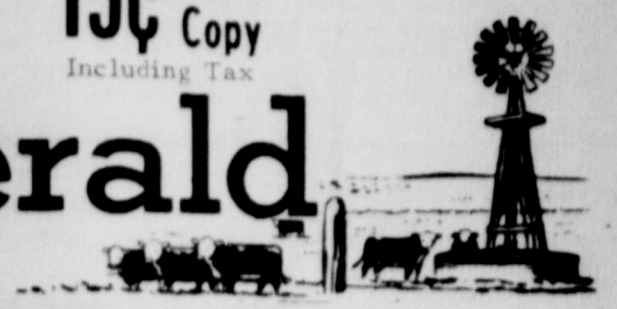

## School Bells Ring At KC Schools Monday Morning

School bells will begin ringing regularly at Knox City Schools Monday morning, August 23. School hours again will be from 8:30 a. m. until 3:50 p. m., the same as previous years.

In order that elementary students will have the opportunity to secure required supplies before school begins, the Knox City Elementary School teachers have supplied parents of children who will be attending grades one through eight with a list of school supplies they will be needing during the school year.

The kindergarten group will need, for each child to bring \$1.00 with them and Mrs.

Clonts will purchase their supplies.

The first grade supply list includes a wide lined beginner's tablet, a beginner's pencil (with eraser), Crayolas, scissors, Elmer's glue, construction paper, manila paper, typing paper, one junior size box of Kleenex, and a cigar box (for supplies).

The second graders will need notebook paper with holder, No. 2 pencil, 1 pair scissors, 1 box Crayolas, manila paper, construction paper and Elmer's glue (29¢).

Supplies needed by the third graders include a 2-hole notebook, 2-hole notebook paper, 2 no. 2 lead pencils, crayons,

scissors, Elmer's glue, ruler, 1 writing table #1253, 1 green felt-tip pen, and 50¢ art fee.

The fourth graders will be needing a 2 hole notebook, 2 hole notebook paper, 2 hole subject dividers, pencils, scissors, ruler, glue, water colors, green grading pen, 2 hole-writing paper #1225 and 25¢ for art fee.

The supply list for fifth graders includes a two-ring looseleaf notebook, two-hole notebook paper, writing practice paper (available at Perry's), no. 2 pencils, green or red grading pencil (Bic, felt tip, etc. - NO BALL POINT), ruler, eraser, reinforcements, dividers for notebooks, scissors, map colors, and shorthand book for spelling.

Supplies needed by the sixth grade are a 2-hole notebook with paper-with reinforcements, 2 no. 2 pencils, ruler, map colors, green or red grading pencil, scissors, eraser, dividers for notebook, writing paper (3 line hand Perry's) and a short hand notebook.

The seventh and eighth grades will need two 2-hole notebooks (no clip boards), 2-hole notebook paper, two no. 2 pencils, shorthand notebook, green or red grading pen, blue writing pen, compass, ruler, protractor, re-enforcements, eraser, notebook dividers, and three report folders.

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce will climax its membership drive Friday night at 7:00 o' clock with a basket supper in the City Park. All chamber members and their families are asked to bring a basket lunch. All new members will be special guests and need not bring a basket. The Chamber membership drive is divided into three groups. These groups have worked all week in an all out

Membership dues are in two classes. Individual dues are \$2.00 monthly or \$24.00 annually. Business dues are \$5.00 monthly or \$60.00 annually.

## Field Day Slated At Chillicothe

A commemorative field day is slated for August 26 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station in Chillicothe, says Herman H. Collier, Knox County Agricultural agent.

Field tours begin at 9 a. m. and will feature grain sorghums from early research projects up to modern standard varieties; including experimental hybrids currently being tested.

The tours will be highlighted by a discussion by J. Roy Quinby, superintendent of the station for 36 years, who will tell of early research and development of hybrids, Darrell Rosenow, grain sorghum scientist from the Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, will report on current studies and future potential.

The formal program starts at 11 a. m. and will include addresses by Dr. Jack Williams, president of Texas A&I, Clyde Wells, A&M board chairman, Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of agriculture and Dr. Rex Thomas, deputy administrator of the USDA Agricultural Research Service.

A barbecue lunch will be sponsored by Chillicothe merchants, according to Collier. Tickets must be picked up before August 23. They are available at the research station and all county Extension offices in Extension District 3, the Rolling Plains.

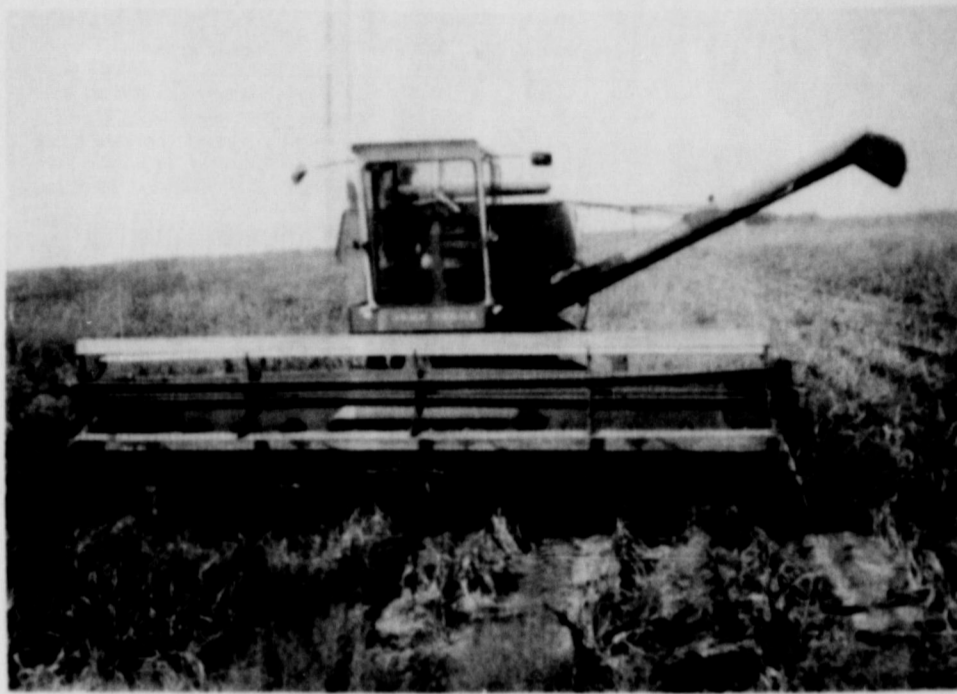

## Grain Harvest Halted By Area Rains

According to Billy Mitchell, manager of Knox City Grain Company, and Charlie Groves, manager of Farmers Grain Co., the maize harvest, which got underway here about July 23, was brought to a halt after rains were received last week.

Reports are that most of the dryland maize is late and the rains will greatly benefit these crops. Some of the early dryland maize had already suffered from the drouth, while other dryland maize, where it was thin withstood the dry weather fairly well. However, some of the grain has fallen since the rains began.

Both managers said that too little had been cut to offer any comparison to last year's yields but with some dry weather and sunshine, harvest of irrigated maize would probably be in full swing by

September 1. Very little irrigated maize has been cut as yet, they said.

Maize started out at \$2.35 per bushel, but has dropped to \$2.25.

Although the rains have delayed the grain harvest, everyone agrees that they have been a blessing for this entire area, and cotton crops are 'loading up'. If the insect damage can be held to a minimum, many farmers have a chance to make good cotton and gear crops.

## Congressman Price To Visit Knox

Congressman Bob Price has announced that he will be in Knox City on Wednesday, August 25, at 2:30 p.m. for a Town Hall meeting at Sheila's City Cafe.

Knox County was among 13 counties in the present 13th District added to 22 in Price's 19th District in the recent redistricting by the Texas Legislature.

"Although the new district will not be effective until January, 1973, I wanted to take this opportunity during the August recess of Congress to become better acquainted with the residents of this area," Price said.

The Northwest Texas Congressman has held many Town Hall meetings during his five years in the House of Representatives as a means of exchanging views with his constituents.

"I did not seek office to represent members of one interest group or a particular political party. It has been my goal to represent all my constituents. That is why I have scheduled this Town Hall meeting in Knox City; to get the views of Republicans, Democrats, and Independents on the great issues which face our Nation today," Price said.

A resident of Pampa, Representative Price was first elected to Congress in 1966 and re-elected in 1968 and 1970; the last time without opposition. He serves on the House Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Science and Astronautics.

The Congressman has been a life-long farmer and rancher and holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture from Oklahoma State University. He served four years as an officer in the U.S. Air Force including a year as fighter pilot during the Korean War.

"I am certainly looking forward to meeting many residents of Knox County on August 25 and hope that many individuals will be able to visit with me at Sheila's City Cafe at 2:30 p.m.," Price said.

Records Needed By All Beginners

**Righteousness Exalts A Nation**

Nations are built of cities, towns and villages. A nation gains its reputation by the kind of cities, towns and villages it has. If they are friendly and prosperous, then the nation is considered so. If the cities and villages are corrupt and dirty, the nation is thus so judged. What causes the great difference we can see in our own land?

First, I think we must consider the fact that cities, towns, and villages are all made up of people. You can not have a clean city with dirty people. Neither will clean people allow their city to be dirty for long. Even so, it is in all walks of life, Jesus said, "By their fruits ye shall know them". Matt. 7:20

Everyone wants to be a part of a thriving, clean, wholesome community, whether it be Dallas or Knox City, New York or Old Glory. Everyone likes recognition or some kind. Everyone wants to be part of a winning team.

The Bible tells us how our nation can be a winner. It has nothing to do with Republicans or Democrats. It has to do with the people. Proverbs 14:34 states, "Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people."

I am afraid many people no longer know the meaning of righteousness. When people hold a grudge against someone for years and years, how can they be considered righteous? Prejudice is certainly not righteousness. When people become set in their own selfish, greedy ways, how can they be considered righteous? Yet, most people try to justify their own self-centered ideas and claim them under the banner of righteousness.

Basically, the word righteousness found in both the Old and New Testaments has three meanings. Of course, it is used in other ways, but these three most nearly convey the meaning. They are: 1) Conformity to the Divine will; 2) To be in the right; 3) Innocence

Some people confuse righteousness with wealth. Some confuse wealth with godliness. Paul instructed Timothy to "from such withdraw thyself". I Timothy 6:5. The Bible gives us several accounts of very devilish men who were wealthy. But neither is poverty a mark of righteousness.

Righteousness may bring wealth, but many times wealth rebels against righteousness. Solomon said, "Wisdom is a defence, and money is a defence." Ecclesiastes 7:12. But many have confused the two thinking their wealth is their wisdom. Righteousness is not measured in wealth.

An individual here in Knox City said that Knox City was a good town doing a good business until sudden wealth from oil and irrigation hit, then people became too "good" to trade with the local merchants. It would appear from his statement people thought they were wiser to trade out of town because they could now afford to. This is an example of wealth being confused for wisdom. Merchants closed their doors because their customers had too much money to trade with them. How strange!

Money brings easy living as when living becomes too easy, people lose sight of righteousness. Because of confusion between money and wisdom, some wealthy persons consider themselves to be wise when, in fact the Bible calls them fools.

When there is plenty of money people usually turn their desires toward being entertained and having a good time. This poison even seeps into religion; thus making some think church should be entertaining. The righteous are, on the other hand, struggling to sustain a livelihood, and when busy tending to their own affairs, they have not time to seek new thrills. "Woe to those who are at ease in Zion." Amos 6:1

A man in need is willing to make changes (conformity to the Divine will). A man who sees no needs in his life doesn't care about Divine will. A man trying to accomplish something worthwhile wants things to be right (in the right). A man who has accomplished his goals or "has his living made" doesn't care about right or wrong, "just don't tread on me." . . .

A man trying to conform and do things right will be innocent when he makes a mistake, because he was trying. A man who rebels against conformity and doing things right will be guilty, not innocent. So will be a man who doesn't care.

A nation crumbles under misplaced values. However, the nation, city or town or village can't have misplaced values, dry its people can. Righteousness exalts a nation only when the people practice righteousness.

God said Israel fell because of its own sins. History said Rome fell from rot within (sin). What will happen to America unless we as a nation pursue righteousness? What future does Knox City have if we as her people fail to practice righteousness? What future do we as individuals have if we fail to practice righteousness? Hasn't God's Word already told us?

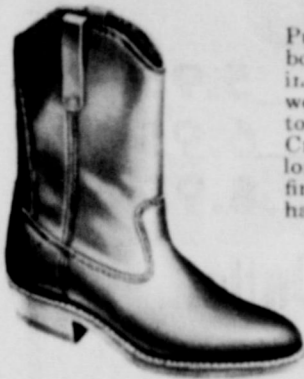

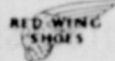

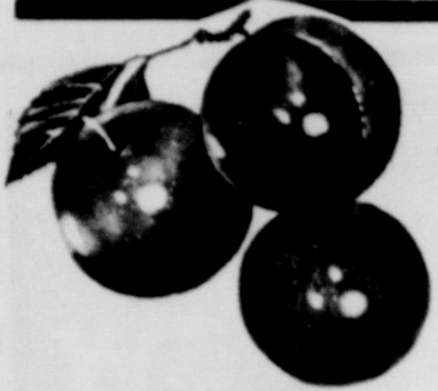
