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Historical Pictures To Again Be Interesting Exhibits Of Festival

Mrs. John C. Spann, general chairman of the historical pictures division of the Knox County Vegetable Festival, together with her co-chairman, Mrs. Jean Leflar, are busy with their area chairmen in their efforts to make this division another outstanding contribution to this year's festival.

Mrs. Spann states that more than 2,000 visitors from seven states and one foreign country (Switzerland) registered in this department last year.

An interesting feature this year will be to have the oldest living person who was born in Knox County as a guest of honor. Efforts are now under way to locate this person, and other oldtimers will be given an opportunity to recall memorable occasions with him or her during the two-day event.

A "Memorial Section," devoted to pictures of early day pioneers who were instrumental in developing Knox County is also planned. Mrs. Spann states that every effort will be made to take the best of care of pictures of this type and to see that they are returned to their owners:

"We already have pictures of prominent businessmen of Munday who appeared in 'The Womanless Wedding,' which dates back many years. We also have a copy of the first issue of the Knox County Herald.

Also in the collection will be a picture of Munday's first schoolhouse, which was located east of the present townsite.

An original copy of the prospectus prepared by the Munday Chamber of Commerce in 1923 in an attempt to get the Texas Technological College located at Munday will be on display.

Items such as historical pap-

ers, news clippings, documents, records and early day annuals are of importance to the committee in selecting materials.

Street Repair Nears Completion

According to Mayor Buddy Angle, the repair of the city streets is nearing completion after top-coating 22 city blocks.

In a recent city council meeting, repair of the streets was voted on and approved. The city plans to repair about the same number of blocks each year and keep the streets in better condition. Streets in most need of repair were chosen first.

The snow and hard freezing experienced in January of this year did major damage to the top coat of the paving. According to several contractors, the base coat of the streets is still in good condition, and provided the repairs are made in time, the top coat will be sufficient.

The D&L Construction Co., of Aspermont did the contract work at a cost of \$5800.00.

★ First Historical Marker To Be Dedicated Sunday

The Official Texas Historical Marker for 'The Narrows' will be dedicated on June 5, at 3 p.m. at the site six miles east of Benjamin, on Highway 82. The cast aluminum marker is of Swedish material for durability and appearance. It measures 18 by 28 inches and is mounted on a concrete base.

The public is invited to attend the ceremonies. Mr. Edward L. Kirk of Abilene will be the speaker. He is a former resident of Knox Co.

This is the first official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Knox County under the R A M P S program. Two others will be erected soon.

Mr. Truett Latimer, executive director of The Texas Historical Survey Committee says, "Texas has just begun to recognize many of the wonderful events of historical interest and the future will be full of excitement and discovery if we continue our program outlined by The Texas Historical Foundation.

Numerous arrowheads have been found on the hill-top of "The Narrows". Several tribes of Indians crossed the area and no doubt passed signals to other tribes as far away as 'Buzzard's Peak' in King County and 'Kiowa Peak' in Stonewall County. This marker and others will appear in official tourists guides to help stimulate tourist trade and historical appreciation as well as acquaint the citizens of the county with their own historical heritage.

The inscription on the marker reads as follows: "The Narrows" — This crest separates the drainage basins of the Wichita River, whose waters flow into the Mississippi, and the Brazos River, which winds through Texas to the Gulf of Mexico.

Known as good hunting grounds because of buffalo grass, fresh springs and herds of mustangs from which to get mounts, the narrows were crossed by the Comanche, Wichita, Kiowa, Apache, Seminole and Tonkawa Indians. Evidence of battles and camps are still being found. Later, settlers used the well-worn paths. Today its canyons and ravines are used for ranching.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Wern Sanford

AUSTIN — That mammoth Texas Water Plan was laid out Monday by Gov. John Connally and the staff of the Texas Water Development Board at a special meeting with members of the Legislature.

It shows how Texans can save and improve their water supplies to meet the needs of the 20,000,000 Texans expected by the year 2020.

This plan has been called the most comprehensive and far-reaching yet undertaken by a state. It calls for 34 more reservoirs, for \$1,500,000,000 worth of waste treatment facilities in the 22 major metropolitan areas alone to clean up waste water,

and a \$1,500,000,000 system of pipelines and canals to move surplus water from the Red River Basin in Northeast Texas.

This transfer can only be described as fabulous. First the surplus water from the Trinity River Basin at a point below Waco, some of it would be moved to the Brazos River to bolster its flow. Near Eagle Lake, some would be moved to the Colorado River to meet downstream irrigation and industrial needs.

Finally, water would be moved into a canal from the Colorado down the Gulf Coast to the Lower Rio Grande Valley region, to provide irrigation and industrial water for the South Texas region.

By supplementing the flows of the Trinity, Brazos, Colorado and Nueces Rivers near their mouths, the plan would make possible the building of water in the upstream regions of the Brazos and Colorado Basins to serve needs of that West Texas area.

Tightly put together, the plan released Monday is but a summary of the conclusions proposed by the Development Board's staff. Hearings will be held in 27 cities to get other ideas and suggestions, or criticisms. Series of hearings will begin in June 17 with the presentation of the West Texas portion of the plan at Lubbock. Then the Board's staff will begin river basin hearings on June 20 at Longview.

When the series is completed in August, the Development Board will adopt the final version of the plan. It will become a flexible guide by which the cities, river authorities, water districts, and state and federal agencies will develop the resources of Texas streams.

Before any project actually can be undertaken, its individual feasibility and a method of financing must be shown to the Texas Water Rights Commission, which will approve and grant permits for each project.

COURTS SPEAK—State Court three its weight behind the decision that once submerged lands (and state) rising from the floor of Laguna Madre in Cameron County are not vacant and unsurveyed public school property subject to sale or lease on application. Ruling, affirming lower courts, upheld position of Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler in refusing to accept application to purchase a tract 15 miles northwest of Brownsville.

Third Court of Appeals sustained transfer of two small sections of land from Friendship Rural High School District to Shallowater Independent School District of Lubbock County.

Some Court said the Pennsylvania Insurance Company cannot get refund of \$311,389 in gross premium taxes paid under protest for a firm acquired in merger.

Third Court of Civil Appeals directed Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst to reconsider his denial of a charter to Northwest Savings Association of Houston.

TEXAS DEFENSE SPENDING UP — State's share of defense contract spending is increasing. Defense contract work for first three quarters of present fiscal year is up to \$2,500,000,000 or 7.3 per cent of national total. This compares with \$1,000,000,000 and 7.3 per cent of U. S. total for same period in fiscal 1962.

Texas bases cleared for construction work by Senate were Fort Bliss, \$4,000,000; Fort Hood, \$1,000,000; Bergstrom Air Force Base, \$4,400,000; Cactuswell AFB, \$1,200,000; Kelly AFB, \$450,000; Laredo AFB, \$220,000; Laughlin AFB, \$775,000; Randolph AFB, \$220,000; Sheppard AFB, \$1,000,000; Patten AFB, \$61,000; Reese AFB, \$500,000; Webb AFB, \$220,000; and Naval Auxiliary Station Chase Field, \$60,000.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULING — Fees of \$2 should be taxed against drivers arrested and convicted for misdemeanor traffic offenses, and court costs should be added in peace bond proceedings. Acty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that:

- Old iron fence which once surrounded capital ground, and now in storage, can be used at governor's mansion without conflicting with state law.
- University of Houston construction projects are not regulated by Houston, LaMarque or Clear Lake City building ordinances.
- Texas Education Foundation, Inc., engaged in the operation of the Gary Job Corps

Training Center, is not exempt from the payment of taxes imposed on the use of motor fuel.

LAST PREMIUM COLLECTED — Texas 45 Health Insurance Association has collected its last premium.

Association, authorized by 45 Texas Legislature to offer health insurance coverage to all Texans past 45, will be replaced on July 1, by Medicare.

Participants in the program were notified in January that all coverages would cease on July 1. However, Texas 45 would remain in operation past that date to process claims incurred before Medicare.

UNLINED PITS BANNED — Use of unlined disposal pits for oil field brine was banned by the Texas Railroad Commission in 13 West Texas counties over nation.

In three separate orders, commission said pits were polluting Ogallala Underground Water Aquifer. Agency has threatened to sever pipeline connections of oil and gas operators who did not fill pits by deadlines in Hemphill, Swisher, Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, Hale, Haskell, Lynn, Terry, Yoakum, Andrews, and Martin counties.

 Most of the danger at a horse race or an auto race involves those who are racing. But sometimes an accident involves those who are watching. To what extent is the management legally liable for that?

Your rights as a spectator are very much like your rights as a shopper. The management owes you "due care"—that is, care measured by the hazards of the occasion — but no more.

You cannot collect damages for an accident which is simply no one's fault. In one case a horse in the paddock area suddenly reared up angrily. Frightened onlookers, although outside the fence, fell back in dismay, pushing one man against a platform.

He sued the management for damages. But since the horse had never been troublesome before, the court could find no basis for liability.

Nor can you collect if you yourself are to blame. Thus: A racing fan, on his way to the betting window, came to a mud puddle. Although it was only a quarter-inch deep, he decided to jump. He landed short, skidded, and fell down hard. A court ruled later that he could not collect damages for an accident which, by his own bravado, he had brought upon himself.

But blame was pinned on the management when a grandstand seat caved in under a spectator. Proper maintenance, ruled the court, would have revealed that the wood beneath the seat had rotted away.

In another case, numerous spectators at an auto race were hurt when a car blew a tire, smashed through a fence, and hurtled into the stands. The blowout was traced to one of several loose nails, lying in plain sight on the track but overlooked by a cleanup crew. Here, too, the court upheld damage claims

against the management.

Of course, safety measures such as careful maintenance, adequate policing, and strong fences can be costly. But in the eyes of the law, cost is secondary. As one court put it:

"While the expense cannot be overlooked, it weighs less than human life in the balance. If a race cannot be held without inherent and extreme risk to life and limb, the command of the law is that it must not be held at all."
