BAIRD — Jay Reeves, has been named Player of the Year by the Abilene Reporter-News Class A All-Area selections, along with his coach, Bill Owen who received the honor of Coach of the Year, for their outstanding ability in the sport of football during this season.

Named to the Class A All-Area team on offense are Butch Barron and Dicky Greenway, and on the defensive team, the late Bill Windham, Honorable mention selections went to Wayne Fielder, Tommy Neal, Danny Vestal and the late Bill Windham on offense. On defense, honorable mentions were Butch Barron and Pud Jaggars.

Earlier this month, coaches of 8-A selected Reeves, Greenway, Neal, Barron, Fielder, Jaggars and the late Bill Windham, to the All-District first team.

This reporter has tried hard to keep from showing favorites during this season, however at this time, I would like to break a rule and single out one player, and this bashful, timid, but friendly fellow goes by the name of Jay Mike Reeves. I really

don't think his teammates or his fans will mind at all.

I would like to say that the patience of Jay Reeves has been a wonder to me. He was called upon to do the punting, kickoffs, and extra points for the Bears last year, and most of the time it was done to perfection. It looked like to me, he was waiting his turn to show what he could do. Well his time finally came at the beginning of the 1972 football season. He not only stood out as an outstanding quarterback, but he was mixing it up on defense as well. He played his game well, and I have one regret, Jay Reeves is a senior at Baird High School. But who knows, maybe we can someday sit back in our easy chair and watch this barefoot kid thrill us even more on nation-wide hookups. Whatever Jay Reeves seeks to do, the homefolks wish him well, and we will all remember the many times he turned six into seven for the great team of Baird Bears.

The record for Reeves will read as follows: First team All-District quarterback; 2nd team All-District defensive back; All-Area quarterback; Most Valuable

Player; serving as one of the Captains; scoring 10 touchdowns; 20 points after touch-down, and 80 tackles, in 12 games.

Butch Barron was All-District tackle on offense, All-District tackle, defense, All-Area tackle for 125 tackles for the season. He received 4 Head Hunter Awards, (which is a decal placed on the helmet), and served as one of the team captains.

Dicky Greenway, All District center, All-Area center. This 152-pound boy was the most consistent player during the year, stated Coach Bill Owen. Greenway played his position well, and assembled his team each time in spirit and determination.

The record of the late Bill Windham is one of which we are very proud, and is most deserving - 1st team All-District lineman; 2nd team All-District running back; All-Area defensive end. He had 162 tackles for the season, and led the team

twice with most tackles. He received 5 Head Hunters for the best hits in a game.

The team ended the season with a 10-1-1 record, and 7-0 district record, District Championship and Bi-District Championship of Class 8-A. The team scored 271 points and held their opponents to 113 points for the most successful year in Class A history for Baird School.

The team was put together by the coaching ability of Bill Owen, who was a new one for the Bears and the first time to be head coach of a team. In his quiet manner and cool attitude, he united a group that were ready for his leadership, and together they made this success. Other championships will mean a lot to Coach Bill Owen, but none will ever mean so much as the 1972 Baird Bears.

### Two Area Youths Appointed to Slate Of Nominees

WASHINGTON — Representative Omar Burleson has announced the names of young men of the 17th Congressional District he is appointing to slates of nominees for the Military, Naval, and Air Force Academies for admission in July 1973. David's illness began in February and numerous treatments and surgery has been the order of the day. Four doctors have waged a hard fight to pinpoint the infection in order to arrest the illness. Most recent surgery for David was Dec. 18. The doctors have since found an infection pocket on the side of his head, this they hope was the cause of high temperature, and that David will someday recover.

A story was published in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal about young David and a visit from Santa Claus and it is published here in part:

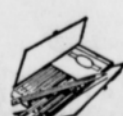

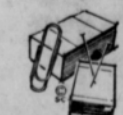

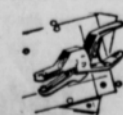

AUSTIN — Proposals for major "reform" statutes and changes in the House and Senate rules have been drawn by the Texas legislative leaders.

Rep. Price Daniel Jr., Liberty, slated to be the next Speaker of the House of Representatives, has announced a nine-point "reform" program.

Several Senate members and Lt. Gov.-elect Bill Hobby, Houston, have discussed proposals to change some of the "reform" rules adopted by the fourth called session of the 62nd Legislature.

Speaking to a seminar sponsored by the Texas Society of Association Executives, Daniel listed these proposed changes in state statutes -- which he feels are necessary because of a "mandate" of Texas voters this year:

1. A one term limit for the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

2. Elimination of the pledge card system for election of the House Speaker - where pledges are exchanged for support of legislation.

3. Disclosure by the Speaker of contribution to support his campaign for that office.

4. A limit on the number of conferees on tax bills.

5. A new "open records" law which would provide more access to public documents - with certain guidelines and safeguards.

6. Improvement of campaign contribution laws.

7. Tightening of the laws governing lobbyist registration.

8. An ethics code for legislators.

9. Changes in the State's "Open Meetings" law to provide the public with more information about actions of governmental bodies.

Daniel said these proposed "reform" measures should not be tagged with liberal or conservative labels.

"Liberal and conservative labels are unfair to the 77 new members of the Legislature. They have not yet cast a vote. The new members will be more independent and reform minded, because that's what the voters demanded in the primary, run-off and general elections this year," he added.

"I don't believe we should over-react to the problems of the past," he said when he discussed major changes in House rules which will be introduced.

**CITIZENS' CONSTITUTIONAL COMMISSION WILL BE SELECTED** — Elected leaders of the three branches of state government - executive, legislative and judicial - will be appointing 36 Texas citizens' commission to study needed constitutional changes and report its recommendations next November.

A resolution to create this "citizens' commission" will be introduced in the 63rd Legislature, and the 36 appointees will be selected by a committee to the elected leaders of state government.

This committee will probably include the Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and Presiding Judge of the Criminals Appeals Court.

At a recent meeting of leaders in the drive for constitutional reform, the addition of the Attorney General to that committee was supported.

**LAWMAKERS LOOK AT BUDGET** — Key lawmakers who make up the Legislative Budget Board met here this week to take a look at multi-billion dollar state spending plans the legislature must pass soon.

Other signs of preparation for a vital and stormy 63rd legislative session are apparent.

Lt. Gov.-elect Hobby has moved into temporary offices and has assembled a staff.

Speaker-elect Daniel also is putting together a staff.

Both the incoming Lieutenant Governor and Speaker are working on their assignments to key standing committees which process legislation, although they prefer not to talk too much publicly about this important chore.

The Legislature, under new

leadership and with a near-record crop of freshmen members, faces a staggering array of tasks.

In addition to the usual problems of making spending fit income, lawmakers have assigned themselves a monumental task of furthering legislative reform.

A hangover from the 1971 session is House of Representatives redistricting which must be redone or left to a federal court for boundary realignment.

Big decisions will also be necessary in the education field if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds a December, 1971, decision invalidating the present Texas system of financing public school education.

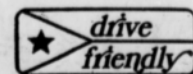

The Cross Plains Elementary School is destroyed by fire. All rear fire departments joined the Cross Plains unit in trying to save the building.

Debbie Curtis of Baird shows a Grand Champion steer at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show, north of Cross Plains.

Clyde Chamber of Commerce acquires building for newly organized Chamber, and Ray Falk serves as President, with Bill Hawk elected Vice-President.

Cecil Mings enters popular race for Commissioner of Precinct 1, and citizens registration sets a record.

Animals on the loose in the City of Baird causes problems and the question is "What To Do?"

Jack Brasher, first man from Clyde to serve as president of Shady Oaks, and 5th president of the organization.

Second tragedy hits Cross Plains. After loss of the Elementary School by fire, was the death of Grade School Principal Jack Watkins, who had been associated with the school for 17 years.

Ralph E. McAdams becomes fourth candidate for Precinct 1 Commissioner race, and voters begin to pick their candidates for the up-coming election.

Elizabeth Elliott and Arts Pride wins Grand Champion Angus, and Don Kelly has Reserve Champion Brahman at Ft. Worth Show. Arts Pride wins again at Houston and adds another ribbon to Elizabeth's scrap book. Reserve Champion honors went to Arts Pride at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show.

Baird Firemen go all out to clean-up, paint-up, and to host Mid-West Texas Firemen and Fire Marshalls Convention to be held April 8th. 250 delegates attend.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Claud Holley and Mrs. Holley honored with plaque for services rendered in the local Chamber, and other organizations. The presentation was made at the Annual Banquet, held March 31.

4,426 citizens registered for May 6th Primaries, and 18 to 21 age group only account for 5 percent of votes.

Coach Bo Wilson resigns to accept position at Granbury, after taking Baird to a 9-1 season record in football.

Votes counted and runoff in Commissioner's race for two men, Corn and Tucker. Corn received 665 votes and Tucker 528.

Robert Harber becomes new owner of Fyeatt's Grocery in Clyde. The new business will be under the name of Harber Grocery. This is one of the oldest firms in Clyde.

Baird gets new business firm on South Access Road off 120. Jim Hatchett opens grocery store July 1.

Clyde Chamber of Commerce and Library has open house - one of the projects of the newly organized Chamber.

380 enroll at Baird School and 1972-73 term begins. Many new teachers have been added. Record enrollment for Eula Rural School with 275 students, 25 over last year. Clyde also sets new record with 932 students for first day enrollment.

The 1972 Baird Bears make ready for the season opener with Throckmorton. New coach Bill Owen prepares to bounce back the Bears.

Construction 40 percent complete on Baird Housing Units, Sept. 22, and deadline is early next year.

Baird Bears win opener 20-6 over Throckmorton; Clyde Bulldogs lose close one to Winters Blizzards 20-16.

Ricky Miller seriously injured in cycle-auto accident at Clyde. Transferred to Lackland AFB Hospital for treatment of badly injured leg.

Callahan Co. Co-op distribute dividend checks to customers for the first time since 1962. The patron checks total over \$13,000. 300 guests attend annual meeting and barbecue.

Clyde Bulldogs battle Pied Pipers to 6-6 tie; Baird Bears tie Cisco Lobos.

Mrs. Bess Driskill named Coming Home Queen as ex-students gather for homecoming. Miss Cheryl Greenway elected Homecoming Queen of BHS. The Bears show off for the fans to the tune of 40-0 over Roscoe Plowboys.

Clyde Chamber of Commerce banquet draws full house as community turns out to show support of first year for the Chamber.

The Baird Bears put it on the Indians, and the Bulldogs stop Comanche as the season record looks good for both teams. Teams get tough, but Clyde gets rough and smashed the Hamilton Bulldogs 45-0, while the Bears outscore Aspermont 14-6.

November 3, the Clyde Bulldogs lost a heartbreaker to the Coleman Bluecats by a score of 7-3. The Bluecats scored in the last minute and 52 seconds to win and take the hard-fought game from the Bulldogs, who had it won by 3 points up to this point. The famous field goal was kicked by Tommy Bailey. This was the end for a championship for the Bulldogs, who went on to win over Cisco 15-7, and Eastland 17-7, and become the 9-AA runner-up. This left Clyde with a 4-1 district record and a 7-2-1 for the season. A job well done by the Bulldogs.

3071 voters cast ballots in the county in the Nov. 7 General Election, and President Nixon carries all boxes in the county. The Baird Bears shake up the

Albany Lions and win for the first time since 1964. Everybody comes to attention and stands back and watches this powerful team show just what this game of football is all about. The next week finds them District 8-A Champions with a win over the Wylie Bulldogs 28-8.

The Bears go on to defeat Archer City Wilcats 27-0 for the Bi-District crown. The game was played in Breckenridge Buckaroo Stadium before a crowd of proud fans in extremely cold weather. The week that followed was a good one for the community and everyone enjoyed it to the hilt. The Bears would meet the Plains Cowboys in Tiger Stadium for Regional honors.

named to the All-District first team. Coach Bill Owen was selected as Top Coach of District 8-A, and Jay Reeves, quarterback, Outstanding Player.

The town was saddened by the tragic death of one of their well-known boys, Bill Windham, who was accidentally shot on Dec. 11. He had been an outstanding football player during the season. He was named to the All-District first team on offense, and 2nd team on offense. On Dec. 21, Bill was named to Class A All-Area as a defensive lineman, along with teammates Dicky Greenway, Butch Barron, and Jay Reeves.

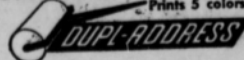

## Highway Commission Extends Filing Deadline for Sign Owners

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31, 1972 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 600 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period.

## Savings Bonds Sales Reach 78 Percent

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds for the 11-month period totaled \$1,010,658 in Callahan County. Of this amount, \$9,868 were purchased during the month of November, according to Howard, E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November, Texans purchased \$17,169,531 in Savings Bonds. The year to date sales amounted to \$194,211,487 for 98 percent of the state's goal of \$197.5 million.

National sales during the month totaled \$545 million, a 19.2 percent increase over 1971 sales of \$457 million. January-November sales were \$5.7 billion for 109 percent of the national sales goal of \$5.3 billion. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$308 million were reported for the first 11 months of 1972, 33 percent above the \$231 million exchanged in 1971.

In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit applications forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.

Owners of signs who have questions about the program or the new deadline date should contact the nearest Highway Department district office.
