# TORRENTAL RAINS DO HEAVY DAMAGE AROUND BAIRD

Torrental rains which fell Sunday night and early Monday morn ing wrought heavy damage around Baird and other sections of Callahan County. Heavy rains fell early Monday morning flooding all creeks around Baird doing heavy damage to the highway in east Bajdd where McKamey Creek which runs through the north and eas;t part of the city was higher than seen for many years.

The water ran over the bridge and for some distance over the highway on each side of bridge These flood waters with water from the creek south of the city emptied into the Texas and Pacifie Ry lake causing a rapid rise, the force of the water breaking the dam releasing the flood waters into the creek below, doing heavy damage to the railroad bridge below, washing away one section of support. All traffic on the railroad in this section was haulted, passengeres and express being transferrred by bus from Putnam to Baird where · trains were held.

Robert L. Edwards sustained sewere loss at his feed lots and slaughter pens just south of the highway when the flood waters wrecked his windmill, water tanks and carried his big barn down the stream and wrecking it on the bridge in Highway 80. The barn was filled with feed, hay, oats and barley, which was strewn for some distance down the creek

The highway bridge was considerable damaged by the wreck.

Mr. and Mrs. McAuley who live on the Edwards place escaped with only their night clothes as the flood waters more than four feet high struck the house, a small brick structure, when they were asleep. They took refuge in the slaughter house, wading outin the high water. Several hundred chickens were drowned, but all othes lifestock on the place escaped the flood.

Many report the loss of chickens and terkeys. Considerable damage was done to growing crops, fences, etc., is different

Highway crews are repairing the highway and crews have made temporary repairs in the railroad bridge and train service has been resumed.

At the Tom Bracheen home just rorth of the highway in east Baird, which is occupied by Mr. Bracheen and the Paul Love!! family, water flooded the house standing about two feet deep in the house. The occdpants escaped with few clothes and farefooted.

#### To Save Life From Drowning

"No elaborate equipment is needed to save a life from d ing," is the opinion of State Health Department officials. "In fact, actual harm has been done by the misuse of so-called lung motors. Modern resuscitation apparatu has been perfected so that oxygen and carbon dioxide can be used without inflicting more damage to cases of asphyxiation and drowning. It is tragic enough to have a drowning accident, but it is far more tragic if no one present at the time knows how to save a life by artificial respiration.

The prompt application of artificial respiration is of primary importance and for this purpose the prone pressure method is the easiest, simplest and most effective. This should begin at once and continue rhythmically until natural breathing is established thns may take four of more hours.

First: Kneel, and straddle the patient below the hips placing hands on small of the back with fingeers over the lowest ribs, tips of fingers just out of sight. Second: with arms straight, while countig one, two, swing fidmly but not violently,

forward bearing weight on body Third: swing backward while and thus relieving pressure, this allows air to be drawn into lungs Fourth: Rest in this position for

two counts. r Fifth: Repeat these movements rhythmically, forward and back ward without interruption about twelve to fifteen a minuet, until natural breathing is restored.

Sixth: Meanwhile, if assistance is at hand, a physician should be sent for, the patients' tight clothing hould be loosened at neck, chest, waist and he should

be kept warm. The patient should not be moved until he is brreathing normallp and then should not be alliwed to get up but should be carried in a lying position to a where he can be kept warm and receive medical attention.


