necessary." He apparently was awaiting three developments:

He asked his newly formed citizens advisory council on school integration to investigate and report to him on several questions, including the need of a special session.

He asked Shepperd to prepare an official ruling on legal questions.

And the decision in the Big Spring court case may set up conditions to determine need of the session.

In July the Board of Education voted to continue regular payments to local districts, whether segregated or not. It left racial policy up to local officials.

Since then, some 30 districts have announced whole or partial desegregation plans.

A University of Texas student committee also has taken on the segregation problem with a poll of student opinion on acceptance of Negro students outside the classroom. Graduate courses have been open to Negroes since 1950. Regents have ordered full desegregation in Sept., 1956.

KKK Talk Challenged
Attorney General Shepperd's claim that efforts are underway in Texas to revive the Ku Klux Klan brought a challenge last week.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips called on Shepperd to name names, but Shepperd declined. Names will be given prosecutors and grand juries when sufficient evidence is gathered for convictions, Shepperd said.

State Senator Killed
Death of State Sen. Wayne W. Wagonseller of Bowie cost Texas liberals one of their leaders.

Wagonseller, killed in a three-car collision in Ft. Worth, was buried last week in the State Cemetery at Austin with full military honors. Services were held earlier in the Senate Chamber.

A World War II veteran, he served two terms in the House before beginning his Senate career in 1951. Friends in Tyler recently had boomed him as a candidate for attorney general. He had been associated with Loyalist Democrats and had supported Ralph Yarborough in the latter's two unsuccessful races for governor.

Giles Pleads Guilty
One of the biggest news breaks of last week was Bascom Giles' plea of guilty in criminal district court at San Antonio to two charges in connection with a Bexar County block land deal.

Giles' guilty plea concerned charges of consenting to accept a \$30,000 bribe. He pleaded not guilty to a third count of accepting the bribe. The state waived this charge and Judge Buck Jones imposed a six-year

prison sentence. It is to run concurrently with a three-year sentence given Giles earlier at Austin on a charge of theft of \$6,800 from the veterans' land fund.

Giles has appealed the case, which affords at least 90 days' delay in final disposition of the sentence.

Awaiting trial in San Antonio were Arthur McKenzie and C. V. Wynn, San Antonio land operators, indicted for offering the \$30,000 bribe to Giles.

Other suits now pending against the former land commissioner are a civil suit at San Antonio, seeking recovery of \$35,000 and nine additional charges in Austin, on other transactions. He also faces trial in Zavala County on another land case.

Stevenson Reply Awaited
Adlai Stevenson is slated to speak in Austin on Sept. 28. At that time he may reply to Gov. Allan Shivers' repeated refusal to support him for president.

During the national governor's conference in Chicago, Shivers said he would again, as in 1952, refuse to support Stevenson if he were Democratic candidate for president.

Stevenson withheld comment "until I am in Texas," Shivers, he pointed out, was a "guest in Illinois."

Stevenson's Austin appearance was arranged by the University of Texas great issues committee. It is billed as "non-political." Subject of his talk will be "America, the Economic Colossus."

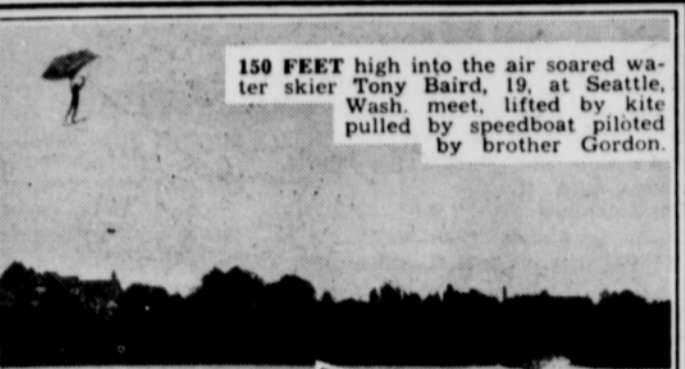
Too Much Money

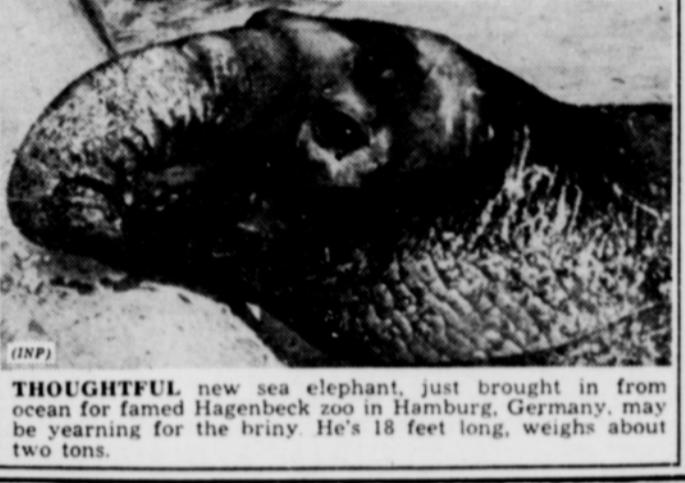

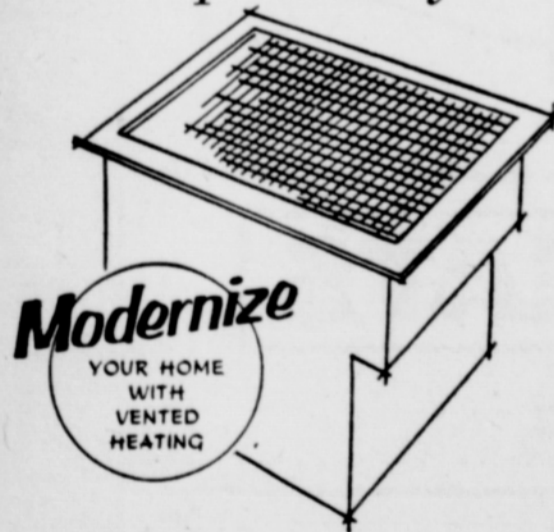

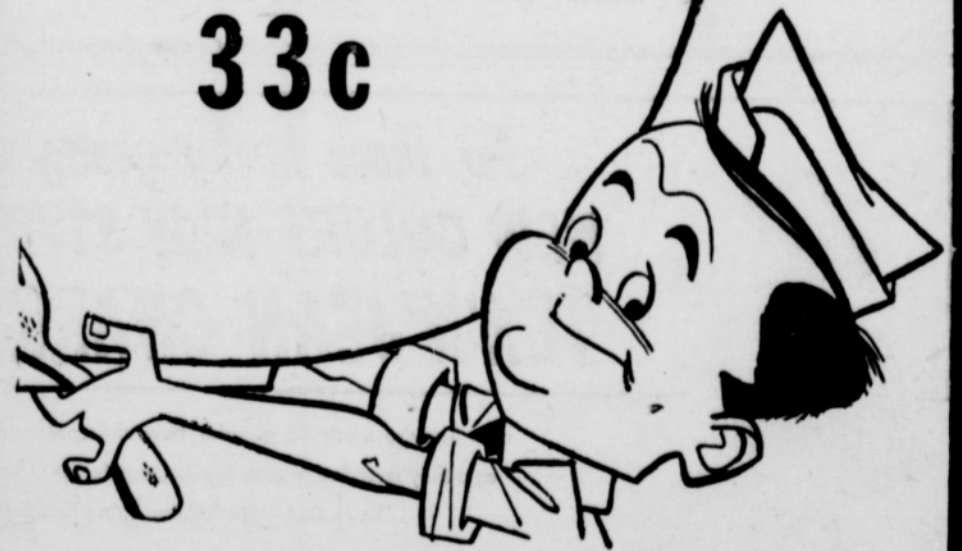
