Until his retirement from A&M on Jan. 31, 1959, Dr. Mogford had been with A&M College since World War I. For 12 years he has done part time work for Northern Star, but since January of this year he has been employed full time.

Dr. Mogford spoke on the species of cotton grown over the world, and the cotton breeding program.

As I see it, every farm ought to have at least one cow, but changing cows is a serious un-

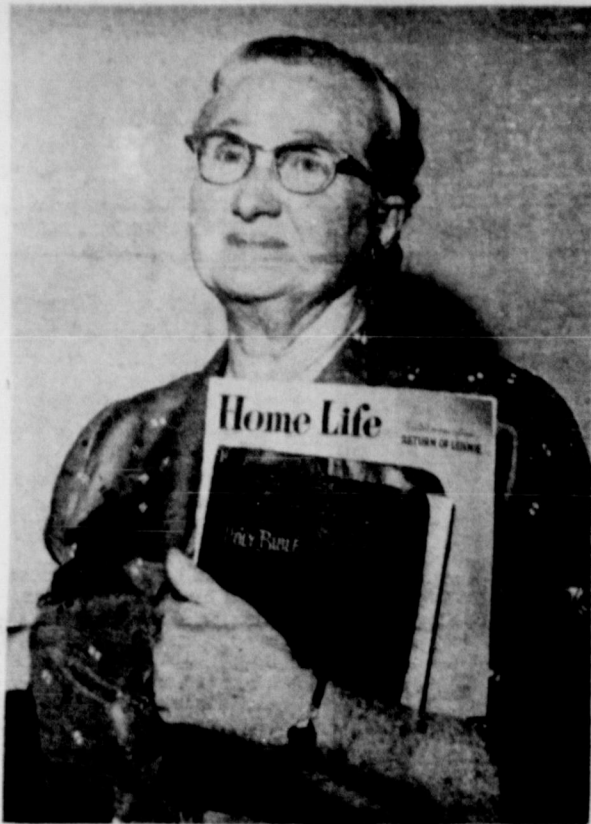
