Area Schools To Benefit Rep. W. S. Healy Praised For Corrective Legislation

Knox City — Superintendent W. R. Baker received word late Monday night that the Texas Legislature in its second special session has passed corrective legislation on education bills previously passed before the close of the regular session. Representative W. S. Healy of Paducah co-authored the corrective measure with Rep. George Hinson of Mineola, and according to Mr. Baker, passage of the corrective measure most likely will represent a \$14,000 saving to the Knox City Independent School district. The corrective bills will give school districts an option of receiving state funds for "teacher units" based on last year's pupil attendance or this year's. Earlier this year, the Legislature changed the basis from the previous year's attendance to present attendance, which would cause systems with declining enrollment to receive less mon-

decline in some districts, according to Hinson.

Mr. Baker said that in the passage of the second bill, Benjamin Schools would have the same teacher allocation as they have had in the past under the sparse area formula. Carney Rural High School in O'Brien will continue to receive the same teacher allocation under the small high school formula. Both of these area schools would have suffered teacher allocation reductions under the bill as it was passed previously.

"Rep. Heatly was very cooperative and made an all-out effort in submitting the corrective legislation before the close of the special session," Mr. Baker emphasized, "and we certainly are most grateful."

After the passage of the education bills in the regular session, Rep. Heatly arranged an appointment with Governor Preston Smith for Mr. Baker on July 24. Prior to the meeting, Mr. Baker in turn arranged a meeting for a large number of superintendents in downtown Austin. Purpose of their meeting was to draft a statement to present to Governor Smith asking him to include the school problems in his special call to the legislature, as only items which the governor issues in his call can be considered.

Area superintendents who accompanied Mr. Baker to Austin in July were Douglas Myers of Munday, Kenneth Roberts of Benjamin, Charles Thorn of O'Brien and Conner Horton of Rule.

Sgt. Anderson is home on leave from the Marines at this time to be with his mother, Mrs. Mildred Anderson, who was hospitalized due to illness recently.

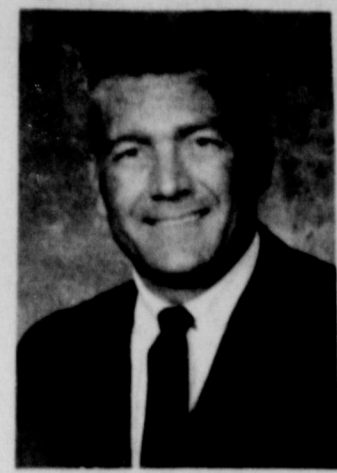

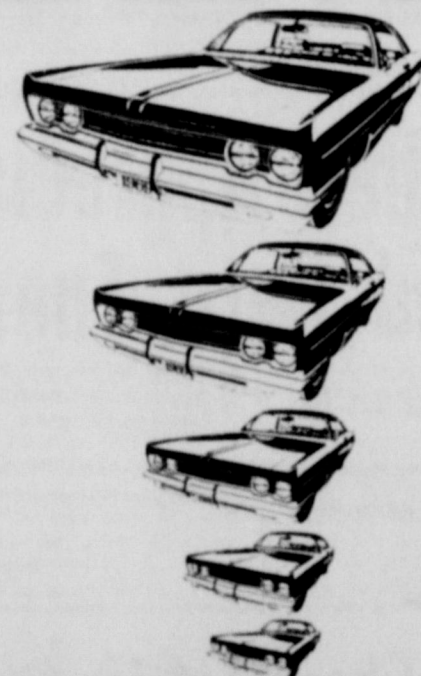

Cotton Meet Slated Tues.

Stamford - Cotton farmers will hear a detailed report on their dollar-a-bale program at a meeting here Tuesday, September 16, according to Charles W. Stenholm, a trustee of the Cotton Producers Institute. The meeting is set for 7:00 p.m. at the Cliff House Restaurant.

"If you are tired of hearing bad news about cotton, plan to attend this meeting," Mr. Stenholm said. "You will hear solid evidence that cotton can fight its way back from the market losses of recent years."

The program will be presented by staff members of the National Cotton Council. They will report in detail on research and promotion activity being carried out by CPI and the National Cotton Council.

The visual presentation will point out how industry funds are being used to make cotton more appealing to consumers, for promotion to convince consumers to buy cotton, and to find ways of producing cotton at lower costs.

"We believe you will leave the meeting with renewed confidence in the future of the cotton industry," Mr. Stenholm said.

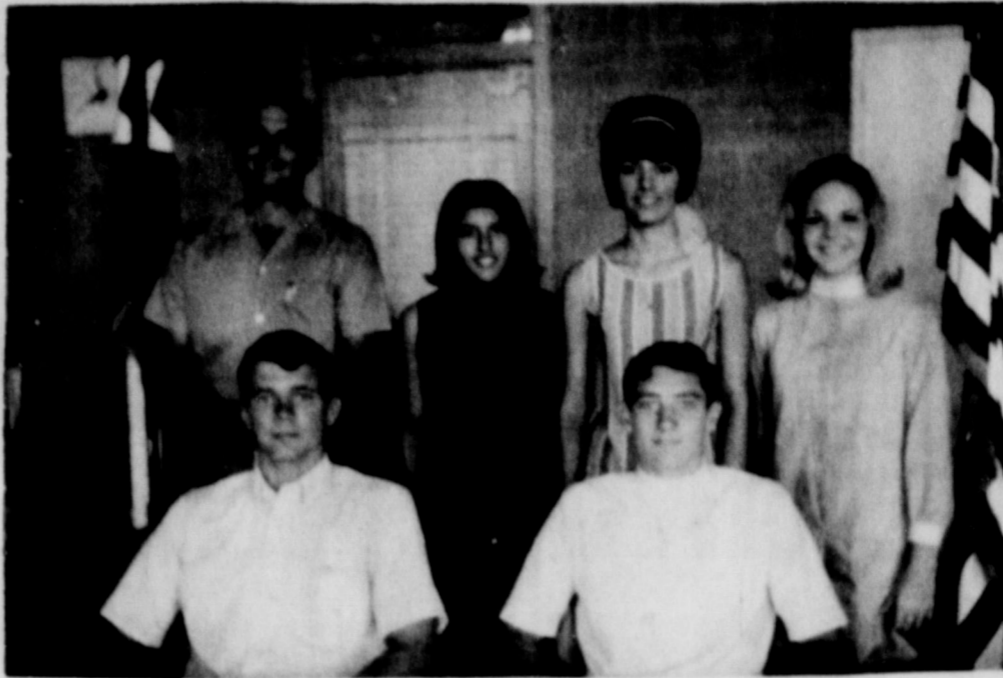

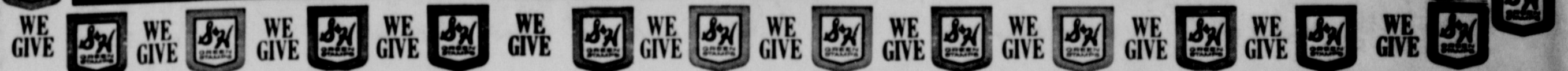
