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## Knox Joins Red Cross Blood Bank Program

On the night of August 16, at the Knox City Clinic in Knox City, a meeting was held which included representatives of the Regional Red Cross Blood Bank in Wichita Falls, members of the County Medical Society, the Administrator of the Knox County Hospital, and the County Chairman of the local Red Cross and the Treasurer of the local Red Cross, and area representatives from various communities of the County for Red Cross.

It was agreed among all those present, unanimously, that Knox County would participate in the regular Red Cross Blood Bank program centered in Wichita Falls.

An interesting film concerning blood donation was shown by Mr. George Clevinger, local Red Cross chairman of Wichita Falls.

The organization is now complete, being underwritten by the local Knox County Red Cross Chapter, the local County doctors, the hospital board and its administrator, and will be put into immediate effect.

The Red Cross blood-mobile will be in Knox City on Friday, September 15, for the first visit to obtain a portion of the 315 pints of blood that it is thought will be required for the annual community needs of Knox County.

The blood-mobile will visit Munday and Rhineland at a later date. Full advance publicity will be provided for these blood-mobile visits.

It was decided that Rhineland being nearer the center of the County, and having excellent facilities for a place to draw the blood, it would be ideal to draw donors from the communities of Gilliland, Vera, Benjamin and Truscott, in addition to the

Wheat Vote Is Today: Farmers Urged To Attend

Wheat producers eligible to vote in the 1962 wheat marketing quota referendum to be held August 24 may cast their ballots at any one of 9 polling places in Knox County, according to Gaylon C. Scott, chairman, County Agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum are those who produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in any one of the years '59, '60, or '61. Producers who signed applications under the feed wheat provisions permitting them to grow wheat for feed use only on their farms for 1961 will not be eligible to vote.

The results of the referendum will determine the kind of wheat program that will be in effect for next year's crop. For this reason, every wheat producer should make his wishes known by casting his ballot at his local polling place, the chairman said.

Today, Thursday, August 24, is election day! Knox City voters will cast their vote at the American Legion Hall any time between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Jacobs Rites Held At Truscott

Funeral services for William Don Jacobs who died suddenly of a heart attack Sunday, were held at Truscott at 4 p.m. Monday. Rev. John Evans of Heavener, Ark., officiated.

Burial was in the Vera Cemetery.

He was born Feb. 20, 1902, at Malino, Texas, in Milam County. He moved to Knox County in 1921. For the past 11 years, he has been an employee of Knox County Precinct No. 3 and has resided in Truscott.

He married Miss Mable Franklin of Vera Nov. 27, 1935. In 1951 he became a member of the First Baptist Church in Truscott.

Survivors include his wife; four children, Malcolm Don Jacobs of Benjamin, Gordon Lee Jacobs, Jannette Jacobs, and Janet Sue Jacobs of Truscott; one grandson; two brothers, Guy Jacobs of Plainview, and Cecil Jacobs of Brownsville; three sisters, Mrs. Flossie Warren of Hillsboro, Mrs. Eunice Locke, Hale Center, and Mrs. Clarence Neighbors of Garland.

Mr. Tom West, Chairman of the Knox County Red Cross Chapter, appointed Dr. D. C. Eiland as Chairman of the blood program in Knox County. Dr. Eiland states that he will be appointing co-chairmen and many assistants.

It was explained at the meeting by Mr. Clevinger that any one could give blood for his aunt or grandmother anywhere in the United States, Canada, Alaska or Hawaii, without having to leave his own community.

It was also explained that certain important blood derivatives are developed after the blood grows out of date for normal human transfusions, and that these derivatives would be furnished by the Red Cross free to the community. These blood products include such things as gamma globulin for liver disease and measles, frozen plasma for hemophilia, and fibrolysin which is useful and in fact a life saving measure for women who suffer premature separation of the after-birth before their babies are born. Also developed would be serum albumin which would be furnished at the cost of \$10. per 100cc. Going retail price for the drug trade on this product is \$65. for 100cc.

The hospital will have to pay \$5.00 per pint of blood to help defray the cost of the blood-mobile and the shipping of blood to us, by bus, or by airplane, depending on our needs.

The present cost of getting a pint of blood drawn and into the refrigerator is about \$10., so this will mean a saving to the patient of at least \$5.00.

In return for this service the Red Cross has asked our County to raise, at its next annual drive, an additional \$500. over its usual quota. It was agreed at the meeting that this was a small price to pay for the services

offered. Also, it was felt by all those present at the meeting that since we might very well have a national emergency at any time, to have a local supply of blood available might well be of vital importance.

The extreme importance of the program is in the fact that there will always be blood available at the hospital or available on call from the Wichita Falls bank, without the necessity of obtaining donors in the middle of the night or at other times, as has been the case in the past. Also, it will relieve the family of the patient of the embarrassment of going out and asking for blood.

Those present at the meeting were enthusiastic about these features of the program, and it is hoped that it will carry on in the various communities of the County, and that there will be no problem in getting sufficient donors and sufficient funds to underwrite it.

An agreement was made between Mr. L. W. Graham, County Red Cross Treasurer, and Mr. Clevinger, that it would not be necessary for us to raise any funds until our regular annual drive in the Spring.

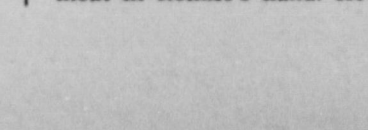

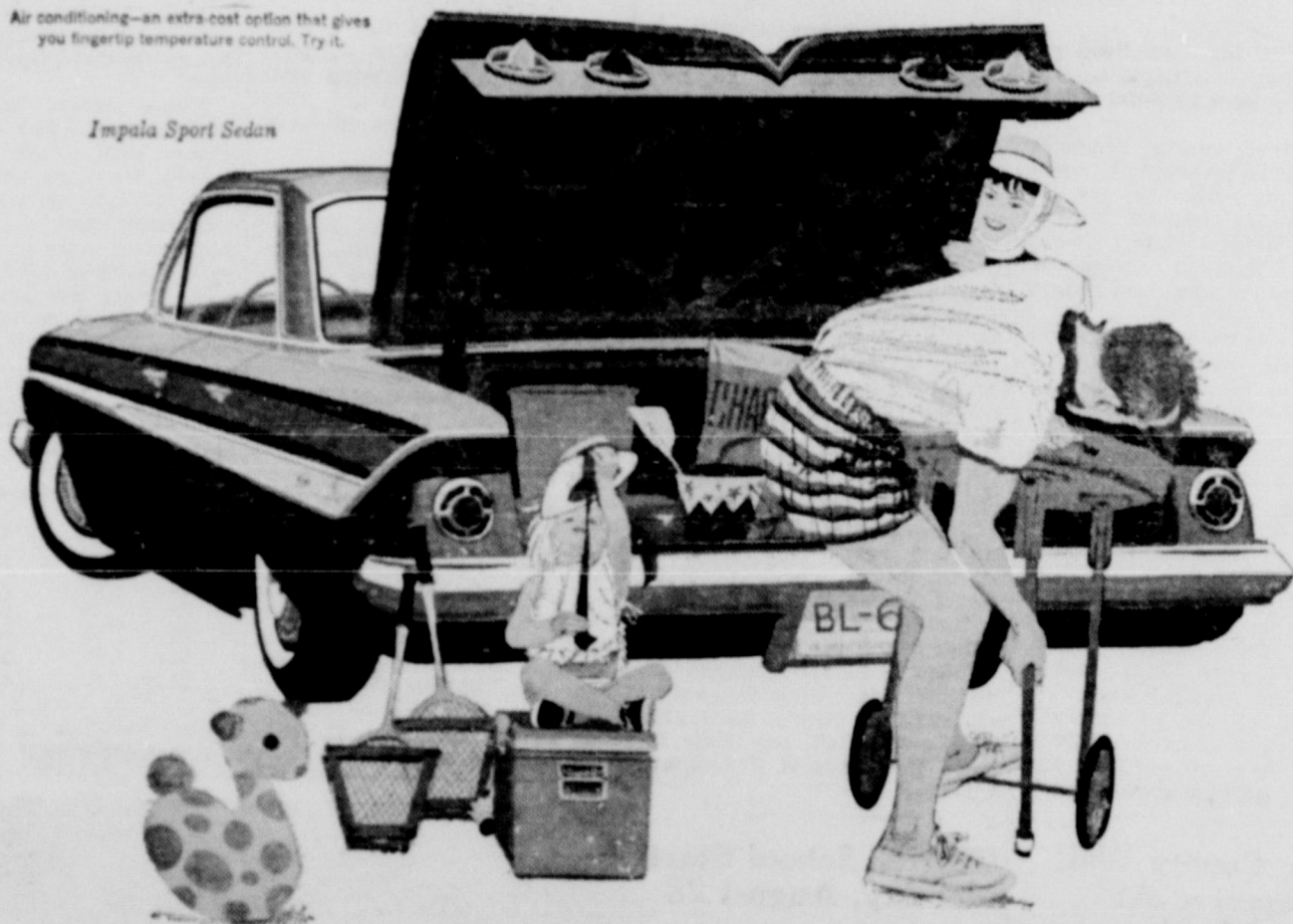

min 4-H club. The group attended the program which had sessions in the morning on electric brooding and protective equipment.

The afternoon was divided and the girls had classes on inside lighting and electric appliances while the boys learned about farmstead lighting and care of electric meters. The program was sponsored by the West Texas Utilities Co.

**Soil Samples—**

About this time each year, many of the farmers in the area begin to think about the planting of fall crops and some take a soil sample in the preparation for planting fall crops. The past several years when there has been favorable moisture condition, the use of fertilizers has shown to be of great benefit. In the drier years, there has not been such a remarkable difference in the fertilized and non-fertilized fields. Naturally, it is hard to tell at this time if we will have a favorable fall winter and spring for the small grains; however, in most cases there is a good "season" in the soil now. Research has shown us that to produce 35 bu. of wheat, we need 42 lbs. of nitrogen, 20 lbs. of phosphorus and 11 lbs. of potassium available for the plant to remove. Most of our soils do not need potassium; however,

most are short in nitrogen and phosphorus. Soil sampling information can be obtained from the county agent's office or the First National Bank in Munday has available soil sample information sheets and a supply of soil sample bags. Soil samples may be sent to any of the soil testing labs in the state; however, the lab at Seymour is the closest. Last September, the fee on samples was raised to \$2.00.

**Gas Tax Refund—**

Farmers and ranchers that wish to apply for refund of Federal tax paid on gasoline used on a farm can now do so and have until Oct. 2 to file the claim. Forms are now available in the county agent's office and can be obtained by coming by and picking one up or by writing and asking for the forms. This will include gasoline purchased before July 1, 1961, which you used on a farm after June 30, 1960, and before July 1, 1961, for farming purposes. This also includes gasoline used by other persons on your farm in cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity. Do not in-

clude gasoline used (1) on the highway, (2) in processing, packaging, freezing, or canning operations; or (3) for personal or non farming purposes. Any person should remember that upon request from the District Director, they must be able to support the amount of refund claimed. The law also provides criminal penalties for filing false or fraudulent claims.

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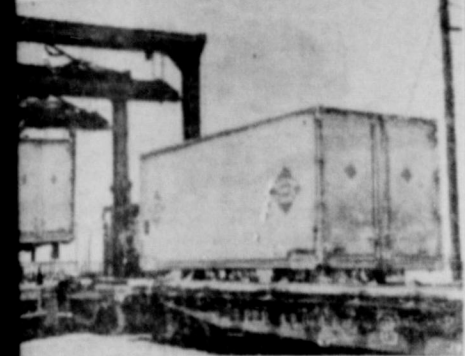

**AUSTIN, Tex.** — Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation.

To the central collection for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer, the cost is unknown, but educated guesses already are being made.

James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions, the general sales tax will be two per cent on purchases of 25 cents or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man—and woman — on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances.

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They increased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They made a bookkeeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

In addition, the Legislature previously had passed a tax on private clubs, calculated to raise some \$4,000,000.

Roughly, it is figured that all these things will cover the state's needs for the next two-year period and provide for a school teachers' pay raise of \$810 per year.

**ESCHEAT BILL OMIT'S BANKS** — Gov. Price Daniel won a partial victory in his long fight to tighten the state's escheat law. It's the law under which abandoned cash and property held by private business and industry is supposed to revert to the state.

After several attempts the Legislature passed a bill requiring institutions holding such

property to report it to the state. Banks, however, were exempt from the provisions of the bill, much to the dismay of Governor Daniel.

"With everyone else covered," he said, "the banks cannot hold out much longer. The enforcement procedures should include banks and I shall continue to fight for this, both as a principle and as a means for the state to obtain property it already owns under the present escheat law."

**PROBLEM AT GATESVILLE** — Recent breaks at the Gatesville School for Boys, and the death of an attendant beaten with a baseball bat, have focused attention on that institution which is without walls or barricades of any kind.

A delegation of attendants came to Austin, talked with Governor Daniel and complained that measures which they are allowed to take are too indefinite.

They said no attendant is allowed to "discipline" inmates of the school. Sometimes the boys will mind and sometimes they will not.

Dr. James A. (Jack) Turman, Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council, told the men that changes were being made which would help. A maximum security unit is being built, a trade school is under contract, and a double maximum fence is in the works for the first offenders.

One request asks a study of the adequacy of the present cattle brand inspection laws. It was pointed out that Texas, unlike other western states, has no statewide brand registration system, relying on county by county registration which permits duplication of brands.

TLC also has asked to look into the problem of job discrimination because of age; problems of urban mass transportation; and the feasibility of using state parks as evacuation centers in the event of enemy attack.

**HOUSE STREAMLINES** — The House of Representatives has voted to do away with more than a third of its committees in order to streamline its operations. House's 43 committees will be reduced in the 1963 session to 28 by combining several groups.

Seniority would determine the membership of one fourth of each committee.

**TEXAS BUSINESS GOOD** — Business activity in Texas dropped three per cent in June, from an all-time high in May, reports the UT Bureau of Business Research. But it still was seven per cent above the level of one year ago.

June activity also was the second highest for any month since the bureau began computing in 1935.

Prospects are fine for good

business conditions to extend well into 1962. This partially as a result of the expanded arms program, resulting from the Berlin situation.

However, the agency said there is a possibility of inflation plaguing the economy again.

**STATE GUARD STRENGTH REPORTED** — With the possibility of calling up the National Guard for active duty, Adjutant General James E. Taylor has been furnished a report on the active strength of the Texas State Guard—1,504 officers and enlisted men in active reserve units, and 218 officers in the ready reserve unassigned.

Corps has a total authorized strength of 10,000 when mobilized to full table of organization. All officers and men in this service serve without compensation and provide their own uniforms. The State Guard is subject to being called by the Governor for internal security service.

**INSURANCE BOARD MEMBER RESIGNS** — Dr. Robert W. Strain has resigned as a member of the State Board of Insurance. He is to become executive secretary of the National Association of Insurance Agents.

With 100,000 members it is one of the largest trade organizations in the country.

Governor Daniel said of Dr. Strain's work on the board: "Dr. Strain's term on the board has been marked by fine progress in the administration of the insurance laws, and has made lasting contributions to the State of Texas in this field. He has served with distinction and great ability in a highly important position."

Strain joined the board in March of 1958. Formerly he was an associate professor of insurance at the University of Texas.

**COLLEGIANS URGED TO STAY WITH IT** — Colonel Morris Schwartz, State Director of Selective Service, has advised

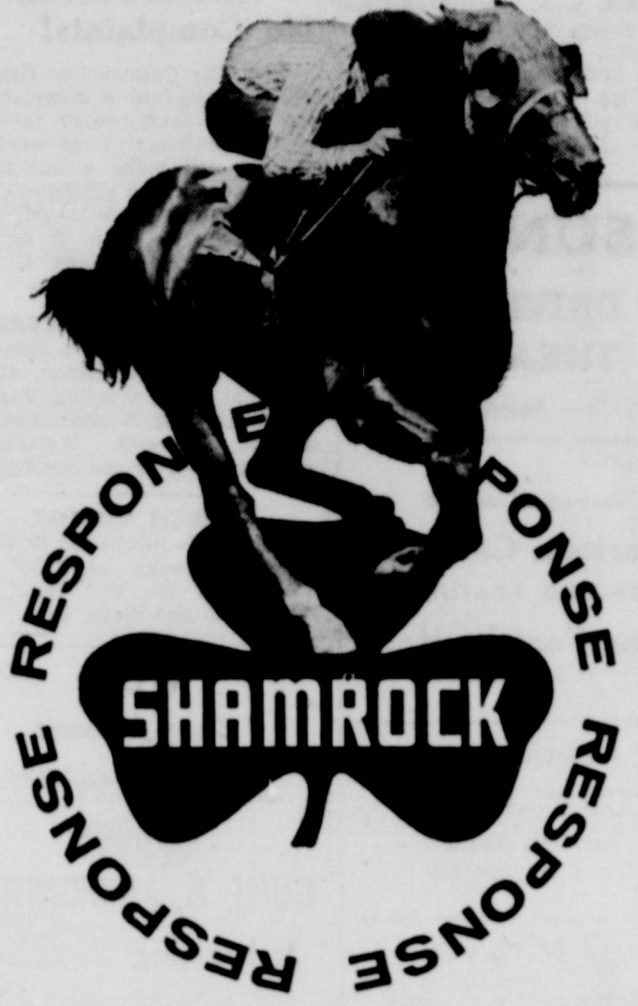
college students to stay with their studies and not be disturbed by increased draft calls.

He predicted no change in the present policy of not drafting anyone under the age of 22, "at least in the foreseeable future," and said college students will be considered for scholastic deferment and likely will be deferred if they are full-time students making passing grades.

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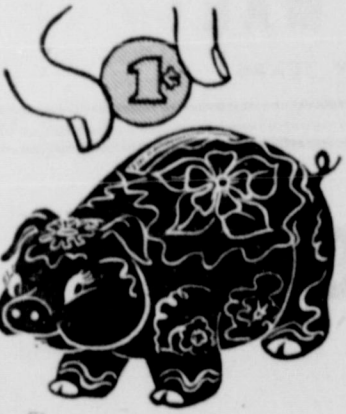

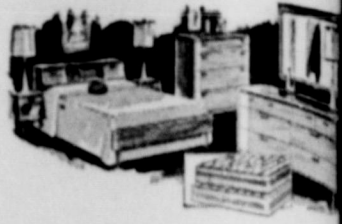
