TRUE OR FALSE?

Is sprinkling the baptism which the New Testament teaches?

The Bible word "baptize" means to dip, immerse, submerge. This is borne out in such passages as Rom. 6:4 where those who were "baptized into Christ" were said to be "buried with him by baptism unto death." Also, Col. 2:12. "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead."

When Philip baptized the Ethiopian "they both went down into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him." Acts 8:38. New Testament baptism required going down into the water and coming up out of the water, as it was a burial in water.

There is no instance of conversion recorded in the New Testament in which water was sprinkled on the candidate. The use of the word "baptize" to mean "sprinkle water upon" one did not originate in New Testament usage or practice. Such a practice was unknown before the second century, after all the apostles had died. It is evident, therefore, that no one can practice it by divine authority. "In vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Matt. 15:8.
