For three years the counties of Starr Hidalgo and portions of Zapata and Duval have been subjected to a drouth of such severity as to renthe production of the necessities of life impossible. The season for planting is past and we are now entering upon the fourth year of distress with no hope of relief unless CASH rain can be obtained in the month of

June, thus securing a light fall crop. The loss of stock, the depreciation in values of all kinds of property the inability of ranchmen to procure money for payment of taxes, a de- Absolut pleted county treasury, the preva- BEST BUGG lence of the small-pox through a section extending from San Ignacio in Zapata county to Rio Grande City in Starr county, and the baleful effects of the Garza' revolution, all combined, have produced a destitution hither to unkhown. Same of the people are using the fresh flesh of cattle who have died from disease or starvation, and others are drying

the meat for future use. The famine district contains a population estimated at \$15,000 to 20,000 persons. It is safe to say that one-fifth of this number require assistance, while the resources of the balance of the population are only adequate to maintain themselves and families. In vain have we appealed to the state for aid and we now appeal to the charitable for contribution of corn, supplies and such other aid as they feel disposed to give.

Grasses for Hogs.

For a hog pasture we would use every kind of grass that would grow in the neighborhood, each the lown Homestead. It is not possible to get too many varieties at the start. You will have few enough at the encol about three years. We have two reasons for this viz., to secure the createst amount of ford per nere and suitable variety for the tastes of the hog. It should be borne in mind by n'l farmers who wish to got the best rosul's from pasture grasses that none of them occupy the field fully the whole season. They have their periods of rest even in the summer, and when there are varieties enough they take precedence by turns. For examp'e. orchard grass comes in first and gives the 'early bite' followed closely by bine grass then timothy, the clovers the crowd generally. In June blue grass gots tired and takes a rest; timothy and alsike clover get discouraged in July and do little more unless the season is quite wet, while orchard grass and red and mammoth clover grow right along. Both of these begin to get tired about the time that blue grass wakes up and gets ready to monopolize things. The grasse; are all social, even blue grass the most reserved and unsocial of all of them -never being quite happy without its chum white clover. Therefore, for a first-class, pormiment pasture, we would grow every variety of grass possible in the locality. It etter to have a pasture that will

carry fourtoen bundred pounds cow, horse, sheep or the acre all summer, than two pastures that will earry only seven hundred pounds per acre. To do so it is imperative that it have a variety of grasses. Any of the grasses we have mentioned will do fairly well in any part of Iowa unless it might be orchard grass in the northern part of the open prairie. To these may be added meadow fescue, and in the extreme northern part red top. Red top will do well on wet lands anywhere, but we would advise against sowing it anywhere in the latitude of central or southern Iowa.

To apply all this to the case of our lowing mixture: Timothy eight pounds red clover six pounds blue grass six pounds, meadow fescue, known as English blue grass, four pounds, and alsike and white clover one pound each. This is a heavy seeding. but when a farmer wants a hog past ure he wants a good one and it will pay. We would sow these grasses on the sod in March and trust to the freezing and thawing to cover them. Do not look for much blue grass for a year or two. It and the white clover or a paste of flour and vinegar. At a recent dairy convention in Mana Ex-tary, Hoard advised the farmers to stop bran buring, and produce feed to take its place. Protein food is necessary in the feeding of dairy cows. A sufficient quantity of protein might be found in seven pounds of cotton seed meak or 12 ounds of corn ment Timothy hay is a poor protein food, while clover is a good one. Forty-five pounds of clover hay contains the protein equivalent found in 79 pounds of timothy hay. Farmers should raise these foods instead of buying them. Peas supply a nitrogenous food; are easily grown and should be substituted for much of the purchased foods Maine dairymen are now buying. In growing peas don't make the ground too rich. Fow thickly and cross plow them in to cover deeply. On top of these sow a bushel of oats and harrow them in. Two pounds of pea meal is equal to six of bran. 

Topography, Water, Soil, Products, Shipping Points, Railroads, Public Schools, and Mill Facilities.

Haskell county is situated in the southern part of the Panhandle on the ine of the one hundredth meridian west from Greenwich. It is 1500 feet above the sea, and has mild winters and summers. It is thirty miles square and contains 576,000 acres of land. It was created in 1858 from a part of Fannin and Milam counties, and named in honor of Charles Haskell, a young Tennesseean, who fell at the massacre at Goliad in 1836.

It remained unsettled until 1874, when there was one or two ranches established. Other ranchmen followed, and in 1880 the county could boast of afteen or twenty inhabitants. There was no further development until early in 1884. when the town of Haskell was laid off, and by donating lots a few settlers were induced to build residences, and in January 1885 the county organized with a polled vote of fifty-seven electors.

Up to 1884 the soil had never been turned by a plow, and the people dehorses, as the natural grasses furnishes in the year. food both winter and summer for immense herds. Experiments were made in 1885 with garden products, corn, oats, wheat, rye, barley and cotton and the yield was bountiful. The acreage in farms have increased to at least 30,000.

TOPOGRAPHY. The county is an undulated plaine. with occasional creeks and branches. It is bounded on the north by that picturesque stream, the Salt Fork of the Brazos, and on the west by Double-Mountain Fork.

There are a few washes and gulches along the breaks and rivers, but with rivers, breaks, rocks and poor land combinded their area in Haskell county not be fine agricultural land.

WATER. It is traversed by numerous creeks and branches besides the rivers mentioned, some of which are fed by never

failing springs of purest water. Besides the numerous branches that afford water for stock all the time, the south half of the country is traversed by Paint and California creeks with their numerous tributaries draining the south half of the county.

The north half is traversed from northwest to northeast by Lake and Miller creeks whose tributaries furnish water and drainage for the same.

Besides the surface water there is an abundance to be obtained by digging from 15 to 40 feet, and all of a good quality, some of which is unsurpassed by that of any section in the state for purity and temperature.

The soil is an alluvial loam of great depth and fertility, varying in color from a red to a dark chocolate, and by reason of its porosity and friable nature, when thoroughly plowed, readily drinks in the rainfall and for the like reason the soll readily drains itself of the surplus water, thereby preventing stegna tion of the water and the baking of the soil, and the germination of mlasma. It is those peculiar qualities of soil that enables vegetation to withstand all va-

rieties of weather. Escept mesquite grubs and stump which are easily extracted, there are no obstructions to plows and the land being level or generally rolling and the same Christian instructions you easy worked, the use of labor-saving yourselves have had. Be enlightened mplements are profitable. One man with machinery and a little hired help has been known to cultivate over an 100 acres in grain and cotton.

Indian coru, wheat, oats, barley, rye, durah corn, miliet, sorghum, castor beans, field peas, peanute, pumpkins, and all the squash family, turnips and cotton are grown successfully and profitable. Sweet potatoes do well, and Irish potatoes as well as anywhere in the south. Garden vegetables grow to per fection, and melons luxuriate in Haskell county soil, growing to fine size of superb quality. Besides the native granges that grow on the prairies, susfaining large numbers of cattle, horses and sheep throughout the year, Colorado grass grows to great perfection and the hey made from this grass form a valuable adjunct to the winter pasture.

SHIPPING POINT. As yet Haskell has no railroad, and our people do their principal shipping to and from Abilene, a town 52 miles south, in Taylor county, on the Texas and Pacific railroad, Albany on the Texas Central 45 miles from Haskell on the southeast, and Seymour on the Wichita Valley road 45 miles northeast.

There is one road being built from Saymour to this place and one to be built from Fort Worth. The Texas Central will extend in a short time from Albany and Haskell is on the line as originally surveyed.

The land men of Austin have organized a company to build a road from that city to this section of the state, where they control nearly all the land, and one of the principal members owns 150,000 acres in this and Knox counties, besides he owns the large addition to the town of Haskell on the south.

Haskell is 52 miles north of the T. & P. R. R., and 90 miles south of the Ft. W. & D. R. R., and is situated on the direct line of the cattle trail over which the Rock Island and G. C & Sa. F. propose to extend their lines.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS. Our school fund is perhaps the best of any country in the northwest. In addition to the amount received from the state, about \$5.59 per capita, our commissioners' court have wisely exe uted a lease for ten years of our four leagues of school land, situated in the Panhandle, the revenue from which, added to the amount received from the state, gives turned by a plow, and the people de-pended upon raising cattle, sheep and several schools of the county ten morths

MAIL FACILITIES.

There is a daily mail service from Haskell to Abilene via Anson, and a weekly mail north to Benjamin and a daily mail to Seymour, also a tri-weekly express and passengers.

RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS.

The religious and moral status of the people of Haskell county will compare favorably with that of any people. The Methodists, Baptists, Christians, Old School and Cumberland Presbyterians as an omen of evil, and the other Ineach have organized churches in the town of Haskell, and have preaching on Sundays, also preaching at other points . in the county.




