## Farmers-Ranchers Face Financial Disaster if Export Controls Imposed

BAIRD — The president of Callahan - Shackelford County Farm Bureau, Dale Wilson of Baird, said today that if controls are imposed on agricultural exports, the results will be financial disaster for many farmers.

He made the comment in reference to legislation currently pending in Congress that would impose export restrictions.

The U. S. House of Representatives passed a bill (H. R. 8547) on Sept. 6th to increase the President's authority to control exports of materials and agricultural commodities. The U. S. Senate is holding hearings on similar bills (S. 2053 and S. 2411).

BAIRD — The Fourth Grade has begun a new learning experience — Outdoor Education. The 4th grade are currently using the school ground, as well as the City Park as an outdoor classroom.

Does this seem strange? Not of you think about it. Man's learning began in the out-of-doors and this type of education has never ceased. The trend in recent years has been to study science, botany, and nature from books in the classroom.

The learning area located on the school grounds, will include a miniature weather station, a garden plot to study how new plants grow, a sun dial, and soil profiles. The nature trail will consist of the major types of vegetation found in the area, their growth habits and uses.

Mrs. Vestal said that Outdoor Classroom is not limited only to science studies, but can be used with other studies, such as art.

Ethetton said he had never seen a more enthused bunch of students or teacher than Mrs. Vestal's Fourth Grade class and their Outdoor Classroom.

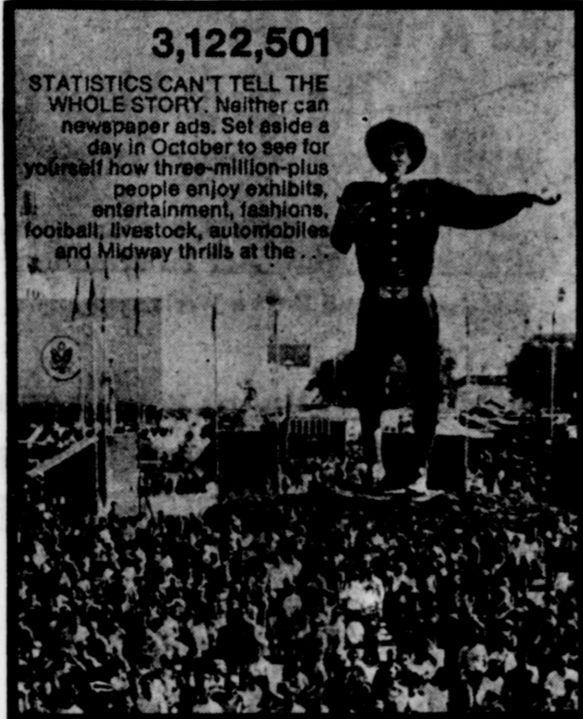

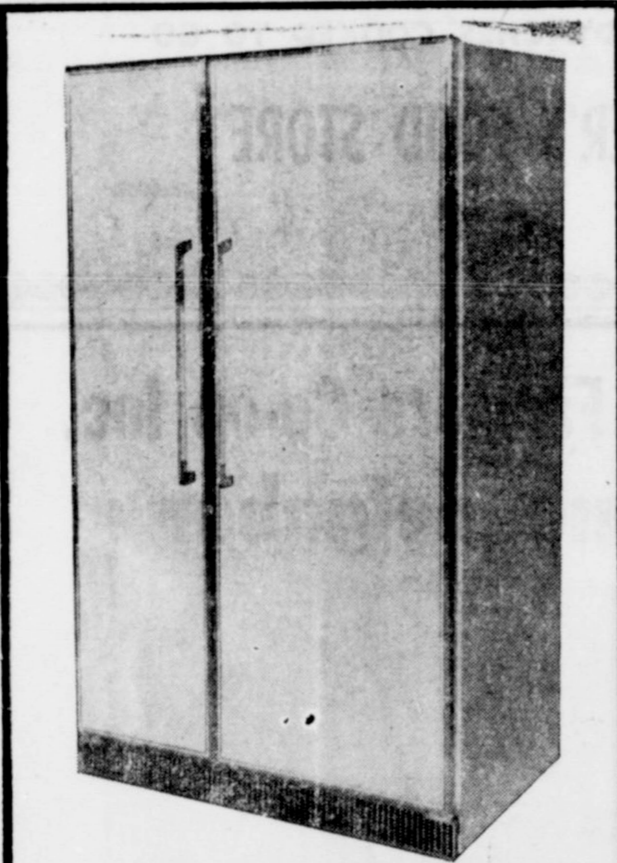
