Williams received the Distinguished Service Award of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts in 1957 and the Distinguished Service Award of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1958. He is married to the former Ruth Christianson of Volga, South Dakota. They have one daughter, Mrs. Mary Cathryn Weir, of Edinburgh, Scotland.
