Bicentennial Plans Discussed Thursday

Representatives from a number of organizations and churches were on hand Thursday afternoon of last week for the meeting to discuss Knox City's plans for the upcoming Bicentennial program.

Chamber of Commerce president J.B. Tabor presided and explained to the group that the primary purpose of the meeting was to bring everyone closer together in the effort to appreciate America more. Each town in the state, as well as the nation, is asked to work toward a definite project. The major categories of the Bicentennial program are Heritage '76, which will seek to sharpen public awareness of the need for the preservation of the remaining tangible evidences of our American history and culture; Festival U.S.A., a communion, a nationwide joining of hands which suggests face-to-face participation -- to see, to sing, to touch, to dance, to discover, to explore, to get to know each other, to experience first hand; and last, but not least, Horizons '76, which focuses on the future, especially America's third century.

Mayor Buddy Angle, unable to attend due to previous commitments, had Mrs. Faye Railsback, city secretary, read a letter to the group explaining that he had appointed city councilmen Carl Shelton and Celso Gonzales as ex-officio members of the Bicentennial committee. He then appointed all persons present as members of the committee, and added that additional appointments would be made later, as the need arises.

The group elected Mrs. Doris Crowover as general chairman; Mrs. Mary Vaughn as chairman of the Heritage committee; Mrs. Jeff Graham as chairman of the Festival U.S.A. committee; and J.B. Tabor as chairman of the Horizons committee. Brenda Harris and Jimmy Lynn, Knox City High School students who serve on the Chamber of Commerce board as youth directors, were named to head the School Activities committee. Mrs. Faye Railsback was chosen as secretary-treasurer for the group.

Three hundred and seventy-five agriculture loan officers of banks and county agents in West Texas were asked: "If a good, workable, new bracero program could be worked out between Mexico and the United States, how many braceros do you estimate would be needed in our county?"

A tabulation of the replies from 112 of the 132 West Texas counties indicates a need for 55,854 bracero agriculture workers.

In a letter to President Gerald R. Ford dated October 3, J. Fike Godfrey, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce stated that "over a year ago on August 1, 1973, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce formally called for a reinstatement of the bracero program and, at that time, urged the West Texas members of Congress and the two Texas senators to work for the establishment of a workable program."

"The 132 West Texas counties produce approximately 55% of Texas agriculture income and using this percentage as a projection for the state, it would seem to indicate that Texas agriculture might be able to use as many

Godsey Brothers Suffer Injuries

Joe and Dan Godsey, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Godsey, and students in O'Brien School, had a close call Thursday evening when they were unloading some irrigation pipe from a trailer. The boys stood one pipe up on end to shake the sand out when it touched an overhead electric line carrying 7,200 volts. Both boys received burns to both hands and feet. West said the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in the average city fire," the Farm Bureau president added.

Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The County Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual Firemen's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 1,200 firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past ten years. Attending from Knox County this summer was A.T. Holcomb, from Knox City.

The state and local Farm Bureaus also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured property.

This valuable training is offered on a no-tuition basis and all materials are free. Students must be at least 19 years of age and not currently enrolled in public schools.

BUILDING A BETTER WORLD

The next time you're using a beautifully landscaped American highway or crossing a streamlined bridge, you may, without realizing it, be driving along an important roadway that has won what amounts to an "Oscar" for civil engineering achievement.

The National System of Interstate and Defense Highways—famously called the Interstate Highway System—was awarded a Special Civil Engineering Achievement Award by the American Society of Civil Engineers in connection with its annual Outstanding Civil Engineering Achievement Competition.

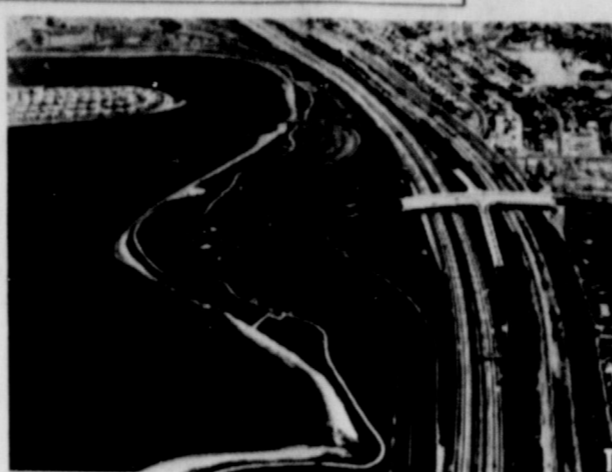
It's the first time that the 70,000 member professional society ever made a Special Award. So what's so special about the Interstate Highway System?

To begin with, by the time it has finished winding its way across the country in 1980, connecting the principal cities, towns and industrial centers—in addition to serving our national defense—it will be 42,500 miles long. Straightened out, it could reach around the earth at the equator 1 and 3/4 times.

The Interstate Highway System is without question the largest public works project in the history of man. Compared with it, the Great Wall of China and Egypt's pyramids, although they took a lot longer to build because of lack of modern technology, were mere child's play.

The statistics of the Interstate System are staggering: cost, mileage, materials used, manpower and benefits to the public.

The cost, for example, is \$76 billion, all paid by user taxes. One aspect that impressed the American Society of Civil Engineers is the fact that, despite its staggering size, the highway system is a real public money-saver.



A section of America's Interstate Highway System, which will be 42,500 miles long when it is completed in 1980. From 1956, when it was started, to its expected completion in 1980, a saving of \$139 billion is expected, about twice the cost. How does it save? By lowering fuel consumption, accidents, repair bills and travel time by passenger cars and trucks.

The system includes the most important highway routes in the United States, except Alaska. It is, in short, the best thing to have happened to overland travel in the country since Jesse Chisholm's heavily-loaded wagon cut deep ruts through Indian territory in the Midwest prairie more than a century ago and laid down a trail used for decades by traders and drovers.

Already the Interstate is carrying more than 20 percent of all highway travel. Of this total, truck travel comprises 18 percent in urban areas and 25 percent in rural areas.

Presently about 700 million miles are traveled daily by vehicles over the interstate system. In 20 years, highway officials expect, this figure will be doubled.

Another thing, the project's size and cost are such that new and more durable materials were developed

as well as new effective and money-saving construction methods. What has been learned building the Interstate is being applied to other design and construction work.

This is also true of maintenance. Operation is checked at all stages and after necessary corrections are made, the improvements are built into later engineering design. In effect, the highway system is being constantly improved. The system also has developed innovations in bridge design that make them more beautiful and safer.

There is an added benefit for communities served by the highway system: value of surrounding land has increased and business and industry has benefited—particularly in the expansion of employment opportunities and the more efficient distribution and movement of people and goods.

With the Interstate you can't really say any more that the trouble with travel is that the car of tomorrow is being driven on the highway of yesterday by the driver of today. The highway is quickly catching up with tomorrow—and the Interstate is leading the way.

"The results of the survey would seem to indicate that the American Embassy in Mexico and people close to agriculture in West Texas hold two widely different views on the availability and need for agriculture workers."

President Luis Echeverria of Mexico has been quoted in a recent newspaper wire service story from Harlingen that "he would like to send as many as 300,000 workers to the United States."

In another wire service story from Mexico, President Echeverria announced in Mexico City that he soon will meet with President Ford at the Mexican-American border to discuss American migrant workers in the United States. "We will discuss the bracero problem," Echeverria said.

"Because of this announced meeting between you and President Echeverria, and the upcoming discussion on the bracero program," Mr. Godfrey wrote, "the West Texas Chamber of Commerce felt the survey results would be helpful to you."

Accompanying the letter were supporting data and material on the actual survey which included a map of the service area of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, a sample survey form, a tabulation of the returns by Texas counties, and some unsolicited comments returned with the survey.

Farmers Union Seeks Emergency Legislation

Farmers Union cotton state representatives called for an emergency amendment to the 1973 Farm Bill providing for a mandatory increase in the cotton support price to 50 cents a pound on the 1974 crop. The action was taken at a meeting in Dallas all day Tuesday. States represented were New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Texas. Texas Farmers union President Jay Naman of Waco, reporting from the Dallas meeting, stated that an immediate increase in the 1974 cotton loan rate is essential to enable southwestern cotton producers to pay off their production loans and finance next year's crop. "High costs, a poor crop, and below the cost of production prices spell disaster to cotton producers. Congress must take emergency action to increase the loan rate to a minimum of 50 cents a pound strict low middling 1-1/16", average location. This action would move the textile industry and shippers into the competitive market.

They are now sitting back expecting farmers to bear the total responsibility of financing the crop until the trade needs it," Naman said. The Texas Farmers Union leader explained that unless the government takes emergency action, the farmers surviving the economic "wringer" will abandon Cotton production in 1975 and instead expand feedgrain production substantially. This could create cotton shortages in the years to come and at the same time cause a feed-grain price bust. The Dallas meeting of Farmers Union cotton leaders called upon National Farmers Union to urge Congress to take the steps necessary to "save the cotton industry." The state Farmers Union organizations will send urgent appeals directly to state congressional delegations soliciting support for an increase in the loan price. "The action to save cotton farmers must be immediate. The production problems including high costs and unfavorable weather conditions

have created serious problems, but we are faced with the situation we can't sell our crop for the cost of production, thing less than a sub increase in the loan provided for by speculation, will spell our ruin to thousands of western cotton producers. Naman said.

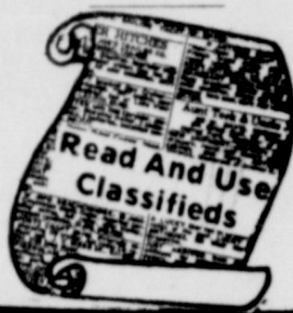

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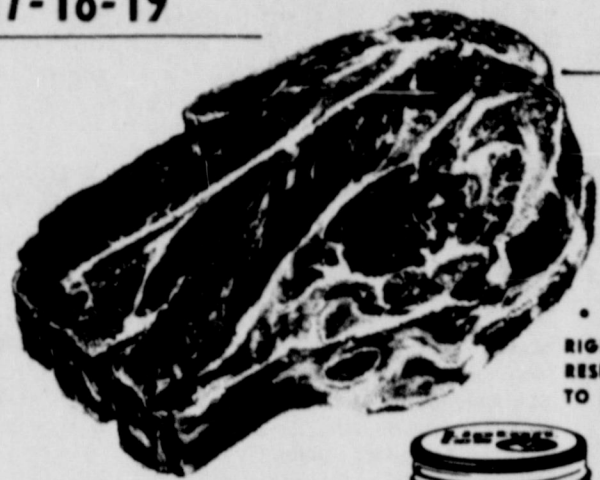
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
