Mr. Ross, county chairman in speaking of the annual campaign says that faced with a growing demand for Red Cross assistance of Europe's warning nations a need for strengthening its domestic operations, the Red Cross will embark on the greatest membership campaign since the World War on November, 11.

"The success of Roll Call this year will gauge the amount of assistance the American Red Cross can give the sick and injured of war and the comfort that can be brought to refugees and other non-combatants fleeing the danger zones, Mr. Ross said.

"At the same time, the Red Cross must be prepared to continue its battle against human suffering in this country," the local chairman said. "The Red Cross has been constantly increasing its volume of service during the past few years. Along the nation's highways, in the homes of the underprivileged in hospitals, military stations, schools and at the scene of disaster the Red Cross is facing a challenge for greater service."

"The 12-months period extending through June of this year, he pointed out, brought to this country the largest number of disasters in history. Tornadoses, floods, hurricanes, nine explosions and calamity in its various forms struck in 157 communities in 43 states. "In meeting the need for assistance from the disaster stricken areas," he said, "the Red Cross assisted 13,000 persons at a cost of \$2,276,109."

Nobody's Business

The firm belief that there will be no special session of the Texas legislature was virtually unanimous among political observers here, following the visit of Lieutenant Gov. Coke Stevenson, of Junction, and his statement to the press after the conference with Gov. O'Daniel. Stevenson told reporters that unless an agreement plan of taxation can be worked out in advance of a special session, it "would be a waste of time" to call the session.

Stevenson is a conservative in his legislative views, holding to much the same beliefs as the large interests which have been seeking ever since O'Daniel was inaugurated to write into fundamental law of the land. He represented a conservative constituency made up of a large ranch owners while owners in the House He believes in a sales tax, and in his strenuous runoff campaign against P. Brooks, the large interests of the state which have long sought to replace ad valorem state taxes with a sales tax, came loyally to Stevenson's aid. Gov. O'Daniel endorsed Stevenson, and the belief of many observers here is that the endorsement was a major factor in Stevenson's winning.

COKE'S POSITION CURIOUS

There is some disposition to wonder however, how the Lieutenant Gov. who is an able lawyer and a real authority on the Texas constitution can consistently advocate that the legislators abdicate themselves blindly in advance to a taxation bill proposed by the chief executive. Observers feel reasonably certain that a majority of neither house nor state will do so. The logical step then, for O'Daniel, is to announce this fact, declare he cannot get the legislators to agree, and refuse to call a special session. The political strategy of such a course is good. The vast majority of laymen do not understand the legal separation of the functions of the executive and the legislative branches. They do not know that the legislatures are supreme in matters of taxation, and that the constitution inhabits any such subservient course as 'Daniel requests, even if they made history this week when it ordered abolished interstate freight shipments the 15 percent differential now charged in certain West Texas territory and the Rio Grande

vally by the railroads. The roads imposed this extra charge years ago, on the theory that a higher rate was justified in a sparsely settled region. Population increases in the valley and West Texas have largely eliminated the excuse for the gouge, and the Commission ruled it could no longer be collected by the railroads.

MANN RIDES AGAIN

Jerry Mann, the triple-threat Attorney General, secured another large gain for the farmers of Texas, unless the courts later declare the play offside when he filed suit against eleven rice milling concerns, charging violation of the State's anti-trust laws. Mann accuses the rice miller of collusive buying and price fixing in their purchases of rice from ranging from a minimum of \$863,000 to a maximum of \$25,905,000, but did not seek cancellation of charters. His staff worked two months gathering evidence of the alleged conspiracy, Mann declared.

COTTON TAKES GAS POST

Sen. Clay Cotton of Palestine, announced he will accept appointment as chief of the utilities division of the Railroad Commission, tendered by Commission Lon Smith and Jerry Sadler, after they had summarily fired Olin Culberson, who has held the post since 1933. Sadler declared Culberson was discharged because he failed to file rate reduction suits against the United Gas System. Culberson cited the record to show that United had accepted rate reductions ordered by the Commission without litigation, and had settled many individual rate controversies with city councils. Cotton will resign from the Senate. The appointment pays \$5,000 a year, and will probably take Cotton out of the race against Judge Tom Beauchamp of the Court of Criminal Appeals, named last week by Gov. O'Daniel to fill out the unexpired term of Judge Morrow, who resigned. It is likely however, that Beauchamp will have other opponents, including Lloyd Davidson, state prosecutor before the highest criminal court.

F. F. A. News

The Ever prominent Baird F. F. A. Chapter, supervised by E. E. Jones, is progressing well on its year's program. This year the chapter is stressing the importance of good stock and the boys are working especially diligently to improve registered pigs in hopes of bringing good animals within reach of fellow chapter members. One energetic young Chapter member, James Burks, brought a registered Hampshire gilt last year from the Lillard farms. He now has fine blooded baby pigs for sale which will be ready for delivery in about five weeks. These pigs are above the average in that they average three pounds at birth and the average pig from a one year old sow, according to swine authority is 2.44 lbs.

Hampshire pigs are popular with feeders because they are a quick maturing type that reach 200 lbs. better in six months. They give a fast, cheaper gain and are ready for market in a short time than the blockier type of pig. Any one desiring one of these Hampshire hogs may contact James Burks.

Calves on feed are being weighed and a check on the daily gain is being made. One of the calves reported on this week is showing a gain of two and three fourths pounds per day while another is gaining one and two thirds lbs. a day. The latter calf has had Pulmonary Edema but is showing a marked improvement. The calves were put on feed August the thirtieth.

The Baird F. F. A. Chapter is doing a splendid work this year in several different fields. The sheep put on feed this month are expected to make excellent showings in the spring stock show and if the price remains anywhere near its present price the boys will pay for their animals in the wool market. Sheep as was shown last year, make an excellent project for the boys to carry out as they can require but little space which can be kept clean easily. They are especially good for town boys with little room. Last year the sheep projects proved very profitable and this year is even more promising.

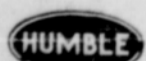

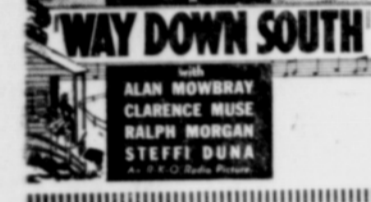
