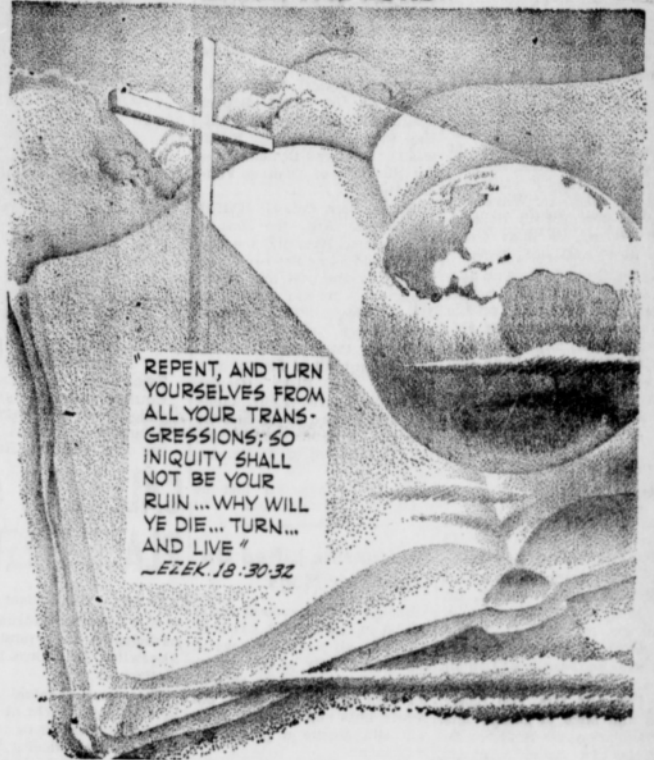
His ship was decommissioned in November 1969 for a complete modernization of electronics and weapons systems.

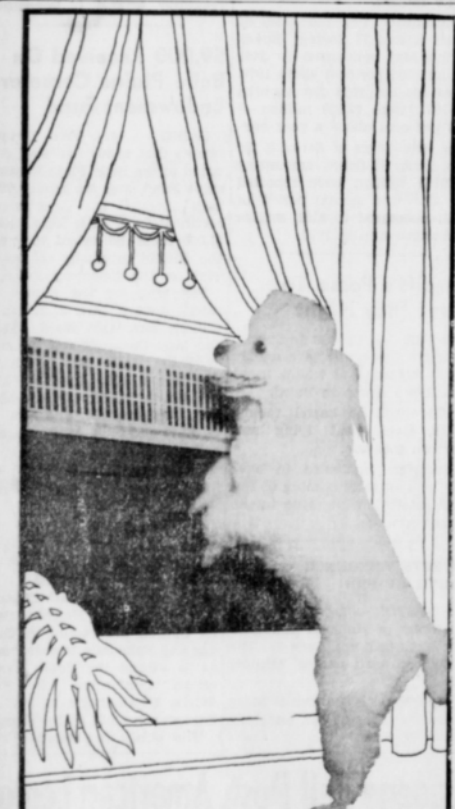

CHRISTIANITY ABUSED

(Continued)

Using the Scriptures as our authority, we now consider some of the essentials of Christianity. What is it that makes a man a Christian?

We read in Acts 11:26, "And the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch." From this we see that one of the essentials of Christianity is being a disciple of Christ. A disciple is one who follows someone's teachings (Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon p. 386). So, a disciple of Christ is one who follows Christ's teachings. Since a Christian is a disciple of Christ, it follows that a Christian is one who follows Christ's teachings. If one fails to follow Christ, he fails to be a Christian. Therefore, we conclude that one of the essentials of Christianity is following Christ's teachings.

People call so many things "Christian" that have no basis in the teachings of Christ. This is how the abuse of the term arises.

For instance, we hear people speak of "the Christian denominations." This is to infer that the teachings of Christ endorse the idea of believers being divided up into various religious denominations. Such an idea could not be further from the truth. See Christ's prayer in John 17:20,21. If this is contrary to the teachings of Christ, it cannot be "Christian." If it is not "Christian," how can one who calls himself a "Christian" endorse such organizations, or be a member of such an organization?

Can one become a Christian by accepting only a part of the teachings of Christ, while rejecting part of them? Is it not essential that one take it all?

"Before The Emergency" Film Shown to Baird-Clyde Residents

BAIRD — The saving of lives was the subject of a program presented by the Texas State Department of Health to the Baird and Clyde Lions Clubs, Fire Departments, and Callahan County Hospital staff in Baird. C. E. Walter, Field Consultant of the Health Department's Civil Defense and Traffic Safety Division, introduced a film, "Before the Emergency," dealing with the functioning of emergency medical services.

More effective and efficient emergency medical services and ways to bring these about were cited. Among these were (1) the formation of an advisory council on the community level to evaluate the local situation, formulate plans for improvement, and develop workable solutions; (2) providing for the best possible equipment for ambulances, rescue units and emergency

rooms; (3) development of better co-ordination among all phases of emergency care; (4) establishment of radio communication between emergency facilities, including ambulances; (5) training for all personnel involved in emergency care; and (6) development of a program of practice and rehearsal to keep everyone aware of his duties and responsibilities.

Dr. Robert Kennedy, New York physician and prominent authority on emergency care, says, "It is reasonable to assume that 20,000 victims of auto and other accidents die needlessly every year because of deficiencies in our emergency services."

The Ambulance Association of America estimates that 25,000 cases of permanent disability are caused by inadequately trained ambulance and rescue crews.

AUSTIN — Texas 1972 political campaigns jumped off to an early start last week amid earthquake-proportioned new rumblings in the long-running Securities and Exchange Commission stock manipulation case.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced he will run for governor, and called "loss of faith and confidence in state government" the No. 1 political issue.

Barnes termed the shadows cast by SEC's inquiry into stock trading of state officials one of the reasons for lost confidence by the public.

"I visualize the role of the governor as a much more aggressive role than it has been in the past," he said. Barnes, who is 33, added "a young governor with progressive ideas would be an asset" to Texas.

Barnes said he would aim to make the state Democratic party "an energetic force for sound government, not just a political tool to be used briefly every two years and then discarded. I want Texas to be strong in national affairs."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, recovered from a March heart attack, announced he will file as a candidate for a fourth term.

"In the light of the scandals that have rocked our state government this spring - and the resulting investigation which my office has begun at the request of the Legislature - I feel it a question of duty to Texans to make the race," said Martin.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde reportedly retains interest in the governor's race.

Gov. Preston Smith still hints he may run again, brands federal handling of the stock case "political harassment."

OIL ALLOWABLE CUT — Statewide oil production allowable for July has been slashed 260,815 barrels a day from June.

New allowable was set by the Railroad Commission at 68.7 per cent of potential or a decrease of 6.7 per cent. Reduction is the third straight.

Market demand factor for the coming month is the lowest since 62.9 per cent allowable was set during part of August, 1970.

Maximum production is estimated at 3,367 barrels daily, but actual production will be closer to 3,273,750 barrels - slightly more than major buyers requested.

Eight of 14 major crude purchasers asked the same allowable for July, four sought less and two requested more.

Crude oil stocks were estimated at 108.4 million barrels, an increase of 1.1 million over the 1970 period.

CRIME FIGHT FUNDS APPROVED — Nearly \$4 million in grants to aid criminal justice projects received Criminal Justice Council Approval.

CJC will fund \$2.5 million from federal aid money, with local governments contributing another \$1.5 million.

Houston - Gulf Coast Building Trades Council got the biggest state grant of \$191,806 for New Waverly delinquency prevention program.

Other grants went to Texarkana Ark-Tex Council of Governments; East Texas COG, Kilgore; Alamo Area COG, San Antonio; Wichita County; McLennan County; Texas County; Austin-Travis County; Harris County Mental Health - Mental Retardation Center; Central Tex COG, Belton; Grayson County; Lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council, McAllen.

Edinburg; Waco Police Department; Fort Worth; Travis County juvenile defender project; Eagle Pass; Lubbock County; City of Dallas; El Paso; Cleveland; regional law enforcement radio communications system; Coastal Bend Regional Planning Commission; Texoma RPC; Heart of Texas COG; Alidine and Midland Independent School Districts.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court upheld a Tyler court ver-

dict awarding \$5,000 accidental death policy recovery to a widow whose husband was shot to death allegedly after committing adultery with the wife of another man.

High Court set July 14 arguments in a Dallas woman's damage suit claiming negligence by a private plane pilot in an accident which killed her husband four years ago.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the life sentence in a Beaumont rape case.

Austin Court of Civil Appeals reversed a Houston trial court and upheld State Board of Examiners of Psychologists' decision denying Houstonian Joseph D. Farrar a license to practice psychology because his master's degree was not primarily psychological but educational.

AG OPINIONS — Minors can be tried for liquor law violations without notification to parents if court is unable to locate parents or guardians, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has said.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

A trial judge has discretion to grant probation when satisfied the best interests of the public and the defendant will be served, and the defendant is not under burden to show eligibility, though the judge may require appropriate proof.

Board of Private Detectives, Private Investigators, Private Patrolmen, Private Guards and Managers has discretion to decide whether or not license of those within its jurisdiction will be denied because of a conviction for felony.

Whether Park and Wildlife Department executive can retire as a "commissioned peace officer" is a fact question to be determined by PWD on the basis of whether he was engaged primarily in criminal law enforcement activities of the department during 10 years.

APPOINTMENTS — Raymond Vowell of Austin will succeed Burton G. Hackney as Texas Public Welfare Commissioner.

Governor Smith named W. A. Hughes of Decatur 235th district judge, Harry Hopkins of Weatherford 43rd district judge, and William B. Sullivant of Gainesville 235th district attorney.

Smith appointed Hugh O. Wolfe of Stephenville to North Texas State University Board of Regents.

LAND SALE SET — School Land Board will offer 594,132 acres of land in 869 tracts for July 6 lease sale.

For the first time, said Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, the Land Board has coordinated environmental planning with the Parks and Wildlife Department on all tracts and inlets included.

PWD reviewed tracts in lease and reported any possible hazard to the environment if drilling is permitted. Proposed restrictions will be considered by the Land Board.

Other tracts included are submerged lands in the Gulf of Mexico cancelled from the May sale list due to U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' halting drilling on such tracts temporarily. Submerged land acreage is the largest offered for lease since June, 1965, when the state received more than \$17 million for sale of leases.

CONVICTION "TAX" LEVIED — Cost of moving traffic violations and other convictions will go up under a bill signed into law and designed to provide funds for projects to improve the criminal justice system.

In addition to other taxable court costs, \$2.50 will be charged in each misdemeanor conviction in justice of the peace or municipal court. County misdemeanor convictions will be charged an additional \$5.00 in court costs, and felony convictions \$10.00.

SHORT SNORTS — Texas' first bale of 1971 cotton was produced on the Crispin Game farm near Pharr in the Rio Grande Valley.

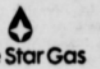

AREA MAIL PROCESSING TO BEGIN IN ABILENE JULY 6

ABILENE — The newest innovation of the United States Postal Service - area mail processing - is to be installed at the Abilene Post Office and Sectional Center Facility July 6th.

Announcement of this new mail plan was made by Postmaster, Clyde E. Grant.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Abilene's modern and recently mechanized post office," Mr. Grant said.

The Abilene Post Office, under Grant, is a Sectional Center Facility which, under the new Area Mail Process program, will process the mail for 17 smaller associate post offices in the Abilene area.

The Abilene Post Office has an electronic cancelling machine equipped with an edger-stacking machine capable of facing and cancelling a total of 30,000 letters per hour.

The Abilene Post Office is being considered for a letter sorting machine which would be installed when determination is made that such an investment would be profitable, Mr. Grant explained.

Area Mail Processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center Facility area, including the associate offices of the Sectional Center, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

Outgoing mail originating from all selected First Class associate offices of the Abilene Sectional Center will be collected

in the respective offices. From there the mail will be dispatched directly to the Sectional Center for culling, facing, cancelling, and distribution preparatory to dispatch, Grant explained. The five First Class Associate Offices in the program are Colorado City, Haskell, Snyder, Stamford and Sweetwater. They will use their local postmark to cancel mail deposited in collection boxes marked "Local."

Anson, Baird, Clyde, Coahoma, Hamlin, Knox City, Merkel, Roscoe, Roby, Rotan, Rule and Winters are the Second Class Post Offices in the plan and will postmark both Local and Out of Town mail.

All 17 of the post offices will retain the mail addressed for their offices. The other mail will be forwarded to Abilene.

Use of the name of these towns in the address and not the word "city" will be crucial for successful mail delivery under the new mail plan, Grant said. Any local mail from any of the 17 offices that is designated "City" and forwarded to Abilene will be returned to the sender, or to the Dead Letter Office, if no return address is on the envelope.

The Abilene Sectional Center Area postmark will read, U. S. Postal Service TX 796, along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Abilene and each individual associate office will not be changed. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

It was emphasized by Mr. Grant that no office will lose its local postmark whatsoever.
