The Community Building, an added attraction to our city, will welcome the public inside to view its lovely decor and spacious interior. The 1800 square foot building will house the offices of the Housing Authority and Baird Chamber of Commerce, along with dining area, when space and meeting rooms for various clubs and organizations.

Committees that will be serving as your hosts on opening date will assist you in viewing the dwelling units, along 4th Street on old Hwy. 80, and on 7th Street.

Announce Reduction Of Federal Excise Tax

BAIRD — Bruce McClelland, Division Commercial Manager for Continental Telephone Service Corporation, announced today that the Continental Telephone System has completed the paper work to reduce the Federal Excise Tax. Mr. McClelland added, "this is the first step in a ten year reduction program. Each year for ten years, the tax will be reduced by 1 percent."

"A great deal of record changes and computer program changes were made to get ready for the reduction. All customers will pay 9 percent excise tax through 1973, 8 percent in 1974, etc. This program, when carried to completion, will eliminate excise tax on telephones."

West Texas Utilities Co. Requests Rate Increase of Clyde Council

CLYDE — A request for the first general rate increase in West Texas Utilities Company 50-year history was presented to the Clyde City Council on Feb. 8th, by WTU Manager Larry Hall.

The Company requested a six percent increase in each step of the residential, commercial and industrial rates and the application of a fuel adjustment clause to municipal water pumping rates.

The increase will not apply to minimum bills, fuel adjustments, municipal rates and power interchanges with other utility companies. "As a result," Mr. Hall said, "the increase in the Company's total revenue will be less than five percent."

The increase will add about 2-2/3 cents per day to the average residential bill, according to Hall. He pointed out that since 1952 the average residential cost has dropped from 3.64 cents per kilowatt-hour to 2.59 cents, a decrease of 29 percent. During the same time, the average residential usage has increased more than 3 1/2 times.

While this is WTU's first general rate increase, the power company manager noted that WTU had voluntarily reduced rates 14 times. The firm's last major rate reduction was in 1964.

In asking the City's approval of the new electric rate schedules, the WTU Manager said the new rates would be applied to bills rendered on or after

Five Clyde School Administrators Given New Contracts by Board

CLYDE — Administrative personnel of Clyde Public School were given new contracts at a meeting of the Board of Trustees Feb. 6th.

Superintendent L. F. Newton received a contract for a three-year period, through the 1975-76 school year. This a one year extension to the contract cur-

rently in force. Two year contracts were issued to four members of the staff. These contracts will be in force through the 1974-75 school year. These contracts are also one year extensions to present contracts.

Receiving two year contracts were: James Alexander, High School Principal; Don Allen, Elementary and Junior High School Principal; Wintford Hogan, Athletic Director and Head Coach; and James Alexander, Vocational Agriculture teacher and Director.

Mr. Hall pointed out that almost every electric utility company in Texas has found it necessary to request rate adjustments and that WTU is one of the last to make such a request. "The spiraling cost of nearly everything we buy or use to provide electric service makes the rate adjustment essential, the WTU Manager said. "The increase is the minimum needed and nothing more."

He emphasized that WTU has been caught in the 'cost squeeze' as a result of the increases in the cost of equipment, services and labor, cost of new power plants, lines, and environmental controls.

With interest costs more than doubled, he pointed out that the cost of borrowing money was one of the major problems. To supply future needs, the Company expects to spend about 77 million dollars for new facilities in the next five years.

TPWC Approves Lake Boat Ramp

CLYDE — State Representative Lynn Nabers of Brownwood reports that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved the application of the Mayor of Clyde, Texas, the Honorable Lee Smith, for a boat ramp to be constructed at Clyde Lake.

The construction site for the boat ramp is the proposed Clyde Lake Park in the Upper Pecan Bayou, near Clyde, Texas.

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Clyde Girl Scout Cookie Sale Helps Maintain Resident Camp

CLYDE — When doorbells start ringing Wednesday at 4 p. m., people in Clyde will know that the 20th annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale is underway. Dates of the sale are Feb. 14-24.

Four different kinds of cookies will be sold: assorted sandwich, mint, butter-flavored shorties and peanut butter. The packages will sell for \$1.00 each or \$10.00 a case. Each package contains 13 to 15 ounces - depending on the kind. It is hoped every household will take advantage of this bargain size package and buy by the case. The cookies will keep indefinitely when frozen. There are 10 packages to the case.

The 1973 council goal is to sell a total of 68,000 packages or 6,800 cases. "If this goal is met," Scout officials state, "it will go for financing and maintenance of the council's resident camp."

The camp now has a Brownie unit - which consists of five camper buildings, a latrine, and a unit shelter; a Junior unit - which consists of eight camper tent frames, two staff tent frames, a latrine, and a unit shelter which has recently been remodeled; and a Cadette-Senior unit - which consists of eight camper tent frames, two staff tent frames, and a combination latrine-unit shelter. The newest unit to camp is the Mariner unit - which is a self-contained building housing 16 girls and two counselors. This unit is located on the waterfront and is limited to girls participating in waterfront program activities.

The camp features a number of large structures in addition to those in the camper units. It has an airy, modern dining hall which will accommodate 132 campers and staff. An infirmary for treating minor accidents or illness among campers and staff is also a feature of the camp. The camp has a swimming pool large enough to accommodate the needs of a camp for the foreseeable future.

When camp is in session, the infirmary is supervised by a registered nurse under the direction of a licensed physician from Brownwood. A caretaker is employed the year round to care for the camp and to help process troops in and out of the camp. Troop camp buildings are available for troops to use throughout the year.

Camping is an important part of the Girl Scout year round program. More and more girls are taking advantage of the camping opportunities each year. Since it is the belief of the Girl Scout organization that camping should be made available to all girls, the Heart of Texas Council makes every effort to provide facilities for the best camping program possible. The camp will be on operation for six weeks this summer - with all girls from the second through the twelfth grades eligible to attend. Camp registrations will open April 1.

"With the development and maintenance of a first class girl's camp as a goal toward which to work, I'm sure the Girl Scouts in Clyde will be working hard to sell their quota of cookies. We are again asking the support of friends of Girl Scouts in making this annual sale the best yet," Mrs. Willard Moore, Girl Scout cookie chairman emphasized.

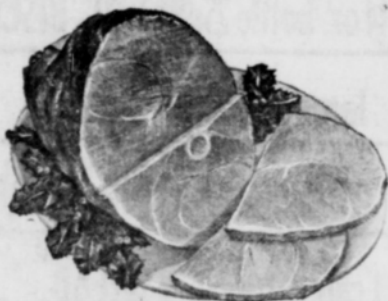
