Golf Club to Hold Ladder Tourney

C. E. Williams, president of the local golf club, has announced that a "Ladder Tournament" will be played during the summer.

A player's position on the ladder will be determined by the score on his 18-hole qualifying round, which must be played by May 17. Any player not qualifying by that date must start at the foot of the ladder.

In cases of ties, the first qualifier will have top position on the ladder.

Any player may, at any time, challenge the player one position above him, with the game to be played within one week. If the challenger wins the match—or if the challenged player fails to play the match—they exchange places on the ladder.

Matches may be either nine or eighteen holes, according to agreement of the players.

All scores should be handed in to secretary Howard Marshall immediately after finishing the qualifying round.

Oil Notes—

Operators recovered 450 feet of oil and 250 feet of oil cut mud on a one-hour drillstem test at the Continental Oil Co. No. 1 W. R. Ross Tuesday. The wildcat is in southeastern King County, 5 1/2 miles southeast of the Ross Ranch pool and six miles north of the King portion of the Katz Strawn pool.

The test was in the Caddo at 5,731 feet, after the formation was topped at 5,633 feet.

Drilling on the Dr. Sam G. Dunn No. 1 LouSamBob, on the Togo Moorhouse Ranch in southeastern King County, will be resumed at 2,776 feet when operators complete a "fishing job."

Tests on the Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1 Percy Jones Estate, in the King County Katz field, have been made. The well pumped 60 barrels of oil and 60 barrels of water during 24 hours.

Fair Foundation No. 1 Roy Smith, 2 1/2 miles north of Knox City, is below 2,770 feet. The Palo Pinto reef was topped at 4,175 feet in the Sunray Oil Co. No. 2 Frances Snelson. The well was drilled to 4,280 and casing was set, and operators are waiting on cement to harden.

ONLY 384 TEXANS TO BE DRAFTED IN JUNE

AUSTIN, April 29. — State draft boards will be called on in June for only 384 men, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced today.

Quotas to local boards for this call, smallest received by the state since July, 1951, will be figured and placed in the mail on or about May 7. The June state quota of 384 is Texas' share of a national quota of 10,000.

General Wakefield predicted that calls on Texas will increase greatly, beginning in July. He pointed out that the first draftees inducted after invasion of South Korea will be eligible for release late this summer and early this fall.

He said everything points toward heavier calls the remainder of this year and the first four or five months of 1953.

The June induction call probably can be filled with examined and acceptable men 21 years and older. Latest available information from local boards shows state draft boards have around 500 men in this category.

The boards are authorized to induct men 20 years old, if necessary, but can go no lower unless a man is a delinquent or a volunteer.

General Wakefield indicated that the state will have a physical examination schedule of around 3,000 men a month during the summer, beginning in June. He said such intention is subject to revision month by month.

A total of 2,965 are scheduled for the pre-induction physical and mental examination in May. In addition, a May call for the re-examination of 624 4-F registrants was mailed to 43 boards from state headquarters yesterday.

A total of \$9,690 Texas youths have taken the regular physical and mental examinations and 37,427 have been inducted since the beginning of the conflict in Korea.

DR. JAMES B. BOREN TO BE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER



Dr. James B. Boren, who will be the speaker at commencement exercises for the graduating class of Knox City High School on Thursday evening, May 15, says he is a Texan by nature and ambition.

Born at Ennis in 1905, Dr. Boren has lived in Telaco, Haskell, Bardwell and Wichita Falls.

He holds a Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Texas, a Master of Education from the University of Oklahoma, a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Education from Oklahoma City University, a Doctor of Laws from Austin College and Doctor of Humanities from Oklahoma City University.

Dr. Boren organized the Mangum, Okla., Junior College and served as its president two years; served as president of Southwestern State Teachers College Weatherford, Okla., for three years; and as president of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, for the last ten years.

Under his administration Midwestern University grew from a two year college to a fully accredited senior college; from an enrollment of 240 to an enrollment of 2,500; from a half-million dollar plant to a five million dollar plant; from a staff of 18 to a staff of 176.

Dr. Boren is a Mason, a Methodist, a Rotarian, past president of the Knife and Fork Club, a member of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, a member of the board of directors of the community Chest, has taught a Sunday School class for eight years, and received the Optimist Award of Wichita Falls in 1949.

He is the author of two books, and is listed in "Who's Who" and "Who's Who in American Education."

The action was interpreted to mean that party members in the county are undecided as to who they want for the party nominee, but want no part in a bolt from the party, no matter who the nominee is.

Charlie Moorhouse of Benjamin and Otis Golden of Munday were elected delegates to the state convention, with Ben Hunt of Goree and Clay Grove of Munday as alternates.

The group also adopted resolutions condemning federal seizure of tidelands, and infringement on states' rights.

In the precinct convention held in Knox City Saturday, delegates were instructed to support the party nominee all the way. Delegates from the east box were John W. Smith, Tom Cummings, E. L. Park, B. B. Cochran and Ben Farmer, and west box delegates were Ed Shaver, Sr., and John A. Smith.

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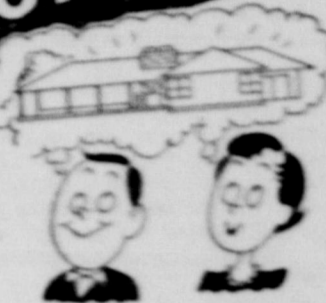

All bids are to be submitted on the basis of the following specifications for both labor and Materials.

Scope of Work: The work to be done by the painting contractor includes the furnishing of all materials, labor, tools and equipment which shall be required to complete the painting and finishing the building as specified.

Preparation of Surfaces: Painting Contractor shall be wholly responsible for finish of his work and therefore shall not commence any part of it until surface is in proper condition in every respect.

On old paint, the surfaces shall be first swept down to remove all dust and where it is, scaling shall be wire brushed and scraped.

All cracks in plastered wall and ceilings are to be closed according to method of repairing. The small hair cracks will be filled with plaster patch powder and water mixture applied by surface brushing only. The other larger cracks will be repaired by the complete removal of plaster to the metal plaster lath to a minimum width of 2" along the cracked area. Large cracks from which 2" plaster have been removed will be filled with two successive coats of plaster of same type now on

walls.
Materials: All materials used will be of the best grade of paint, either of Luminol or oil base paint; (decided by the Commissioners Court).
Number of Coats: All of the interior will receive one coat of paint, two where necessary in order to make satisfactory job.
