## Former Putnam Resident Honored As "Senior Citizens of Month"

Following is an article which appeared in the Levelland newspaper last September 11, and was mailed to me by Margie Jones of Clyde. Those of you who remember Mrs. Viola Marshall Wood will be interested in the article. The newspaper will be at the Community Center for anyone interested in seeing her picture.

Mrs. Viola Wood, a tiny little red head who won't tell her age, and long time resident of Levelland and Hockley County, was selected to be the first "Senior Citizen of the Month" by the Senior Citizens Association.

Mrs. Wood, a native of Callahan County, located east of Abilene, lived at Putnam, Texas, with her parents on their ranch north of the townsite. She was the former Miss Viola Marshall.

She graduated from Putnam High School and attended Draughon's Business College in Abilene.

Viola helped her stepfather keep books on the ranch for as long as she could remember. She also had to milk ten to fifteen cows each morning before walking several miles to school. Viola said one of the fondest memories of her childhood was of her very own "little Spanish pony." "I would ride my little pony into the fields and have a lot of fun."

Viola worked in the Putnam bank for several months after graduation. She later worked for the A. Julian Garage in Putnam, making out payrolls for the employees.

Viola said this was how she met her husband, Marlin Lewis Wood, in 1926. "One day as I

was making out the payrolls, this great, big, blue-eyed Irishman walked in and said, 'Hi gal, how about a check?' I thought he was really big. Later we began dating."

In 1927, Wood moved to Pyote, Texas, on another job. He returned to Putnam on December 18, and they were married on December 20, 1927 in Putnam.

After their marriage, they returned to Pyote, where they managed a service station for about six months before moving back to Putnam.

While living in Putnam, the Wood's became the parents of their only child, a son, M. L., born on January 5, 1930. Viola said the weather was very cold the night M. L. was born. It was four below zero. Since Putnam didn't have a doctor, Mr.

Wood had to travel to Cisco to get one to deliver the baby.

They moved from Putnam to Cisco, then to Big Spring and Kermit, where Mr. Wood worked in the old fields driving a truck.

The family lived at Odessa about six months, moving there from Kermit, then to Sundown and on to Levelland in 1947.

Mr. Wood was employed by Paul Musslewhite as a truck driver. Viola said she and her husband would paint the trucks in the evening, getting them ready for the next day's run. That was a good time for Viola and her husband and son. Shortly after moving to Levelland they purchased a lot at 1065 10th Street, where Viola still makes her home. Mr. Wood died in 1962.

Viola collects pitchers and has many old and prized ones in her possession. She enjoys painting around the house and building fences. She also plays basketball with her grandchildren when they visit her. In addition to her four grandchildren, she has three great-grandchildren.

Viola is very active in the Senior Citizens organization, Senior Citizens Band, Chamber of Commerce and her church. Viola is a Friend to everyone. She is surely Senior Citizen of the Month and all year long.

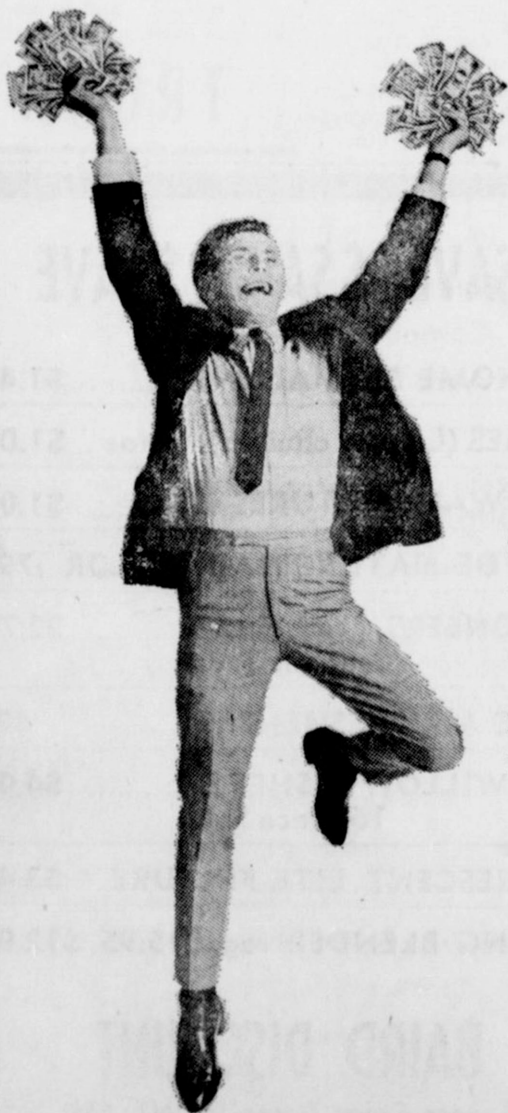

## BAIRD LOSES TIE GAME IN LAST SECONDS WITH LOBOES

BAIRD — The Bears held the Cisco Lobos to a 7-7 tie until seven seconds were left in the ball game, Friday night, and Cisco went over for 6 points to win the game 13-7. Both teams, undefeated for the year, were evenly matched for most of the game, with Baird having 12 first down, Cisco 11, and total offense for Cisco totalled 3 more yards than the Bears 230.

The Lobos scored in the 1st period with Kelly Kent going 41 yards, completing a 67 yard drive.

The Bears drove 85 yards with quarterback Jay Ringhoffer passing to Johnny Gonzales for 15 yards for Baird's touchdown, with two minutes to play in the game. Jimmy Meador kicked the point and tied the game 7-7.

The strong Baird line held the Lobos until the last seven seconds of the hard fought battle, but the Cisco team took the kickoff from its own 35 yard line and scored on a 45-yard pass from quarterback Powelson to Collins. The extra point failed and the score stood at 13-7.

The Bears will host the Santa Anna Mountaineers this Friday night, Sept. 28, at 8 p. m.

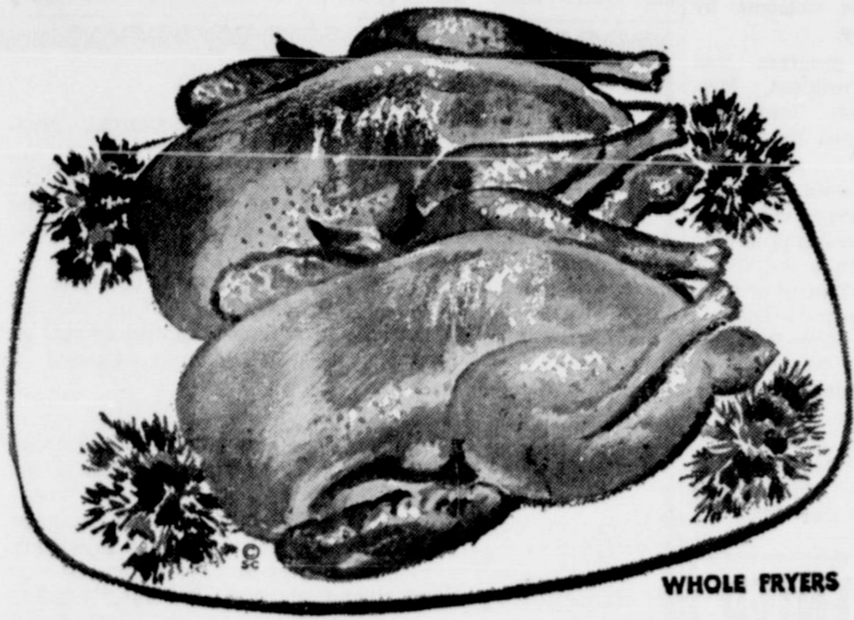
